# It's that time of year again

The flu shot program at Reese starts Monday and runs until the end of the month.

Everyone is required to receive the immunization yearly since the influenza virus tends to change over time. Since immunity is very specific, everyone will need to get vaccinated against the most current strains.

The hospital immunization team will come to each squadron to administer the shots. Unit orderly rooms will coordinate a date with the Immunization Clinic. The 'gun' which is used is a quicker and less painful method of giving the shots than the traditional hypodermic needle.

Some people will feel chills and aches, mild flu symptoms, for a day or two. This is because the vaccine contains a scaled-down live flu virus. It causes your system to produce antibodies which will protect you against the real thing.

Pregnant- women and people with known allergies to eggs are exempt from the shots. If you have this rare problem, you must come to the clinic with your medical record. A physician will review your case and determine if you are able to take the shot.





I want to thank the UEI team for giving us a thorough and tough inspection.



The second sortie Crew chiefs will be scored on numerous activities associated with aircraft launch and recovery tasks. Pilots and crew chiefs will jointly participate in aircraft preflight competitions.

On Saturday the competition will conclude with T-37 and T-38 engine change competition. A Saturday afternoon awards ceremony will complete Torchlight '87 activities.

The noise you've been hearing so early is gas cannon-sounding devices being fired in the Reese lakes area. This is done to frighten migratory birds roosting in the lakes from the flightline area. The firing scares the birds from their nesting place without physical harm.

Last year, and again this year, we experienced several problems with our aircraft because of birdstrikes. Because birdstrikes present a serious hazard to our air crews, especially during the migration season, it is necessary to carry out this procedure as early as possible, before flying begins.

I'm sorry for the inconvenience and hope this will not be going on much longer.


With any intersection on base, caution is necessary to prevent mishaps. I hope everyone on base makes an effort to observe ground safety precautions. Thank you for your call.



The first Buck Stops Here Award ever presented to an Air Force Health Facility was awarded to USAF Hospital Reese on September 10, 1987 at the annual Air Training Command Surgeons Conference.

All facilities, including Medical Centers, Hospitals, and Clinics competed for the award which was presented by Colonel John E. Murphy, Chief Air Force Medical Service Corps and Assistant Surgeon General for resources. The award cites the USAF hospital "for management innovation contributions resulting in significant cost savings and increased efficiency.," Receiving the award on behalf of the hospital were Colonel Roy L. Bobbitt, Commander, and Major Michael V. Neese, Administrator. Colonel Murphy went on to state that USAF Hospital Reese won the award based on the significant improvements and innovations throughout the facility. He further explained that Reese had done an absolutely superb job as the pilot facility in ATC for the Health Care Finder Program. Many of the innovations began at Reese in their immensely successful program were adopted by the Air Force for use.

Colonel Murphy also praised Reese's forward thinking that was shown in development of their VA inpatient Sharing Agreement, the first of its kind in the Air Force. He highly recommended that other ATC facilities look into this same type of agreement. Finally, Colonel Murphy praised the significant and sweeping improvement shown on the recent Health Services Management Inspection. He stated that these improvements had not escaped the attention of the Air Force Surgeon General.

#### VA agreement

Reese Air Force Base and the Veterans Administration announced the signing of an agreement between the two facilities providing for the sharing of inpatient services.

The agreement will enable the VA Medical Center in Amarillo to admit certain VA patients to the Reese Air Force Base Hospital. This will serve to provide needed beds in Lubbock for VA patients and benefit Air Force patients by increased resources. The care of these patients will be provided jointly by staff from the VA Outpatient Clinic in Lubbock and the Reese Air Force Base Hospital. Under this agreement, Reese agrees to provide hospital beds for VA patients that require continued, intermediate (non-acute) hospital care. This would allow the VA Medical Center in Amarillo to transfer South Plains area patients to the Reese hospital so that their hospital care can be provided at a facility closer to their families. The first patient under this agreement has already been admitted.

