Prepare to go smokeless

In 1976, the first Great American Smokeout was observed in California. The following year it went nationwide.

This year, from midnight Wednesday, Nov. 18 to Midnight Thursday, Nov. 19, the Great American Smokeout will again challenge Americans to "Take a breather" and prove to themselves they can abstain from smoking for 24 hours.

The goal of the 1987 smokeout is to get at least one in every five smokers to give up their cigarettes for one day.

Smokeout 1986 set an all-time record for participation. The 23.8 million smokers who tried to quit during the day-long event represented more than 43 percent of the nation's 54.5 million

For smokers who are serious about making the attempt to quit for good on Nov. 19, the Fresh Start Stop Smoking Clinic will be held beginning Monday.

The clinic will meet again Nov. 12, 16 and 18. The meetings are held at 3:30 p.m. Wing Regulation 160-5, Health Promotion, permits the use of duty time by civilian employees to attend the stop smoking clinic.

These four one-hour sessions offer education, motivation and group support. There are no magic cures for smoking, but help is available. To sign up for the class, call 3536.

For the first time since the Great American Smokeout began, Reese will compete with the other three Undergraduate Pilot Training bases for best participation in the Great American Smoke Out (GASO). Air Training Command Headquarters, will be the judge.

Here are some tips provided by the American Cancer Society giving different ways smokers have used to retrain. themselves to live without cigarettes. They may be helpful to those who hope to take the first step towards quitting smoking, and proving Reese is the best in ATC on Nov. 19:

•Before you quit smoking, try wrapping your cigarettes with a sheet of paper like a Christmas present. Every time you want a cigarette, unwrap the pack and write down what you are doing, how you feel and how important this cigarette is to you. Do this for two weeks and you'll have cut down as well as developed new insights into your

•On a 3 by 5 inch card, make a list of what you like and dislike about smoking. Add to it and read it daily.

•Never carry matches or a lighter with

• Always ask yourself, "Do I need this cigarette or is this just a reflex?" • Each day try to put off lighting your


first cigarette. •Decide arbitrarily that you will smoke only on even or odd numbered hours of the clock.

The Air Force has begun a major upgrade of the civilian payroll system.

The Air Force Standard Civilian Automated Pay System (AFSCAPS) is a redesign of the original Air Force civilian payroll system. With the aid of personal computers, optical mark readers, and a lot of hard work, AFSCAPS will catapult the civilian payroll system out of the stone age.

The main thrust of AFSCAPS is directed at the elimination of punch cards and keypunch machines. The most practical way of doing this is through the

use of computers. This modernization this at Reese in November 1987. will be accomplished in two phases.

put. Punch cards will be replaced by direct input through the personal com-

The first step involves using an optical mark reader to process a new computergenerated time and attendance form. The data on this form will be scanned by the sensitive optical mark reader and then transmitted to the mainframe computer to produce the payroll.

Ultimately, AFSCAPS will reduce the amount of time spent on tedious tasks and allow us to save through manpower reductions. We are hoping to implement

Phase II involves merging the person-Phase I will eliminate punch card in- nel and pay systems by means of a direct system-to-system interface. This means the Personnel Data and the Civilian Pay Automated Data Systems will talk to each other, will compare data, and update the systems as necessary. This will greatly improve timely and accurate updates of the pay system on personnel actions. Phase II is expected to be completed by early 1988.

These improvements are part of a major effort to improve the payroll system and eventually centralize civilian payroll functions Air Force-wide.

Calling All Officers . . .



Veterans Day message



The Readiness Question of the Week: Scenario: You are walking down a street on Reese and you are approached by a member of the Base Exercise Evaluation Team (BEET), or an inspector that is on the Headquarters, Air Training Command Mission Capability Inspection (MCI) Team. The inspector presents you with a card that reads "Situational Problem Input — You have just heard an explosion and seen flames coming from the Communications Squadron Building, take the appropriate action." What actions do you take?

