County Agent

One of the most dreaded household pests is, without a doubt, the brown recluse spider. The bad reputation of this spider is well deserved for, although not especially aggressive, the bite of brown recluse can result in disfiguring skin ulcers, severe pain, and occasionally, life-threatening complications.

As its name implies, the brown recluse is shy and not naturally aggressive. It is most often found in sites that are rarely disturbed, such as under old boards, in piles of discarded junk, and in seldom-disturbed storage spaces in houses and outbuildings. Indoors, they are most common in cluttered closets, garages, crawl spaces, and attics.

Brown recluse nests consist of a large, irregular web with thick, sticky threads. Nests act as snares and serve as a retreat for the shy spider. They are usually constructed in dark, out of the way corners.

Identification of the brown recluse is not difficult. Look for a light brown spider, with slender legs extending over an area about the size of a quarter to a half-dollar. Two characteristics that help distinguish this spider from other similar species include the dark violin shaped marking on the back of the front portion of the body, and the semicircular, paired

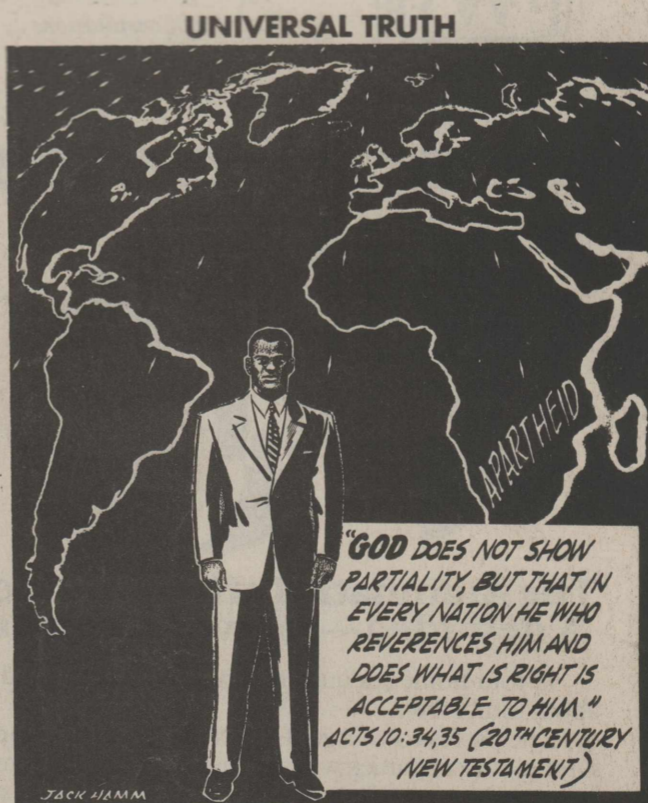

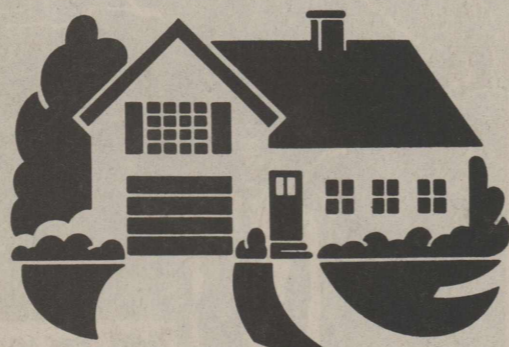

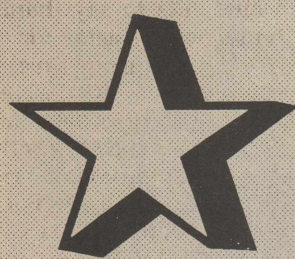

arrangement of the six eyes.

Adult brown recluse spiders are most frequently seen during the spring months. Mating season in Oklahoma, and presumably Texas, lasts from April to Early July, during which time female spiders produce up to five egg sacs, containing about 50 eggs each. The length of time required for development to the adult stage is slightly less than a year, and in the laboratory, spiders have been observed to live for up to two and a half years.

Because of the seriousness of their bite, professional treatment is the best solution to a household infestation of brown recluse spiders. A thorough treatment will consist of the following four steps: 1-Sanitation-unnecessary clutter should be eliminated, webs removed from interior and exterior areas, and a thorough vacuuming should be undertaken around, under and behind furniture; 2-Residual sprays-Residual insecticide sprays should be applied to exterior foundation, eaves, closets, storage areas, and rugs, if necessary; 3-Residual dusts-Insecticidal dust should be applied in wall voids, attics, and inaccessible crawl spaces; and 4-ULV spray-A ULV treatment of pyrethrins or resmethrin should be applied to kill exposed spiders and encourage others to move and contact treated surfaces.

