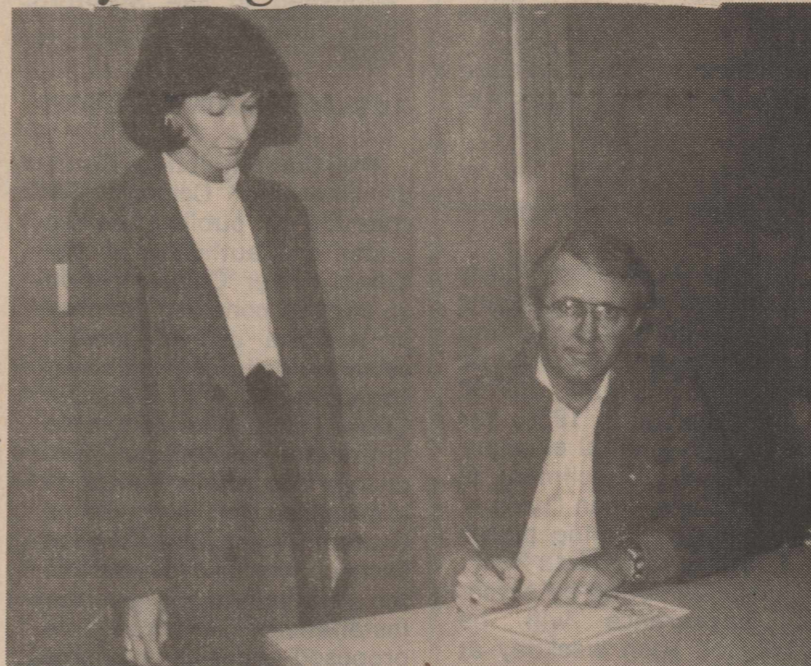
Little League Holds First Meeting

Texas Should Develop Textile Industry

Texas should process its own cotton, wool and mohair to enhance state jobs and revenue, according to a recent study by the Texas Agri-Business Electric Council (TABEC) and Texas A&M University.

TABEC is composed of 10 Texas investor-owned electric utilities, including Southwestern Public Service Company, and works in conjunction with Texas A&M's Agricultural Engineering Department.

A third of U.S. cotton is produced in Texas, but 92 percent of the state's crop is processed elsewhere, the study said. Thirty-seven percent of Texas's crop is sent to North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama and Virginia for processing. The remaining 55 percent is exported to foreign markets.

Texas also produces almost all U.S. mohair, which is derived from Angora goats, and a fifth of all U.S. wool, according to the report.

"SPS will be using this study as an economic-development tool to provide information for those interested in developing the

textile industry in our service area," said Greg Boggs, SPS agricultural consultant.

SPS serves a 52,000 square mile area of the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, eastern and southwestern New Mexico, the Panhandle of Oklahoma, and southwestern Kansas.

"In Texas, we have an abundance of cotton, and 92% is sent out of state," he said.

Boggs said several textile plants are operating in Texas, but the industry has not been developed to its potential. The TABEC-A&M study, as well as other reports, suggests there is room for expansion in the textile industry in Texas, he said.

Boggs pointed out that the market value of cotton leaving the state is about 55 cents per pound. By spinning the cotton into yarn, its market value increases about \$1 per pound and another \$1 per pound when it's woven or knitted into fabric.

"Fabric is purchased for roughly \$3.50 to \$4 per pound and sold as clothing for about \$5 per pound," he said.

"This all suggests there are millions of dollars of revenue being lost to the state, not to mention a large amount of jobs that are lost when we ship our fiber elsewhere," Boggs said.

