Council names Comanche Trail Park pavilion in memory of Stewarts

At its meeting Tuesday evening, the Big Spring City Council renamed Comanche Trail Park's Cowboy Pavilion in honor of longtime Big Spring residents and volunteers. Howard and Vicki Stewart.

"The Parks and Recreation Board brought it to us after Howard Stewart passed away, and asked if there were any pavilions that were not named directly after anybody already inside Comanche Trail Park, and if there were any available, if we could please name one in honor of Vicki and Howard Stewart for all of the work that they've done for the community," said Community Services Director Haley Herrera in an interview following the meeting.

Howard Stewart taught history and coached golf at Big Spring schools, later serving as Transportation Director for the district. He served on the Big Spring City Council for several years. After his

time on the Council. he served as manager of the Comanche Trail Park Golf Course. He was also an active volunteer with the Comanche Trail Park Festival of Lights and the American Cancer Society.

Vicki Stewart volunteered many years with the American Cancer Society and Relay for Life, and volunteered as a coordinator and designer with the Festival of Lights.

Howard was named Man of the Year by the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce in 2013, while Vicki was named Woman of the Year in 2017.

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Herrera said the Stewarts' work with Festival of Lights was more important than many people realize.

"We thought it was really important to honor them for such a huge event that has brought so many people to Big Spring," she said.

In addition to Cowboy Pavilion, the new Stewart Pavilion has also been referred to as "Second Pavilion."

At the start of Tuesday's meeting, the Council heard the call to order and the invocation, followed by the Pledges of Allegiance to the U.S. and Texas flags. One local resident spoke during the time allotted for Public Comment, identifying himself only as "Mr. Longoria," a resident of Big Spring's North Side. Longoria used his time at the podium to introduce himself to those present and

to express his Christian faith.

"I'm first of all and foremost, a believer in this book," Longoria said. "This is a Bible. This is what I carry around with me everywhere I go in this city."

Longoria stated that he is originally from Los Angeles, Calif., and is 35 years old. He said he has lived in Big Spring about six months, and had been a volunteer at the YMCA, but was let go from that position. During his comments, Longoria, who said he had participated in Junior ROTC training, advocated for a similar program in Big Spring to provide discipline for local teens.

Longoria was the only speaker during the Public Comments section of the meeting.

A planned presentation by Dathan Jones of the YMCA was postponed until a later meeting.

City Manager Todd Darden gave his regular report, speaking on four topics including the upcoming Large Item Pickup scheduled for District 2 on Feb. 16. Darden announced that brush is now being accepted during the large item pickups.

Other items on Darden's list included an announcement of the upcoming President's Day city holiday on Feb. 21; an update on the city's bond refunding, which currently total slightly more than \$709,000; and an update on profit sharing with Vector Fleet Management, which currently amounts to about \$72,000.

The city approved four items on its Consent Agenda unanimously and without comment, including approval of City Council minutes from the regular meeting of Jan. 25; final readings of two ordinances, one allowing the council to establish service charges for use of credit or debit cards to make municipal payments, and the other allowing the

City Manager to waive established fees for video productions that "advance a public purpose"; and final reading of a resolution calling the upcoming General Election on May 7. City offices up for election include Mayor and City Council member for District 5, currently held by Troy Tompkins.

Council members unanimously approved vouchers for Jan. 27 in the amount of \$764,108.63, as presented by District 1 Councilman Nick Ornelas. District 2 Councilwoman Diane Yanez moved to table consideration of vouchers for Feb. 4 totaling \$389,968.68 until the next meeting, a motion that was unanimously passed.

The council unanimously approved purchase of 10 30-yard trash containers for \$71,256; and also unanimously voted to reject all bids on several capital purchases totaling \$603,000. Regarding the second item, \$350,000 of the total was for a new sanitation truck; however, fulfillment on the truck was delayed due to lack of availability of a chassis for the vehicle. The item would not be available until July of 2023. In presenting the item, Finance Director Sandy Smith requested that the Council approve waiting on the sanitation truck for now, and allowing city staff to pay for other items, including a \$40,000 batwing mower, a \$15,000 zero-turn mower, a \$44,000 golf course greens mower, a \$14,000 Gator for the Utility Department, a \$65,000 diesel pump on a trailer for the Wastewater Department, and \$75,000 to place netting around the landfill.

In New Business, the City Council unanimously approved six of seven items on the agenda, and opted to pull one item from consideration.