Research at Oklahoma State University has confirmed that brown recluse spiders ARE very difficult to kill with insecticides. Pyrethroid insecticides (Commodore, WP, Tempo, and Demon WP) provided the best control in laboratory evaluations. Dursban dust formulations gave best control compared to Drione, Ficam and Diazinon dusts. Residual treatments were only effective up to seven days after treatment on wood and masonry surfaces in the OSU tests. Residues on vinyl surfaces provided good control up to 60 days after treatment. A vigorous sanitation and interior/exterior insecticide treatment program remains the best solution to brown recluse problems in homes.

each family member spends his or her time shows what each person thinks is important.

Youth can be most resourceful when they learn to make time count. This begins by learning the value of time. At a set time in the evening, when you can talk with your children, ask them to guess how many of the next 24 hours they will spend: *Eating, Sleeping, Watching TV, Listening to music, reading, playing/visiting with friends, working on a project they have, doing things to help around the house, doing things with another family member, playing with their pet, or other activities typical for your child.

Encourage them to write down their guesses. At the same time the next evening, go back to the list and discuss how much time they actually spent compared to what they guessed. How do they feel about how they used their time? What did they want or hope to do that was not done? What did they spend more time on than expected and why? Avoid being judgmental. Encourage them to begin thinking about what is important to them and begin the habit of planning to

use thier time for things that are most important to them.

Involve youth in making up games to test their time resourcefulness. One game might be "Time Flies and Creeps." List times when the minutes seem to pass quickest, list times when the minutes go slowest. Take turns giving answers. Another game could be "Killing Time" where each person share how they used time during the day and how they would use it differently. Give each other clues about ways to use your time more resourcefully. Youth need "free" time to think and relax. Your goal is to help them be aware of how their choices about how they use their time resource make the diffence in what they do and how they feel about each day.

Time management experts stress that time management is self-management. Resourceful youth learn to manage themselves to use their time for things that help them and their family reach their personal and family goals. They learn to get the greatest value for their time.

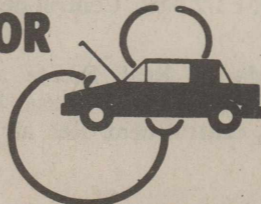

County Agent

One of the most dreaded household pests is, without a doubt, the brown recluse spider. The bad reputation of this spider is well deserved for, although not especially aggressive, the bite of brown recluse can result in disfiguring skin ulcers, severe pain, and occasionally, life-threatening complications.

As its name implies, the brown recluse is shy and not naturally aggressive. It is most often found in sites that are rarely disturbed, such as under old boards, in piles of discarded junk, and in seldom-disturbed storage spaces in houses and outbuildings. Indoors, they are most common in cluttered closets, garages, crawl spaces, and attics.

Brown recluse nests consist of a large, irregular web with thick, sticky threads. Nests act as snares and serve as a retreat for the shy spider. They are usually constructed in dark, out of the way corners.

Identification of the brown recluse is not difficult. Look for a light brown spider, with slender legs extending over an area about the size of a quarter to a half-dollar. Two characteristics that help distinguish this spider from other similar species include the dark violin shaped marking on the back of the front portion of the body, and the semicircular, paired

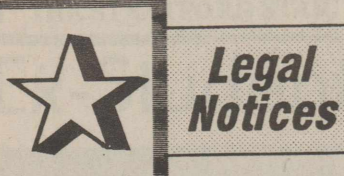

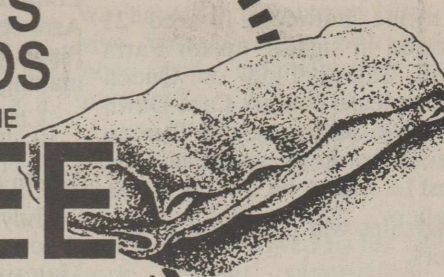

Ice Cream Winners Recipes

Vanilla Ice Cream
1st place Susie Spurlock

Mix the following in the canister of a 5 quart ice cream freezer:

- 3 cans sweetened condensed milk
- 2 pints half-n-half
- 1/2 pint whipping cream
- 2 tablespoons vanilla

Fill canister with fresh whole milk and freeze according to manufacturer's instructions.

