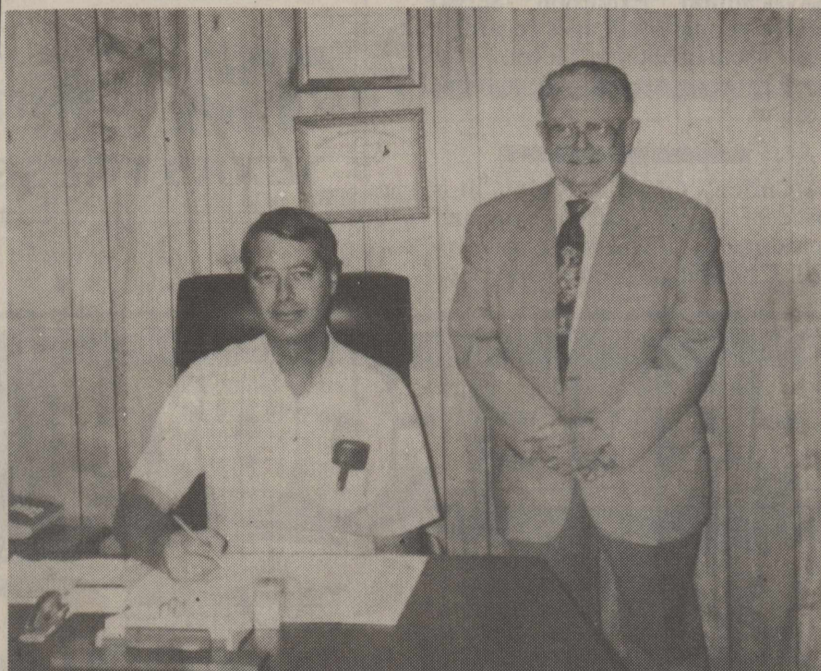

Craig & Reinart Seated As New Board Members

The Board of Trustees of Stratford Independent School District met in Regular Session on June 11, 1992, at 8:00 p.m. Old Business was conducted by reading and approving the May 7 minutes, and approving paying

May Bills.

Rusty Craig and Rick Reinart were seated as new Board members and election of officers was held. Board President is Jack Rhoades; Vice President, Rick Reinart and Secretary, Kenton Kimball.

Kay Brizzolara met with the board to present several options available through her business of applying for grants available to the school. These grants would be used for a computer lab in Mary Allen Elementary and Middle School. The Board voted to have Ms. Brizzolara apply for the available grants.

The resignation of Neal Hugg was accepted with regrets.

In other business, school lunch prices were set for the 1991-93 school year. The prices will remain the same as they were for 1991-92; Mary Allen Elementary and Jr. High, \$1.25; High School \$1.35; Teachers \$1.50 and Visitors \$3.00. Breakfast prices will stay at \$1.00 for students and \$1.50 for teachers and visitors.

The Board discussed and adopted a policy on "Individual Learning: Credit by Exclamation", and Steve Haynes reported on the National Honor Society.

Superintendent Brite gave a report on transportation; reservations for the TASB convention; Sherman County Economic Development Corporation; swimming pool; and city police salary.

Executive session was called for the purpose of discussing salaries. In Regular Session the Board voted to pay above base salaries of \$2400 and \$2800, plus a portion of personnel insurance. Proposed salaries were accepted for auxiliary and administrative personnel.

The Board adjourned at 1:00 a.m.

PTA Update

On January 30th the Texas Supreme Court ruled that the method of financing public education in Texas was unconstitutional...again. The Court ruled that the County Education Districts created by the legislature in SB351 was in fact a state property tax with a tax rate set by the state and this is not legal under the Texas Constitution. However, the Supreme Court ruled that the CED's would remain in existence and continue to collect taxes, giving the legislature until June 1993 to write a new plan. Another suit has been filed by several major taxpayers challenging the right of the court to mandate the payment and collection of a tax already ruled to be unconstitutional.

Meanwhile, what comes next is unclear. Governor Richards has said that she will call a special session this spring or summer to try again for the third time to write a plan that will adequately fund education, be politically feasible, and satisfy the courts. This is a tall order! The Supreme Court gave no indication of what type plan they might accept. Possible solutions being mentioned include a constitutional amendment to validate the funding method decided upon or limit the Supreme Courts; review of the finance system, adoption of a state property tax or income tax, a state tax on limited entities such as mineral production or utilities, and massive school consolidations- especially the wealthiest 5 to 10% of districts.

This is going to be a most difficult session for the legislators. Every member of the House and Senate is up for election due to the court-ordered redistricting and several of the important players in the past three attempts at writing finance plans have announced that they are not seeking reelection. We, the voters, have perhaps the best opportunity ever to make our voices heard because for the first time there doesn't seem to be a plan already written and just waiting to be introduced and passed by the powerful committees of the legislature.

