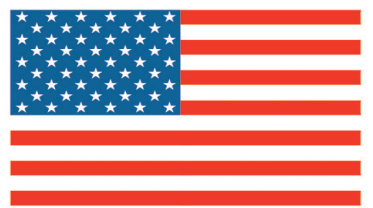

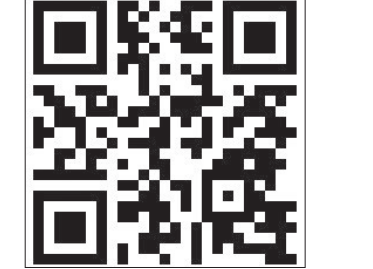

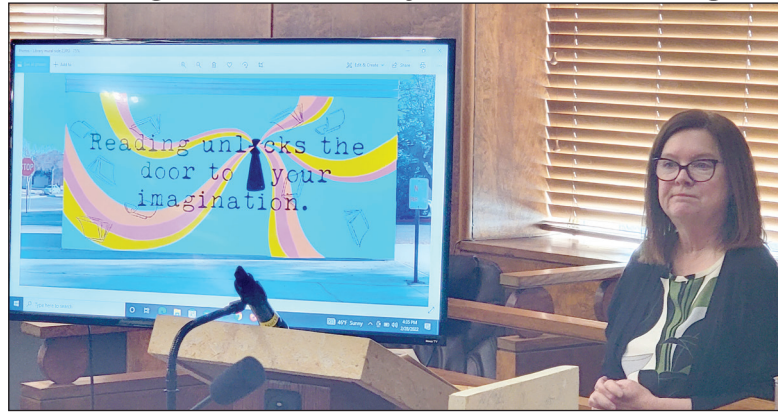
Commissioners approve Library mural final design

Howard County Commissioners saw the final sketches of the planned Howard County Library mural and unanimously approved the project...once again pending the signing of a memorandum of understanding with Big Spring Independent School District.

The decision came during a meeting of the commissioners Monday afternoon. County Head Librarian Mavour Braswell presented an updated sketch of the front of the mural - featuring a girl carrying a large key and riding a flying book, a dragon, hot air balloons and a sailing ship, and the words "Dora Roberts" and "Howard County Library"; as well as the previously unrevealed back side, which features images of books,

a flowing design emerging from a keyhole, and the phrase "Reading unlocks the door to your imagination." According to Braswell, the two small sides of the rectangular building will simply be painted and adorned with the word "Library."1 "So I think their drawing pretty much represents the things that they wanted to express," Braswell said. "So you have literacy, because she's riding

HC trustees cancel election with no contested races

Several Howard College administrators presented items of note to the Howard County Junior College District Board of Trustees during its meeting Monday.

Following the opening of the meeting, the board approved routine matters including minutes of previous meetings, financial statements and reports before looking into New Business. College President Dr. Cheryl Sparks told the trustees that Howard College's candidates in the May election are all running unopposed. Although trustee Michael Flores has decided not to run again in the election, only one candidate has filed to seek the seat Flores will vacate: former Big Spring City Council member Raul Marquez Jr. College Board incumbent Mark Morgan will run unopposed, as will at-large incumbent Dr. Marisha Beck, who was appointed to replace former board member Patricia Bennett, who vacated her seat when she moved.

Board members voted to certify the unopposed candidates and to cancel the college's portion of the May election.

Board members unanimously voted to approve Dr. Sparks' contract and job description.

Sparks gave a status update on COVID-19 at the college, during which she said numbers of students and staff positive for the disease are down since the spike of Omicron variant cases in January.

At this point, as mentioned previously, several college employees gave reports on partnerships and grants at the college.

Dean of Health Professions Luci Gabehart spoke about a partnership with Texas Tech University to assist nursing students to advance from an Associate's Degree in Nursing (ADN) to a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN).

Evan Hoefelmeyer and Kelby Vise from the school's Agriculture Department reported on a USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture grant for the college's Veterinary Tech

holding the key of knowledge, which is coming from the book, and then imagination, which is all of the other items around her, the dragon, the fairy, the ship, representing adventure. This is the side facing the parking lot.. The other side says, 'Reading unlocks the door to your imagination,' and this would be the side facing the library."

