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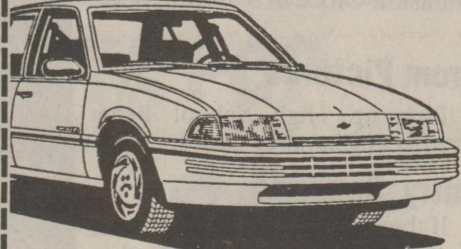

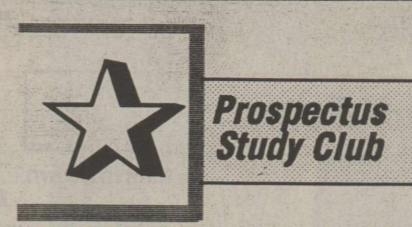

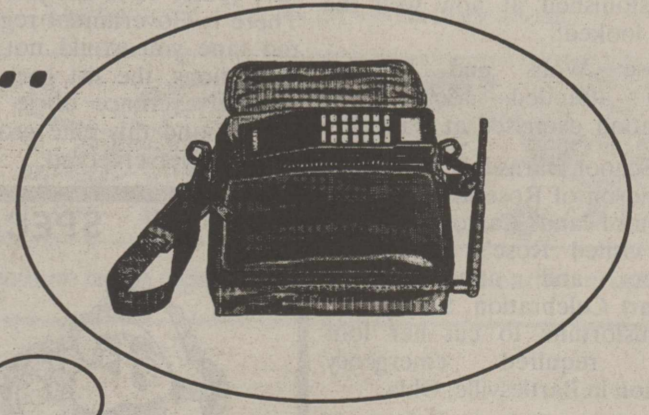

**WHAT IF?**

Dear Editor:

I have for many days now have been thinking of how that I could approach this article and communicate my thoughts to you, the citizens of this fine community. In thinking about what to say and how to say it, I happened to pick up the May 1992 Edition of Readers Digest and happened upon an article entitled "RESCUE SQUAD". I would like to quote the introduction to that article.

"Pat Ivey's life as a suburban mom was rewarding, but she had to admit to herself, that something was missing. She felt she was taking more than she was giving."

"She considered her options. She had once been a school teacher and could always go back to that. Or she could try...something else. That "something else" came in the form of a casual invitation to join the local rescue squad."

"For someone who couldn't stand the sight of blood or the sound of an ambulance, it hardly seemed the natural choice. Yet one night here she was, part of a team of Emergency Medical Technicians, working quickly and smoothly in cramped, speeding ambulances, fixing broken bleeding bodies-doing their best to cheat death."

As I read this article I could not help but think of my own career as an EMT-Paramedic. I can, and others can as well, identify with what the author was saying in this book section of the Readers Digest.

It has been just over five years since Dorothy and I left Stratford, our home of almost 27 years, to

move to Amarillo, and then on to Littlefield, Texas. In that brief period of time there has been a drastic decrease in the numbers of volunteers for EMS duty in this community, especially for those volunteers who can take call in the daylight hours. This fact disturbs me because this community depends heavily upon volunteers to keep the emergency services staffed.

And then I thought, WHAT IF, one day the Ambulance was called, and it could not respond because no one was available for call...? That is a frightening thought, but it happens to be a very real thought.

Texas Department of Health has certain Standards that must be met before that Ambulance can run. There must be, for one thing, a minimum of two certified individuals on board the ambulance before it can legally transport the sick or injured. It becomes very easy for each of us to say, "Oh, I could not do what you are doing", or "It really is not my responsibility. This happens to be the responsibility of the Hospital District." But in reality folks, it becomes the responsibility of each of us to help look out for the other person in this

community. Let us not become as Cain, when he asked God, "Am I my brother's keeper?" But on the other hand we should be as the Good Samaritan, who cared enough to take his time, his transportation, his oil, his wine, and his money to care for a stranger.

On Monday evening June 15th there will be a public meeting conducted by the Texas Department of Health concerning a requested variance from State Minimums for Certified personnel on board the Ambulance. This becomes a frightening situation, and should be one of concern for every citizen in this community. We have been privileged over the years here to have a large group of individuals who were willing to give of themselves and train to take care of the sick and injured. You have become accustomed to the very best of Pre-Hospital Emergency Care in this community. At one time there were 7 paramedics, 1 EMT-Intermediate, and numerous basic EMT's in this community. This is no longer the case.

I would encourage everyone in this community to be present at this meeting on June 15th, and participate in the meeting. This

of nitrogen in mid to late summer encourage a rapid growth rate in the fall. In most cases large amounts of high nitrogen fertilizer should not be applied after the first of June. Trees should be pruned only during the dormant season or in early summer. If possible reduce irrigation in late summer and early fall. This does not mean cutting off all water but apply only enough to prevent tree stress. Once the trees are dormant, make sure the soil is kept moist. Trees in dry soil are more likely to suffer winter injury than trees in moist soil. These practices are difficult to follow if a tree is part of a landscape because large amounts of nitrogen fertilizer and water are often required to maintain the lawn.

Remove freeze injured limbs, so that they will not be entry sites for canker and wood rotting organisms. It is best to wait until the trees have completely leafed out before pruning off the damaged wood. The use of wound paints is only suggested in areas where oak wilt is a problem and then only on Spanish oaks, live oaks and black jack oaks. The wound paint serves as a barrier to beetles that might be carrying the oak wilt fungus.