Approved items included:

• Emergency reading of a resolution allowing City Attorney Andrew Hagen to act as an intermediary between the City and the Big Spring Housing Authority in an attempt to locate city office space for the Authority. According to City Manager Todd

EXPLAINER: How does curling scoring work?

BEIJING — Amid the clattering of the rocks and the shouting and sweeping and chess-like strategy, curling has a simple goal: position as many stones as possible closest to the center of the target.

All that is left then is to tally up the points. And while curling technique and strategy can be complicated, the scoring isn't.

Here is an explanation of how the game is scored:

THE LINGO

which is closer.

The target area is called the house, and at its center is the button. The rock closest to he button is the shot rock, and the team that played the shot rock will score at least one point in that end. (Think of an end like a baseball inning.)

The Olympics is using stones with yellow and red handles. So if the closest rock is red and the next-closest one is yellow, the red team will score one point. (Only one team scores in each end.)

COUNTING IT ALL UP

If the two stones closest to the button belong to the same team, that team gets two points. Three is three points, and so on until an opposing rock is closer, or until there are no other stones in the

The last rock is such an advantage that a score of one point with the hammer can be considered a disappointment, because the scoring team must give up the hammer for the next end.

If the team without the hammer scores, it is known as a steal. NO SCORE

If there are no stones in the house when all eight have been played - called a blank end the hammer stays put.

That doesn't necessarily mean someone messed up: Because the hammer is considered more valuable than

a single point, teams will sometimes intentionally blank an end to retain the last-rock advantage in the next one -- especially approaching the final ends in a close match.

gets to six spades on the bidding shown. You're on lead, and the question is whether to lead the jack of hearts or the jack of diamonds. The suits are exactly the same, and offhand, your choice of which jack to lead would seem to be a tossup.

However, as in many similar situations, there is an inference you can draw that should persuade you to lead a diamond, which defeats the slam, rather than a heart, which lets declarer make it. **The reason for** the diamond lead


lies in East's pass of North's fiveheart bid. The pass is significant in a negative way: If East had desired a heart lead against the slam toward which North-South seemed headed, he presumably would have doubled five hearts. East's failure to double suggests lack of interest in a heart lead.

To illustrate the point in a different way, let's suppose East held the K-Q-8-7-5 of hearts instead of diamonds. In that case, he surely would have doubled five hearts to induce West to lead a heart.

Of course, East might have no preference at all for either red suit, in which case his pass of five hearts would be meaningless. But in the long run, East's silence is more likely to imply preference for a diamond lead, so West would do better to choose that suit if he has no good reason to do otherwise.

As for South, it would have been wiser for him to bid six spades directly, without bothering with Blackwood. North was certain to have either one or two aces for his jump-shift to three clubs, so the inquiry for aces had the potential to be more helpful to East-West than to North-South.

Contact lenses are a popular alternative to eyeglasses. In fact, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that an estimated 45 million Americans rely on contact lenses.

Like eyeglasses, contact lenses correct refractive error, which refers to a change in eye shape that causes blurry vision. Contact lenses have evolved over the years, and now offer improved comfort, wearability and safety. Consumers can review the following pros and cons to figure out if contacts are right for them.

Advantages to contact lenses

The biggest perk of contact lenses is they provide unobstructed vision. Contacts move with the eye to provide a natural field of vision without the distortions or blind spots that pop up when wearing eyeglasses. Contact lens wearers also do not need to worry about contacts getting in the way, breaking or falling off during activities.

Contacts come in two main materials: soft and rigid gas permeable lenses. Contacts now can correct most vision problems, including astigmatism, age-related loss of close-up vision, and irregular corneal curvature. Multifocal lenses can correct multiple problems in the same lens. Some contacts also have UV protection built in to protect the eyes from the sun.

Wide availability and affordability can make contacts attainable for just about anyone. Aesthetics is a driving force behind the popularity of contact lenses. They do not change one's appearance (unless desired) and are virtually undetectable in the eye.

Once contact lenses are in, wearers do not have to worry about them clouding up when wearing masks or when walking from the cold outdoors into a warm home.

Disadvantages to contact lenses

Contact lenses need to be changed frequently and over time will cost more than eyeglasses, which only need to be replaced if prescriptions change or frames break.