Answer to the Readiness Question of the Week: The most important thing to remember is that a Situational Problem Input is always forwarded to the Contingency Support Staff (CSS). You should immediately send the input through your chain of command to the CSS. No other actions are required. Once the Situational Problem Input arrives at the CSS, the CSS will treat the input as a discussion exercise only. Exercising Reese capabilities

Emergency units at Reese Air Force Base wrung out their training techniques on the 27th of October as they responded to a simulated crash of a T-38 training jet.

In the training exercise scenario, the T-38 cleared the south fence, encountered a bird strike and crashed. The student ejected from the trainer, while the Instructor Pilot went down with the jet. The student susbtained various injuries, and the instructor was declared a fatality at the scene.

The scenario was staged by the Reese Base Exercise Evaluation Team to test

response capabilities of Reese units. In the drill, all units that would respond to a real crash ran through their predetermined procedures as though a T-38 had actually crashed.

The on-scene commander heading activities from the mobile command post, directs the actions required to save lives and property. He keeps in radio contact with the Wing Commander, who is in charge of overall activities, and the Contingency Support Staff.

Reese crews effectively responded to the exercise by putting out the fire, caring for the casualties and providing damage assessment reports.



inspections and discussions with assigned personnel clearly shows the biggest difference is involvement. We are seeing quality involvement on the part of not


only commanders and supervisors, but everyone in the wing to do things smarter. In short, everyone is looking

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
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Ninety percent of the cost of running a washing machine is for hot water. You can save 95 percent of this cost by using a cold wash/cold rinse cycle and 65 percent by using warm wash/ cold rinse cycle. Your washing machine uses 39 gallons of hot water on a hot wash/warm rise set, as opposed to only 13 gallons for warm wash/cold rinse.

To get your best results for cleaner clothes and low energy use, set your wash cycle on warm wash/cold rinse. Since cleaning ability increases only

slightly as water temperature ature should be set on 80 degrees Farenheit. For cold water wash, the water temperature should not fall below 60 degrees Farenheit. Below 60 degrees Farenheit detergents become ineffective and do not clean clothes properly.

For best cleaning results in cold water use a liquid detergent or predissolve powdered deter- the bacteria in clothes are ding to your wash. The tem- bleach and nine percent are

In October, 1975 Miller was appointed Assistant Director of the U.S. Council on Wage and Price Stability, where he monitored the impact of the public sector on inflation and served on President Ford's Regulatory Review Group.

From early 1977 until early 1981 Miller was a Resident Scholar at the American Enterprise Institute and Codirector of AEI's Center for the Study of Government Regulation. From that post he was named by OMB Director David Stockman as the first Administrator for Information and Regulatory Affairs, where he also served as Executive Director of the Presidential Task Force on Regulatory Relief, chaired by Vice President George Bush.

Miller became Chairman of the Federal Trade Commission in October, 1981.

He is married and resides with his wife and three children in Washington, D.C.



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

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

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

They have stood ready to give freely and unselfishly of themselves, even their lives, in defense of the democratic principles represented in the Constitution.

From Valley Forge to Vietnam, through war and peace, America's veterans answered their country's call. They left their homes and loved ones to serve their country, defending the freedoms that have made America great.

In recognition of the vital role veterans have played throughout the history of the United States,

the theme for this year's Nov. 11 Veterans Day observance is "Veterans, You Are America."

Veterans Day gives Americans a special opportunity to pay tribute to those men and women who, throughout America's history, have served with honor, pride and a belief in country. It is a time to pay special tribute to nearly 28 million living veterans who have served their country in uniform and to more than 1 million who died during wartime service.

"On this special day, our hearts and thoughts turn to those whose sacrifices preserved our freedom and our way of life," said President Ronald Reagan. "With a spirit of pride and gratitude, let us recall our heroic accomplishments and thank them for their unselfish devotion to duty. They are indeed worthy of the solemn tribute of a grateful nation."






