Dental Insurance Vetoed For County Employees

On this the 12th day of March, 1990, the Commissioners Court of Sherman County convened in regular session being open to the public, at the regular meeting place in the Courthouse in Stratford, Texas, with the following members of the court present: W.C. Fesler, County Judge, Wayne Cummings, Comm. Prec. 1; Boyd Spurlock, Comm. Prec. 2; Dale Hamilton, Comm. Prec. 3; Darrell Cotney, Comm. Prec. 4; and M.L. Albert County & District Clerk. Absent none. The above constituting a quorum, the following proceedings were had to wit:

Motion was made by Comm. Darrell Cotney & seconded by Comm. Dale Hamilton that the minutes of the previous meeting be approved as read. All ayes. Motion carried.

Dorothy Haile gave a report on the Library. Circulation Statistics were presented to the Court to let them know who and what age was using the County Library.

Motion was made by Comm. Wayne Cummings & seconded by Comm. Darrell Cotney that the monthly reports of all elected officials be approved. All ayes. Motion carried.

Child Welfare Board annual report was presented to the Court.

Emergency Management Coordinator Terry Kennedy gave an oral report on Emergency Management.

Motion was made by Comm. Dale Hamilton & seconded by Judge W.C. Fesler that the monthly bills be examined and approved for payment. All ayes. Motion carried.

Recessed for lunch at 12:10 p.m.

Motion was made by Comm. Darrell Cotney & seconded by Comm. Wayne

Cummings that the bond for Deputy Tax Collector be approved. All ayes. Motion carried.

County Extension Agent, Jim Allison met with the court to discuss completion of the storeroom and livestock show barn. No action was taken.

Court recessed at 2:00 p.m. and reconvened at 2:25 p.m. to allow the clerk to attend a meeting.

Dwight Brandt met with the Court to discuss seal coating. There are 91.3 miles of paved roads in Sherman County by precinct as follows: Pct. 1, 38.4 miles; Pct. 2 46.1 miles; Pct. 3 1.0 miles; Pct. 4 5.8 miles. Motion was made by Comm. Boyd Spurlock and seconded by Comm. Darrell Cotney to advertise for bids for seal coating approximately 14 miles of Sherman County paved roads. Bids to be opened on April 9, 1990 at 1:30 p.m. All ayes. Motion carried.

Jack Osborn met with the court to discuss bidding on fuel for the County. Tabled pending additional information.

Dental Insurance for County employees was discussed. Motion was made by Comm. Dale Hamilton seconded by Comm. Wayne Cummings that Sherman County not take out dental insurance for Sherman County employees. Comm. Wayne Cummings, Dale Hamilton and Judge W.C. Fesler aye. Comm. Boyd Spurlock and Darrell Cotney abstained. Motion carried.

Linda Keener, County Treasurer, met with the Court to discuss a desk for her office. Motion was made by Comm. Dale Hamilton & seconded by Comm. Boyd Spurlock to allow the Treasurer to purchase a desk for 1698.00 for her office. All ayes. Motion carried.

Annual holidays for County employees were discussed. Motion was made by Comm. Darrell Cotney & seconded by Comm. Dale Hamilton to leave the county holidays as they are. Judge W.C. Fesler abstained. All Comm. voted aye. Motion carried.

Election equipment for the Library was tabled for further information.

Motion was made by Comm. Wayne Cummings & seconded by Judge W.C. Fesler to sign Resolution for Substitution and or Withdrawal of Securities. All ayes. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Comm. Wayne Cummings & seconded by Comm. Darrell Cotney to accept the contract with Glover and Associates for handicap accessibility for the Courthouse except that 20% will be held until a certificate of completion is given. All ayes. Motion carried.

A fax machine for the courthouse was discussed. No action taken.

Meeting was adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

Farmer Family Deduction

Employment expenses paid to farm family members are deductible if there is a clear-cut record of an employer/employee relationship.

The criteria used to establish the employer/employee concept are:

1. the salaries paid to family members must be reasonable and periodic;
2. the family members must earn their wages, and;
3. they must be treated as employees.

Also, a record of the tasks performed and hours worked by the family member employee helps to establish an income tax deduction.

USO Salutes Local Servicemember

Army Pfc. Chase P. Griffin of Stratford was among 100 U.S. servicemen and women, along with 50 Republic of Korea and 10 United Nations Command soldiers, honored in a United Service Organizations (USO) Six-Star Salute recently.

Griffin is the grandson of Wayland E. and Betty J. Brown of Stratford. He is assigned to 307th Signal Battalion, Camp Carroll and was selected to participate in the program as a guest of the USO Council of Korea and a number of other participating sponsors.

The program began in 1970 when a group of Korean civic leaders wanted to express their country's gratitude to the military community. They felt the backbone of the military was its enlisted personnel. Because the highest rank the military has ever awarded

any of its members is five stars, the honorary rank of Six Stars was created and bestowed upon all those selected to participate.