Frequent computer users may find that

contacts dry out more quickly when staring at screens, so eyeglasses can be more comfortable in these instances. The same can be said for people with naturally dry eyes or those who suffer from allergies or other eye irritations.

Contacts require contact with the eye, which increases the risk of infections due to poor hygiene. Improper cleaning of contact lenses and cases also has been linked to eye health issues.

Health professionals warn against overuse of contact lenses. They should not be left in the eyes past recommended durations; otherwise, they may cause corneal hypoxia, which is the suffocation of the corneas. The University of Michigan Health says hypoxia occurs when the cornea does not get enough oxygen, which can be a risk with extended contact use.

Contact lenses effectively correct vision. People can decide if they're the right visual aides for them.

House prosecutors opened the trial with graphic video of the Jan. 6 insurrection at the U.S. Capitol and Trump's own calls for a rally crowd to march to the iconic building and "fight like hell" against his reelection defeat; Trump's lawyers insisted that his remarks were pro-tected by the First Amendment. A team of international and Chinese scientists looking for the origins of COVID-19 said it most likely appeared in humans after jumping from an animal. Federal safety officials blamed the January 2020 helicopter crash that killed former NBA star Kobe Bryant and eight others on the pilot's decision to fly into clouds, where he became disoriented. Chick Corea, a jazz pianist who'd pushed the boundaries of the genre, died of cancer at 79.





Jacobellis finally wins Olympic gold medal, 1st for US

BEIJING — Lindsey Jacobellis is finally an Olympic gold medalist.

Let that sink in for a moment because Jacobellis has been trying for 16 years. Jacobellis helped make the wild sport of snowboardcross famous. Who could forget her premature celebration as she approached the finish line in the 2006 Turin Games, an ill-timed board grab that sent her tumbling out of the lead? In a way, she became one of the best-known silver medalists of all time.

Now Jacobellis will be remembered as the first American gold medalist at the Beijing Olympics. She reached the top of the podium hours after Mikaela Shiffrin had another stunning early exit on the Alpine ski hill.

Jacobellis rode hard to the finish of the snowboardcross final on Wednesday. beating Chloe Trespeuch of France and covering her heart with her hands as she slowed.

Jacobellis was 20 when she made the mistake in Turin. Now 36 and in her fifth Olympics, she became the oldest U.S. woman to win a gold. The 16 years is also the longest gap between medals for any U.S. woman.

She never stopped reaching for a gold medal.

"They can keep talking about it all they want because it really shaped me into the individual that I am," Jacobellis said. "It kept me hungry and really kept me fighting in this sport."

A glum Olympics for the Americans actually began to brighten a few hours earlier when California snowboarders Chloe Kim and Shaun White, the defending gold medalists, had joyful rides through the halfpipe. Kim earned the top spot in women's qualifying while White, a three-time gold medalist in his fifth and final Olympics, was fourth in the men's qualifying.

Jacobellis' performance lit up the Genting Snow Park.

"This feels incredible because the level that all the women are riding at today is so much higher than it was 16 years ago," Jacobellis said.

Jacobellis said she'd advise young riders to not let mistakes define them. "Especially if you've made it to this stage, you're a winner. And look at what you've learned from the experience and take that with you later in life."

SHIFFRIN'S LETDOWN

Mikaela Shiffrin arrived in Beijing heavily favored to add to her collection of two Olympic gold medals but instead is 0 for 2, a shocking development that has left her shaken.

She skidded out just a few seconds into the slalom, a quicker exit than two days earlier when she crashed out of the super-G.

"I've never been in this position before and I don't know how to handle it," said the teary-eyed Shiffrin, who won the slalom at the 2014 Sochi Games and the giant slalom at the 2018 Pyeonchgang Games.

The seventh racer on Wednesday, she began losing her balance and teetering out of control just four seconds and four gates in. She swerved too far as she veered to her right and she ended up way wide of the fifth gate.

"I was pushing and maybe it was past my limit."

There was nothing left to do but ski to the side of the course known as the Ice River, click out of her skis and sit on the ground, her head resting in her arms.

"GS and slalom, those were my biggest focuses. So it really feels like a lot of work for nothing," she said.

Shiffrin had planned on entering all five individual Alpine races. Her next opportunity could come Friday in the super-G, but she raised doubts about that.

"It would be a pleasure to ski. But I also have some teammates who are really fast, and we have the athletes who can fill the spaces. So if I'm going to ski out on the fifth gate, like, what's the point?" she said.


