DPS releases report on fatal wreck

Several Herald readers posted on social media about a wreck involving a pickup truck and a tractor-trailer near Coahoma last week. Texas Department of Public Safety released a report Tuesday about the wreck, which left an Oklahoma man dead.

According to the report, at about 11:24 a.m. Wednesday, Scott Jerome Neal, 62, of Statesville, N.C., was traveling east on Interstate 20 about 11 miles east of Big Spring in his 2019 Freightliner truck with trailer, but was stopped in the outside lane due to backed-up traffic from construction.

Teddy Mack Hillis, 63, of Noble,

Okla., was also traveling east on Interstate 20 in his 2017 Ford F-250, and failed to control his speed, striking Neal's truck from the rear.

Hillis was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Mike Averette. Neal was not injured in the wreck.

According to the report, both drivers were wearing their safety belts during the wreck. Weather at the time of the accident was clear, and the road was dry.

The accident was investigated by Texas Highway Patrol Trooper Amanda Strickland of Big Spring, assisted by Sgt. Matthew Skinner and Trooper Ashton Brantley of Big Spring and Trooper David Nanez of Midland.

Luther King Jr. Day Commemorative Walk.

The Rev. Michael D. Smith, senior pastor of Big Spring's Mt. Bethel Baptist Church, led the procession, which commenced down MLK Boulevard, ending with a brief ceremony near the intersection of MLK and FM 700. Rev. Smith, who was marking his eighth year as part of the event, said he was pleased with the turnout for the walk.

"I am ecstatic about the turnout for this year," he said. "Each year, I seem to say that this is really the most diverse gathering that we've had, so I'm grateful to God that the city and the surrounding Howard County area is coming together to reflect and to mark this special occasion and this day."

Smith said that King's legacy is as important in today's world as it has ever been.

"I've believe that Dr. King's legacy, his memory

and his dream are even more important as we see all of the legal changes and the infringements upon the citizens' right to vote," Rev. Smith said. "I think it is even more imperative that we not only march and fight and pray, but that we also get active as it relates to participation in the legal system, to try to push back some of these infringements that we are seeing in cities across the United States. And I believe that, if we fail to do that, we are really placing the very name of our nation – the United States of America – in jeopardy if we fail to give the citizenry the right, the privilege, to voice their preferences in the voting box."

Smith recognized local government and church leaders who joined in the event, including Big Spring Mayor Shannon Thomason; City Council members Nick Ornelas (District 1), Diane Yanez (District 2), Troy Tompkins (District 5); Howard County Commissioner Eddilisa Ray (Precinct 1); and Justice of the Peace for Precinct 1, Place 2 Mike

Averette. Also, a representative from State Senator Kel Seliger's office was present at the event.

Averette offered a quotation from Dr. King: "Darkness does not drive out darkness: only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate: only love can do that."

Mayor Thomason spoke briefly at the event.

"Dr. King took a stand at a time in our history where people of color faced serious challenges and serious controversy," Thomason said. "The fact that we are here today honoring his memory and his work is tribute to the way he stood against those challenges and the controversy of his time. I believe we've come a long way today. I believe we still have a long way to go."

Martin Luther King Jr. was an American Baptist minister who was the most important spokesman and leader in the American Civil Rights movement. He was slain in 1968 by an assassin's bullet at the age of 39.

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

Escape. That's what the New Mexico Junior College Thunderbird were able to do Monday at night at Dorothy Garrett Coliseum. The T-Birds flew in at No. 8 in the nation, sporting a 15-3 record. Two of those losses came in a grinding stretch in league play. NMJC managed to come away with a 63-50 win over the upset minded Howard squad.

This Howard squad hardly resembled the team that lost to Frank Phillips last Thursday night. Monday Howard faced a giant and came oh so close to conquering it. The giant stood in the form of a NMJC team that had four players over six-foot tall, the tallest standing 6-5. Howard scratched and clawed the whole game, although NMJC held a 30-22 rebounding edge.

NMJC coach Austin Mefford said his squad may have been a little lackadaisical but took nothing away from the Howard squad. They (Howard) played well, Coach Ishee had them very well prepared for us. Sometimes when you are in our position and we tend to overlook things. We got off to a slow start, we didn't do a good job of defending. We really played well in the fourth quarter. We've played four of our first five conference on the

road. It's a tough conference. We're just ready to get home and play some basketball."

Howard took the fight right to the T-Birds, jumping out to a 8-2 lead thanks to two baskets by Kiara Green.

In fact Howard led the entire first half .Daysha Tijerina made sure Howard stayed on top by hitting a couple of three-pointers. Tijerina led Howard with 13 points, making four of seven from three. Kaeona Marquez made three-of-five threes to end up with 11 points. Green was the other Lady Hawk in double figures with 10.

Howard led 31-27 at..halftime HC got the lead up to 34-29 with eight minutes left in third quarter but NMJC slowly crawled back, going on a 9-0 run to take a 38-34 lead.

Tijerina made another three and Howard trailed 43-42 going into the fourth quarter.

The T-Birds soared in the final quarter behind the play of point guard Delma Zita and the inside play of 6-2 freshman reserve post player Danna Grenald, who came off the bench to score 18 points and grab eight rebounds. Zita gave Howard ball handlers trouble all game. She finished with eight steals and 15 points.