The result: We were able to tear down 11 World War II (WWII) buildings!!

The new vehicle maintenance complex is 40 percent completed. It will have an on-site fuel station. When this complex is finished around June 1988, we will be able to take down five WWII buildings.

Replacing the gas lines is the reason why there has been so much digging on base. The old metal gas lines were corroded and leaking—we were losing a lot of gas. The contractors should be finished with this one in October.

Phase I should end in August 1988, and then we'll head into phase II with more units entering the renovation

Some great things are going on over by the commissary. The Commissary warehouse is being enlarged. Included with this expansion will be a new bakery! This all should be done in July 1988. And two WWII warehouse buildings (located between the BX and CE complex) will be torn down.

The running track was torn out and a new, regulation 440 yard track will be put in along with a sprinkler system. This project should take around 120 days, so we're looking at a January completion date.

Renovation of Dorm 230 first floor continues. The MWR staff already mov-



According to this instruction, the listening devices mask or prevent recognition of emergency signals, alarms, announcements, human speech, the approach of vehicles, and the ability to determine from which direction sound is coming.

# Be prepared for storms

Outside you see the sky light up then you hear a loud boom. This can be a very beautiful and deadly sight.

It is estimated that at any given moment nearly 2,000 thunderstorms are in progress over the earth's surface. Lightning strikes the surface 100 times each second. There are at least 100,000 thunderstorms annually across the United States. There have been 130 deaths from lightning in the state of Texas from 1959 to 1984.

To be sure of proper actions one should know the difference between a severe thunderstorm Watch, and severe thunderstorm Warning. A severe thunderstorm Watch means severe thunderstorms are possible. A severe thunderstorm Warning means severe thunderstorms

have been sighted or indicated bicycles and golfcarts. Put by radar. If there is a thunderstorm Watch you should monitor the Emergency Broadcast System at KFYO Radio, 790 on the A.M. dial, or your television for official weather bureau information.

If you plan to be outdoors, check the latest weather fore cas and keep a weathereye on the sky


When a thunderstorm threatens, get inside a home or a large building. Do not use the telephone except for emergencies.


If you are caught outside, do not stand underneath a tall isolated tree or a telephone pole. Avoid projecting above the surrounding landscape.

Get off or away from open. water tractors and other metal farm equipment or small metal vehicles, such as motorcycles,

down golf clubs and take off golf shoes. Stay away from wire fences, clotheslines, metal pipes and rails. Remember lightning may strike up to 15 miles from the parent cloud. Precautions should be taken even if the thunderstorm is not directly overhead.

# Fire prevention week begins

Fire Prevention Week stems from history.

Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 4 through 10, 1987, marks the 76th year that fire safety has been the subject of a national observance.

It all started on October 9. 1911, when Fire Prevention Day was inaugurated. The date of October 9th was chosen because it marks the anniversary of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire of 1871"—the conflagration which killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168 million, and the fire which started people thinking in terms of fire prevention rather than only of fire fighting.

Fire Prevention Day was begun by the Fire Marshall's Association of North America,

now a section of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). The day was first proclaimed by President Woodrow Wilson on the 40th anniversary of the Chicago blaze.

In 1922, on recommendation of a member of NFPA, and a unanimous vote of the membership at the association's annual meeting, the fire safety observance was extended to cover the entire week that includes the October 9th anniversary date. President Warren Harding was the first to officially proclaim National Fire Prevention Week. which always is the Sunday through Saturday period during which the October 9th anniversary date falls.

The Reese Fire Department would like you to become a "Partner in Fire Prevention." Fire prevention can't be a matter of "Let George do it . . .'

practice is, instead, a matter of "togetherness." The individual and the family must work to keep their home as fire-safe as possible, following recommendations of the Fire Department.