I urge you to study this matter carefully and stay informed. Talk to your administrators and school board members and find out how the various plans will effect your school. Then, tell you elected representatives! Write, call, or visit and express your views. Remember that they are elected to represent YOU and they can only do that if they know how you feel on the issue.

Make a check of the vehicle to include tires, brakes, belts, hoses, wipers, lighting and fluid levels and include spare parts for any minor repair that might

Computer Training Center To Feature Microsoft Works

To help new computer users make better use of a versatile software program many receive when they purchase their computer hardware, The Texas Agricultural Extension service is offering a special course June 25-26 at the Texas A & M Computer Education and Training Center here. The course is "Introduction to Microsoft Works".

Microsoft Works, by Microsoft, is an inexpensive, integrated computer program that is included free of charge in many computer hardware purchases. Microsoft Works contains four applications, a word processor, spreadsheet, database and communications program in a Windows-type environment.

"These four applications more than meet the computing needs of the average user," said Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension Service economist and marketing specialist, instructor for the course. Each of the components is stand-alone package, but when convenient, information can be exchanged among the tools. Many commands are shared by all components of Microsoft Works, lessening the amount of time needed to learn the program.

During the workshop participants will learn the intricacies of the word processor, data base and spreadsheet, and will be introduced to the communications package. Participants will learn the basics of opening, closing and saving files. They will type a letter, then discover ways to "make it pretty" with Works' editing features. They will create a database, enter data, then sort and manipulate the date to generate the desired report. Participants will also develop a budget on the spreadsheet, with formulas to speed calculation.

The cost for the two day course will be \$100. This will include catered lunches on both days and education materials. Spouses are

Let's End Family Violence

Numerous changes enacted by the Texas Legislature in 1989 have created new procedures concerning Family Violence that will require law enforcement agencies to update themselves and integrate these new procedures into court and police procedures. What can each of us as individuals do to prevent the cancerous spread and continuation of family violence?

The best way to prevent such tragedies is to realize this is not a rare happening. Become aware that family violence is an ugly fact of life in thousands of Texas homes. Hold our law enforcement agencies responsible for the arrest of the abuser and insist that persons holding public offices are helpful in issuing protective orders for the victims of this violence. First of all find out what the attitude of your city's police department is in arresting violent family members. Next ask what the prosecuting attorneys will or won't do to help a victim get a protective order. Contact the judges and ask what measures they take with abusive family members.

In case you need protection from violence in your home, or if you know someone that might need protection, clip out the following question and answer and watch for regular articles from the Texas Rural Legal Aid Manual "Stopping The Violence" to appear in this paper. This information could very well save a life.

Remember your local shelter/advocacy services for victims of domestic violence is SAFE PLACE which can be reached at 935-2828 in Dumas or 1-800-753-7553 outside of Dumas. If you need transportation from Stratford to Safe Place, the contact is Terry Wagoner 396-2013.

When violence erupts—GET OUT!! Even if you are without money and have only the clothes on your back. Safe Place's Shelter will take you in. It's free and confidential. No one else has to know.

