City approves grant resolution for development west of Airpark

During their meeting Tuesday evening, the Big Spring City Council unanimously approved a resolution authorizing an application for a \$1.5 million grant from the United States Economic Development Administration for infrastructure work on the west side of the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark.

According to the terms of the proposed grant, the city will put \$500,000 of its own money, joined by \$400,000 approved earlier today by the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation, for a total of \$2.4 million to fund the project.

According to the grant reso-

lution, "...water and sewer extensions planned as part of the project will encourage economic development in a critical location to build back better the rural, economically distressed City of Big Spring and the surrounding area."

In later language, the resolution confirms that the \$1,500,000 in grant funds will be used "...to carry out Water and System

The resolution also notes the financial commitments made by the city and the EDC: "...the City of Big Spring is committing up to \$500,000 from its Utility Fund as cash contribution toward the construction, engineering, and administration of the Water and Sewer Enhancement Project. These funds are available, unencumbered, and committed to the project," and "...the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation is committing up to \$400,000 as cash contribution toward the

construction, engineering and administration of the Water and Sewer Enhancement Project."

The resolution also states the Council's approval of the EDC's expenditure.

The council approved the resolution unanimously as an emergency item, meaning that only one vote is required for the approval.

Following the City Council meeting's being called to order Tuesday evening, the invocation and Pledges of Allegiance to the U.S. and Texas flags were recited. A time for public comment was allotted but no one chose to spoke.

The council also held its second public hearing on its redistricting plans, with Bob Bass of Allison, Bass and Magee LLP law firm joining the meeting by video link.

EDC approves resolution at Tuesday noon meeting

The Big Spring Economic Development Corporation's Board of Directors held a brief special meeting Tuesday to consider a resolution prior to Tuesday evening's City Council meeting. After the meeting was called to order,

the board heard the invocation and recited the Pledge of Allegiance before opening the floor to public comment, but no one took that opportunity to address the EDC leaders. The next item on the meeting's agenda

was Executive Session to discuss and deliberate on a business prospect. The closed session lasted about 20 minutes. When the EDC board returned to open

session, they took up consideration of

the resolution, which involved partici-

pating with the City of Big Spring to obtain a grant from the United States EconomicD Development Administration.

"Big Spring Economic Development Corporation agrees to participate with the City of Big Spring in supplying a portion of the necessary, matching funds (up to \$400,0000 to attain a United States Economic Development Administration Public Works Project Grant for water and sewer infrastructure to allow for business expansion to the west of the City," read EDC Vice President Jeff Ward from the resolution. "This resolution authorizes the expenditure of up to \$400,000 of Big Spring Economic Development funds for said infrastructure expansion conditional upon: (A) the award of \$1.5 million to the City of Big Spring by the United States Economic Development Administration for said funding participation in the project of \$500,000, for a total project cost of be-

tween \$2.3 and \$2.4 million." The grant goes on to conclude: "This project is deemed, by the Board of the Big Spring Economic Corporation Board (sic) and the Big Spring City Council, as essential in providing critical infrastructure support required for economic expansion and job creation in the City of Big Spring and Howard County."

The board unanimously approved the resolution, and, In the absence of EDC President Shane Seaton, Ward and EDC Secretary/Treasurer Raul Benavides signed document.

The U.S. EDA grant was discussed and voted on at the Big Spring City Council meeting Tuesday evening. See the story reporting on that meeting for details.

"All single-member district-based governmental units that elect their executive bodies from single-member districts are required to look at those districts after the Census to determine whether the population in those districts is roughly in balance," Bass said. "We have a maximum total deviation, or tolerance, of no more than 10 percent."

Bass said population shifts in Big Spring since the 2010 Census caused Big Spring's districts to become out of balance, and redistricting - shifting the boundaries of the city's districts to balance their populations – is required.

"We found that Ward 1 was underpopulated the most, by about 537 people, and Ward 5 was the most overpopulated by about 10.27 percent," he said. "Those two, that's the range. That's the maximum range from top to bottom, and that equalled 25.21 percent. So it's about twice the legal limit you're allowed to have."

Allison, Bass and Magee drew up three possible plans to balance the city's districts, and the City Council chose "Plan C."

"Plan C was felt to be the most beneficial in terms of balance," he said. "It came in at about 1.63 percent deviation, or as few as 33 people over the ideal in (Ward) 4, and 26 people under in Ward 1. So that is significant. That is about as good as it gets in terms of reducing the deviation."

Redistricting requires that voting blocks of voters belonging to racial minorities not be split by redistricting.

The council unanimously approved adoption of Redistricting Plan C on the final reading of the

During a city manager's report given by Assistant City Manager John Medina in the absence of City Manager Todd Darden, Medina introduced

the new McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark Director Mike Feeley, who replaced former Director Jim Little, who recently retired.

Medina also gave a brief update on the Jan. 19 Large Item Pickup.

Dr. Steve Ahmed gave a COVID-19 report.

"The 27th of this month is the Magic Number, give or take five days plus or minus," Ahmed said. 'The positivity rate is going to be high by then, but the hospitalizations will continue for about another two weeks, so that brings us close to Valentine's Day. That's about the time that we think that this should begin to get less and less. This disease will become endemic, which means there will be here and there a few cases, but it won't be as many cases as we have now."

Dr. Ahmed said many people who have the CO-VID Omicron variant don't know they have it.

