The 1989 Chamber of Commerce Banquet was held Friday night, March 31st in the Sherman County Barn. There were approximately 196 in attendance enjoying the colorful decorations and wonderful meal catered by Barbecue 54.

Emcee for the evening was Martha Mitts. Invocation was by Rev. Terry Fred of the First Assembly of God Church. Benediction was given by Clark Tatum of the Church of Christ. The entertainment consisted of a slide presentation prepared by Vicki Gore and presented by Selma Pendleton, both did a wonderful job.

Martha Mitts introduced the out of town guests. The 1988 Chamber president, Eugene Griffin introduced the 1989 president Doak Crabtree and the 1988 Womens Division President, Penny Boyd introduced the 1989 Womens President, Vicki Gore.

The awards for Farmer, Business persons and Citizen of the Year were presented by last years winners starting with Jimmy Chesher presenting the 1988 Farmer of the Year award to Joe Everett.

Jimmy Announced, Joe was an outstanding student in Stratford High School. He lettered four years in basketball, two years in baseball and four years in the Elk band. He received the highest State award an FFA member can receive on State basis. He served as President of our local FFA Chapter, President of his senior class and received many other such awards.

When graduated from high school, he was immediately involved in farming with his father and brother. They were strictly dryland until 1954, when they drilled their first irrigation well. In 1957 they built a feedlot which served as a first step toward vertical intergration of their farm and its produce. Today they operate five and one half sections of irrigated land and have extensive ranching operation in New Mexico. In 1988 they processed and fed a total of 17,500 head of cattle. This was done with an astonishing low death rate of only 1%.

He served two years as President and eight more years as director of the Sherman County Farm Bureau, attending eight State conventions and two National conventions.

He was elected county commissioner in 1972 and did an outstanding job, until the end of 1984 when he chose not to run again. He is presently on the board of directors of P.C.A.A member of the Sherman County Farm Bureau, New Mexico cattlemen Association and POPCA.

sweetheart who is still the woman behind him and his four sons who all form a part of this family farming and ranching operation.

The 1987 Business persons Betty and Baskin Brown presented the 1988 Award to Don and Bill Riffe of Stratford Grain Company. Mr. and Mrs. Browns speech consisted of the following statements. It is our privilege to present the recipients of the Business Persons award for this year.

As in the past it will be to two people. They have been in business in Stratford for 35 years. They were both born in Dalhart about 4 years apart, and have lived most of their lives in Sherman County. They attended Stratford Public School, were popular made good grades and won many awards. One played basketball on a state championship team. One learned to drive when 15 years old because earlier he had failed to stop and ran through a gate. One let a county prisoner talk them into removing the lock from the jail-freeing the prisoner. One raised a white pig, entered it in the fair and sold it for \$10.00. One raised chickens and built the pen over the cesspool, the rains came, the cesspool fill in and drowned his project. This was their first experience in 4H.

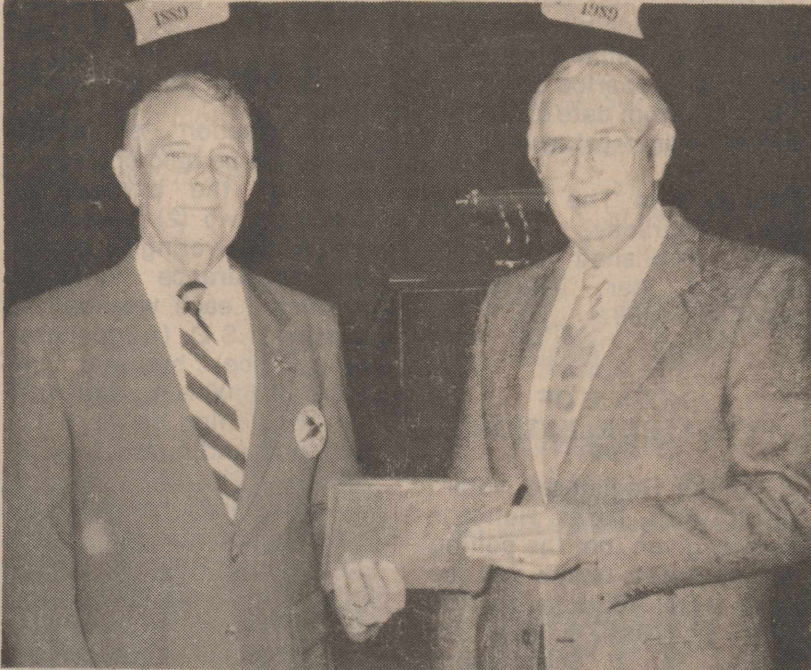
One got his first experience in getting a paycheck when he applied for the janitor job at his church. He janitored for several months.