Although the commissioners all expressed approval of the design, one slight hiccup in the process came when Braswell presented the Memorandum of Understanding, as yet unsigned by BSISD Superintendent Jay McWilliams, stating that the school district will be responsible for the costs and maintenance of the project.

"It is the policy of the court not to sign agreements until the other party signs," said County Judge Kathryn Wiseman. "I'm sorry, I should've seen that before we came to court."

The commissioners voted again to approve the agreement and allow Wiseman to sign it, pending a signature by the superintendent first.

Work on the mural is planned over Spring Break. Following the pledges of allegiance to the U.S.

and Texas flags at the start of the meeting, Susan McLellan, Peggy Skiles and Nancy Michaelis addressed the commissioners, speaking in favor of the library mural.

County Treasurer Sharon Adams presented personnel considerations, her Treasurer's Monthly Report for January, and her Monthly Payroll Report for February, all of which were approved unanimously. Adams also reminded commissioners that the county's program of paid COVID-19 leave was expiring, asking if they wanted to extend it or let it end. The commissioners voted to extend the program through the end of the fiscal year. Commissioners also approved renewal of an agreement with the Texas Association of Counties in which TAC helps the county oversee its administration of the Affordable Care Act funds.

"They've been doing it for quite a number of years now, and it is quite helpful," Adams said.

County Auditor Jackie Olson presented Program Manager David Quin with the Public Power Pool. According to the Public Power Pool's website, they are "...designed to save taxpayer money by aggregating power usage to procure the best power contracts at the lowest cost..." for local governments.

Olson also presented invoices and purchase re-

quests, which the commissioners approved, as well as a change order on the county's fencing project; and bids on a boiler for and windows for \$323,580 at the courthouse. Another bid on a boiler at the Library was tabled.

Although she was busy setting up for today's county election, Elections Administrator Jodi Duck presented an item asking the commissioners to sign and order the May election on state Constitutional Amendments. The May election will also include city elections. Commissioners approved the measure unanimously.

Library Director Braswell asked commissioners to approve her annual state report and five-year plan, which they did unanimously, before presenting the item on the Library mural.

County Road Engineer Brian Klinksiek presented his roadway maintenance update, in which he reported that 6,000 cubic yards of roadway material had been transferred to the road department's holding yard. Klinksiek also reported that work on County Roads 21 and 23 has begun.

Klinksiek told commissioners that a funeral for long-time Road and Bridge Department retiree Willie Speaker was held Monday. Speaker worked for the county for 30 years, according to Klinksiek.

program.

Dean of Workforce Development Dee Lindsey reported on a partnership with the group BAM BIZHUB for entrepreneurship training.

Executive Dean Pam Callan from Howard's San Angelo campus reported on a partnership with Hands Up Interpreting for ASL training, with the San Angelo Museum of Fine Arts regarding an Artisan Series, with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW) concerning electrical certification, and with Angelo State University's Engineering Department regarding a program called "2+2 Engineering."

The SouthWest College for the Deaf welcomed Marla Martinez and Gina D'Amore to its Advisory Council, and Executive Dean Danny Campbell announced that the college will soon offer dual credit for high school and college, with a single course being offered this summer as a test run.

In the Performance Measures and Outcomes portion of the meeting, Dr. Sparks announced that district-wide, enrollment and student contact hours are down, although actual numbers vary across the district. At the Big Spring

campus, both enrollment and contact hours are virtually flat since last year, while both metrics at the Lamesa campus are actually up. Enrollment at San Angelo is down about 12 percent, while contact hours are also down. While Sparks didn't offer a number on contact hours at SWCD, she did note that enrollment is up about 30 percent.

Howard's Director of Institutional Effectiveness Bryan Stokes reported on progress preparing students for college-level courses and allowing students to take developmental courses "co-requisite" - i.e. at the same time - as college courses.

Stokes also reported on an Economic Modeling Specialists International (EMSI) report on labor market analytics.

"What's really great about EMSI is they provide numerous data points for us to look at," Stokes said.

