

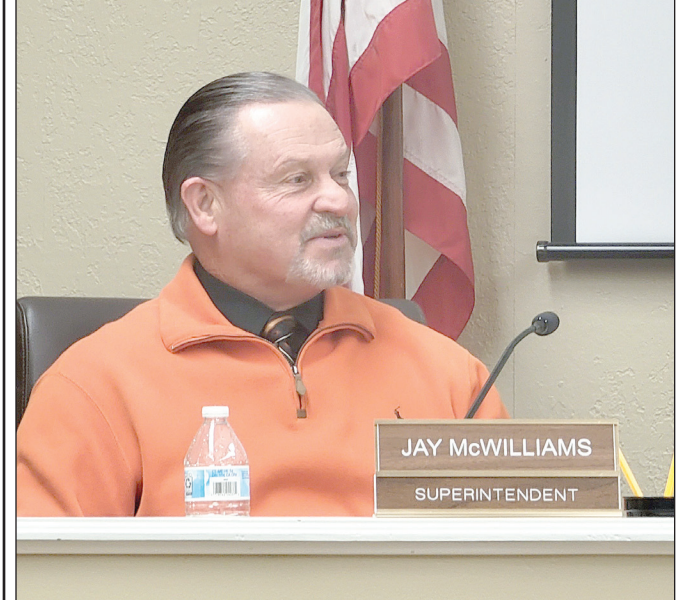

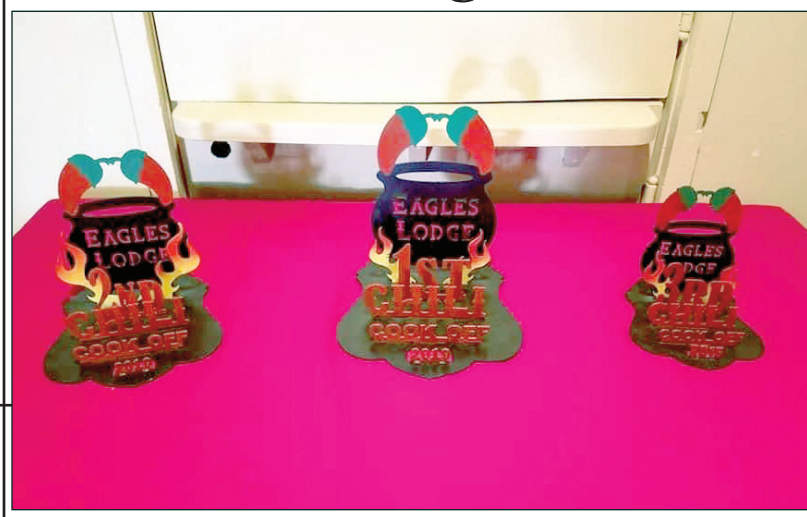

The Big Spring ISD school board voted unanimously extend Superintendent Jay McWilliams' contract at Thursday's special meeting. The item was the only business on the meeting's agenda.

During the meeting, after the opening prayer and Pledge of Allegiance, school board President Fabian Serrano called for public comment, but no one chose to speak. The board then immediately retired into executive session to deliberate on McWilliams' contract. After deliberation of more than an hour, the board returned to open session and voted to renew McWilliams' three-year contract. "The board felt that since Mr. McWilliams has started, there

 After Spring Break, the Howard County Library is going to be a little more colorful. A mock-up of one side of

the mural – printed with this article – features a girl holding a golden key, riding on a flying book, and surrounded by fanciful elements such as a dragon, hot-air balloons, rainbows, and an ocean with a jumping fish and sailing ship. The mural features the words "Dora Roberts" and "Howard County Library." According to Howard County Library Director Mavour Braswell, the theme of the mural is "Literacy, Knowledge, and Imagination," and work on the project is planned to take place over Spring Break, March 12-20. "High school is a time when we start to lose readers," said Friends of the Library President Nancy Michaelis. "To have them that invested in the Library, that invested in something in their community it's a win. It's a win in so many ways. County Commissioners had tabled the item twice previously, raising concerns about how materials would be paid for and how the mural would be preserved against the elements, as well as how the safety of the students working on the mural could be ensured while on county property. Monday, Braswell said that all costs of creating and maintaining the mural would be covered by the Big Spring ISD. "The Superintendent has agreed to an MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) to cover the maintenance, in case it deteriorates or gets damaged in some way," she said. Commissioners' approval of the project is contingent upon the signing of the MOU.

Russia to stage massive nuclear drills amid Ukraine standoff

MOSCOW — The Russian military on Friday announced massive drills of its strategic nuclear forces, a stark reminder of the country's nuclear might amid Western fears that Moscow might be preparing to invade Ukraine.