One went to Wentworth Military Academy. After finishing his sophomore year at Stratford High School. After graduating from Wentworth he enrolled in SMU and served as an officer in his fraternity S.A.E. At

graduation he received his wings in the Air Force and was stationed at Tucson. He met his future wife there. She was going to college and they married upon her graduation from school. From there he returned to Stratford to his present business.

On the Chamber of Commerce one was president in 1971 and both have been board members and are members of Hunters-Ambassador Group. One was original president of Stratford Development Corp. in 1966. One served on the Stratford Area Foundation and is now serving on the Amarillo Area Foundation. One was the first president of Stratford Country Club and very instrumental in its beginning. The other has served on the board and both are excellent golfers. One has been president (Boss Lion) of Lions Club and served as a district officer. One is also a member of the American Legion. Scot organization one is serving as Vice President. Both are very active and faithful members of Methodist Church, and both have served on the City Council. One has served as president of School board. One served as Board of Regents of McMurry College. They both have supported 4-H and FFA clubs for many years and many ways especially the livestock show and auction. Both are members of national Grain and Seed Dealers where one served as President of the National & Panhandle organizations, the other served as president of the Texas Grain and Seed Dealers and Panhandle Grain & Seed Dealers.

The phone has not been ringing off the wall! Perhaps it would ring if the phone number was known. It is 396-2021. Now, if you have any questions, we will try to answer them.

Tornado season is coming. Last week we covered what to do to start getting ready ahead of time. This week we'll cover the difference between a WATCH and a WARNING.

A tornado WATCH means a tornado is possible. If the National Weather Service issues a tornado WATCH it means a tornado is possible. If the National Weather Service issues a tornado WATCH for SHERMAN County—listen to radio or TV for further information—be alert to weather conditions and signs of an approaching tornado, such as blowing debris or the sounds of a tornado (many say it sounds like a freight train.)

A tornado WARNING means a tornado has been spotted or is about to strike. You may only have a few minutes to go to safety. Tornadoes can happen so rapidly that you may NOT get a warning. If the Weather Service issues a tornado WARNING—GO TO SAFETY IMMEDIATELY; Stay away from windows; go to the basement, or the lowest floor and into a bathroom, closet, or interior hallway in the center of the building; protect yourself under something sturdy. and protect your head.

Two Meetings Scheduled

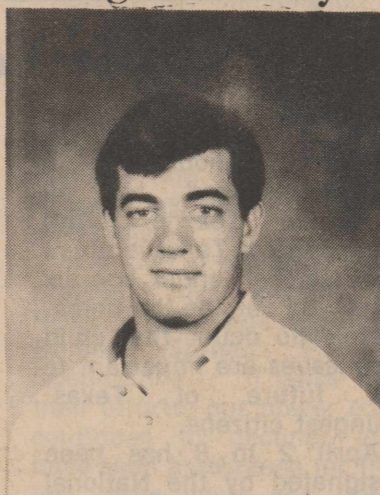

"Week Of The Young Child" Highlighted

By Susie Spurlock, CEA-HEC

"Who is caring for the children?" should be a question asked by all concerned Texans. With almost half of Texas mothers with children under age six employed outside the home, there's no doubt that child care issues are important to the future of Texas' youngest citizens.

April 2 to 8 has been designated by the National Association for the Education of Young Children as the "Week of the Young Child". This is a special time for building public understanding and support for the critical importance of good services during the early years of life.

Affordability, availability and quality care are the key concerns of young parents. Day care is typically the second highest expense for the average American family, just below housing. For a limited income family of three, the cost often represents one-third to one-half of the total income.

In some cases, even when parents can afford the fees, there are inadequate child care resources. Many rural and poor urban neighborhoods offer few quality facilities. In areas where child care is available and affordable, there is still the challenge of selecting a proper child care facility—one that meets both the child's needs and the parents' schedule.

Many parents need help in making child care decisions.

They need information about the criteria for quality care; about management of costs as a part of the family budget and about employment policies that may affect their child care decision.

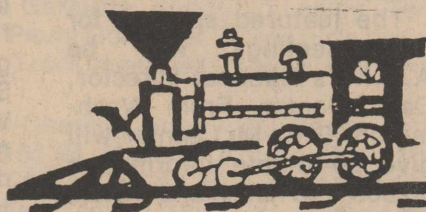
In addition, they need resource and referral information about availability near to home or work sites. Families with school age children and children with special needs often face the reality of finding few sources available.