Trustees also approved the college's Quarterly Investment Report and final audit document.

Chief Business Officer Steve Smith noted that the college's new system servers, storage and system software should be in place in two to four weeks.

Chief of Operations Fabian Serrano reported that the college is working with the City of Big Spring to develop an interlocal agreement for seal coating services at the SWCD campus.

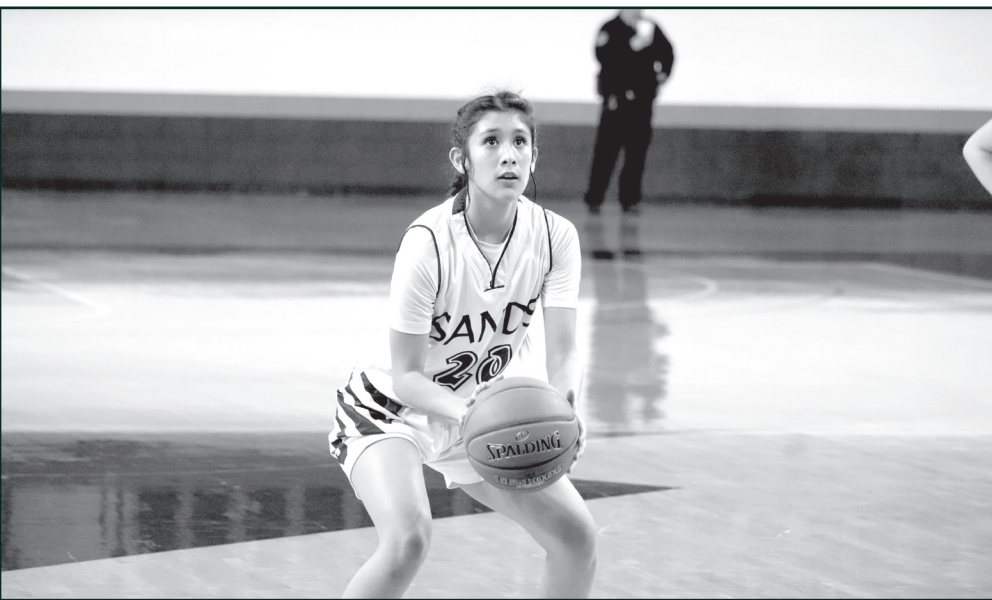

dren, particularly toddlers or early grade-schoolers, to dig into a seafood meal can be a struggle. However, fish sticks can make a fish dinner more attractive to youngsters. You don't need to buy the frozen variety at the store. This recipe for "Fish Sticks with Fries and Tartar Sauce" from "Danielle Walker's Eat What You Love" (Ten Speed Press) is a crunchy, homemade alternative.

Fish Sticks with Fries and Tartar Sauce
Makes 12

- Tartar Sauce**
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon minced cornichons (gherkin pickles)
1 tablespoon chopped capers
1 teaspoon champagne vinegar
1 teaspoon freshly squeezed lemon juice
1 teaspoon coarse-grain mustard
1 teaspoon chopped fresh

flat-leaf parsley
1/8 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Fries
1 large parsnip, peeled
1 white-fleshed sweet potato (such as Hannah), scrubbed but unpeeled
3 tablespoons avocado oil
Kosher salt

Fish sticks
1 pound haddock or cod fillets
4 ounces plantain chips
Fine sea salt and freshly ground black pepper
2 egg whites, beaten until frothy
2 teaspoons Dijon mustard

Preheat the oven to 450 F.

To make the tartar sauce, in a small bowl, mix together the mayonnaise, cornichons, capers, vinegar, lemon juice, mustard, parsley, and pepper. Place in the refrigerator to chill while you make the fries and fish sticks, or up to

Pat the fish dry with paper towels and season generously with 3/4 teaspoon sea salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. One at a time, dip the fish strips into the egg mixture and shake gently, allowing any excess to drip back into the bowl, then dip the fish into the plantain chip mixture, turning to coat each strip and shaking off any excess. Place the fish strips on the prepared wire rack.

Remove the baking sheet from the oven and scoot the fries over to one side. Position the rack with the fish sticks on the baking sheet and return to the oven.

