

Why vote?
 Here are a few reasons, as well as what seats are up for grabs locally in this year’s elections

For a lot of people, voting is a serious civic duty. They show up to the polls on election day. They know exactly who and what they are voting for, and they leave the polling place with a sense of pride.

But for many others, voting can be viewed as too much of a hassle, too much pressure, or a useless endeavor. There are a lot of reasons why people don’t vote, but it’s important that everyone’s voice is heard.

What is an election? In simple words, an election is a way a community can choose who will represent them in local, state and national issues.

Why is it important to vote? Increasing the number of people that vote in each election means better representation, more funding for our community and a better quality of life.

Here are some reasons to vote:

- Your vote makes a difference. It might feel like your vote won’t matter; however, it will make a difference, especially in local elections. There are plenty of cases where a candidate has won by a small margin; your vote could be that one.

- The winner will represent you anyway. Voting for a candidate is not an endorsement of the candidate, but more about how they will represent their party. It is easy to register to vote; just be a citizen 18 or older on or before election day. Be sure you register prior to the registration deadline for an election to be able to vote in it.

Elections affect your life every day. You may not realize it but your life is affected by government, regardless if it is local, state or national. Their decisions affect, the roads we drive on, the air we breathe, the water we drink, the food we eat, and the schools that teach our children. Know what is going on your community, state and nation.

People fought for your right to vote.

It is understandable that life is complicated and it’s a struggle to fit it into your schedule. However, voting is one of the few chances you have to make a direct impact on your

Library mural approved by county commissioners

After tabling the issue during their past two meetings, Howard County Commissioners voted Monday to approve the creation of a mural on a small building near the parking lot of the Howard County Library.

The decision came during the commissioners’ regular meeting, which started with three people — Tammy DePauw, Nancy Michaelis and Michael Gray — all of whom spoke in favor of the project.

“High school is a time when we start to lose readers,” Michaelis — who serves as President of the Friends of the Library — said. “To have them that invested in the Library, that invested in something in their community, is a win. It’s a win in so many ways.”

During the item’s portion of the agenda, County Library Director Mavour Braswell addressed the commissioners in favor

community. Using early voting you can be in and out in minutes.

If you are having trouble deciding who to vote for, consider reviewing a ballot guide before the election.

Try choosing your top three issues or concerns and look for candidates who line up with these priorities. Contact public officials about issues that are important to you.

Voting is key to having your voice heard on issues that directly impact our community. You can make a difference by taking part in choosing who our leaders are. Respect your right to vote. It is a privilege that not many people in the world have. The right to vote is precious, everyone should use it. There is nothing like participating in choosing who will represent you, it is healthy for you and the community. Staying on the sidelines is disempowering, voting is always empowering.

Early voting for the Primary elections started on

Monday and goes until the February 25. All early voting is conducted at the County Courthouse. The current election is a contest to choose who runs in the November election from each party. When there is only one candidate for an office, they automatically go on the ballot for the November election. In the primary election you vote for one party, Republican or Democrat. Libertarian and the Green parties are only on the November ballots. Only in the primary election are you asked which ballot you want. In this election you will be voting for: County Commissioner, County Judge, Justice of the Peace, and County Commissioners; as well as statewide candidates.

The County Commissioners are responsible for roads and bridges within their precinct. They also make policy and budgeting decisions for the county.

Four commissioners are elected, each from a quarter of the county's population. They serve along with the County Judge on the Commissioners' Court. The difference between County commissioners and County Judge is, a County Judge has been screened for qualifications, and commis-

sioners often do not have the experience a County Judge has. The commissioners are responsible to the voters, but their duties are defined and controlled by the State.

The County Judge has a wide range of judicial and administrative duties, and is the presiding officer of the commissioner's court. They can serve as budget officer, and most have broad judicial duties such as presiding over misdemeanor criminal and small civil cases, probate matters, and appeals from the Justice of the Peace Court. The County Judge works with our representatives in Austin to benefit our county and also serves as head of emergency management.

Justice of the Peace duties are:

- Hears traffic and other class C misdemeanor cases punishable by fine only.
- Hears civil cases with up to \$20,000 at stake.
- Hears landlord and tenant disputes.
- Hears truancy cases, performs magistrate duties, and conducts inquest.

These are what you will be voting on in the primary election. Get to know each candidate and what they plan on bringing to the office when elected.

of the mural.

