In the weekend edition of the *Herald*, candidates for County Judge answered seven questions posed by the paper. In today's edition, Justice of the Peace candidates had the opportunity to respond to the same queries. The main purpose of elections is to choose good representatives for our county. On March 1, the citizens of Howard County will vote in a Primary election to elect the candidates they want on the ballot in November for the following positions: County Judge, County Commissioner (Precinct 2) County Commissioner (Precinct 4), Justice of the Peace (Precinct 1, Place 2), and Justice of The Peace (Precient 2). Early voting is now underway at the Howard County Courthouse, and is slated to continue each weekday through Feb. 25.

To aid voters in making the best choice, each candidate was asked to respond to a set of seven questions, selected by the Big Spring Herald. The questions, presented in the same order for each candidate, include:



a concert in the Big Spring High School Auditorium, featuring Magical Movie Music in the first half and Music From Out of This World in the second half.

"It went very well. This is an extraordinary group, and the kids were fabulous at the end. I thought they were just terrific. One rehearsal! Just that one, brief rehearsal and they pulled it off like professionals! It was great," Giordano said following the concert.

Of course, the maestro, rightfully, gushed about his granddaughter, a mezzo-soprano, currently a master's degree scholar studying vocal performance at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, with several opera and vocal music credits to her name. Despite her other credits, Saturday night's concert marks her debut engagement as a soloist before an orchestra.

"She's phenomenal. I predict a really first-rate career for her," Giordano said. "She's actually just beginning...this is her first orchestral engagement, and I think it's a great send-off for her, I really do. She has an extraordinary talent. Her unusual ability is not just her voice, but she has a stage presence that is amazing. She is a very quiet, subdued, soft-spoken, kind of shy person, but she gets on stage, and all of a sudden, this beauty and everything comes forward and goes across the footlights. It's a rare quality."

Auatin's portion of Saturday night's program came before intermission, at the end of the first half of the concert.

Following the National Anthem, Maestro Giordano led the Big Spring Symphony Orchestra in wellknown music which has appeared in movies, including Gioacchino Rossini's Overture to William Tell, which has appeared in many movies but is best-known as the theme to The Lone Ranger; Percy Grainger's "Irish Tune from County Derry" (aka "Oh Danny Boy," aka "Londonderry Air"), which has appeared in movies such as The Matchmaker, Once Upon a Time In the West, Return to Me, and Paradise Road; and Franz Schubert's Symphony No. 8 "The Unfinished", Movement No. 1, which can be heard in Double Indemnity, Fight Club, and Minority Report.

At this point in the program, Giordano left the stage to "find" Austin and brought her to the stage, where she performed three pieces plus an encore: Wolfgang Mozart's "Voi che sapete" from his opera Le Nozze di Figaro (The Marriage of Figaro); "Somewhere" from the musical West Side Story, by Leonard Bernstein; and "Una voce poco fa" from Giaochino Rossini's Il Barbiere di Siviglia (The Barber of Seville).

After a standing ovation, Austin returned to the stage to perform an encore: "If I Loved You," from the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical Carousel.

Following the concert, Austin said she enjoyed

What are her plans following graduate school? "This!" said Austin enthusiastically, meaning performing on stage.

During intermission Big Spring Symphony President Mark Watt presented Giordano with a token of Big Spring's esteem.

"We do have a gift. As a small token of our appreciation, the Big Spring Symphony Association Board voted to establish an endowed scholarship at Howard College in your honor," he said. "Beginning in the Fall of 2022 and every year following, one of our music students at Howard College will be awarded the Maestro John Giordano Music Scholarship.'

In responding to the honor, Giordano recognized the Big Spring Symphony Orchestra's Music Director and Head Conductor, Dr. Keith Graumann.

"I don't know what to say, except I owe a great deal of gratitude to one person here who always stays in the background, but has done something remarkable in Big Spring," Giordano said. "To develop a symphony of this quality and bring it back year after year for I don't know how many years, and to keep it afloat, and make things work and bring great artists in as we have this evening, it's just extraordinary and I owe him a great deal of gratitude. Dr. Keith Graumann."

Next, Giordano and the orchestra embarked on the second half of the performance, Music From Out of This World.

