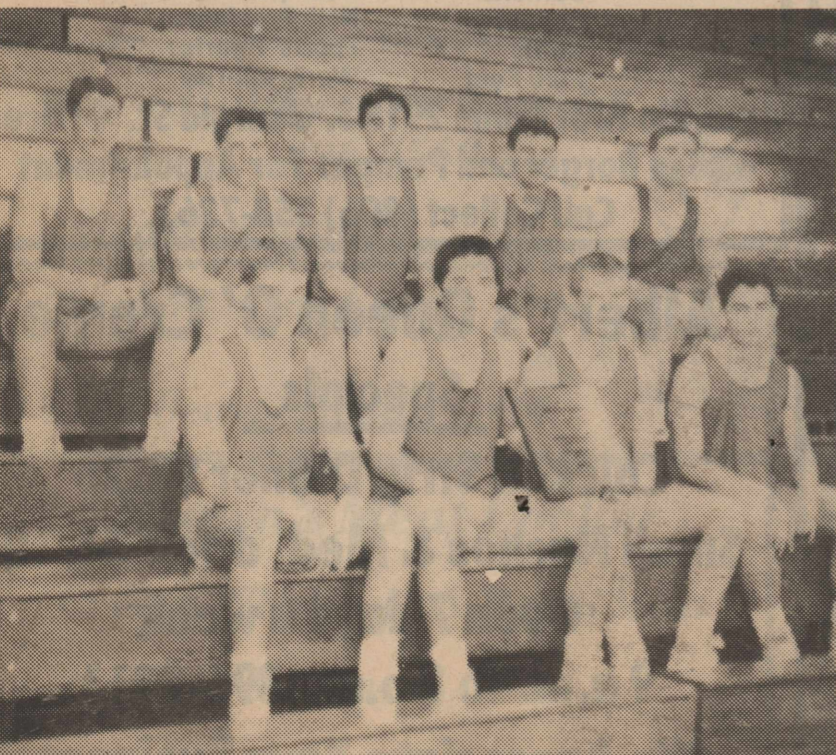

Champion Elm Tree



Travis Spurlock [right] and Thomas Reed are getting an idea of the size of this giant Elm tree. It's way too big for two people to reach around.

Travis Spurlock has a Siberian Elm Tree which is currently the second largest tree of its kind in Texas. The tree was thought to be the state champion until further research was done and a larger tree was found listed in the Texas Big Tree Registry, maintained by the Texas Forest Service. The Texas Big Tree Registry lists those trees which are the largest of their kind in the state.

An index value is calculated for comparison purposes among trees. The factors included are: tree

circumference, height, and average crown diameter. Spurlock's tree is 67 feet tall, the average crown spread is 77 feet, and the circumference is 133 inches. The champion Siberian Elm is located in Potter County. It is 54 feet tall, has an 81 foot crown spread and a circumference of 173 inches.

Spurlock's tree is approximately 40 years old. Lightning struck it in 1983 causing some damage and some pruning has been done where it touches the house. Otherwise the tree is in good condition and is well cared

FIRST 18-YEAR OLD TO REGISTER WITH SELECTIVE SERVICE. TOO OLD TO BE DRAFTED

Joseph Frank, a resident and city employee of Lafayette, celebrates his birthday today. By turning 26, Frank unknowingly establishes a milestone for an agency of the U.S. Government and earns himself a minor place in history.

Eight years ago, Frank was the first 18-year-old man to sign up and be processed by the Selective Service System under the continuous draft registration program. From today on, however, if Congress and the president order a return to military conscription under present law, Frank is too old to be drafted. He becomes the first man since Vietnam to pass through the full, eight-year-long period of draft eligibility without being drafted.

Names and addresses of men ages 18 through 25 are kept on file by Selective Service for use in a national emergency. If Congress reinstates the draft, men most likely to be called into military service would be those who turn 20 during that calendar year. Selective Service would first conduct a birthdate lottery to determine the order of call within that age group and then, depending upon the manpower requirements of the crisis, those men whose birthdays draw low lottery numbers would be more likely to be called.

There has not been a draft since 1973 when the U.S. switched to an all-volunteer military force. In 1975, the Selective Service System was placed in "deep standby" status and the requirement for men to register was suspended. But it wasn't long before several studies and commission reports noted that a draft would be needed again if the country



Weeding Out The Records

Winter is a good time to re-asses your financial habits because a year has just ended. Like most people, your financial papers and records could probably stand a little overhauling.

But before you begin a reorganizing, consider what you really need and what you can prune out. Most of us save more paperwork than necessary and it just takes up a lot of space.

Start by setting out boxes and files to hold three types of records: those you can toss, those you need to keep six or more years, and those you need to keep for the rest of your life.

THINGS YOU CAN TOSS: If you don't need the record for tax purposes or if you are sure it can easily be replaced, don't save it.

Receipts for small daily purchases do not have to be saved, especially if they have no tax consequences. But keep receipts for expensive items to settle insurance claims in the case of loss, theft or damage.

It isn't necessary to keep monthly mutual fund and brokerage statements once a comprehensive year-end statement is issued. Howev-

er, you should save trade confirmations and dividends-reinvestment statements.

This information is needed to determine your cost basis when you sell a security. Without it, you may overpay taxes when you sell the security.