Braswell said the cost of creating and maintaining the mural would be covered by the Big Spring ISD.

"The Superintendent has agreed to an MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) to cover the maintenance, in case it deteriorates or gets damaged in some way."

Braswell suggested that angled parking bumpers near the building be repositioned further away from the building to prevent vehicles striking the building.

"They can be moved back further away from the building and still not impede people passing behind those vehicles, so that can be done," she said.

Braswell said the theme of the mural will be "Literacy, Knowledge, and Imagination." Work on the project is planned for Spring Break, March 12-20.

Big Spring High School art teacher Andrea Phinney, whose students will create the project, was also present at the meeting, and showed commissioners a preliminary sketch of the proposed mural.

Commissioners unanimously approved the mural, contingent upon the Memorandum of Understanding with the school district.

At the start of the meeting, County Treasurer Sharon Adams presented personnel considerations. She also presented an item requesting permission to change the county's Employee Handbook to reflect changes to the county's Direct Deposit policy enacted at the commissioners' previous meeting. The change, approved at the commissioners' Jan. 10 meeting, requires employees to utilize direct deposit rather than receiving a paper paycheck. The change is

set to go into effect April 1.

Adams also presented her Monthly Payroll Report for January.

County Auditor Jackie Olson's portion of the meeting was to have included a presentation by David Quin on contract negotiations and anticipated future rates for electricity, but Quin was not present at the meeting, so the item was tabled.

Olson presented invoices, purchase requests and financial reports, all of which were unanimously approved by the commissioners.

Library Director Braswell gave her presentation on the mural next, followed by County Road Engineer Brian Klinksiek, who spoke about election campaign signs in the right-of-way of county roads.

"We don't allow companies to put signs in the right-of-way. It is an obstacle to us in the maintenance of ditches, they can cause sight problems. There are signs that we are required to put up by the MUTCD (Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices) so I just wanted to bring this to the attention of all of the campaigns," Klinksiek said. "If you're going to put a sign up, and you have permission from the property owners, put it on their side of the fence, or attach it to the fence itself."

Klinksiek said campaigns have through this upcoming weekend to adjust the position of their signs.

"Starting next Monday, we'll pick them up," he said.

Klinksiek also presented three low bids on road work, on Salem Road, County Road 54, and County Road 36. Additionally, the bid on the County Road 36 project was increased to \$168,094 to correct quantities for the project. Commissioners unanimously approved all the bids.

County Clerk Brent Zitterkopf presented his monthly report for January, which was unanimously approved by the commissioners, before the meeting adjourned.

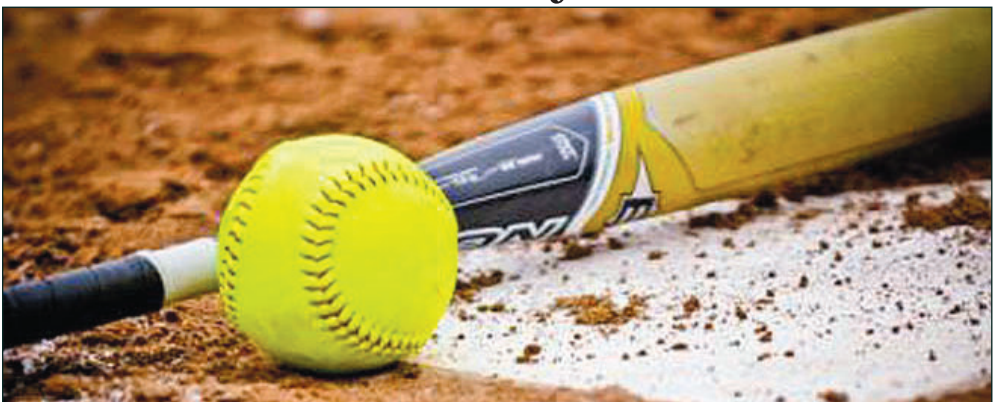

Contract Bridge

Forewarned is forearmed

West dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:

Opening lead — jack of hearts.

There are many hands where, when the play begins, declarer has no idea how the opposing cards are distributed. If he then adopts the most promising line of play and it happens to fail, he cannot be faulted, even though some other approach might have proven successful.

But there are also many instances where declarer knows a great deal about the unseen hands because of the bidding. If there is sufficient information available to him to find the winning line of play and he does not do so, then the blame can be laid squarely on his doorstep.

