Routine Traffic Stop Turns Into Drug Bust

A routine traffic stop, led to the arrest of two men from Minnesota, and the confiscation of approximately 60 pounds of marijuana. Chief Kerry Copeland, was monitoring traffic in the school zone, on Monday the morning of January 20th, when Chief Copeland, stopped a vehicle from Minnesota, for speeding in the school zone. Investigation by Chief Copeland caused him to request assistance from Sheriff Jack Haile. Further investigation by Chief Copeland and Sheriff Haile, led to the discovery of 60 pounds of packaged marijuana, with an estimated street value of \$100,000. Both men from Minnesota were arrested for Interstate traffic of narcotics and the marijuana along with the vehicle were seized by the Stratford Police Department. Both men remain in the Sherman County Jail, with their names being withheld pending arraignment and further investigation.

Seminar To Be Given Jan. 23rd

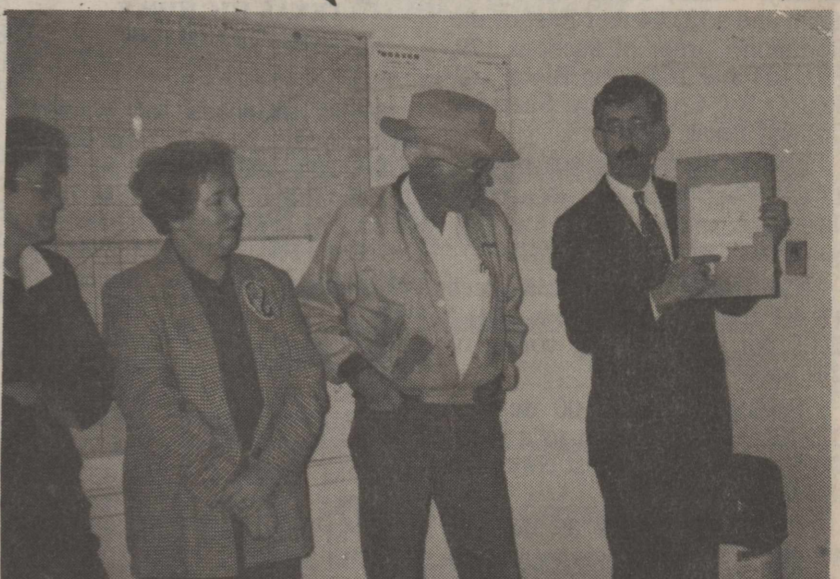

Bivins Seeking Re-election To Senate

State Sen. Teel Bivins announced on Jan. 15, 1992 that he is seeking re-election. On a two-day 16-city tour of the 31st Senatorial District, Bivins highlighted the successes of his first term in office while outlining his plan for the future.

Senator Bivins made stops in Midland, Odessa, Hereford, Amarillo, Pampa, Borger, Dalhart, Andrews, Seminole, Morton, Muleshoe, Dumas, Stratford, Spearman, Perryton and Canadian. He said his priorities

for the future were: reducing the burden on taxpayers, improving the state's economic climate, limiting terms of office and expanding control of local governments.

As one of two Republicans on the budget-writing Senate Finance Committee, Bivins led the fight to cut \$3.5 billion from the state's budget deficit. He said there are many opportunities to further reduce state government.

"In the next session, I plan to push for more cuts in the state bureaucracy," Bivins said. "For example, Texas has more than 16 paid holidays for state workers. Each holiday costs taxpayers \$40 million. These can be reduced."

Bivins said he planned to continue a pilot project he created designed to protect severance tax revenue from dramatic fluctuations in oil prices. He also stressed the need to reduce welfare fraud through the use of modern technology.

"I passed a resolution in the Senate directing the state to utilize electronic benefits transfer. Under his EBT system, food stamp recipients use a card, similar to an automatic teller-machine card, to purchase groceries, therefore preventing the buying, selling and theft of food stamps. The state needs to expand the use of EBT to further reduce costs," he said.

Clarence Highley

Memorial services were held Sat., Jan. 11, 1992 for Clarence Highley, Pharmacist, at the Central Christian Church in Portales, New Mexico. C.J. donated his body to the Texas Tech University Medical School. He was the son of Ollie Bowen and Clyde W. Highley of Goodwell, and Woodward, Oklahoma.

Clarence, nephew of Lee Ellen Bonar, was well known to Stratford residents, having assisted during his boyhood years in the operation of the St2ratford Drug Company, owned by C. Russel Bonar since 1912, and his wife, Lee Ellen Bonar, both Pharmacists.

