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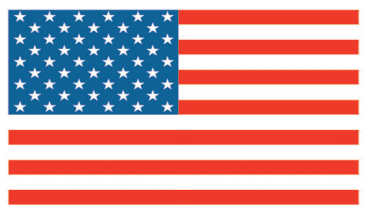

"It was so much fun!" said BSSO Conductor Dr. Keith Graumann following the show. "The fans and the guest artists were fantastic, but the orchestra played very well as well. The third time's a charm. We've had to cancel it twice."

Jeans 'n Classics Lead Singer Ian Jutsun said he always enjoys performing with the Big Spring Symphony.

A Moment in History

Mexican restaurants of Big Spring's past

The El Patio Restaurant was opened in 1947 by Victor Gomez and located at 400 N.W. Third. He hired Frank Morales as the head Chef and Manager. The Gomez brothers had maintained businesses along N.W. Third Street for many years. The El Patio became a target for crime with several robberies and shootings in the area.

Morales moved to open his own restaurant, The Morales Grill, in the former air terminal building on West Highway 80. The new restaurant was opened on April 5, 1950. Frank served delicious Mexican food along with sea food, chicken, and grilled steaks. He had private dining rooms that allowed for formal parties and meetings.

In 1952, plans were announced that the former base and hangar building were being reactivated as Webb Air Force Base, requiring Morales to move to a new location. The restaurant was so popular that Morales was not too con-

cerned about relocating. He still would offer the same top-of-the-line service and menu.

Frank Morales began construction

on a new restaurant at 206 NW Fourth Street and, on March 24, 1953, a formal opening was held at the new Morales Restaurant and Bar. The restaurant had a front entry with a 'Hollywood style canopy' and opened into the bar area. The Matador Bar and dining room featured paintings of Big Spring's popular female matador, Patricia McCormick. The Palm dining room was at a slightly higher elevation and featured palm tree posts along with a revolving barbecue on a spit. A refrigerated pastry and salad unit were added along with a steak bar and separate tortilla unit. This unit provided freshly made tortillas and tamales available for purchase. Each table in the dining areas featured a lite candle and live music from the newly installed organo. Morales was known to

"run a tight ship." Waitresses were required to stay on their feet the entire shift. They wore white starched uniforms with aprons and white shoes. If there were ever a soiled uniform, the staff member was required to change immediately. The restaurants were to be in pristine condition and the customer was the first concern with Frank. His ethics began to show in his restaurants, as they quickly grew in popularity. Morales Restaurant had a family atmosphere and, with the reactivation of the Air Force Base, was sure to fill with satisfied customers.

Later, the restaurant was enlarged and had a new makeover on the exterior with a more inviting 'Mexican' style stucco façade.

In 1967, Oscar Zertuche took over the business and renamed the restaurant La Posada.

Through the years, the restaurant remained a Big Spring favorite.

The restaurant went through several owners and endured good and hard times. The last owner passed away and the doors were permanently closed in 2021.

During most of the breaks between songs, Jutsun offered commentary.

"Queen, being the visionaries that they were, saw the onset of what video was doing for radio. Some of you are two young to remember when there wasn't video, and I remember when there wasn't. We used to listen to the records over and over and over again," he said. "They actually captured the feeling that I feel now, and I think some of you do. If you grew up in the video age and you're mad at me for saying it, well, too bad, because it's true. But nonetheless. Here

we are, singing some 'Radio Ga Ga.'"

Up next for the Big Spring Symphony Orchestra will be its annual Guest Conductor concert featuring perennial BSSO guest conductor Maestro John Giordano of Texas Christian University. Graumann said the show will likely be Giordano's final engagement with the Big Spring orchestra, because he is retiring soon. The concert will be February 19. The Big Spring Lady Steers got that bad taste of their mouths from Tuesday's lopsided loss to Levelland Friday at Steer Gym by whacking the Sweetwater Mustangs 57-28. The net result is Big Spring, 4-1 in league play, finishes the first half of District 3-4A play in second place behind unbeaten Levelland.

The contest was a blowout from the start. It wasn't pretty but the Lady Steers had more than enough firepower to overwhelm a six-man Sweetwater squad that hasn't won a game all season.

Sweetwater coach Thomas Robinson, a retired Army veteran, explained his situation. "I'm a first year coach at Sweetwater. I came here from Temple. We had a couple of kids go down with knees. Like any coach coming into a new situation there are changes to be made. Whenever people don't accept those changes, sometimes you have to part ways," said Robinson.

