The Sherman County Ag Day will be held Tuesday, August 11, from 9:30 to 3:00 p.m. in the Sherman County Exhibit Building.

The program will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Jimmy Chesher farm, three miles east of Stratford on Highway 15. We will observe and discuss nine varieties of irrigated corn. We will then move to the Sherman County Exhibit Building to continue the program. Topics to be discussed will include Improved Grasses and their Management, presented by Monty Cluck. Russell French, District Sales Manager with Pioneer Seed Company, will discuss Ridge Till Farming. Dr. Carl Patrick, Area Entomologist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will discuss Integrated Pest Management. Dr. Brent Bean, Area Agronomist, will discuss Herbicides in Corn and Grain Sorghum, and Application of Herbicides with Ground Sprayers. Lavon Harman, Pesticide Specialist with the Texas Department of Agriculture will

discuss Laws and Regulations Relating to Use of Agricultural Pesticides. Participants will receive three CEU's toward the fifteen required for the five year period, 1990-1994. A barbeque lunch will be served courtesy of Panhandle Commodities and the Allen Insurance Agency.

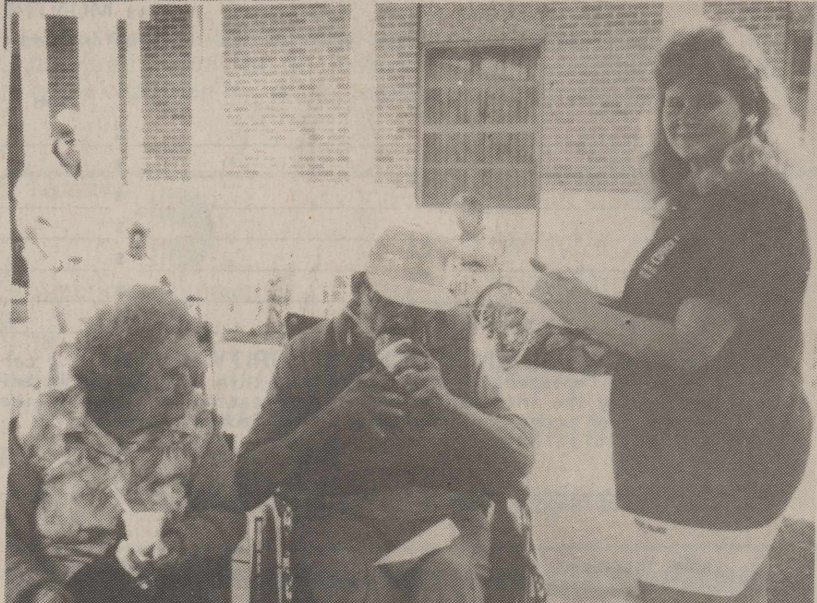

Fountain To Instruct Tailoring Technique Seminar

Barbara Fountain of Fountain Fabrics will instruct Tailoring Technique seminars on Monday, August 10th at two sessions. The training is planned to co-include with Fall home sewing and preparation for the District Make It Yourself With Wool Contest to be held November 21 in Lubbock.

The seminars will be held at the Texas A & M Extension and Research Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West at 2:00 and 6:00. Seminar participation is limited to 30 per session. A \$3 registration will be charged.

Pre-registration should be done by calling the Potter County Extension Office, 373-0713. Fountain plans a hands on seminar. Teaching points will be emphasized by actual exhibits of the construction details which the participants will be able to scrutinize in small groups.

Inside tailoring techniques to produce a professional finished look will be the seminar teaching objective. Fountain is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Fountain, who opened John Fountain Tailors in 1943, which has been in continual operation since and has gained a reputation of quality tailoring. A former teacher, motel manager and corporate trainer, Fountain is now associated at Fountain Fabrics in sales, construction buying, public relations and education. She owns an Amarillo based business which delivers Air Force and Navy Maintenance uniforms. Military patches are sewn on locally in cottage industries managed by Fountain. The seminar will be sponsored by the Potter County Home Economics committee. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

Local Counselor Participates In Workshop

Ann Nelson Parker, licensed Professional Counselor, joined other mental health practitioners from across the state in Lubbock, June 27, at Texas Tech University. The seminar was titled "Help, I've No More Stuffing Room!" Healing Past Childhood Wounds. This workshop explored various childhood wounds resulting from physical, emotional, verbal, sexual, and spiritual abuse. The effects of past childhood hurts on the adult survivor such as low self-esteem, feelings of guilt and shame, low trust, feelings of abandonment, rigid control, difficult in relationships, along with other consequences were discussed. Various healing strategies and skills were introduced, with participants learning techniques to facilitate the inner child work, grief work and the uncovering of painful memories.

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is asking the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to begin charging \$3.00 per bill, for duplicate paper copies of a customer's bill up to 15 pages. If the customer's bill exceeds 15 pages, an additional five cents per page will apply. If the customer's bill is lost or mutilated for reasons other than negligence by the customer, no charge for a duplicate copy will apply if a customer notifies Southwestern Bell within 60 days of the billing date. The effective date of this application is December 4, 1992.

If approved by the PUC, this application will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$835,000, which is an increase of approximately two one-hundredths of 1 percent (.02 percent) in the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1991. The application could affect all of the Company's approximately 4.6 million residence customers and all of its approximately 575,000 business customers should they choose to request duplicate copies of their bills.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. The deadline to intervene is August 7, 1992. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas at 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. LETTER TO HOUSEHOLDS (Multi-Child Meals) NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM/SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM

Parent/Guardian:

The Stratford Independent School serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for (Elem./Jr. High) \$1.25 and (High School) \$1.35 and all breakfasts for \$1.00. Children also may get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is .40 for lunch and .30 for breakfast.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member.

If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature.

If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

IN THE OPERATION OF THE CHILD FEEDING PROGRAMS, NO CHILD WILL BE DISCRIMINATED AGAINST BECAUSE OF RACE, SEX, COLOR, NATIONAL ORIGIN, AGE OR HANDICAP. IF YOU BELIEVE YOU HAVE BEEN DISCRIMINATED AGAINST, WRITE IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WASHINGTON, D. C. 20250.

We will let you know when your application is approved or denied.

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is asking the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer a new optional service called Remote Access to Call Forwarding (RACF) on a permanent basis beginning September 7, 1992.

RACF is an optional service that is intended for use by residence and business customers. RACF permits a customer who subscribes to the optional service Call Forwarding to activate, deactivate or change the Call Forwarding destination from a location other than the customer's premises. In order for RACF to function, it must be accessed from a push-button telephone.

The proposed monthly rate for RACF for residence customers is \$1.00, and the proposed monthly rate for business customers is \$2.75. These rates are in addition to the rates for basic local exchange service and regular Call Forwarding. (The monthly rates for Call Forwarding are \$2.10 for residence customers and \$2.65 for business customers.)

RACF is expected to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$643,000.