"Partners in Fire Prevention." theme of Fire Prevention Week 1987, calls attention to the necessity for everyone to "think fire safety," not only during the week of Oct. 4-10, but all year. At home, each person in the

household can help by keeping accumulations of burnables at a minimum. Get rid of old papers, clothing, draperies, boxes, nearly-empty containers of paint and other liquids that might be flammable.

Practice burn prevention in the kitchen by keeping hot pans and small appliances such as coffee maker and broilers out of the reach young children, so

Good fire safety planning and they can't spill scalding-hot liquids or grease on themselves.

> Keep lamp and appliance cords in good condition. Use a minimum number of extension cords and don't plug too many cords into any one outlet. Never run electric cords under rugs or across doorways. Walking on them damages the insulation and leaves bare wires which could start a fire. Use only the proper size fuses in your fuse box.

> If anyone in the house smokes, provide a lot of large sturdy ash trays. Do your best to prevent people from smoking in bed or even while relaxing in an easy chair or on the couch.


Dozing off while smoking, and accidentally setting fire to bedding and/or upholstered furniture is by far the leading cause of home fires in which people lose their lives.

Before retiring for the night, check behind cushions for smouldering cigarettes that might have rolled there unnoticed. Leave the dirty ash trays for morning, of if you feel you must 'tidy up" before going to bed, be sure to dump butts and ashes into an empty metal container, never a plastic wastebasket, and never on top of papers and other trash.

"Partnership in Fire Prevention" at its' best, means cooperating with your Fire Department by installing automatic fire detectors. These inexpensive units are your best defense against being overcome by smoke and flames before you have a chance to escape safely.

Be a "Partner in Fire Prevention" from each fire prevention week to the next and "Learn Not To Burn!'



### Demphasizing volunteers

Recently the Air Force Chief of Staff, General Larry Welch sent a letter to all major commands expressing his concern "that too many organizations place too much emphasis on volunteer' status during consideration of officer assignments." His bottom line was: "In my view, as officers, we volunteer one time-when we take the oath of office.

Based upon the Chief's letter, a study was conducted which found that most agencies have institutionalized the "volunteer only" philosophy. In an effort to break away from this widespread mind set, during future officer assignment selection procedures, volunteer status will not be a mandatory criteria for selection.

All assignment selections, including faculty positions and

joint duty assignments (with the exception of hazardous duties such as explosive ordinance teams) will be made based primarily on the officer's qualifications. Agencies may solicit volunteers, but this will not exclude selection of nonvolunteers.

In keeping with the Chief of Staff's direction, officer Professional Military Education assignments will now be treated similar to a Permanent Change of Station. Assignments must now be accepted or declined within seven calendar days of the officer's notification; however, declination will not require the officer to apply for separation or retirement. After the seven day period, officers will only be released if a documented humanitarian or hardship condition exists. As in the past, release of an officer due to operational necessity will still be allowed.

### Opportunity to exchange ideas

Captains Sandra Gellner, 64th Air Base Group, and Paul Nelson, 35th Flying Training Squadron, were Reese's participants in the Air Training Command Outstanding Officer Orientation Program or PACE-SETTER. In August, they received a close-up look at the command mission and the chance to exchange ideas with the ATC Commander and his staff.

Thirty-six captains and majors participated in PACESET-TER. The officers were selected for the 4 day program by their wing or center commanders because of outstanding job performance and professionalism, said Capt. Chuck Crane, Chief Officer of Special Programs at Headquarters ATC's personnel programs directorate. Capt. Crane added that the program offers these individuals the opportunity to better understand ATC's mission, while recognizing them as "pacesetters" among the peers.

During their visit to Ran-

dolph, the officers were briefed by ATC deputy chiefs of staff, including technical training, inspector general, operations, plans, logistics, personnel, and engineering and services. They traveled to Lackland AFB to tour the NCO Academy and received briefings on the Air Force Military Training Center and Basic Military Training School. At BMTS, the pacesetters had lunch with trainees and toured the dormitories.