You can safely discard most business receipts for less than \$25 and your credit card bills after your bank returns the cancelled check verifying that you paid the bill. However, if you need your credit card statement for analyzing itemized deductions at tax time, keep those statements with your tax records.

RECORDS TO KEEP SIX OR MORE YEARS: Plan to keep tax records for as long as they are important for any Internal Reveune Law. Keep records that support an item of income or a deduction appearing on a return until the statute of limitations for the return runs out. Usually this is 3 years from the date the return was due or filed, or 2 years from the date the tax was paid, whichever date is later.

Sometimes you may have to keep tax records for a longer period, such as in property transactions, when the basis for the new or replacement property depends on the old property's basis. Keep those records for as long as they are important in figuring your property's basis.

RECORDS TO KEEP FOREVER: These records include birth and death certificates, list of financial assets, medical records, powers of attorney, trust agreements, wills and W-2 Statements. Also keep divorce decrees and custody agreements, military papers, naturalization papers and prenuptial agreements.

Getting a handle on your paper trail will take a little time and effort, but will be worth it. Once you've accomplished this task, you'll be able to find every paper you need.

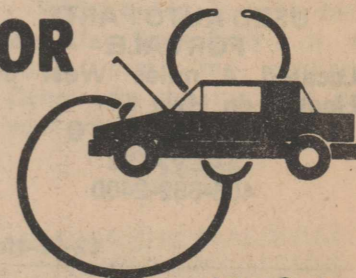

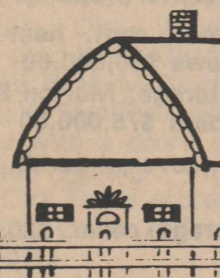

ever became involved in a major conflict. They predicted it would take too long to get men registered, classified, inducted, and trained. In 1980, after the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, President Carter revitalized the Selective Service System and reinstated the registration requirement for men. On Jan. 5, 1981, registration of 18-year-old men began again and has continued. Today using computer technology, the System can begin issuing thousands of induction orders via Western Union "Mailgrams" in three days or less, once Congress and the President give the go-ahead.

With few exceptions, Federal law requires every man to register with Selective Service within 30 days of his 18th birthday. (Men have a 60-day window in which to comply with the law: from 30 days before to 30 days after turning 18). The process is simple. Men furnish their names, addresses, and telephone and social security numbers by completing and signing a short form at any post office. A man who is out of the country around the time of his 18th birthday can register at any U.S. embassy or consular office.

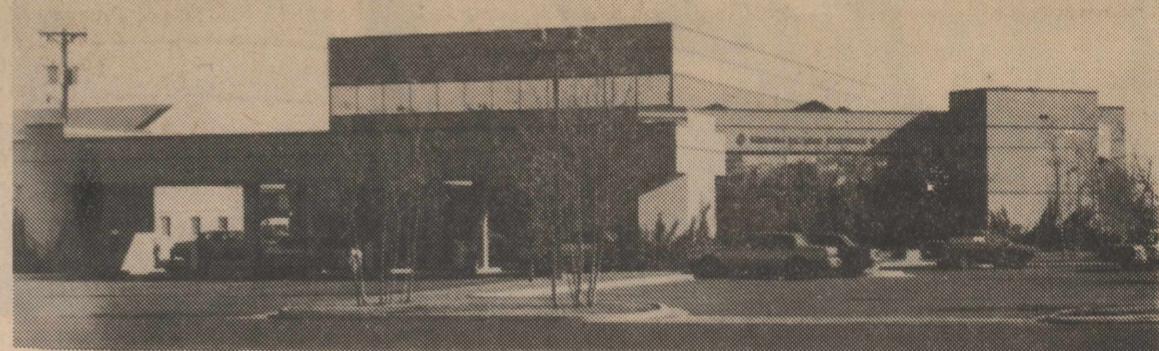

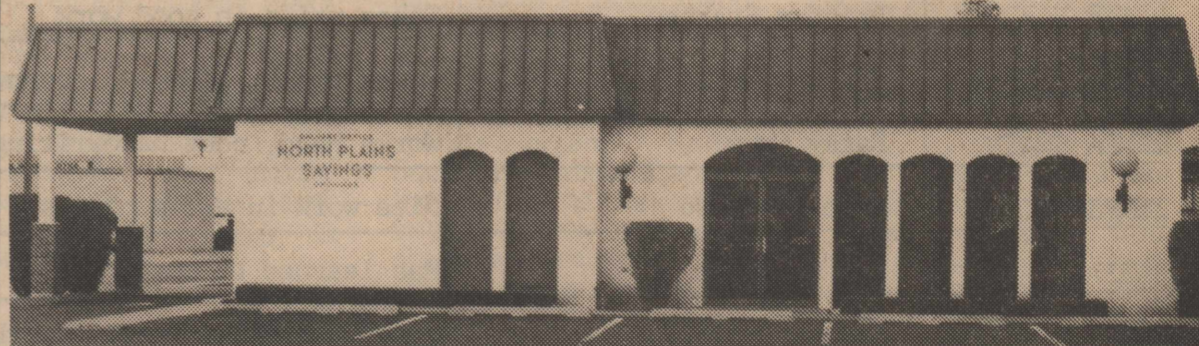
