Reward increased in 1977 Winkler County cold case multiple times. He was pronounced Special to the Herald

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is seeking information in the 1977 slaying of 73-yearold S.A. "Champ" Weaver, then the Precinct 4 Constable of Winkler County. An increased reward of up to \$6,000 is being offered for information that leads to the arrest of those responsible if the tip is received before the next featured cold case is announced. A \$3,000 reward for information leading to an arrest is routinely offered on all cases on the Texas Rangers' Cold Case web-

Weaver's 1971 Monte Carlo was found on the north shoulder of Highway 302, four miles west of Kermit. The engine was running, and the

headlights were on. Weaver had been robbed of cash and shot

dead at the scene.

Weaver was last seen earlier in the evening at the local lounge he owned, the Elbow Room. Weaver also owned a water works pumping station. At the time of his death he was married with children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

The Texas Rangers are assisting the Winkler County Sheriff's Office with this investigation and are the primary investigative agency. Anyone with details regarding the homicide is asked to come forward with information.

Texas boasts cheapest gas price average in America Rising crude oil costs lead to higher pump prices

The statewide gas price average in Texas is \$2.96 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is four cents more than it was on this day last week and is 84 cents more per gallon compared to this day last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers

in El Paso are paying the most on average at \$3.35 per gallon while drivers in Amarillo and San Antonio are paying the least at \$2.87 per gallon.

In Big Spring, gas prices on regular unleaded range between a low of \$2.87 at Alon at 3315 FM 700 to a high of \$3.22. The national average price for a gallon of regular unleaded

is \$3.32, which is two cents more when compared to this day last week and 93 cents more than the price per gallon at this same time last year. The outlook for gasoline demand remains strong and that

optimism continues to drive crude oil markets higher. In addition, market analysts are predicting tighter gasoline supplies after a fire on a key oil pipeline from Iraq to Turkey occurred Russia and the West over Ukraine.

on Tuesday along with rising geopolitical tensions between "The dynamics in the oil and gasoline market remain complex to start off the new year," said AAA Texas spokesperson

Daniel Armbruster. "The bottom line for the consumer is that

market optimism for crude and gasoline demand remains robust, and, therefore, AAA anticipates climbing gasoline prices

Drivers in Texas are paying the lowest gas price average in the country, according to gasprices.aaa.com. Meanwhile drivers in California are paying the most at \$4.65 on average for a gallon of regular unleaded.

- Maintain your car according to the manufacturer's recommendations. Regular service will ensure optimum fuel econo-

- in more aerodynamic drag. • Use cruise control on the highway to help maintain a con-
- stant speed and save fuel. However, never use cruise control on slippery roads because a loss of vehicle control could result. Minimize your use of air conditioning.
- Avoid extended idling to warm up the engine, even in cold-
- er temperatures. It's unnecessary and wastes fuel. Remove unnecessary and bulky items from your car.
- Minimize your use of roof racks and remove special carri-
- ers when not in use.

tion through the Texas Rangers' Cold Case website or by phone to the Missing Persons Hotline at 1-800-346-3243.

The Texas Rangers' Cold Case website provides information on more than 125 cases in an effort to garner public interest in unsolved or cold cases. Texas Crime Stoppers offers rewards (funded by the Governor's Criminal Justice Division and administered by DPS) of up to \$3,000 for information that leads to the arrest of those responsible for any Ranger cold case listed on the website. For more information, visit the Texas Rangers' Cold Case

As part of a DPS public awareness program, one case from the Texas Rangers Unsolved Crime Investigation (Cold Case) Program will be featured bi-monthly in an effort to generate new investigative leads and bring attention to these cold cases.

The Texas Crime Stoppers reward is increased up to \$6,000 for the featured case in hopes that the higher reward money will generate additional tips. The higher reward amount will only be paid if the

tip is submitted before the next case is featured. The Texas Rangers Unsolved Crimes Investigation Program was created to assist Texas law enforcement agencies investigating unsolved homicides or violent serial crimes.

Since there is no statute of limitations on the offense of murder, investigators pursue these cases to a successful resolution or until no viable leads

Something to think about...

Listen UP! As parents of four young children we often find ourselves competing for our children's undivided attention. They may find themselves competing for our undivided attention at times too. In this chaotic world filled with noise and activity, it is easy to get distracted. I wonder how often the Lord struggles to get our undivided attention?

We usually need someone to capture our attention so that we can clearly hear what the Lord may be communicating to us. God often uses unique people to ignite our imaginations that we might better hear His voice and follow His way. Scripture calls them prophets. I like to think of them as God's megaphone. We encounter several of them in the Bible, but in our own history God used a young pastor named Martin Luther King, Jr. to speak to the conscience

Dr. King lived with the conviction that "Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that." In light of his influence, I think it is important to reflect on King's dream again

"And so even though we face the difficulties of today and tomorrow, I still

have a dream. It is a dream deeply rooted in the American dream.