Leading off the second half was music from a galaxy far, far away: Star Wars Epic Suite II by John Williams, arranged by R.W. Smith. The suite contained Princess Leia's Theme, the Imperial March, Forest Battle and the familiar Star Wars main theme.

The next piece was Johann Strauss II's wellknown "Blue Danube Waltz," which is instrumental in developing the tone of the 1968 classic science fiction movie 2001: A Space Odyssey.

Following the "Blue Danube" was Claude Debussy's "Clair de Lune," which is included primarily for it's title's reference to the moon, but is also in a few films including the historical space drama The Right Stuff; Westworld; and Oceans Eleven.

Next came Claude Debussy's "Firebird Suite," which features prominently in Disney's movie Fantasia.

The finale featured student musicians from several area high schools, including Big Spring, Coahoma, Colorado City, Stanton and San Angelo Central. All of the student performers have qualified for All Region, All Area, or All State band or ensemble. Prior to the group's performance with the Orchestra, Giordano and Graumann handed out certificates to the students, announced by Watt.

From Colorado City High School: Adam Hernandez, clarinet; Mallory Carreon, trombone; Jason Hale, euphonium; and Karson Martin, tuba; from San Angelo Central High School: Gregory Faught, contrabass; and from Stanton High School: Andres Flores, French horn; Coper Gernentz, trombone; Thayne Gernentz, trumpet; and Abbigayle Keesee, French horn.

The show's finale was "Finlandia" by Jean Sibelius

After the concert, the Big Spring Symphony Guild hosted a reception in the auditorium lobby. Speaking at the reception, Maestro Giordano said he doesn't plan to be "...some of these people that have 16 retirement trips."

"Unless it's the New York Philharmonic that calls," he laughed. "No, but seriously, it's probably the last concert, at least for a long time, that I'll be doing. It's been a long, great affiliation with Big Spring. Like, 40 years!"

Giordano reminded those present that he had brought the Fort Worth Symphony to visit Big Spring before the Big Spring Symphony Orchestra had even formed.

"A lot of wonderful stories we have of the concerts we did with the Fort Worth Symphony and the Big Spring Orchestra," he said. "Big Spring has been one of my favorite places to come for many years. It's the people! The orchestra people are wonderful people, and everybody here in the city are just very loving. It's just amazing. And the orchestra is good, so it's a positive event for me. It's something I'm going to miss, and I'm very honored with the scholarship."

The orchestra's next concert will be April 23 at Howard College's Dorothy Garrett Coliseum, and will feature internationally-known musical artist Marie Osmond.

CLYDE - The Coahoma Lady Bulldogettes' season came to an end Saturday afternoon against the Brock Lady Eagles. But it wasn't so much as what Brock did to shutdown Coahoma. It was more of the Bulldogettes having "one of those days".Brock eliminated Coahoma 53-26 in the area round of the state basketball playoffs.

It ends a successful Coahoma season where coach Joe Mireles squad finished with a 22-11 record. Brock advances to the third round with a 21-13 mark, poised to play Jim Ned, next week in Cisco.

The Bulldogettes played their usual tough defense but the offense was missing. They just couldn't put the ball in the hole against the Brock man defense. Coahoma got some good looks at the basket, both near and far, but the ball just wouldn't go in on this afternoon. How bad was it? Coahoma only made three baskets the entire half. It finished the game 8 of 37 from the floor, for 22 percent. Guards Isabella Cox and Madison Rodgers stayed in foul trouble all game long, Cox, who had 21 points in the win against Ballinger, fouled out midway through the third quarter, finishing with six points. Rodgers also scored six points.

Brock got off to a slow start itself, leading 6-5 after one quarter. Coahoma's second quarter was just as fruitless, it managed only five points, Meanwhile Brock made a couple of three pointers and sank several free throws to push its lead to 20-10 at halftime.

The Lady Eagles put the game away in the third behind the long range bombing of Hallie McPherson, who finished the game with three six-pointer to lead her team with 16 points. Shae Lang made a couple of free throws and a basket and Cox turned in a three point play to try to keep Coahoma close but the Brock lead swelled to 37-21 going into the fourth quarter. "Our shot just wouldn't fall tonight," said Mireles. "Brock did a good job against us. I'm proud of these young ladies on how far they've come. They've grown so much this year. We're only losing two seniors. We have a lot to look for. It was a very enjoyable ride."

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