Peach Cheesecake Ice Cream
2nd place Nina Ellison

- 1-8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
- 3/4 c. sugar
- 1 c. whipping cream
- 1/2 c. milk
- 1/4 c. peach nectar or orange juice (Texsun I used)
- 2 tsp. lemon juice
- 1 tsp. vanilla (Watkins)
- 1/8 tsp. Watkins apple pie spice
- 1 large ripe peach, chopped (3/4 cup)

In a large mixer bowl combine softened cream cheese and sugar. Beat with an electric mixer on medium-high speed till fluffy. Reduce mixer speed to low and gradually add whipped cream, milk, peach nectar or orange juice, lemon juice, vanilla, and apple pie spice. Beat till ingredients are combined. Stir in the chopped peach. Freeze mixture in a 1 or 2 quart freezer (or increase ingredients to size of your freezer. Makes about 1 quart.

Banana Nut Ice Cream
3rd Place Buffy Ellison

- 7 eggs
- 1 cup white Karo
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 cup pecans
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 ripe bananas, mashed
- 1 TBSP. Vanilla
- 1 pt. whipping cream

Beat yolks and whites separately. Beat yolks until light in color. Beat whites until they stand in peaks (this is important). Add half of sugar and beat. Add rest of sugar to whites and beat, then add both egg mixtures together. Add Karo, Cream, salt and vanilla. Pour into freezer, add bananas and nuts. Add enough milk to fill freezer. Freeze and let set 1 hour. Makes 1 gallon.

each family member spends his or her time shows what each person thinks is important.

Youth can be most resourceful when they learn to make time count. This begins by learning the value of time. At a set time in the evening, when you can talk with your children, ask them to guess how many of the next 24 hours they will spend: *Eating, Sleeping, Watching TV, Listening to music, reading, playing/visiting with friends, working on a project they have, doing things to help around the house, doing things with another family member, playing with their pet, or other activities typical for your child.

Encourage them to write down their guesses. At the same time the next evening, go back to the list and discuss how much time they actually spent compared to what they guessed. How do they feel about how they used their time? What did they want or hope to do that was not done? What did they spend more time on than expected and why? Avoid being judgmental. Encourage them to begin thinking about what is important to them and begin the habit of planning to

use their time for things that are most important to them.

Involve youth in making up games to test their time resourcefulness. One game might be "Time Flies and Creeps." List times when the minutes seem to pass quickest, list times when the minutes go slowest. Take turns giving answers. Another game could be "Killing Time" where each person share how they used time during the day and how they would use it differently. Give each other clues about ways to use your time more resourcefully. Youth need "free" time to think and relax. Your goal is to help them be aware of how their choices about how they use their time resource make the difference in what they do and how they feel about each day.

Time management experts stress that time management is self-management. Resourceful youth learn to manage themselves to use their time for things that help them and their family reach their personal and family goals. They learn to get the greatest value for their time.

arrangement of the six eyes.

Adult brown recluse spiders are most frequently seen during the spring months. Mating season in Oklahoma, and presumably Texas, lasts from April to Early July, during which time female spiders produce up to five egg sacs, containing about 50 eggs each. The length of time required for development to the adult stage is slightly less than a year, and in the laboratory, spiders have been observed to live for up to two and a half years.

Because of the seriousness of their bite, professional treatment is the best solution to a household infestation of brown recluse spiders. A thorough treatment will consist of the following four steps: 1-Sanitation-unnecessary clutter should be eliminated, webs removed from interior and exterior areas, and a thorough vacuuming should be undertaken around, under and behind furniture; 2-Residual sprays-Residual insecticide sprays should be applied to exterior foundation, eaves, closets, storage areas, and rugs, if necessary; 3-Residual dusts-Insecticidal dust should be applied in wall voids, attics, and inaccessible crawl spaces; and 4-ULV spray-A ULV treatment of pyrethrins or resmethrin should be applied to kill exposed spiders and encourage others to move and contact treated surfaces.

Research at Oklahoma State University has confirmed that brown recluse spiders ARE very difficult to kill with insecticides. Pyrethroid insecticides (Commodore, WP, Tempo, and Demon WP) provided the best control in laboratory evaluations. Dursban dust formulations gave best control compared to Drione, Ficam and Diazinon dusts. Residual treatments were only effective up to seven days after treatment on wood and masonite surfaces in the OSU tests. Residues on vinyl surfaces provided good control up to 60 days after treatment. A vigorous sanitation and interior/exterior insecticide treatment program remains the best solution to brown recluse problems in homes.