I have a dream that one day this nation will rise up and live out the true meaning of its creed: 'We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are

I have a dream that one day on the red hills of Georgia, the sons of former slaves and the sons of former slave owners will be able to sit down together at the table of brotherhood. I have a dream that one day even the state of Mississippi, a state sweltering

with the heat of injustice, sweltering with the heat of oppression, will be transformed into an oasis of freedom and justice. I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation

where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.

I have a dream today!"

I believe that this dream is not only "deeply rooted in the American dream," but is also deeply rooted in God's vision for us. As Dr. King also said, "We must learn to live together as brothers [and sisters] or perish together as fools." I believe that God is speaking, but the question is, "Are we listening?"



Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 21, 2010, a bitterly divided U.S. Supreme Court, in Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission, vastly increased the power of big business and labor unions to influence government decisions by freeing them to spend their millions directly to sway elections for president and Congress.

On this date:

In 1793, during the French Revolution, King Louis XVI, condemned for treason, was executed on the guillotine.

In 1910, the Great Paris Flood began as the rain-swollen Seine River burst its banks, sending water into the French capital.

In 1915, the first Kiwanis Club, dedicated to community service, was founded in Detroit.

In 1924, Russian revolution-ary Vladimir Lenin died at age 53.

In 1942, pinball machines were banned in New York City after a court ruled they were gambling devices that relied on chance rather than skill (the ban was lifted in 1976).

In 1950, former State Department official Alger Hiss, accused of being part of a Communist spy ring, was found guilty in New York of lying to a grand jury. (Hiss, who proclaimed his innocence, served less than four years in prison.)

In 1954, the first atomic sub-marine, the USS Nautilus, was launched at Groton (GRAH'tuhn), Connecticut (however, the Nautilus did not make its first nuclear-powered run until nearly a year later).

In 1976, British Airways and Air France inaugurated scheduled passenger service on the supersonic Concorde jet.

In 1977, on his first full day in office, President Jimmy Carter pardoned almost all Vietnam War draft evaders.

Ten years ago: Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich scored an upset win in the South Carolina Republican presidential primary, dealing a sharp setback to Mitt Romney.

Five years ago: A day after Donald Trump's inauguration, more than 1 million people rallied at women's marches in the nation's capital and cities around the world to send the new president an emphatic message that they wouldn't let his agenda go unchallenged. The Southeast saw the beginning of a weekend outbreak

of tornadoes and severe thunderstorms; sixteen people were killed in Georgia, four people died in Mississippi and one death was reported in Florida.

One year ago: On his first full day in office, President Joe Biden signed 10 executive orders aimed at combating the coronavirus pandemic, including one broadening the use of the Defense Production Act to expand vaccine production; he also signed an order mandating masks for travel, including in airports and on planes, ships, trains, buses and public transportation. After being largely sidelined in the final months of the Trump administration, Dr. Anthony Fauci returned to the White House briefing room to provide an update on the pandemic. The U.S. said it would resume funding for the World Health Organization; the funding had been halted

by the Trump administration.

Partner bids One Diamond with opener is free to pass. For this reaneither side vulnerable, and the next player passes. You have a partscore of 60. What would you bid with each of the following four

1. Two notrump. A two-notrump response to an opening bid of one of a suit ordinarily indicates a balanced hand containing 13 to 15 points with stoppers in the three unbid suits. The bid is forcing, and the auction must continue until game is reached.

But when there is a partscore of 60, two notrump has a different meaning. Since a response of one notrump would be sufficient to complete a game, the two-notrump bid amounts to a slam try and is usually based on 16 or 17 points.

However, opener need not bid again, and, in fact, he is expected to pass with minimum values. **2.** Three diamonds. The same principle applies to a jump-raise that is one level higher than necessary. Such a raise also carries with it a slam suggestion. And, as before, the jump-raise is not forcing. It is

also important to note that a two-

son, the value bid of three diamonds, which immediately confirms a fit and alerts partner to

slam possibilities, is preferred.

3. One notrump. Without the partscore, you would respond two clubs as a normal exploratory move. But it is inadvisable to bid such a weak suit under partscore conditions at a time when partner is not obligated to bid again. There is a real danger that he will pass with two or three small trumps, and this could result in the loss of a game if the trumps are banked


A one-notrump response is superior because it allows the contract to be made on high-card strength alone, even if you run into an unlucky distribution of the clubs. With 11 high-card points facing an opening bid, you should not worry about making one notrump if partner accepts that contract by passing. Seven tricks should be a breeze.

4. Two spades. A jump-response in a new suit (jump-shift) is 100 percent forcing and compels the opener to bid again regardless of the nature of his hand. The jumpshift differs from the jump-raise or the jump to two notrump, which are merely mild invitational moves toward a slam. There's no ceiling on the strength implied by a jumpshift. The sky's the limit.