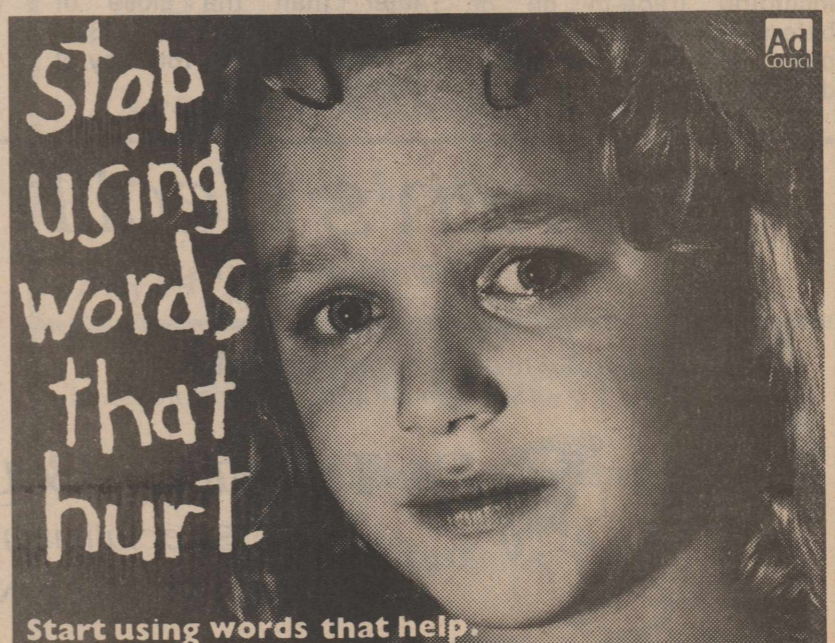

His primary purpose is to get someone to head up the Cancer Drive & to be that person who can help with local services: those being: ROAD TO RECOVERY-Volunteers provide transportation to and from the hospital or clinic for cancer treatment. This service is only available in some communities. PATIENT VISITOR PROGRAMS-The Reach to Recovery program of the American Cancer Society provides rehabilitation to women who have had breast surgery. It is designed to help them meet their physical, psychological and cosmetic needs. With the aid of a volunteer visitor, a woman who has had a mastectomy, the patient can see first-hand that she too will be able to successfully adjust to surgery. LARYNGECTOMY-When requested by the surgeon, a pre-op visit by a trained laryngectomee can be the first step in psychological rehabilitation of the patient. Post-laryngectomy speech training following surgery is also available. OSTOMY Fully trained and carefully supervised volunteers who have successfully readjusted to ostomy surgery are available in some areas. These volunteers visit new ostomates, giving reassurance and emotional support that will assist patients in resuming normal living patterns. 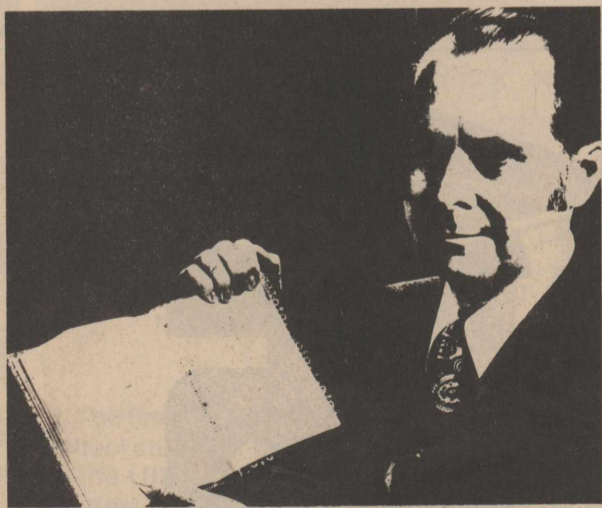