In 1942, Clarence enlisted in the Navy, serving as an operating room technician in the South Pacific for two years. He was called back into the service during the Korean conflict and stationed at the Oakland Naval Hospital.

He attended the University of New Mexico and was a graduate of the Capitol College in Denver. C.J.'s Pill Box in Portales was opened in 1967 after he managed the Price Drug in Clovis for several years.

Public Notice

On October 4, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) that proposes a new optional service called DigiLine™ Service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10655.

DigiLine Service uses a 144 Kbps facility, typically divided into two 64 Kbps B Channels and one 16 Kbps D Channel to provide access to and from the public switched telephone network for circuit-switched voice communications. DigiLine Service also provides transmission of circuit-switched data and packet-switched data within the customer's service office area only. This service allows the simultaneous transmission of voice and data over a single residence or business telephone line from a serving office equipped for DigiLine Service.

The monthly recurring charges for DigiLine Service consist of three major rate elements: Basic Interface Facility (\$19.00); Basic Interface Equipment (\$12.00); and, an Integrated Services Network Component for each B Channel (rate varies from \$1.90 to \$7.25 per B Channel depending on the customer's class of service and location.) Other charges may also be applicable depending on the options requested by the customer.

DigiLine Service operates only with compatibly-equipped FCC Part 68 registered equipment. The service will be offered initially in the following exchanges and within the following serving offices:

DigiLine Service may be furnished in other serving offices in any of the above exchanges in combination with foreign serving office charges. In addition, DigiLine Service may be available in other exchanges upon a customer's bona fide request. A bona fide request is a written request for service. Upon receipt of the bona fide request, Southwestern Bell will conduct an economic analysis to determine the financial viability of offering the requested service.

Southwestern Bell expects DigiLine Service to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$236,000.