Bake the fish and fries together for 10 to 12 minutes, until the fish is crisp and cooked through. Season the fries generously with the kosher salt. Serve the fish sticks and fries immediately with the tartar sauce on the side.

Contract Bridge

The best way to skin a cat

The bidding:

Opening lead — two of diamonds.
On many hands, declarer cannot overcome a bad lie of the adverse cards and so can only hope that they will be divided favorably. But there are also times when he can succeed despite an unlucky distribution, and these are the times that test his mettle.

Consider this deal where West leads a diamond against four spades, declarer winning East's king with the ace. South sees four potential losers — three clubs and a heart — and immediately starts

looking for a way to eliminate one of them.

One possibility, after drawing trump, is to lead a low heart from dummy toward his queen. If East has the king and takes it, South will eventually get rid of a club loser on the ace; if East does not take his king, he loses it.

Another possibility is to attack clubs by leading a low one toward dummy's queen. If the queen loses to East's king or ace, South will still have the J-9 left and can later lead a club from dummy toward his hand and perhaps score a club trick.

As the cards lie, neither of these approaches succeeds against best defense, and South would go down one. However, declarer can assure the contract if he plays correctly. After drawing trump, he cashes the Q-9 of diamonds, discarding a heart from dummy, and then plays the ace and another heart.

This leaves South firmly in the driver's seat. The defender who wins the second heart with the king will have to yield a ruff-and-discard or else lead a club, establishing a club trick for declarer.

The suggested method of play totally eliminates the luck factor that appears to exist when dummy first comes down.

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, March 1, the 60th day of 2022. There are 305 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 1, 1974, seven people, including former Nixon White House aides H.R. Haldeman and John D. Ehrlichman, former Attorney General John Mitchell and former assistant Attorney General Robert Mardian, were indicted on charges of conspiring to obstruct justice in connection with the Watergate break-in. (These four defendants were convicted in January 1975, although Mardian's conviction was later reversed.)

On this date:

In 1815, Napoleon, having escaped exile in Elba, arrived in Cannes, France, and headed for Paris to begin his "Hundred Days" rule.

In 1867, Nebraska became the 37th state as President Andrew Johnson signed a proclamation.

In 1893, inventor Nikola Tesla first publicly demonstrated radio during a meeting of the National Electric Light Association in St. Louis by transmitting electromagnetic energy without wires.

In 1932, Charles A. Lindbergh Jr., the 20-month-old son of Charles and Anne Lindbergh, was kidnapped from the family home near Hopewell,

New Jersey. (Remains identified as those of the child were found the following May.)

In 1945, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, back from the Yalta Conference, proclaimed the meeting a success as he addressed a joint session of Congress.

In 1954, four Puerto Rican nationalists opened fire from the spectators' gallery of the U.S. House of Representatives, wounding five members of Congress.

In 1966, the Soviet space probe Venera 3 impacted the surface of Venus, becoming the first spacecraft to reach another planet; however, Venera was unable to transmit any data, its communications system having failed.

In 1971, a bomb went off inside a men's room at the U.S. Capitol; the radical group Weather Underground claimed responsibility for the pre-dawn blast.

In 2005, Dennis Rader, the churchgoing family man accused of leading a double life as the BTK serial killer, was charged in Wichita, Kansas, with 10 counts of first-degree murder. (Rader later pleaded guilty and received multiple life sentences.) A closely divided Supreme Court outlawed the death penalty for juvenile criminals.

In 2010, Jay Leno returned as host of NBC's "The Tonight Show."

In 2015, tens of thousands marched through Moscow in honor of

slain Russian opposition leader Boris Nemtsov, who had been shot to death on Feb. 27.

In 2020, state officials said New York City had its first confirmed case of the coronavirus, a woman in her late 30s who had contracted the virus while traveling in Washington state, announcing what was believed at the time to be the second U.S. death from the coronavirus, said the virus may have been circulating for weeks undetected in the Seattle area.

Ten years ago: Maryland Gov. Martin O'Malley signed a measure legalizing same-sex marriage in his state, effective January 2013. Online publisher and conservative blogger Andrew Breitbart died in Los Angeles at age 43.