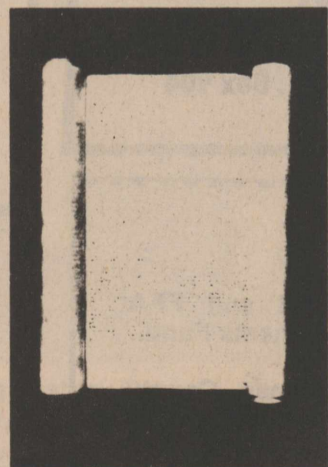

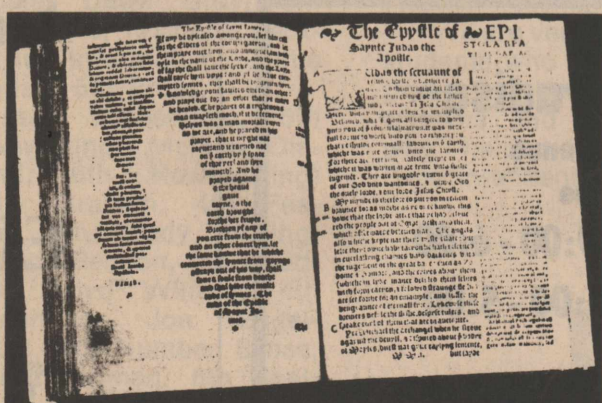

Estimated Tax

You may have to pay your federal income tax quarterly if you are working abroad for a foreign employer, since not all foreign employers withhold U.S. tax from your wages. Use IRS Form 1040-ES, "Estimated Tax for Individuals," to estimate your tax.

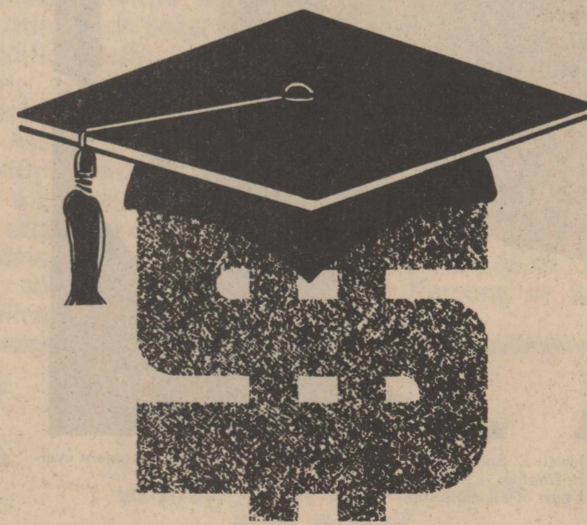

Tips & Topics

The plastic bag the dry cleaner uses is designed to keep garments clean while they are being taken home. Sometimes people store garments in these bags, perhaps for weeks, months or seasons. Consequently, garments may be damaged.

For instance, ink from the lettering on the bag may stain garments in the bag or those stored next to the plastic. These stains appear more often on leathers, suedes, vinyls and synthetic materials, but they can happen to any fabric.

The International Fabric

Care Institute reports that considerable research has been done to find inks that will not transfer to fabrics. No ink has yet been found that is suitable for printing on plastic that will not transfer dye to fabrics.

For this reason, garments should not be stored in plastic bags from dry cleaners. Some bag manufacturers are putting warnings on the bag. But whether the warning is there or not, the best practice is to remove garments from dry cleaner bags as soon as you get them home.

John Deere Answers Your Lawn and Garden Woes



Bugged in the Lawn Market

Dear John: Even though it's not traded on the stock exchange, I consider my lawn to be a precious commodity. Last year, it was the target of a hostile takeover by insects. How can I prevent a repeat?

Dear Green Male: No need to sell out your lawn to the gold bugs. Instead, invest in a pesticide that provides a "poison pill" for those aggressive types. Due to the variety of insects looking for weak spots in your market, you need to get a closer profile of your enemies in order to wage a successful counteroffensive.

Lawns are most vulnerable to attack by two kinds of insects. Above-ground pests like cutworms gnaw away at grass stems and blades. Beetle grubs and other below-ground bugs do their damage at the roots.

Most common pesticides help wage the battle against both types of pests. If cutworms are your concern, water the lawn and apply pesticide, then don't water for several days. Reverse the procedure for below-ground bugs, by watering heavily after applying pesticide in order to get it down to the roots.

Dear John: I like to go outside after a spring shower and do some yard work. Is it a good time to mow the lawn?

Dear Misty Mower: Damp soil is easier to work in the garden, but a damp lawn makes for slick footing and risky mowing.

Mowing a wet lawn can distribute a fungus disease by scattering water droplets that can harbor disease organisms.