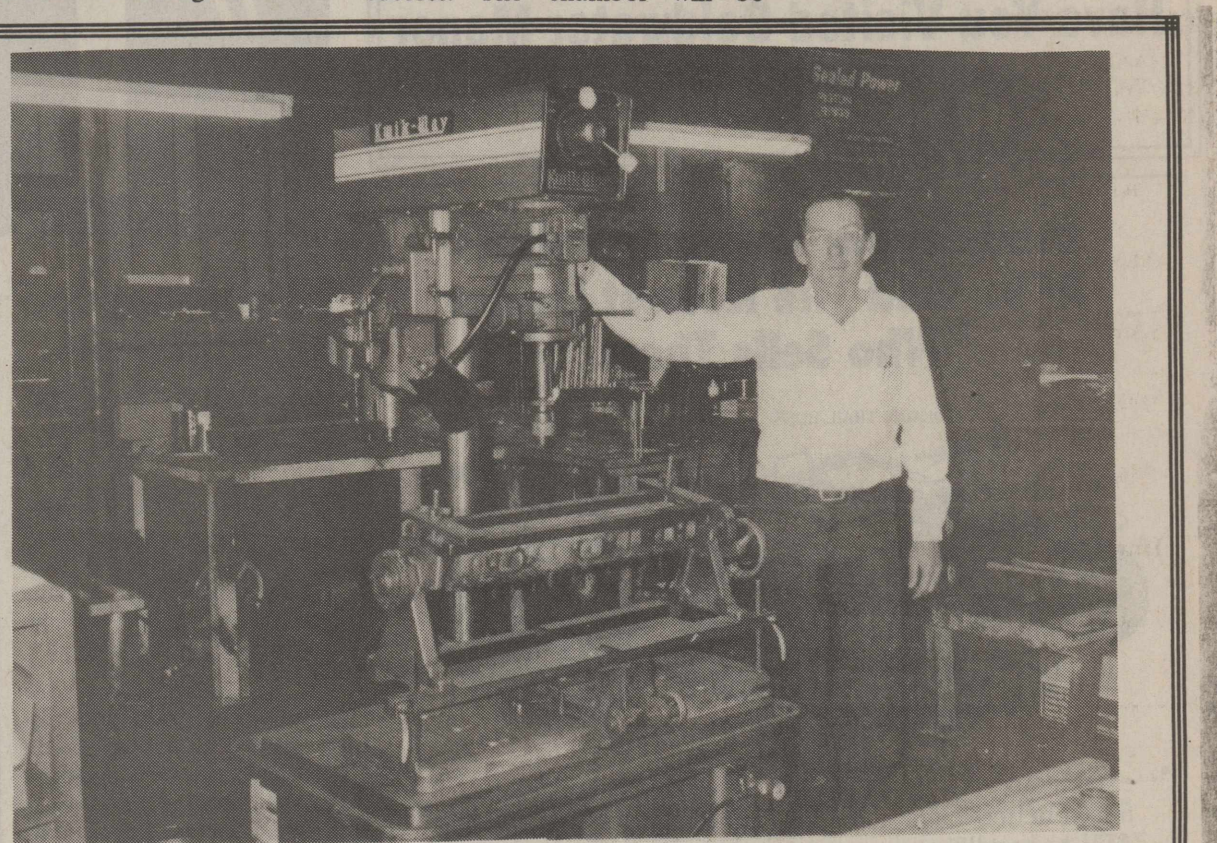

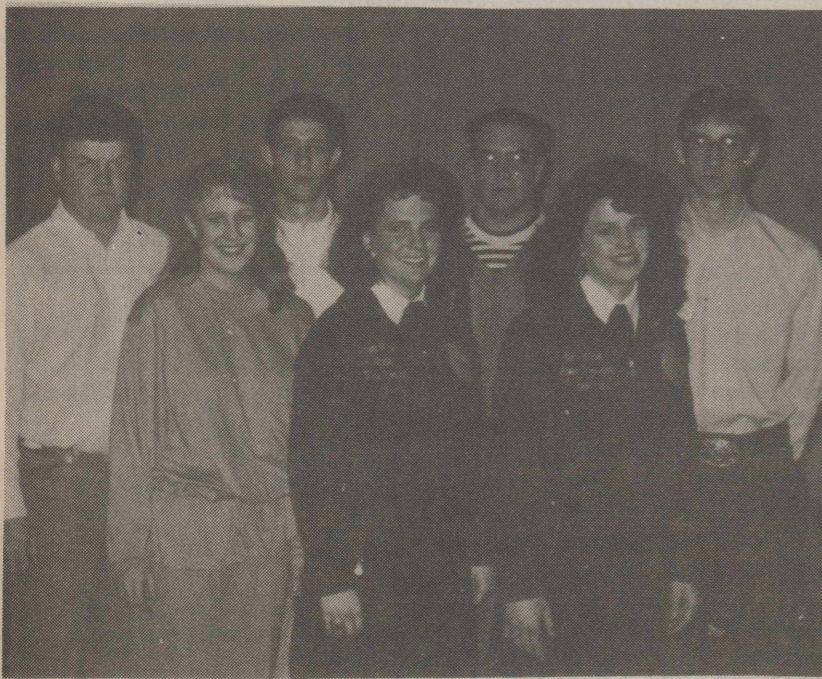

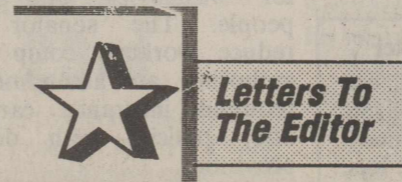

Binvs said the state's economic climate should be a priority for the next Legislature. He pledged to continue the lead in the Senate to improve the state's product liability laws, which now encourage frivolous lawsuits and hurt the Texas economy. Additionally, Binvs said he would continue to make worker's compensation coverage affordable for businesses and working people. The senator helped reduce worker's comp cost by authoring an amendment that required insurance carriers to offer policies with deductible provisions.

Citing other priorities, Binvs said the Legislature should limit terms for its members. "The redistricting process proved that the incumbent Democrat majority is interested in only one thing—preserving its long tenures," he said. Binvs has co-sponsored a bill to limit terms for state senators, representatives and statewide elected officials.

Binvs said he was alarmed when, in November, 1991, Attorney Gen. Dan Morales overturned a 50-year precedent

that permitted local water districts to manage groundwater. By transferring this authority to the Texas Water Commission, Morales stripped local water districts of their purpose. Binvs said he will offer legislation returning control of groundwater to local districts. He noted that local control of education and mental-health services also should be expanded.

Regarding health-care insurance, Binvs denounced the lack of choices available to Texans. "Companies offer a uniform policy with broad coverage that is very expensive-A

Cadillac plan. Texans should have the choice of a basic Chevrolet policy with options-a less expensive plan meeting their individual needs," he said.

Binvs also vowed to lead the state in deregulation of intrastate trucking rates. "It costs twice as much to send a load of goods from West Texas to Texarkana, Texas, than it does from West Texas to Texarkana, Arkansas. We need to reduce rates and open up the industry. Free market forces should determine trucking rates and markets, not government bureaucrats," he said.

Texas more strictly regulates the trucking industry than any

other state, he noted.

Teel Binvs has spent his entire life in West Texas, building his business and raising his family. He continues his family's four generation involvement in ranching as a businessman and cattleman.