Answers to the "Child care crises" will not be found totally in governmental policy. Parents, employers, providers and communities must come together to analyze the deal with local

concerns.

Action can be taken by parents in analyzing and evaluating child care facilities. Recognition should be given to providers who are offering high standards of care. Employers need to examine their policies affecting providing information concerning child care options.

Providers need to analyze continuously the quality of their programs and seek informational sources for professional improvement. Community leaders need to examine local supports systems and obstacles impacting the availability of child care.





Jim Morriss, executive vice-president and general manager of the Association of Texas Electric Cooperatives in Austin, addressed the membership as the guest speaker.

Morriss' speech emphasized the uniqueness of the cooperative form of business "Thank you for coming out to your annual meeting. I should note that Southwestern Public Service doesn't have a meeting like this," he said.

He noted that electric cooperatives have come a long way since the first co-op meter in the country was energized at Bartlett, Texas, in 1936. Today, Texas co-ops serve 1.1 million meters and maintain 250,000 miles of power line.

Morriss tried to clear up one general misconception of electric cooperatives regarding subsidies from the federal government.

"This country has a unwritten policy that says every electric consumer in the nation will be subsidized. Few people know that," he said.

He explained that a recent study shows that electric consumers served by municipal utilities receive \$97.41 per consumer per year in subsidies through tax-exempt bond financing. "That's revenue that is forgone to the Treasury," he said.

Investor-owned utilities receive \$61.27 per consumer per year, he said, explaining that the subsidy comes in the form of accelerated depreciation and income taxes collected by those utilities that are never actually paid to the government.

Electric cooperatives receive the lowest subsidy of the three types of electric utilities, he noted. The basic subsidy of \$52.38 per consumer supports the Rural Electrification Administration's revolving fund, which is occasionally replenished with government securities sold on the private market.

And, he explained, the electric cooperative "subsidy" is in the form of loans, not giveaways. The money is paid back to the federal government.

In fact, Morriss pointed out, electric cooperatives paid almost \$4 billion more to the federal government than they borrowed in 1988.

"The REA program is an investment, and I think it's a darn good one," he said.

Members also watched two films about electric cooperatives, "This We Believe," and "The Cooperative Connection."

The big winner in the prize drawing was Ruben Thomas of Dalhart who won a \$300 energy certificate.

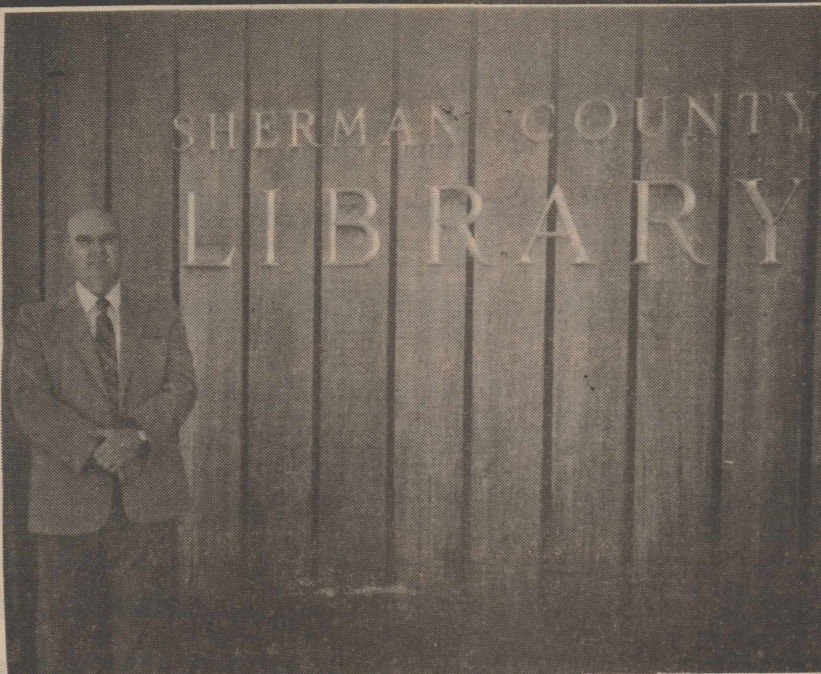

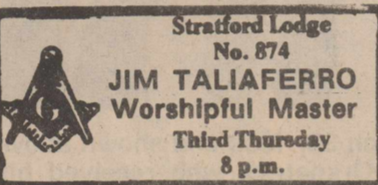