Russian President Vladimir Putin will personally oversee Saturday's exercise, which will involve multiple practice launches of intercontinental ballistic missiles and cruise missiles, the Defense Ministry said.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said Putin would observe the drills from the Defense Ministry's situation room and supervise the practice missile launches himself.

The ministry said it planned the maneuvers some time ago to check the readiness of Russia's military command and personnel, as well as the reliability of its nuclear and conventional weapons.

The war games follow U.S. President Joe Biden's warning on Thursday that Russia could invade Ukraine within days.

Western fears focus on an estimated 150,000 Russian troops — including about 60% of Russia's overall ground forces — concentrated near Ukraine's borders. The Kremlin insists it has no plans to invade.

But Moscow has demanded that the U.S. and its allies keep Ukraine and other ex-Soviet nations out of NATO, not deploy weapons in Ukraine and pull back NATO forces from Eastern Europe.

Washington and its allies bluntly rejected the Russian demands, and Moscow threatened to take unspecified "military-technical measures" if the West continued to stonewall.

Russia holds massive drills of its strategic nuclear forces on an annual basis, but the maneuvers planned for Saturday pointedly involve the Black Sea Fleet. The fleet is based on the Crimean Peninsula, which Russia annexed from Ukraine in 2014.

The Black Sea Fleet has surface warships and submarines equipped with Kalibr cruise missiles, but it doesn't have intercontinental ballistic missiles and didn't take part in similar previous drills of the country's strategic forces.

In the past, Russia has held the annual strategic forces drills in the fall. U.S. officials have voiced concern that Moscow shifted the exercise to February to coincide with a possible invasion of Ukraine.

The Kremlin's Peskov said Russia notified foreign partners about the maneuvers in advance, adding that the exercise shouldn't cause worries in the West.

"Practice launches of ballistic missiles are part of regular training," he said. "They are preceded by a series of notices to other nations via different channels."

Putin met with Belarusian President Alexander Lukashenko and invited him to watch Saturday's maneuvers.

He also said in Luke 14, "Salt is good: but if the salt have lost his savour, wherewith shall it be seasoned?" Salt is for preservation. If it has lost its saltiness or usefulness, it is good for

nothing but to be thrown in the trash heap of life.

Jesus is the only One who can make us fit for His Kingdom. He loves us enough to clean up our lives when we trust Him to do so. He gives us abundant life here on earth, and everlasting life with Him in His Kingdom.

So this new year is a great time to begin on the plans He has for us. New resolutions don't work. But a commitment to Him does. Be worth your salt by living the life abundantly He has planned for you. He will even show you what that is, if you will take the time to ask Him.

The Howard College Lady Hawks treated their Kansas counterparts downright rudely over the past two days. Tuesday Howard run ruled Dodge City College 9-0, 12-4. Wednesday Howard did the same thing to Garden City College 15-6, 22-5.

Behind the bats of Oliva Varas and Samantha Cervantes Howard rocked the Garden City pitchers for 14 runs and three home runs in the opening game. Howard pitcher Cassie Elliott did enough to slow down the potent Garden City bats as the Lady Hawks cruised to a run rule victory.

Vargas and Cervantes each drove in four runs. First baseman Vargas was perfect at the plate, 4-for-4, including hitting a solo shot in a four run Howard fourth. Vargas, the designated hitter, got three hits, including a two-run scoring single in Howard's four-run second inning.

Howard coach Ashley Lopez said it was all in a day's work for her Lady Hawks. "I think this is just how these girls work," said Lopez. "We have a talented team. They love to hit, that's how they do. Hitting is contagious. Once it starts, it's unstoppable. I tell them we'll get the fundamentals down and the home runs will come."

The home runs did come. Center fielder Kamryn Cottrell and right fielder Briana Sibrian also homered for the Lady Hawks. Sibrian lined a two run missile over the left field fence in the third inning. Cottrell lined a three-run shot to left the next inning.

Howard chased Garden City starter Tara Reid from the game in the fourth. Reid surrendered 13 runs on 12 hits.

Garden City, which is averaging 12 runs per game, got to Elliott for six runs in the middle innings. Other than that Elliott got the win and was effective the rest of the game. Garden City leadoff

hitters Ryanna Johnson was strong at the plate for her team, hitting a double and single, driving in four runs.

In the second game the Lady Hawks scored 10 runs in the fourth inning to blow the game wide open behind the pitching of Alicia Estrada, who struck out eight along the way. Left fielder Madison Dingman went 4-for-5 at the plate.

