# Annual walk set to honor civil rights leader Martin Luther King

"Even though we face the difficulties of today and tomorrow, I still have a dream." – Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Monday, Jan. 18, is Martin Luther King Jr. Day this year, and the occasion will be observed in Big Spring with the annual Martin Luther King Jr. Day Commemorative Walk.

"We're going to start at the corner of Highway 87 and MLK, right across from Subway," said event organizer Ida Hambrick. "Nalley-Pickle and Welch Funeral Home has allowed us to park on their back side, where it does not interfere with their business. Every year, they're very generous. We will start right there on that corner at 6 p.m. The Police Department has been notified and the Fire Department, so you'll see police cars and fire engines following the entire procession."

Hambrick added that several streets along the route will be blocked off for the safety of the procession.

"For several years now, people just drive, plow right through parades and things like that," she said. "I don't know why they do that, but they have blocked off those small streets

going in and out."

Hambrick said the procession will continue down the entire length of Martin Luther King Boulevard, past Scenic Moun-

tain Medical Center, to FM 700.

"We will walk all the way up to 700 right past the hospital," she said, noting that a short program will ensue at the intersection of MLK and FM 700. "That is where we will convene. You know, words of encouragement, and different city officials will just have something short to say. Then it will end in words of encouragement and prayer, and we will be released

from that corner in front of the apartment buildings."

Hambrick said the event was originally started by Mount

Bethel Baptist Church several years ago. "We've done that for years," she said. "It was long before I



Many of the sessions are hands-on exercises that provide the participants with opportunities to step into the role of the police officer and handle various situations officers are called upon to deal with daily. "Participants also spend a working shift riding in a patrol car with an on-duty officer to gain a first-hand perspective of a day in the life of a local cop," explains Gordon. Historically, this is one of the aspects of the program enjoyed by all of the participants.

The program will also introduce participants to the Volunteer in Police Service (VIPS) group. Representatives of this group will attend and assist with the classroom activities. According to Marvin Boyd, President of VIPS, "We are an active group who assist the BSPD with activities such as traffic control for parades and other activities, the house watch program and monitoring handicap parking violations." Graduation from the CPA will qualify participants to join the VIPS group. Boyd encourages all past and future graduates of the CPA to consider joining the volunteer group.

"We have a real need for additional volunteers

so we can provide more assistance to our Law Enforcement Officers," states Boyd.

Since its inception in 1994, the CPA has provided a forum wherein citizens and police can exchange information and viewpoints. "We have found that this exchange benefits the participants, the officers and instructors, the Department and the community in general," Gordon said. The community comes to a better understanding of the often-conflicting expectations and requirements placed on law enforcement and law enforcement comes to a better understanding of the expectations of their community.

"Over the years, as a result of this exchange, the department has modified some of its practices and procedures to better meet the needs and desires of the citizens. In turn we have seen an increased acceptance of our role in the community and have enjoyed a more open dialog with its members," adds Chad Williams, Chief of Police.

his presidency of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), the organiztion of the 1963 March on Washington including his famous "I Have a Dream" speech on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial; earning the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 for his use of non-violent resistance to campaign for racial equality in America; and organization of marches from Selma to Montgomery in 1965. He was assassinated on April 4, 1968, and posthumously awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1977 and the Congressional Gold Medal in 2003. Martin Luther King Jr. Day was established as a holiday starting in 1971, and enacted at the federal level by President Ronald Reagan in 1986. In 2011, the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., was dedicated.

"It's actually a 'day on' instead of a day off," Hambrick said. "Yes, we're all off and we do different things, and so on and so forth. But you know, Martin Luther King encouraged us as Americans to be active in Civil Rights and Civil Rights movements. And yes, don't get me wrong, we've made lots of strides. We have made lots of strides. But there's still work to do. So it's a day on instead of a day off. There's still things. There's still rights. There's still fairness. And don't forget equality, that has to be fought for. I just happen to be a veteran, and you know, freedom isn't free. I served in the military for 28 years, and freedom isn't free. You have to always be active, and you have to always be fighting for what's absolutely what's right and fair for everyone. Not just for blacks. I'm not just talking for blacks, but right and fair for everyone."