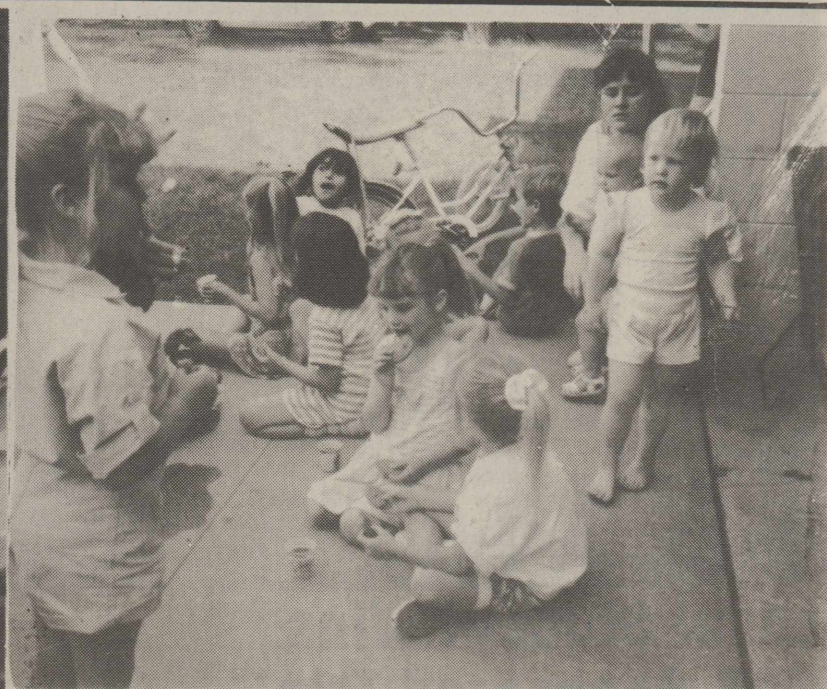

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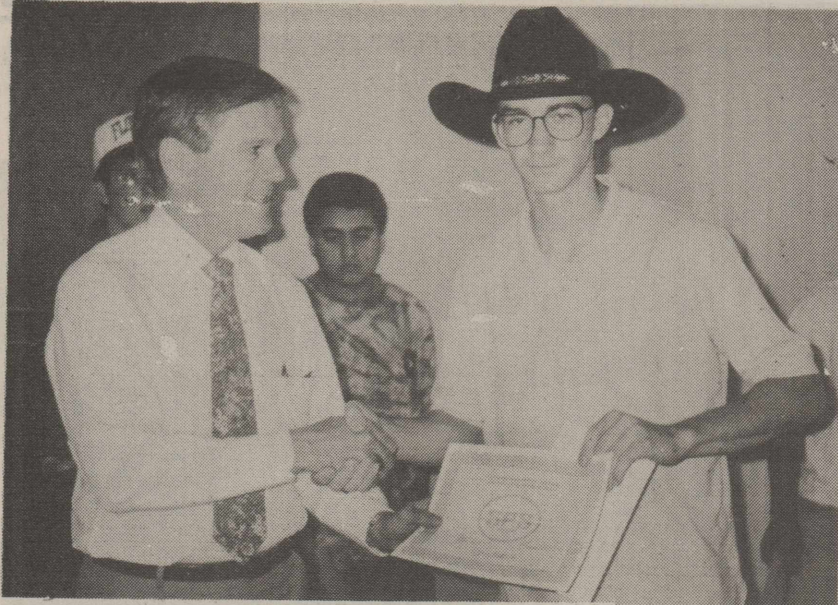

I spoke with two of them about the dangers of breathing chemicals and tried to express my concern for their safety and future health.

I am afraid for their safety, because not only is the children's vision limited, but oncoming traffic would not be able to see them. I am concerned for their future health, because inhaling chemicals is dangerous. The boys riding the bicycles would be breathing deeper and faster than normal, in addition to riding in the fog almost continuously for an unspecified amount of time.

I have visited with the City and was told the children have been warned repeatedly.

I hope that you will check with your children and inform them of the dangers. If the boys will not stop on their own, I certainly hope their parents will stop them.

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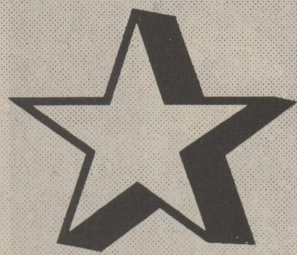

unexpectedly come up. Remember to use your headlights to allow other drivers to see you in adverse conditions. At night, do not overdrive your headlights. Over 50% of all traffic deaths happen at night. Also, remember that at night, our eyes take 4 to 7 seconds to re-adjust to night conditions after facing bright lights.

Keep posted on weather conditions. Adverse weather can affect your ability to see and be seen. In bad weather, slow down and put on the low beam headlights. If conditions warrant, it is advisable to stop and take a break. Be alert to traffic conditions and if you are traveling at night, and especially on the weekends, be aware that a lot of drivers sharing the road with you are either fatigued or intoxicated. Alcohol impaired drivers cause at least 50% of all fatal accidents. One of your best defenses against the drunk driver is your safety belt, but it is only effective if you and all your occupants wear them.

Let's all work together to make this summer a safe one on our Texas highways. Driver friendly, it's the Texas way.

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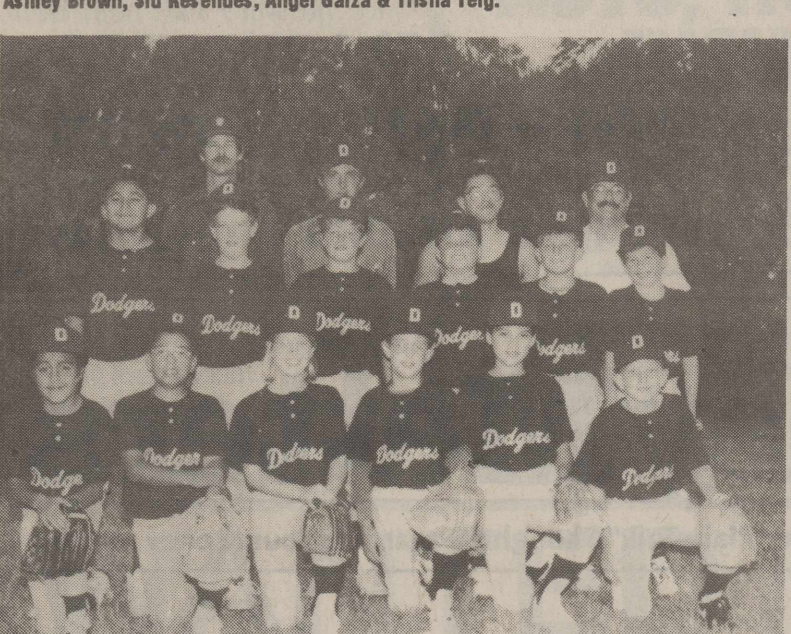