Consider today's deal where South arrives at three notrump on the bidding shown. Given West's opening bid, declarer should have no trouble finding the winning route to nine tricks. But if he makes the slightest slip along the way, he will fail.

The critical play comes at trick two, after South wins the opening heart lead with the queen. If he next leads the queen of diamonds, West wins, continues hearts and later gets in with the ace of clubs to put the contract down two.

If instead declarer leads a club at trick two, West takes the ace, continues hearts and South eventually goes down one.

But observe the difference if South leads a low diamond at trick two. If West puts up the ace, declarer has nine tricks — four diamonds, two hearts and three spades. And if West ducks the diamond instead, dummy's jack wins. South then abandons diamonds and drives out the ace of clubs to assure nine tricks in the form of three clubs, three spades, two hearts and a diamond.

The winning line of play is not difficult to find given West's bidding, which marks him with both missing aces. Armed with this information, South simply arranges the play so that he is sure to score nine tricks before West can get five.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Feb. 15, 1879, President Rutherford B. Hayes signed a bill allowing female attorneys to argue cases before the Supreme Court.

On this date:

In 1764, the site of present-day St. Louis was established by Pierre Laclede and Auguste Chouteau.

In 1898, the U.S. battleship Maine mysteriously blew up in Havana Harbor, killing more than 260 crew members and bringing the United States closer to war with Spain.

In 1933, President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt escaped an assassination attempt in Miami that mortally wounded Chicago Mayor Anton J. Cermak; gunman Giuseppe Zangara was executed more than four weeks later.

In 1944, Allied bombers destroyed the monastery atop Monte Cassino (MAWN'-tay kah-SEE'-noh) in Italy.

In 1961, 73 people, including an 18-member U.S. figure skating team en route to the World Championships in Czechoslovakia, were killed in the crash of a Sabena Airlines Boeing 707 in Belgium.

In 1965, singer Nat King Cole, 45, died in Santa Monica, California.

In 1967, the rock band Chicago was founded by Walter Parazaidner, Terry Kath, Danny Seraphine, Lee Loughnane (LAHK'-nayn), James Pankow and Robert Lamm; the group originally called itself The Big Thing.

In 1989, the Soviet Union announced that the last of its troops had left Afghanistan, after more than nine years of military intervention.

In 1992, a Milwaukee jury found that Jeffrey Dahmer was sane when he killed and mutilated 15 men and boys. (The decision meant that Dahmer, who had already pleaded guilty to the murders, would receive a mandatory life sentence for each count; Dahmer was beaten to death in prison in 1994.)

In 2003, millions of protesters around the world demonstrated against the prospect of a U.S. attack on Iraq.

In 2005, defrocked priest Paul Shanley was sentenced in Boston to 12 to 15 years in prison on child rape charges.

In 2020, the U.S. government said Americans who were on board a cruise ship under quarantine in Japan because of the coronavirus would be flown back home on a chartered flight, but that they would face another two-week quarantine; about 380 Americans were aboard the Diamond Princess.

Ten years ago: Con-

gressional negotiators sealed an agreement on legislation to renew a payroll tax cut for 160 million workers and jobless benefits for millions more. In defiant swipes at its foes, Iran said it was dramatically closer to mastering the production of nuclear fuel even as the U.S. weighed tougher pressure on the Tehran government.

Five years ago: President Donald Trump's nominee for labor secretary, Andrew Puzder, abruptly withdrew his nomination after Senate Republicans balked at supporting him, in part over taxes he had belatedly paid on a former housekeeper not authorized to work in the United States. In an ultimatum to America's allies, Defense Secretary Jim Mattis told fellow NATO members to increase military spending by year's end or risk seeing the U.S. curtail its defense support.

One year ago: A sprawling blast of winter weather brought unusual snow and cold into Texas, knocking out power for more than 4 million people and sending temperatures into the single digits as far south as San Antonio; the icy blast across the Deep South would later be blamed for more than 100 deaths in Texas and dozens more across other Southern states. Salsa music idol Johnny Pacheco died at 85 in New York, where he'd been hospitalized with pneumonia. Michael McDowell stunned NASCAR by scoring his first career victory in the Daytona 500, charging through a crash scene when Brad Keselowski and Joey Logano wrecked

racing for the win; the race ended early on a Monday morning after a rain delay of nearly six hours.
