Water Development Board Report on Public Supply Ground Water

AUSTIN (June 29, 1992)--Texas Water Development Board Report No. 336, Public Supply Ground Water Use in the Northern High Plains of Texas, has been released. The report lists the water well facilities of 50 major entities supplying ground water for public supply use in 19 counties in the northern half of the Texas High Plains.

A map showing the location of cities with public supply ground water facilities and tables listing water well information are included in the report for the following counties: Armstrong, Carson, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Grey, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, and Wheeler.

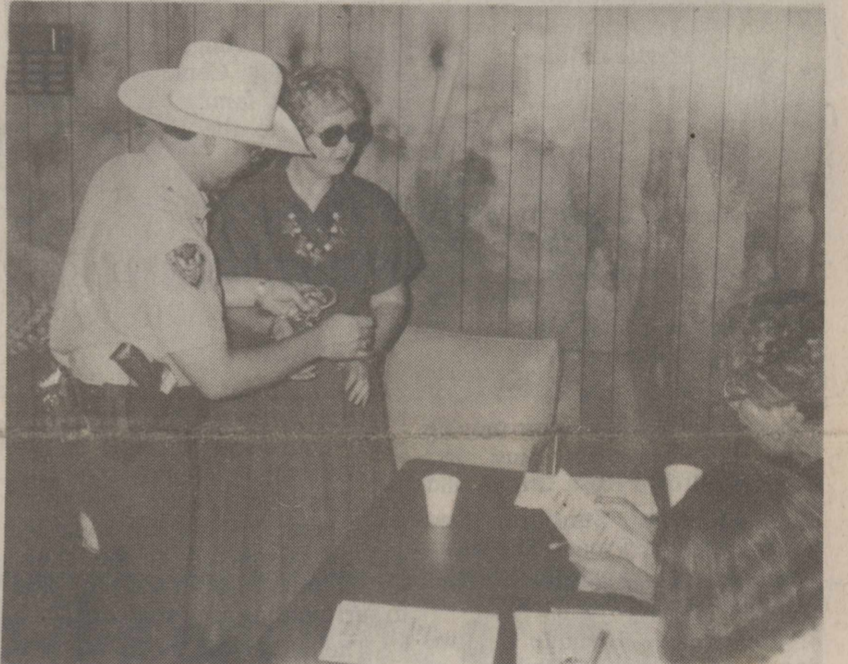

Your Right To Know

There is a report on Radon that may be of interest to you. The Environmental Protection Agency guideline considers 4.0 picocuries the 'action level' for indoor radon; a level at which you should take steps to reduce radon in your home. The radon level at a residence in Stratford is 24.4 picocuries. If you would like to test your home, kits can be purchased at the General Store in Stratford. If your home was one of those original four tested in Sherman County, please call the Office of Emergency Management at 396-2021.

A Full Scale Exercise is being planned for Sherman County on Saturday, Sept. 19th. It is time to get prepared. Since the tornados hit Fritch there have been daily articles on phases of the events pre and post disaster. There has been a minimal set of reports of advance preparations, but there have been some.
