Pecan Date Sticky Buns Makes 8 buns

Dough:

5 3/4 to 6 1/4 cups all-purpose flour

1/3 cup sugar 1 1/2 teaspoons salt 2 packages Fleischmann's® **Active Dry Yeast*** 1 cup water

1/2 cup milk 1/3 cup butter or margarine 2 eggs, at room temperature No Cholesterol PAM® Cooking