Wet lawns also can create a temptation to reach into the discharge chute to unclog a clump of soggy clippings. Remember to keep fingers away from the cutting blade when it's under power, and at any time, use a tool to clear a clog.

Also, mowing a wet lawn can compact the soil, making it difficult for sunlight, air and nutrients to get through to the roots.

Dear John: I've always been a softy when it comes to caring for my garden. Can you explain how to "harden off" vegetables I've begun growing indoors?

Dear Gentle Gardener: Prepare your plants for the move to the garden by gradually exposing them to colder temperatures. One way to do this is to set them outside for longer periods of time every day, providing plenty of water and fertilizer, until they're ready for the permanent move to the great outdoors. Do make sure you're not moving them outside too early, as a late frost can damage your plants.

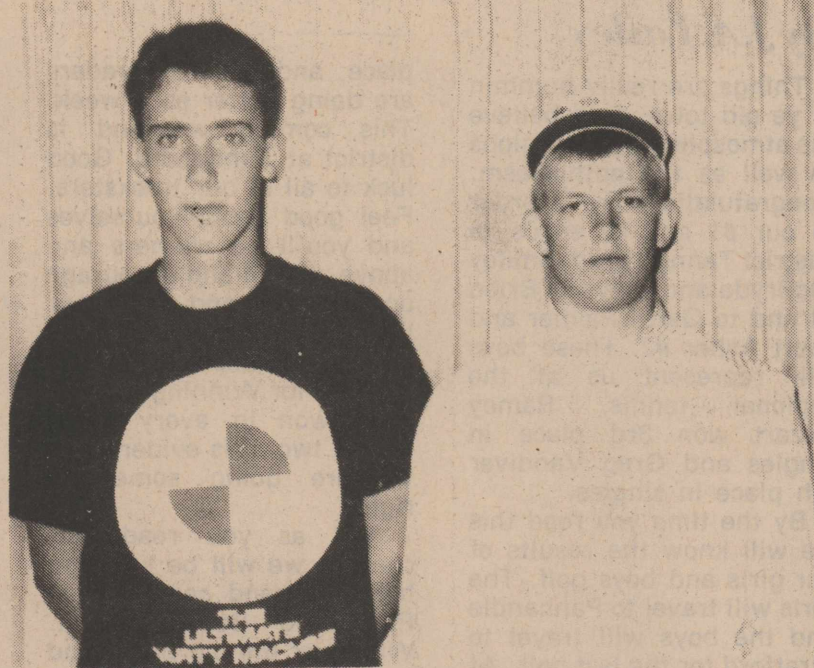

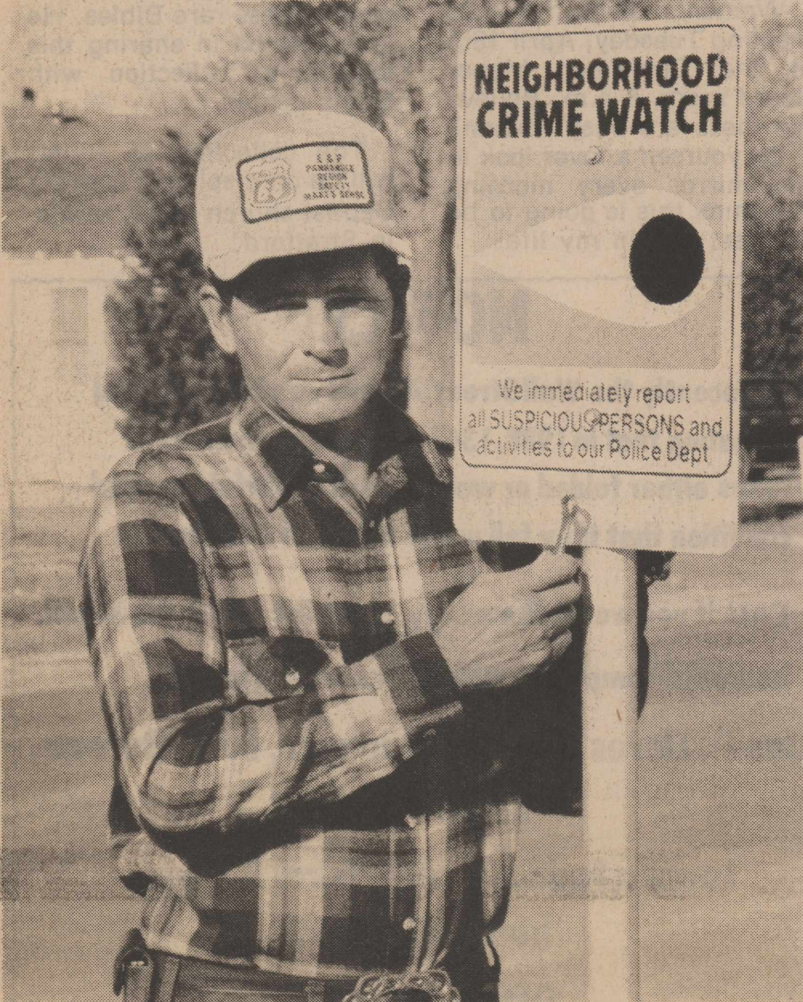

Stopping Vandals

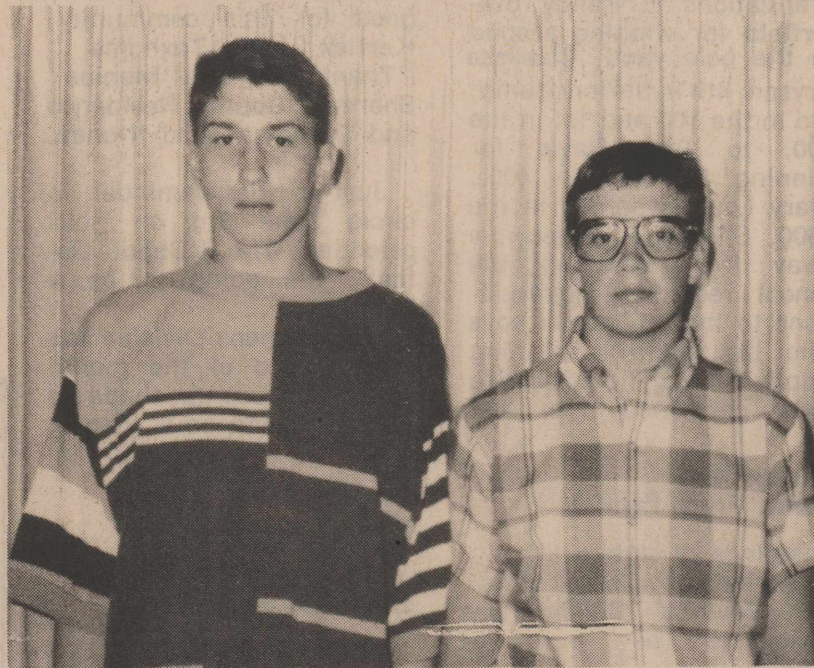
Stratford is a farming community of 1,900 in the Texas Panhandle where serious crime is rare, but vandalism was a concern. Police Chief Dennis Davis says residents also were worried about potential problems from transients who pass through town on two major highways.

Happy 34th Birthday from You Know Who!

Each summer when fruit is ripening or is nearly ripe, I begin to get calls about worms in the fruit and what can be done to control them. Unfortunately it is too late and nothing can be done at that time.

Now is the time to begin controlling those insects that cause the damage to your apples, pears, plums, peaches, apricots and cherries.

We have just passed the pink bud stage and are moving into full bloom on most fruit trees. At this time, you need to be trying to control the peach twig borer and aphids if they are present. When 75% of the petals have fallen, you need to be controlling the codling moth, plum curculio, oriental fruit moth, thrips, stink bugs and other insects. The oriental fruit moth and codling moth begin depositing their eggs in the blooms where they begin maturing. When fruit begins ripening and fruit begins falling from the trees and virtually all the fruit contains worms, there is nothing that can be done. It is too late so all you can do is trim out the bad and that is

discouraging.