Howard's big inning was powered by a homer by Olivia Kuzminskli and double by Dingman. Dingman also singled in the inning along with base hits by Cottrell, Ariana Soto and a walk by Alyssa Olivas. Obanor paces No. 11 Texas Tech for sweep of No. 7 Baylor

LUBBOCK, Texas — Kevin Obanor and his Texas Tech teammates responded after some choice words at halftime from coach Mark Adams to complete a season sweep of reigning national champion Baylor.

"I can't say too much on camera, but he wasn't happy," Obanor said. "We were down and we were just playing with no energy. ... He called a couple of people out, including myself."

Obanor scored 21 of his 23 points in the second half while rediscovering his long-range shot, and had nine of his 13 rebounds after the break when the 11th-ranked Red Raiders overcame a seven-point deficit to beat No. 7 Baylor 83-73 on Wednesday night.

After missing 11 consecutive 3-pointers over 2 1/2 games, Obanor made back-to-back shots from beyond the arc to cap a 14-3 run that started the second half and put the Red Raiders (20-6, 9-4 Big 12) ahead to stay.

"Kevin just put it in another gear," Adams said. "That second half, he put us over his shoulders and said, 'Hey, I'm not gonna let us lose,' and had a great 20 minutes. ... He just took the game over."

When Obanor had consecutive 3s again later in the game, Tech led by double digits for the first time.

"We had a lot of mishaps in the second half that allowed him to shoot," Baylor guard Adam Flagler said.

"My teammates, my family, they just helped encourage me, telling me to pick up my head and they believe in me," Obanor said. "Once you get confidence like that, you can truly enjoy playing for a team like that."

Bryson Williams added 17 points for Tech, which had a 51-point outburst in the second half to improve to 16-0 at home this season. Adonis Arms scored 15 points, while Terrence Shannon had 14 points and five assists.

James Akinjo had 18 points and seven assists for Baylor (21-5, 9-4), while Adam Flagler had 14 points and Matthew Mayer 13. Jeremy Sochan had eight points and 10 rebounds.

"Really played well the first half and then second half turned it over," Bears coach Scott Drew said. "We didn't rebound, we didn't get stops, we didn't get in transition."

Today in History

Today is Friday, Feb. 18, the 49th day of 2022. There are 316 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Feb. 18, 2001, auto racing star Dale Earnhardt Sr. died in a crash at the Daytona 500; he was 49.

On this date:

In 1564, artist Michelangelo died in Rome.

In 1885, Mark Twain's "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" was published in the U.S. for the first time (after being published in Britain and Canada).

In 1970, the "Chicago Seven" defendants were found not guilty of conspiring to incite riots at the 1968 Democratic national convention; five were convicted of violating the Anti-Riot Act of 1968 (those convictions were later reversed).

In 1972, the California Supreme Court struck down the state's death penalty.

In 1983, 13 people were shot to death at a gambling club in Seattle's Chinatown in what became known as the Wah Mee Massacre. (Two men were convicted of the killings and were sentenced to life in prison; a third was found guilty of robbery and assault.)

In 1984, Italy and the Vatican signed an accord under which Roman Catholicism ceased to be the state religion of Italy.

In 1988, Anthony M. Kennedy was sworn in as an associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court.

In 1994, at the Winter Olympic Games in Norway, U.S. speedskater Dan Jansen finally won a gold medal, breaking the world record in the 1,000 meters.

In 2001, veteran FBI agent Robert Philip Hanssen was arrested, accused of spying for Russia. (Hanssen later pleaded guilty to espionage and attempted espionage and was sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole.)

In 2003, an arson attack involving two South Korean subway trains in the city of Daegu claimed 198 lives. (The arsonist was sentenced to life in prison, where he died in 2004.)

In 2016, in what was seen as a criticism of Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump, Pope Francis said that a person who advocated building walls was "not Christian"; Trump quickly retorted it was "disgraceful" to question a person's faith. (A Vatican spokesman said the next day that the pope's comment was not intended as a "personal attack" on Trump.)

In 2020, President Donald Trump commuted the 14-year prison sentence of former Illinois Gov. Rod Blagojevich for political corruption; Blagojevich

left prison hours later and returned home to Chicago. (Trump also issued pardons or clemency to former New York City police commissioner Bernie Kerik, financier Michael Milken and a long list of others.)

Ten years ago: A star-studded funeral service was held for pop singer Whitney Houston at New Hope Baptist Church in Newark, New Jersey, a week after her death at age 48. Syrian security forces fired live rounds and tear gas at thousands of people marching in a funeral procession that turned into one of the largest protests in Damascus since the 11-month uprising against President Bashar Assad began.