"They have a little scratchy throat or cold-like symptoms," he said. "The viral load is not much. So if you're going by a rapid test, the test might come back negative because there's not much of the viral load. So the PCR is the way to confirm this.' In other business, the council unanimously ap-

proved the meeting's Consent Agenda, which included: approval of Jan. 11 City Council meeting minutes; and final readings of resolutions changing the Council's schedule of council members verifying and presenting payment vouchers for Council approval to monthly rather than biweekly, and resetting the number of directors on the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation board to seven; and final readings of ordinances adopting the 2021 edition of the International Property Maintenance Code and purchasing a new vehicle for the Senior Center.

The vote on Redistricting Plan C - mentioned earlier - came next, and as mentioned was approved unanimously.

Councilman Nick Ornelas (District 1) presented

vouchers for Jan. 13 in the amount of \$2,434,523.84 and for Jan. 20 in the amount of \$360,835.62. The vouchers were unanimously approved.

In New Business, council members acknowledged receipt of the Big Spring EDC board's minutes from Dec. 21. EDC Executive Director Mark Willis was at the meeting, and mentioned that the board had approved the U.S. EDA Grant resolution mentioned earlier.

The council unanimously approved an item allowing the city council to establish credit/debit card reimbursement fees for payment of city services with a card. The item does not specifically set any fees, but reverses a former rule banning the practice of charging a fee for card use. The council also unanimously approved an item

allowing the City Council to waive fees for video productions in the city which "advance a public purpose." The council unanimously approved submission

of the U.S. EDA grant application mentioned earlier. The previous item approved the city's resolution regarding the grant, while this item approves the actual submission of the application.

Other items unanimously approved at the meeting included:

- · A joint election agreement with the Big Spring Independent School District for the upcoming elec-· A services agreement with AdComp Systems
- Inc., which allows the City Manager to negotiate with the company on favorable terms for allowing people with fines to pay in the city's Municipal Court to do so electronically. • A Texas Community Development Block Grant
- engineering services agreement with Freese and Nichols Inc. for the Downtown Revitalization
- The city's Investment Report for the quarter ending Dec. 31, 2021.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 26, 2020, the U.S. consulate in the Chinese city of Wuhan, the epicenter of the coronavirus epidemic, said it would evacuate its personnel and some private citizens aboard a charter flight. Five cases of the new coronavirus were now confirmed in the United States, including new cases in California and Arizona; all involved people who had traveled to Wuhan.

On this date:

In 1861, Louisiana passed an Ordinance of Secession, becoming the sixth state to break free from the United States.

In 1911, the Richard Strauss opera "Der Rosenkavalier" (The Cavalier of the Rose) premiered in Dresden, Germany.

Wilson signed the Rocky Mountain National Park Act, which created America's 10th national park.

In 1962, the United States launched Ranger 3 to land sci-entific instruments on the moon. (The probe ended up missing its target by more than 22,000 miles.)

In 1992, Democratic presidential candidate Bill Clinton, appearing with his wife, Hillary on CBS' "60 Minutes," acknowledged "causing pain in my mar-riage," but said past problems were not relevant to the cam-

In 1993, Vaclav Havel (VAHTS'-lahv HAH'-vel) was elected president of the newly formed Czech Republic.

In 1994, a scare occurred during a visit to Sydney, Australia, by Britain's Prince Charles as college student David Kang

blank shots from a starter's pistol. (Kang was later sentenced to 500 hours of community service.)

In 1998, President Bill Clinton forcefully denied having an affair with a former White House intern, telling reporters, "I did not have sexual relations with that woman, Miss Lewinsky."

In 2005, a U.S. Marine helicopter crashed in western Iraq, killing 30 Marines and a Navy medic aboard. A man parked his SUV on railroad tracks in Glendale, California, setting off a crash of two commuter trains that killed 11 people. (The SUV's driver, Juan Alvarez, was convicted of murder and sentenced to 11 consecutive life terms.)

In 2009, Nadya Suleman gave birth at Kaiser Permanente Bellflower Medical Center in California to six boys and two girls; criticism came after the public learned that the unemployed, single mother had gotten pregnant with the octuplets and

six elder children through in vitro fertilization.

In 2016, the FBI arrested the leaders of an armed group that was occupying a national wildlife refuge in Oregon for more than three weeks during a traffic stop that left one man, Robert "LaVoy" Finicum, dead Character actor Abe Vigoda, 94, died in Woodland Park, New Jersey.





does not depend on any allencompassing formula. Take this case where South is declarer in three notrump. He starts with seven tricks and needs to increase them to nine. The most

obvious method of play is to win

additional spade tricks will immediately accrue, solving declarer's problem right away.

However, attacking spades at once has a serious drawback. If East has the king, he will win and most likely shift to a heart, and the contract might — and in the actual case will — go down. For this reason, South should

avoid, or at least defer, any method of play that allows East to gain the lead and launch a potentially deadly heart attack. The A-Q of hearts are a formidable combination so long as West is on lead, but their power is considerably diminished if East obtains the lead. East is Public Enemy No. 1, and the hand should be played so as to avoid him, if at all possible. Declarer should therefore win the

first diamond in his hand, lead a club to the ace and return a club. If East follows low, South should insert the ten, being willing to lose the trick to West. This play automatically produces trick No. 8, since the clubs are bound to be divided 3-2 if the ten loses to West. Whatever West returns, South is

certain of at least nine tricks, because he can now take the spade finesse in complete safety. Win or lose, he can't be defeated.