# Maui musings: Finau happy to be back and feels he belongs

KAPALUA, Hawaii — Tony Finau has been in Hawaii long enough to become a motivational speaker.

For football, not golf.

Finau arrived three weeks ago to spend time with his wife's family near the North Shore on Oahu. His good friend, an assistant football coach at Kuhuku High School, asked Finau to speak to the Red Raiders before they played for the state title.

The stories he shared sounded familiar. They were about staying hungry and working hard even during the lean years and crushing losses. Finau knows that as well as anyone.

He also makes no excuses and doesn't grouse about any criticism carelessly thrown his way.

"That's how it is, and this is what I signed up for," Finau had said after ending more than five years without winning at The Northern Trust.

Kukuhu overwhelmed Saint Louis, 49-14, for its first state title in six years.

"I made it clear when I talked to them. I said, 'I'm definitely not going to tell you guys how to play football because I would be way out of my lane," Finau said Wednesday. "A lot of these young men made it known to me that they look up to me as a Polynesian athlete and how I've conducted myself. They made it known that they like it."

Finau, of Tongan and Samoan heritage, is 6-foot-4 with a wingspan of 6-foot-8. He could at least pass for a football player.

"I just tried to explain to them some of the things that — my life experiences — that have helped me to stay humble and to stay hungry throughout my career," he said. "I think they have enjoyed it and hopefully some of them take it with them as they go throughout their life and throughout their careers."

That brings him to the Sentry Tournament of Champions with a renewed sense of pride.

Finau was at Kapalua a year ago with an asterisk. Because of a year shortened by the COVID-19 pandemic, the criteria was changed for the winners-only start of the new year by adding anyone who reached the Tour Championship.

Finau was among 16 players who fell into that category.

"It was a different feel for me," Finau said. "Being a champion and being here feels great. This is one of those tournaments, when you win a golf tournament you look so forward to this week. Just teeing it up with all the guys that have won, it's a special field."

Finau's enthusiasm for a week in paradise is matched by Jordan Spieth, who began his career believing he would be a regular at Kapalua. That ended when he failed to win in 2018, and the following two years as his game went so off the rails that he nearly fell out of the top 100 in the world.

Spieth arrived a week early, playing down the Maui coast at Makena, traveling for the first time with his wife and 6-week-old son, Sammy. He won the Texas Open, his first title since capturing the 2017 British Open at Royal Birkdale.

All it takes is one win to get to Kapalua. Spieth could have had more, failing to convert chances in Phoenix and Pebble Beach, Colonial and the British Open.

"If you told me what last year was going to be at this time last year, I would have said I'm obviously very pleased," he said. "But I can also look back and say I really wish I had won three or four events, given the amount of times I had a chance on Sunday."

He talks about getting back to his DNA, and for the first time in years, he feels he is finally heading back in the right direction. There is excitement in his voice.

"For me, it's maybe different from a lot of guys,"

Spieth said. "For the first time in years, I feel like I've got some momentum."

Finau can relate, which doesn't winning any easier for either of them. Finau had eight run-

Finau had eight runner-up finishes — three of them playoff losses — and 39 top 10s between winning the 2016 Puerto Rico Open and beating Cameron Smith in a playoff at Liberty National last August.

"I know how hard that second one came and I put a lot of work into just getting better, and so that's where my attention will be," he said. "You never know when your week is going to be, but being properly prepared every week is the most important thing and that's all I can do."


He does not lack for preparation. Finau wasn't on the North Shore to give a speech to the Kuhuku Red Raiders.

Finau has a relationship with Turtle Bay and played there often during his two weeks on Oahu in plenty of wind and rain, all the elements Hawaii has to offer.

The pursuit of winning doesn't get any easier. The joy of the game has never left him, even in the

wake of criticism that he should be winning more.