Five years ago: Norma McCorvey, whose legal challenge under the pseudonym "Jane Roe" led to the U.S. Supreme Court's landmark decision that legalized abortion but who later became an outspoken opponent of the procedure, died in Katy, Texas, at age 69. Omar Abdel-Rahman, the so-called "Blind Sheik"

convicted of plotting terror attacks in the United States in the 1990s, died at a federal prison in North Carolina where he was serving a life sentence; he was 78.

One year ago: Republican Sen. Ted Cruz of Texas, who had flown with his family to a vacation in Mexico as his state dealt with a deadly winter storm that crippled the power grid, returned home a day later and described the trip as "obviously a mistake." Bob Dole, a 97-year-old former long-time senator and the 1996 Republican presidential nominee, said he'd been diagnosed with Stage 4 lung cancer. (Dole died in December 2021.) Health officials reported that life expectancy in the United States had dropped by one year during the first half of 2020 as the coronavirus pandemic caused its first wave of deaths. Naomi Osaka stopped Serena Williams' latest bid for a record-tying 24th Grand Slam singles title in the Australian Open semifinals.

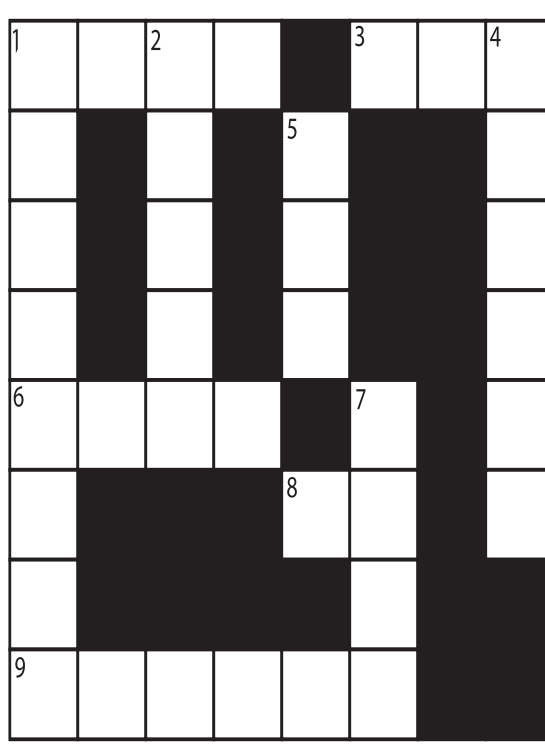

Contract Bridge

Test your play

You are declarer with the West hand at Four Hearts, and North leads the queen of diamonds. How would you play the hand? (With proper play, the contract can be made against virtually any distribution, but it is not easy to find the solution.)

WEST: ♠ A Q 6 3, ♥ K J 6 4 2, ♦ 7, ♣ A Q 6
EAST: ♠ 5 4 2, ♥ A Q 10 7 5, ♦ A 4, ♣ 4 3 2

Win the diamond queen with the ace, ruff a diamond, cash the A-K of trump and ace of spades, lead a low trump to dummy's ten and play a spade toward your Q-6-3.

1. If South shows out, play low, forcing North to hand you the contract whether he returns a spade, a diamond or a club.

2. If South produces the king of spades when you lead the spade from dummy, 10 tricks are assured, and, in fact, you have a chance for one or two overtricks.

3. If South produces a spade lower than the king, play the queen. If the queen wins, your mission is accomplished. But even if the queen loses to North's king, he cannot stop you from making the con-

tract because:
a) If North started with the doubleton king of spades, he must return a diamond or a club, either of which hands you the contract.
b) If North started with three spades to the king, a spade return establishes your fourth spade as a trick, while a diamond or club return also gives you your 10th trick.
c) If North started with four spades headed by the king, he can do no better than take your queen with the king, cash another spade and continue with his last spade. But instead of ruffing this spade in dummy, which you might feel tempted to do, you discard one of dummy's clubs!

This leaves North in an untenable position. He must either return a diamond, allowing you to discard another club from dummy as you ruff in your hand, or else lead a club into your A-Q. Either way, you are certain to make the contract. Your only losers in this variation would be three spade tricks.

It's hard to visualize at the very start that making four hearts is certain regardless of how the North-South cards are divided. But the fact is that you can't miss if you adopt the right line of play.

