disfiguring disfiguring skin ulcers, severe pain,
and occasionally, life-threatening and occasiona
complications.
As its name implies, the brown
recluse is shy and not naturally aggressive. It is most often found in sites that are rarely disturbed,
such as under old boards, in piles of discarded junk, and in seldomdisturbed storage spaces in houses and outbuildings. Indoors, they
are most common in cluttered closets, garages, crawl spaces, and
ctics.
Brown recluse nests consist o
large, irregular web with starge, irregular web with thick, and serve as a retreat for the shy
spider. They are usually constructed in dark, out of the way
corners. corners.