For years the USO has worked with assigned project officers from United States Forces Korea, Korea's Ministry of National Defense and the United Nations Command in organizing the gala event. However, the honorees were selected by each person's unit for their outstanding duty performance while assigned to units based on the Korean peninsula.

Local hotels donated blocks of rooms to accommodate the guests. The Korean National Tourist Corporation donated buses for sightseeing and transportation, as well as paying the bill for breakfast for each guest. Gifts and souvenirs were made possible by individual contributions and donations, and special medallions were created for presentation to the honorees.

This year's honorees were given full VIP treatment during their two day stay in Seoul. The first night the honorees were treated to a banquet at one of Seoul's largest hotels where they spent the evening in the company of admirals, generals, ambassadors, ministers, board chairman and company presidents.

Guest speaker for the gala event was United States Ambassador to Korea, Donald P. Gregg.

The following day the group were hosted by the Mayor of Seoul Metropolitan Government for a luncheon before returning to duty with their units.

Gardening season is just around the corner, and with it the need for early preparation against insect pests that are sure to be around.

First, gardeners should inspect insecticides left over from last year to determine if they are still good. Product age and storage conditions must be considered.

If properly stored, most products should have at least a two-year shelf life once they begin to be used. Dusts sometimes have a tendency to absorb moisture if the bag is not sealed tightly after each use; they should not be used if lumpy. Place bags containing insecticides in a clear, polyethylene bag and seal it with a rubber band to keep moisture out.

If dusts are two years old or older, and there is any doubt about their storage, dispose of them according to label directions and buy new insecticide.

Although liquid materials are not as likely to absorb moisture, storage is still important. Caps should be resealed tightly on the product after each use. Do not use liquids which are cloudy or milky in color or which have sediments on the bottom of the container.

Do not store pesticides on a shelf in front of a window, especially if the window gets strong afternoon sun. Do not store liquids in an area subjected to extreme temperature fluctuations. Extremes from summer to winter temperatures may not hurt the active ingredient in the insecticide, but it may damage the ability of the product to mix properly in water.

If liquid materials are at least two years old and have not been stored properly, monitor vegetables closely after spraying to determine if the pesticides are controlling insects.

It's important to anticipate pesticides that will be needed for the crops to be grown. Select insecticides by considering the plants and the period for insect control before repeating the applica-