Big Spring jumped on Sweetwater early and hard, utilizing their full court press. Alexis Enriquez started things off with a jumper and Tristan Smith made a three-pointer. With Sweetwater constantly turning the ball over, Enriquez made another three-pointer and Mya Blanco's steal and layup put Big Spring up 10-0 three minutes into the game. In fact Big Spring scored the first 16 points of the game. The streak was broken when Hanna Vera made free throw for the Mustangs with 3:25 left in the first quarter. Big Spring led 34-12 at the half when Emily Matthews' lob pass to Kortney Moore resulted in two points just before the buzzer.

Big Spring coach Eric Tuttle this was a good game for Big Spring to get back on the win track. "I thought we came out a little flat," he said. "We made a few adjustments in the second half. We talked about making those gimmes, those easy shot under the basket. We've got to make more of them. We played with more energy in the second half. We'll just keep working at it every day."

Smith led all Big Spring scorers with 16 points. Enriquez followed with 12 points and Ryan Terrazas contributed 11 points and nine rebounds.

Big Spring will be on the road Tuesday against Lubbock Estacado at 6:15 p.m.

The Big Spring Steers got what they wanted - a date with the No. 12 ranked Lubbock Estacado Mustangs Tuesday in a battle of district unbeatens. The Steers wasted little time getting to the showdown with Estacado via a 53-26 dismantling of the Sweetwater Mustangs Friday night in Steer Gym.

This Sweetwater match was supposed to be a tough one for the Steers. It appeared not. Off to a fast start, keyed by tight man-to-man defense and the hot shooting of Chris Martinez., The senior guard

is making quite a name for himself with his offensive heroics, made three three pointers early, staking Big Spring to 13-0 lead with 3:34 left in the first quarter. The lead was 18-5 after one and 34-17 at the half.

As good as his shooting is, Martinez was even more relentless on defense, harassing Sweetwater players throughout the game. If his game-high 19 points wasn't enough, Martinez had seven steals, many times stealing the ball away from the dribbler. Also giving Sweetwater fits was Kaegen Mitchell, who had five steals himself.

Big Spring totally took Sweet-

water out of its game. So flustered were the Mustangs they were hit with four technical fouls, one on the head coach, one on the assistant coach and two on players.

Gavin Greathouse was the only other Steer in double figures with 11 points. Isaiah Holloway continued to play well for this under-sized Steers team. He finished with eight points and five rebounds.

The Steer will play Estacado in Lubbock at 7:45 p.m Tuesday.

Friend or Thief?

Dear Annie: I have a very dear friend who is like family. I am 20 years older than she is, and at times I feel more like a surrogate mother than a big sister.

I know she has mental health problems, including anger management, trust issues, obsessive-compulsive disorder and, at times, I think, narcissistic tendencies. But she truly is a good person at heart. I encouraged her to get into therapy, and she has blossomed and grown over this past year. I support her 100% in any way that I can.

She is a single mother who works two jobs. She has three boys, and they are her world. My husband and I take the boys after school while she works her second job because they are like grandchildren to us.

The other day, I was getting ready to make

Christmas cookies and thought I was losing my mind. Two of the pre-packaged cookie dough packages were missing. The boys saw my bewilderment and informed me that their mom took them to make them cookies the previous week.

Tonight, when I went to make the cookies for our house and church, I discovered that I'm missing a cookie sheet. So, I've been thinking back, and a lot of things have gone missing, and I simply thought that I must not have bought what I thought, or used all of something and not remembered. I have asked her before about things missing or if she "accidentally" picked something up, and she would be honest and return it the next day. Nothing of major value by any means. Simple silly things like a candle or a pair of scissors or hand lotion.

Well, after the incident with the cookie dough,

which really upset me, I bought a few bottles of wine to give as gifts, left them in the bag and taped a note on them: "Do Not Touch." When she came by after work to eat and get the boys, she saw this and got upset and was personally offended. My husband says to let it be because we love those boys so much and she's doing so well. We can afford to replace the little things.

I feel that she and I should have a conversation, and I feel her therapist should know.

To be honest, I'm afraid this will end up like our son, who robbed us blind and cut ties with us because we finally had to say enough was enough and file charges. I'm afraid the little things will become larger and the boys will think this behavior is acceptable if we don't stop it now. Please help. -- Stuck in Maryland

Dear Stuck in Mary-

land: You are correct to be concerned for your friend -- not because of (SET ITAL)what(END ITAL) she is stealing but for the fact that she is stealing from you at all. It shows a lack of trust. The fact that she took a little note and blew it way out of proportion tells me she is feeling guilty about something. As Shakespeare said, "The lady doth protest too much."

If anything, sitting down with your friend and trying to get her professional help is the kindest thing. Make sure when you approach her that it is not with a "got ya" mentality but rather one of concern for her mental health.

Today is Monday, Jan. 24, the 24th day of 2022. There are 341 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 24, 1989, confessed serial killer Theodore Bundy was executed in Florida's electric chair.

