Fire at Bent Tree

13 families displaced as Building 2 burns down

Building 2 at Big Spring's Bent Tree Apartments burned completely Saturday afternoon, displacing 13 families. No life-threatening injuries were reported.

A fire at Big Spring's Bent Tree Apartments Saturday afternoon has left 13 families without homes as it destroyed Building No. 2 of the 1 Courtney Place complex.

According to reports, the Big Spring Fire Department responded to the blaze

at about 4 p.m. Saturday, March 12, and were joined by a ladder/aerial truck from the Midland Fire Department. The firefighters surrounded the involved building, flanking it on the east and west and providing a ladder truck on the south, while Midland's truck occupied the north side of the building.

According to Big Spring Fire Chief Craig Ferguson, three people were taken to the hospital as a result of the fire, but no life-threatening injuries or fatalities were reported.

Ferguson said firefighters had the blaze under control by 6:30 p.m., but monitored the scene overnight to guard against potential re-ignitions.

Those displaced by the fire were sheltered at First Baptist Church, locate only a few blocks from the Bent Tree Apartments. The church was also utilized as a location for separated family members to locate one another, and volunteers provided food and water at the scene. Later in the day, Howard College's Coliseum joined in helping with these responsibilities.

In addition to Big Spring and Midland Fire Departments and First Baptist Church, the Howard County Volunteer Fire Department, Big Spring Police Department, Howard County Sheriff's Office, Oncor, Atmos, the Salvation Army, Howard County Emergency Services Chaplains' Corps, Howard College, the American Red Cross, and City of Big Spring departments including the Water Department, Parks Department, Streets Department and the city's Administrative staff contributed to fighting the fire and/or dealing with the aftermath.

The T&P/Birdwell Hotel

The T&P/Birdwell Hotel was a two-story wooden structure that was located on the south side of the tracks facing north between present-day Main and Runnels Streets. The hotel was built to receive train passengers directly off the train. If arriving on horseback or buggy, the guest had to enter through the back gate.

The hotel was the first building that train passengers saw when they deboarded in Big Spring(s).

Elin Summerall was one of the lucky ones in *Seagrass Pier-Hope Beach #3* (F COB C) by Colleen Coble. Not only did she get a heart transplant, but the donor was a perfect fit. A miraculously perfect fit. But when Elin begins having violent flashbacks, and vivid dreams of being strangled, she realizes that she has been the recipient of more than just a new heart, Elin is remembering her donor's murder. Her strange affliction has attracted some unwanted attention: from the press, from the authorities, and from the killer himself. Now, living alone with her young daughter and aging mother, Elin is being stalked by a man she's only met in her nightmares. The police are dubious of her story, but one off-duty FBI agent agrees to help her: Agent Marc Everton. Now, in a remote cottage on Hope Island, Elin and Marc must probe the secrets buried in her borrowed heart. And there's no time to waste. One man is desperate to silence her before she remem-

bers too much.

Left with little back in Missouri, Kevin Hunt takes his younger siblings on a journey to Wyoming when he receives news that he's inheriting part of a ranch in *Braced for Love-Brothers in Arms #1* (F CON M) by Mary Connealy. The catch is that the ranch is also being given to a half-brother he never knew existed. Turns out, Kevin's supposedly dead father led a secret and scandalous life. But danger seems to track Kevin along the way, and he wonders if his half-brother, Wyatt, is behind the attacks. Finally arriving at the ranch, everyone is at each other's throats and the only one willing to stand in between is Winona Hawkins, a nearby schoolmarm. Despite being a long-time friend to Wyatt, Winona can't help but be drawn to the earnest, kind Kevin and that puts her in the crosshairs of somebody's dangerous plot. Will they all be able to put aside their differences long enough to keep anyone from getting truly hurt?

Eight years ago, after the Philistines surrendered the stolen Ark of the Covenant back to the Israelites, Eliora and her brother left their Philistine

It was built around 1884, and John Birdwell became the first proprietor of the hotel. He and his family lived there from 1884 thru 1901. John was also the town sheriff, and it wasn't uncommon to have a group of men gathered at a table drinking coffee and talking about town business with the usual gossip mixed in.

The bottom floor of the hotel had a large dining room on the east end. Rooms were located on the second floor and reached by a straight staircase located in the center of the hotel. The back of the hotel had several small buildings that housed the kitchen, a laundry area, the 'servants' quarters, two chicken coops and a coal building.

The Birdwells were a generous and giving family. They were always helping those in need, and were very well respected in the community.

The two-story building was a gathering place for travelers, strangers, and Big Spring(s) friends. Weddings were often performed there, and each Christmas, the hotel was decorated for the festivities. A train car of holly and Christmas greenery would arrive as the ladies decorated, sometimes using sprinkles of flour for the illusion of snow.

Mrs. L.S. McDowell arrived in Big Spring and said, "We stepped off the train into the Birdwell Hotel and all night long I thought it rained but, in the morning, we found it was only the wind whispering softly among the leaves of the cottonwood trees that surrounded and hovered over the hotel."