"We didn't really know we signed up for it when we were kids. We just wanted to play golf," he said. "But this is what comes with it. There's expectations when you get to a certain level. There's expectations that come with trying to become a great player and trying to become a great winner. You take them in strike and just keep going no matter what."





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#### What to do if you're forced to evacuate

Natural disasters and extreme weather pose a significant threat. No one is invulnerable to such events, and even if the idea of evacuating your home seems unlikely, preparing for evacuation can ensure calmer heads prevail in the case of adverse situations like natural disasters.

Ready.gov is a public service campaign that was established in February 2003 to help people prepare for, respond to and mitigate various types of

emergencies, including natural disasters. The campaign notes that many types of emergencies can necessitate evacuation, and offers the following tips to individuals who have been told evacuation is their best option.

 Download the FEMA app. The FEMA app is an invaluable resource for individuals facing evacuation. The app, which is available for download through the Google Play store as well as the Apple App Store, provides a host of important information, including a list of open shelters for individuals living in

areas where

officials are urging residents to evacuate.

Follow local evacua-

tion instructions. Everyone has seen images of individuals stranded in areas that have been overtaken by flooding or destroyed by storms like hurricanes and tornados. Staying in place when evacuation orders have been issued puts your own life at risk as well as the lives of those who may attempt to help you, such as public safety officials. Many local public safety organizations will not send workers to help stranded citizens if the conditions pose a threat to the workers, which underscores how important it is that individuals evacuate when orders are issued.

· Don't delay. The longer individuals wait to evacuate, the more risky the situation becomes. Ready.gov urges individuals to leave early enough to avoid being trapped by severe weather. Even if the storm is not scheduled to touch down for awhile, getting caught in last-minute traffic could put evacuees in harm's way. When you begin to evacuate, stick to the recommended evacuation routes, as alternative routes may be closed.

 Respect shelter pet policies. Evacuees who hope to stay in shelters must recognize that only service animals will be allowed in public shelters. Evacuees should still take their pets with them but should make arranging shelter for their companion animals part of their emergency strategy. Speak with friends or family members who live nearby but beyond the eye of the storm to determine if they can take in your pets should you be forced to evacu ate your home.

• Secure your home. Prior to evacuating, secure your home by locking doors and windows and unplugging electrical equipment like radios, televisions and small appliances. Pay attention to evacuation order details. which may advise residents to shut off water, gas and electricity before leaving their homes.

 Stay in touch. Do your best to stay in touch with friends and family once you have evacuated your home. Let others know where you are going and inform them once you have arrived at your destination. In the days prior to evacuating, forward a copy of your evacuation plan to family members in other regions but also those who live locally so they can follow suit if need

Few people want to imagine evacuating their homes. Such a scenario can be frightening, but it's considerably less daunting when individuals know what to do and where to go during the evacuation.

#### The case of the telltale deuce

North dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:

North East South West Pass 1 2 ♦ Pass 4 🏚

Opening lead — king of diamonds.

Things are not always what they seem; in fact, sometimes they are exactly the opposite! Assume you're West and lead the king of diamonds against four spades. East plays the deuce and South the seven. Looking at only your own hand and dummy, what should you do next?

If you continue with the ace of diamonds, which seems the natural thing to do, declarer easily makes the contract. But if you lead a low diamond at trick two, South goes down one. Your partner wins with the queen and returns a heart, bless him, and it's all over.

How can you possibly be expected to know that a low diamond lead at trick two is the only winning play? It's the right play, but it takes a few mental gyrations to reach this conclusion.

Your sole task is to interpret the meaning of your partner's deuce of diamonds. Ordinarily, a deuce means "stop playing the suit." But in the present case, it would be a serious error to attribute this meaning to it.

After the play to the first trick. you should reason that East cannot have either the Q-10-2 or the 10-2, since he would have played the ten from either holding to ask for a continuation. Therefore, he must have either the singleton deuce or the Q-2 doubleton.