Five years ago: Former Montana Rep. Ryan Zinke was sworn in as secretary of the Interior Department by Vice President Mike Pence, hours after being confirmed by the Senate.

One year ago: Vernon Jordan, who rose from humble beginnings in the segregated South to become a champion of civil rights before reinventing himself as a Washington insider, died at 85. Pennsylvania's Republican Party expressed its disapproval of U.S. Sen. Pat Toomey over his vote to convict Donald Trump during Trump's second impeachment trial, but stopped short of issuing a more serious censure. Twitter said it had begun labeling tweets that included misleading information about

COVID-19 vaccines, and that it would use a "strike system" to remove accounts that repeatedly violate its rules. An American father and son wanted by Japan for helping former Nissan Chairman Carlos Ghosn escape from the country in a box while facing financial misconduct charges were handed over to Japanese custody. (Michael Taylor would be sentenced to two years in prison; his son Peter was sentenced to one year and eight months.)

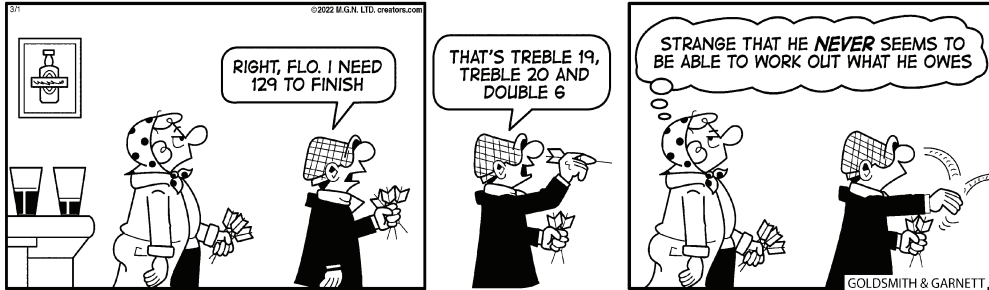

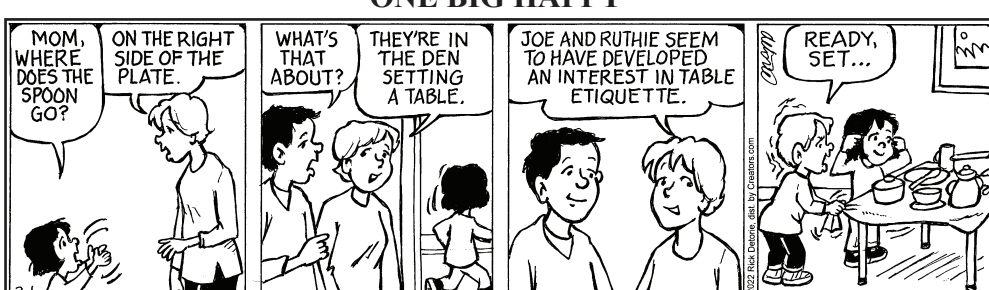

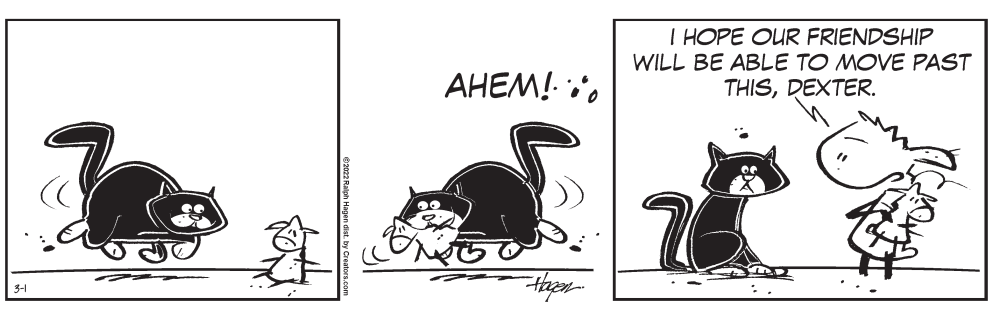