The recommended control schedule is to begin spraying when 75% of the petals have fallen and spray every 10 days for 5 to 16 weeks. Malathion is one of the recommended insecticides that are also recommended. You can check with your garden center for these or contact the County Extension Office.

You must be persistent to effectively control these insects.

can cope offers an educational program in a group setting. The course includes guest speakers such as physicians, nurses, social workers, and dietitians. CanSurmount provides one to one individual patient rehabilitation. Cancer patients who have successfully adjusted and live normal lives visit other patients to assist them with the problems encountered with a diagnosis of cancer. Dialogue provides professional group counseling and support to cancer patients and their families. This program allows them to discuss with others concerns involving living with cancer. HOUSING The Guestroom program provides temporary housing for patients who must travel for cancer related treatment and check-ups. This service is limited to cities with agreements between the American Cancer Society and local hotels. The American Cancer Society Service Rehabilitation program is growing rapidly in response to community needs. Some services may be available that are not listed.

Local Youth Has Space Experience At U.S. Space Academy

Clint Parsons of Stratford, Texas trained for a space adventure and explored the future of scientific exploration at U.S. Space Academy Level 1 in Huntsville, Ala.

Space Academy trainees in grades seven, eight, and nine, sample astronaut training by using Space Academy's special astronaut training simulators. They spin and twist in the Multi-Axis Training Simulator an adaptation of early Mercury program training equipment.

Trainees also bounce high in the air while experiencing the Microgravity Training Chair, which is similar to equipment Apollo astronauts used in training for missions to the Moon. They also spin and turn in the Five Degrees of Freedom Trainer, which was used by Gemini astronauts training for early spacewalks.

Space Academy Level 1 Trainees use the nation's only full-scale Space Shuttle exhibit to get a better understanding of how the shuttle works. They use Space Academy's realistic mission control and Space Shuttle orbiter mockups for training prior to a pair of simulated space missions.

Each team of 20 trainees is divided for the missions, with half in mission control, monitoring activities aboard the shuttle. Each person has a specific task; mission director, flight director, principal investigator and more. All must work as a team with the shuttle crew to ensure a successful mission.

The orbiter crew includes a commander and pilot, whose controls move the hydraulically-powered cock-

pit. Mission specialists don space suit mockups and are strapped into spacewalk simulators for work outside of the orbiter. Others perform experiments using Spacelab and Skylab hardware that was used for actual astronaut training.

Trainees in Space Academy programs are housed in the new Space Habitat, a futuristic dormitory built to simulate aspects of the Space Station.

At NASA's nearby Marshall Space Flight Center, trainees watch as engineers and scientists design and build prototypes of the 1990's Space Station Freedom.

They also enjoy the many hands-on activities and demonstrations at The Space & Rocket Center. And they learn the history of space exploration by touring the Space Center's Rocket Park, the most comprehensive collection of manned space-flight rockets on Earth.

Space Academy also offers the advanced, college-accredited, Space Academy Level 11, a ten-day program for high school students. U.S. Space Camp has five-day programs for younger children, fourth through sixth graders in Huntsville, and fourth through seventh grades at the new Space Camp campus in Florida, near NASA's Kennedy Space Center.

6th Grade Appreciation Party

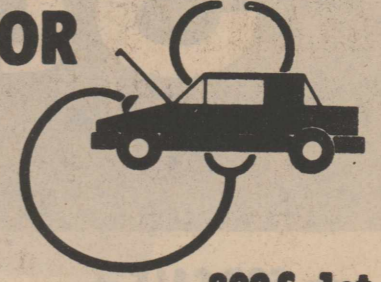

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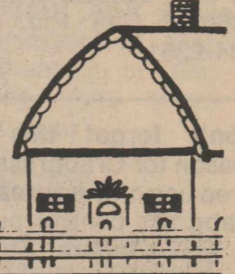