The officers also toured the Air Force Drug Testing Lab at Brooks AFB, participated in the formal military retreat ceremony at Randolph, "Tattoo at " the Taj", and had lunch with the ATC staff.

Capt. Gellner said one of the most interesting aspects was hearing the general officers express the same concerns as those of her peers.

The PACESETTER program, held annually, began in 1982 and has evolved into a prestigious command recognition program, said Capt. Crane.







# A legend has taken root

In the years since the end of world War I, a legend has taken root that the men who fought in the skies above the savage European landscape were somehow different from the soldiers huddled in the dark trenches. Perhaps it is true.

The great aces were, by necessity, men of great skill and courage. They had to possess eagle-eyed vision, lightningquick reflexes and the daring to risk their necks in the flimsy and unpredictable flying machines of the era.

Individually, they were so different that no one description fits all of them. Some were war lovers who killed with ferocious satisfaction. Others killed equally well, but always with regret.

Some were sportsmen who reveled in the rules of the game. These were the hunter-killers like Richthofen, who gave himself a silver cup after every victory.

There were also deeply religious teenagers like Albert Ball, who wrote his parents assuring them that he said his prayers every night. He died before he was 20.

Cool, calculating perfectionists, like Rene' Fonck, France's top-ranking ace, were among them also. Fonck ended the war with an official score of 75 enemy planes.

France's Nungesser and Germany's Besthold were typical of the driven fanatics in their midst—men who survived battle wounds that would have disabled and hospitalized lesser men, and flew again . . . and again.

Willy Coppens, the Belgian ace who landed on a German observation balloon and took off again, and Billy Bishop, the Canadian ace who won the Victoria Cross after attacking a German airfield by himself, were in there, too. During the war, each nation praised and publicized their pilots. The number of downed enemy aircraft brought a corresponding amount of glory. In France, anyone who shot down five enemy planes became an ace. The Germans were tougher, requiring their flyers to down 10 aircraft before being hailed as a kanone. The traditionally stoic English felt that herosim should not be unduly publicized and released their heroes' war records only on the occasion of their being solemnly decorated. American newspaper headlines were full of aerial combat feats.

Every nation had strict requirements for verifying victory claims. Three eyewitnesses were usually necessary. So, too, was verification by army personnel on ground. As a result, it's likely that many of the great aces on both sides scored more kills than the official records show.

The accomplishmes of the aces, however legendary they were, tended to be more romantic than decisive in the outcome of the war. Throughout the conflict, reconnaissance was the most important function of aircraft, reaching its peak when coordination with the ground troops improved and better cameras were developed. The value of aerial reconnaissance was limited, however, by the static French warfare camouflage and the fact that many troop movements were made at night. The airplane was blind 12 hours out of every 24.

Tactical use of the airplane for ground support was limited by their vulnerability to ground fire. An extremely brave pilot, such as Germany's Ernst Udet, could cause a lot of damage. Udet destroyed a British tank by driving at it continually until it went out of control and turned over. However, low-level strafing was dangerous. Edward Mannock, Britain's highest ranking ace, was shot down by a German infantryman's bullet.

Strategic bombing was too inaccurate and sporadic to be effective. The Germans tried to instill terror in the hearts of the British by mass Zeppelin raids over England. They only succeeded in infuriating the British, whose angry fighters swarmed into the air to blow up the gas-filled ships with incendiary bullets.

During the last weeks of World War I, the potential of both air-to-air combat and strategic bombing was revealed. Allied fighters wrested control of the skies from the Germans, making daytime troop and supply movement extremely risky. Hundreds of Allied bombers smashed German troop staging areas, railroad terminals and supply concentrations.

This was the message written across the skies by the Richtofens, Balls, Foncks, Coppens, Bishops and other "daring young men in their flying machines"—if you hold the air, you cannot be beaten. If you lose the air, you cannot win.







German Fokker triplane attacks British Sopwith Camel.