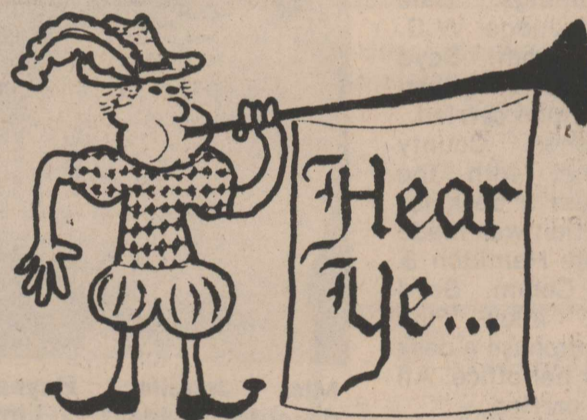

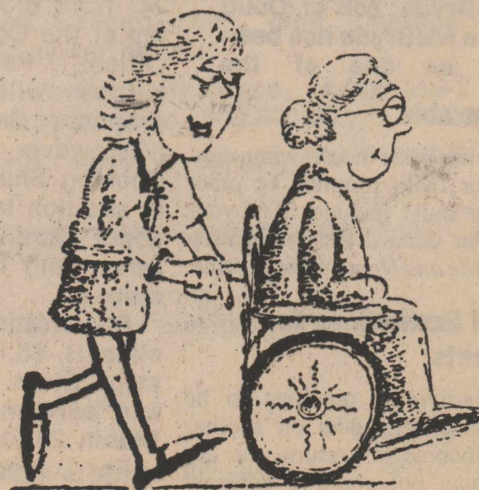

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

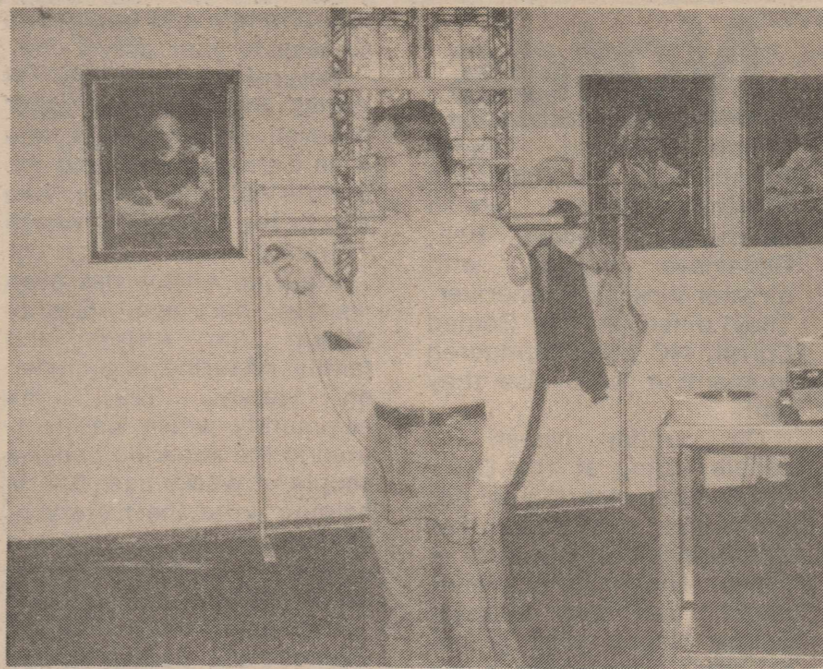

Tips & Topics

Recent publicity during the past two decades has encouraged people to reduce their consumption of total fat and saturated fatty acids. The reason for the interest in reduction of these fats has been because diets high in total fat, saturated fatty acids, and cholesterol play a major role in the high levels of blood cholesterol found in millions of Americans. Saturated fatty acid is the key dietary factor raising blood cholesterol levels. In contrast, dietary cholesterol has a smaller effect on blood cholesterol levels.

Many health organizations such as the American Heart Association, National Cholesterol Education Programs, National Cancer Institute and others, are now recommending a reduction of the total fat content of the American diet, around 40 percent total, down to 30 percent of the total calories.

Fat we eat contains fatty acids that are saturated or unsaturated, these are terms that refer to the chemical structure of the fatty acids in the fat molecules. Unsaturated fatty acids are divided into two kinds--monounsaturated fatty acids and polyunsaturated fatty acids. Food fats contain a mixture of these three kinds of fatty acids. When a fat contains a large proportion of one kind of fatty acids such as saturated fatty acids, then often it has been classified as being higher in that particular fatty acid.

Polyunsaturated fatty acids are found primarily in plant products--including safflower, sunflower, corn, soybeans, and cottonseed oils; nuts; and seeds--and in fatty fish. Major vegetable oil sources of monounsaturated fatty acids are primarily olive oil and canola oil.

In order to help reduce fat in the diet and keep blood cholesterol at normal levels, you should:

- *Eat less high-fat food (especially those high in saturated fatty acids);
- *Replace part of the saturated fatty acids in your diet with unsaturated fatty acids;
- *Eat less high-cholesterol food;

*Choose foods high in complex carbohydrates (Starch 9 fiber); and
*Reduce your weight, if you are overweight.

Saturated fatty acids are found primarily in the following foods:

- *Animal products, particularly meats & poultry with large amounts of fat and many dairy products.
- *Coconut oil, palm kernel oil, and palm oil are also very saturated.
- *Some of the saturated fatty acids in vegetable oils are also made more saturated by a process called hydrogenation.
- *Commercially-prepared & processed foods made with vegetable oils or with saturated fatty acids like butter and lard can also be high in saturated fatty acids.

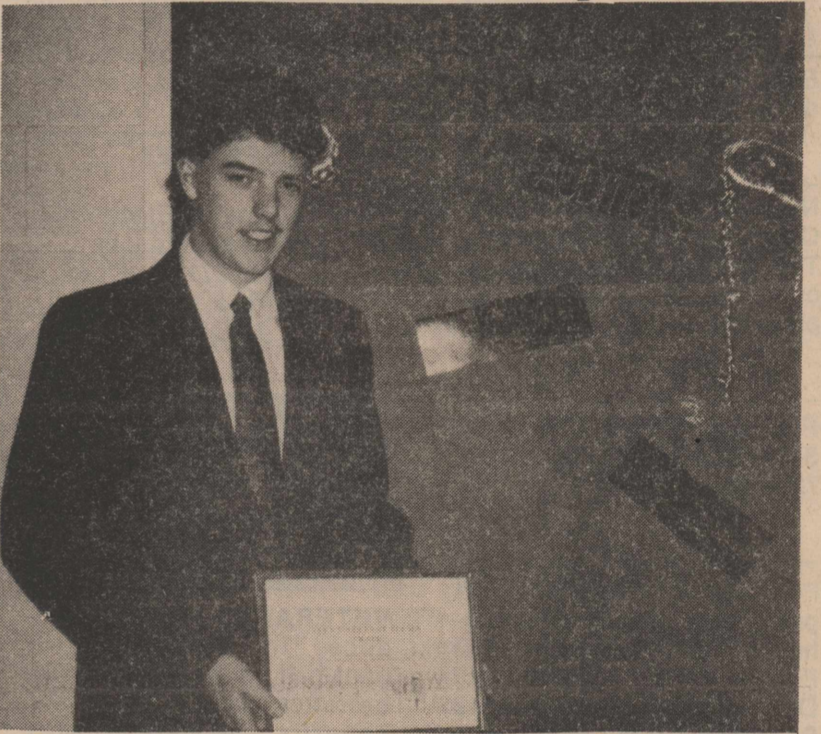
