

This is Farmers' 33rd consecutive float entry in the world-famous parade. Over the vears. Farmers has won numerous prizes for its entries, including the Grand Prize.



Our Museum Board were hostesses to the Northwest Association of Museums last Friday, with 80 folks registered. The Imagination Station and the Annex of the Depot Museum were busy places. Lots of folks stirring about in our community.
