Carole will train select volunteers, who will in turn train Girl Scout leaders throughout the area. Carole's innovative techniques and dynamic style will inspire our trainers as they prepare Girl Scout leaders to effectively meet the challenges of leading young women into the next century", said Jo Salley, president of the local Yuca Girl Scout Council. "The leaders are the backbone of Girl Scouting--the direct link to the girls."

Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. requires that each instructor be certified before training other volunteers to be trainers, thereby establishing a consistent, nationwide standard of competency. Only candidates with demonstrated abilities in planning, design, delivery and evaluation methods are awarded the certification. Certification is valid for three years. Re-certification requires additional courses related to training or an individual development plan.

All proposals shall be accompanied by a cashier's or certified check written upon a national or state bank in the amount of five (5%) per cent of the total maximum bid price payable without recourse to the County of Sherman or a bid bond in the same amount from a reliable surety company, as a guarantee that the bidder will enter into a contract and execute a performance bond within ten days after notice of award of contract to him. Mrs. Everett was quoted that she felt the rapid pace of the U.S. causes a loss in that parents forget to love their families as they should. In Mexico education is more family oriented.

Mrs. Saenz said there are three classes in Mexico: rich, middle class and very very poor.

Mrs. Ortega was born in a small village where school was only taught to the second grade. It is now upgraded to sixth grade. School hours are 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. In many of the larger schools, students wear uniforms. Students often walk two to three miles to school.