On this date:

In 1848, James W. Marshall discovered a gold nugget at Sutter's Mill in northern California, a discovery that led to the gold rush of '49.

In 1943, President Franklin D. Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Winston Churchill concluded a wartime conference in Casablanca, Morocco.

In 1945, Associated Press war correspondent Joseph Morton was among a group of captives executed by the

Germans at the Mauthausen-Gusen concentration camp in Austria.

In 1965, British statesman Winston Churchill died in London at age 90.

In 1978, a nuclear-powered Soviet satellite, Cosmos 954, plunged through Earth's atmosphere and disintegrated, scattering radioactive debris over parts of northern Canada.

In 1984, Apple Computer began selling its first Macintosh model, which boasted a built-in 9-inch monochrome display, a clock rate of 8 megahertz and 128K of RAM.

In 1985, the space shuttle Discovery was launched from Cape Canaveral on the first secret, all-military shuttle mission.

In 1987, gunmen in

Lebanon kidnapped educators Alann Steen, Jesse Turner, Robert Polhill and Mitheleshwar Singh. (All were eventually released.)

In 2003, former Pennsylvania Gov. Tom Ridge was sworn as the first secretary of the new Department of Homeland Security.

In 2011, a suicide bomber attacked Moscow's busiest airport, killing 37 people; Chechen separatists claimed responsibility.

In 2013, Defense Secretary Leon Panetta announced the lifting of a ban on women serving in combat.

In 2020, health officials in Chicago said a woman in her 60s had become the second U.S. patient diagnosed with a new virus that had emerged in China; she'd returned from that country in mid-January. Fifteen-year-old Coco Gauff upset defending champ Naomi

Osaka in the third round of the Australian Open.

Ten years ago: Declaring the American dream under siege, President Barack Obama used his State of the Union address to deliver a populist challenge to shrink the gap between rich and poor, promising to tax the wealthy more and help jobless Americans get work and hang onto their homes. Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney released his 2010 tax returns, showing that his annual income topped \$20 million and that he had paid about \$3 million in federal income taxes.

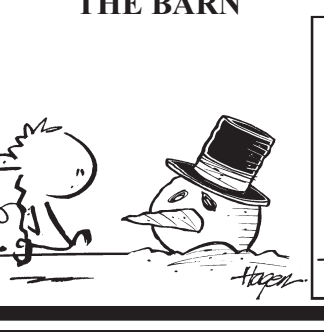
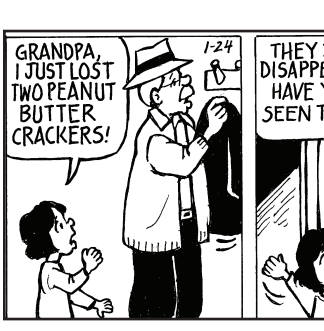
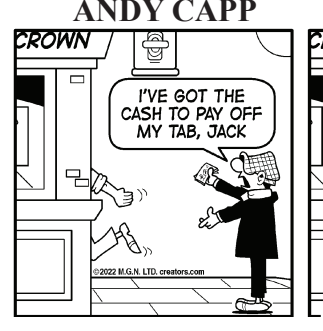
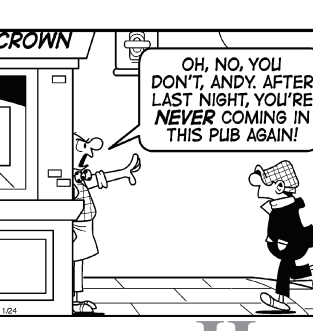
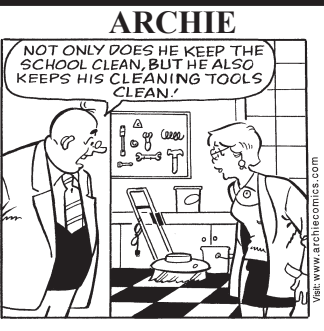
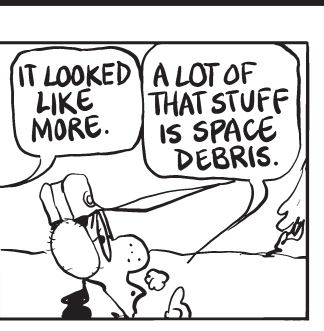
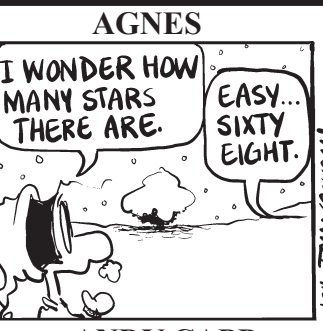