The Right Stuff

Sixty years ago on February 20, 1962, John Glenn became the first American to orbit the earth. I was in 9th grade. Our science teacher slipped us out a side door and led us to his house a few blocks away where we crowded around his black and white television to watch the launch. The tiny speakers strained to recreate the thunder of the Mercury Atlas 6 rocket when it ignited on the launch pad at Cape Canaveral. A shaky camera traced the flame that streaked through the sky hurtling John Glenn toward space. The rocket was little more than a beefed up Intercontinental Ballistic Missile, its warhead replaced by a space capsule. Within four hours, Glenn made three orbits of the earth, and then prepared for re-entry. An entire nation held its breath as Walter Cronkite described the potentially loose heat shield and the likelihood that Friendship 7 would burn up like a meteor.

Years later I visited the Smithsonian and viewed the space capsule in which Glenn made his historic

flight. The capsule is about the size of a 1960's Volkswagen Beetle. It was far less sophisticated than a Prius or a Ford Focus. Personal computers would not become available for another twenty years. Because of their discipline and courage, John Glenn and the other astronauts who blazed the first trails into space came to be known as men with "the right stuff."

Few of us will ever experience a heroic moment like John Glenn experienced February 20, 1962. But each of us can be men and women with "the right stuff." Every day we are called upon to live with courage, discipline, and faith. Some face huge challenges.

Today, when I think of people with the "right stuff," I think of Patrick Kalenzi, the veterinarian who recently helped us care for our dog, Buddy, in his final days. Patrick was born into abject poverty in Uganda, the son of a Tutsi family that had escaped genocide in Rwanda. With an indefatigable faith he overcame insurmountable obstacles and obtained an education. He immigrated to the US and rescued his family in Uganda from poverty. He

captured his extraordinary story in his book, Tears Run Dry.

James wrote, "Consider it all joy, my brethren, when you encounter various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces endurance." (James 1:2-3). Peter wrote, "In this you greatly rejoice, even though now for a little while, if necessary, you have been distressed by various trials, so that the proof of your faith, being more precious than gold which is perishable, even though tested by fire, may be found to result in praise and glory and honor at the revelation of Jesus Christ." (1 Peter 1:6-7).

Perhaps the sixtieth anniversary of John Glenn's courageous journey into space will remind us that we all can face life with courage and faith. Each of us can live with the "right stuff."

EXPLAINER: Why are thousands of baptisms deemed invalid?

When is a baptism not a baptism?

When the cleric presiding at the ceremony alters the ritual language in such a fundamental way that it undercuts its meaning, according to the Vatican.

And even the altering of a single, crucial pronoun can render a baptism invalid, it says.

A Roman Catholic priest, the Rev. Andres Arango, resigned Feb. 1 as pastor of his parish in Phoenix, after acknowledging he had been using the incorrect baptismal formula during more than two decades of priestly ministry in Arizona, California and Brazil.

Arango used the formula, "We baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit," instead of the prescribed singular pronoun: "I baptize you ..."

Theologically, that makes all the difference, the Vatican ruled in 2020, because it's not the "we" of the congregation doing the baptizing, but rather the "I" of Jesus Christ, working through the priest.

Now the Diocese of Phoenix is putting out a call to anyone who underwent the ritual under Arango to receive "valid" baptisms — and potentially other rites of initiation. The diocese estimates that thousands were affected.

WHAT IS THE SIGNIFICANCE OF BAPTISM, AND WHY IS IT IMPORTANT FOR IT TO BE "VALID"?

Baptism is the basic rite of initiation into the Christian faith. In Catholic theology, baptism is

considered a sacrament — a visible rite conveying spiritual grace — and is "necessary for salvation," according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church. "The church does not know of any means other than baptism that assures entry into eternal beatitude" — that is, heaven.

For a sacrament to be valid, it has to be presided over correctly, the church teaches.

"Baptism for us is for salvation, so it's a big deal. We need to make sure to make it right," said Jay Conzemius, moderator of the Diocese of Pittsburgh's tribunal and past president of the Canon Law Society of America.

HAS THIS COME UP BEFORE?

Yes. Cases have arisen in Michigan and Oklahoma of priests who learned their baptism was invalid.

The Vatican in June 2020 issued guidance declaring that the formula "We baptize you ..." was invalid and that anyone who baptized using it must be re-baptized properly.

The Vatican said then that some unnamed priests were using the "We" formula to make the baptism more of a communal affair involving parents, godparents and the community in welcoming a new member into the Catholic Church. But in an explanatory note accompanying its decision, it recalled that when a priest baptizes someone, it is actually Christ performing the sacrament, not the community.

"Modifying on one's own initiative the form of the celebration of a sacrament does not only

constitute a liturgical abuse ... but a wound inflicted upon the ecclesial communion," the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith said in the note.

The Vatican clearly knew that its ruling would cause upheaval, but for such a fundamental sacrament which concerns the salvation of a soul, it felt the need to insist that freelance variations were not only unacceptable but invalid.