Consequently, no harm can come from leading a low diamond at trick two. If East has no more diamonds, he will ruff and return a heart; if East started with the doubleton queen, he will win and also return a heart. So, oddly enough, the deuce cannot possibly mean what it appears to say.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 6, 2021, supporters of President Donald Trump, fueled by his false claims of a stolen election, assaulted police and smashed their way into the Capitol to interrupt the certification of Democrat Joe Biden's victory, forcing lawmakers into hiding; most of the rioters had come from a nearby rally where Trump urged them to "fight like hell." A Trump sup-porter, Ashli Babbitt, was shot and killed by a police officer as she tried to breach a barricaded doorway inside the Capitol. Capitol Police Officer Brian Sicknick, injured while confronting the rioters, suf-fered a stroke the next day and died from natural causes, the Washington, D.C., medical examiner's office said. (In the

the riot took their own lives.) Congress reconvened hours later to finish certifying the election result.

On this date:

In 1412, tradition holds that Joan of Arc was born this day in Domremy.

In 1838, Samuel Morse and Alfred Vail gave the first successful public demonstration of their telegraph in Morristown, New Jersey.

In 1912, New Mexico became the 47th state.

In 1919, the 26th president of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt, died in Oyster Bay, New York, at age 60.

In 1941, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, in his State of the Union address, outlined a goal of "Four Freedoms": Freedom of speech and expression; the freedom of people to worship

God in their own way: freedom from want; freedom from fear.

In 1974, year-round daylight saving time began in the United States on a trial basis as a fuel-saving measure in response to the OPEC oil

In 1982, truck driver William G. Bonin was convicted in Los Angeles of 10 of the "Freeway Killer" slayings of young men and boys. (Bonin was later convicted of four other killings; he was executed in 1996.)

In 1994, figure skater Nancy Kerrigan was clubbed on the leg by an assailant at Detroit's Cobo Arena; four men, including the ex-husband of Kerrigan's rival, Tonya Harding, went to prison for their roles in the attack. (Harding pleaded guilty to conspiracy to hinder prosecution, but denied any advance knowledge about the assault.)

In 2001, with Vice President Al Gore presiding in his capacity as president of the Senate, Congress formally certified George W. Bush the winner of the bitterly contested 2000 presidential election.

In 2005, former Ku Klux Klan leader Edgar Ray Killen was arrested on murder charges 41 years after three civil rights workers were slain in Mississippi. (Killen was later convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to 60 years in prison; he died in prison in 2018.)

In 2006, velvet-voiced singer Lou Rawls died in Los Angeles at age 72.

In 2020, throngs of Iranians attended the funeral of Gen. Qassem Soleimani, who'd been killed in a U.S. airstrike in Iraq; Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei wept while praying over the casket. Former White House national security adviser John Bolton said he was "prepared to testi-fy" if subpoenaed by the Senate in its impeachment trial of President Donald Trump. (The Senate voted against calling

Ten years ago: A bomb exploded at a busy Damascus intersection, killing 25 people and wounding dozens in the second major attack in the Syrian capital in as many weeks. The Obama administration expanded the FBI's more than eight-decades-old definition of rape to count men as victims for the first time and to drop the requirement that victims physically resisted their attackers.

Five years ago: Congress certified Donald Trump's presi-dential victory over the objections of a handful of House Democrats, with Vice President Joe Biden pronouncing, "It is over." An arriving airline passenger pulled a gun from his luggage and opened fire in the baggage claim area at the Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport in Florida, killing five people and wounding eight. (An Alaska man, Esteban Santiago, admitted to the shooting and was sentenced to life in prison.) Mother-and-daughter actors

Debbie Reynolds and Carrie Fisher were laid to rest together at Forest Lawn Memorial Park - Hollywood Hills.

One year ago: As final votes were counted in the preceding day's Senate runoffs in Georgia Democrats Jon Ossoff and Raphael Warnock emerged as the winners over Republicans David Perdue and Kelly Loeffler, giving Democrats control of the Senate.