During Big Spring's 1902 flood, the hotel had over four feet of water inside. Little boats were used to ferry people around.

Many people made a stop at the hotel eating house and paid 50 cents for a hot

meal.

Mrs. Birdwell and her daughters hated the steam engines because of the smoke they emitted. Lillian Birdwell said, "Smoke fell over the town. It was pollution before anyone even heard of pollution."

The horns were loud as the train engineer announced their arrival. It was rarely quiet at the Birdwell Hotel. The sounds of the railroad were always heard around the clock.

John's wife, Annabelle Birdwell, was born in Tennessee to a wealthy family. She never learned to cook or do household chores. This dry desolate area became a new existence for her when she first arrived in Big Spring(s) as a young bride. So, John always kept plenty of extra "help" for the hotel cleaning, washing, and cooking.

Being the successful entrepreneur that he was, John also had The Ranch Saloon, located behind the hotel and in front of the Fisher Mercantile on Main. Annabelle Birdwell decided that raising children so close to the tracks and saloons was not safe. John had a home built for them on the south hill, later known as 909 Goliad Street.

John Birdwell made a decision to take care of the ranch and turn over the proprietorship of the hotel to Mr. and Mrs. Millhollan. Within a year, the old hotel burned to the ground and a new T&P Depot was built in its place.

Big Spring Steers Track Team wins Big Spring Invitational

The Big Spring Steers remained perfect this track season. Coach Brandon Clemmons' squad made it three-for-three by winning the Big Spring Invitational Thursday afternoon at Blankenship Field.

The Steers fought off a challenge from Abilene Cooper, outdistancing the Cougars 125-106. Big Spring got off to a good start scoring 32 field

events points to lead Cooper 32-27. Senior Braxton Pearson did his part with his second place in the discus and third place in the shot put. It wasn't what the 5-11, 235-pounder envisioned but he got points. He's chasing a bigger trophy. Pearson finished fourth at state last year in the discus. He's chasing another return trip to state while putting his name in the Big Spring record books with another Pearson - Tim, his father who ran on the school record 400 meter relay team back in the 80's "He got the speed and I got the brawn" laughed Braxton. Tim went on to run track at Wayland Baptist.

"I see my dad up there on the record board and I want to be up there with him," Braxton. Last year Braxton threw 160 feet.. He's only nine feet behind school record holder Pete Buske who set the mark back in he 80s. Tim Pearson and Pete Buske were teammates. "Dad said he (Buske) was big dude," said Braxton

Pearson transferred to Big Spring last year from Midland High. He was successful at MHS, but he blossomed last year at Big Spring, improving 20 feet in a matter of weeks. "It was a meet in Abilene and I hit 140. I knew I could only get better after that. At the area meet

there was this guy from Borger and I didn't want to lose to him. I threw 160. It shocked me. I had all my adrenaline flowing, everything just came together."

The Steers started their surge to victory at the start of the running events. Roman Perez and Isaac Gonzalez and Kevin Quezada went 1-2-5 in the 3200 meters. That was followed by a third place in the 400 relay and Adrian Solis winning a very competitive 800. The top three finishers run under 1:59 with Solis nipping Midland Classical's Reagan Laya. Solis' winning time of 1:57.23 ranks as one of the tops in the state.

Perez and Gonzales helped put the competition away by going 1-3 in the 1600 meters.

As for Pearson he's ready to move on. He talked about the state experience. "I wasn't nervous It was a great experience, plus we got to go eat at all these neat places, I was just all excited just to be there. I want to go back there," said the Region I-4A champion.

Big Spring got valuable jumping event points from Quetavian Lewis, second in the long jump and Isiah Holloway who won the triple jump.

Abilene Wylie totally dominated the girls competition. The Lady Bulldogs scored 91 points in the field events alone. They finished with 234 points, followed by the Lady Steers with 142 points.

The Lady Steers scored big in the relays, winning the 1600 meter relay, and placing second in the 400 and 800 relays. Freshman Naomi Wines had a great day

, jumping a personal best 16-8 in the long jump and 5-4 in the high jump, also a personal best. Wines got nipped at the tape in the 200 by teammate Kyla Mathews.

Jha'Niah Johnson, who's going to the state powerlifting meet this week, scored eight points for the Lady Steers with her second place finish in the discus.

Big Spring's next meet will be March 25-25 at the San Angelo Relays.

COAHOMA - Coach Alexander Orosco got what he wanted out of his Coahoma Bulldogettes this past weekend when they hosted a tournament here. The tournament fielded 14 teams and was played in Coahoma and Forsan. The Bulldogettes didn't lose a game, the only blemish on their record was a 1-1 tie with Lamesa in the last game Saturday night. In the process they defeated Ballinger, Borden County and Colorado City along the way.

Saturday afternoon's 9-1 win over I-20 rival was very impressive. Coahoma is now 6-4 in the season and currently ranked No. 18 in Class 2A made it to the regional finals last year, losing to eventual state champion Stamford. The tie with Lamesa was equally as impressive being the Lady Tors went far in the Class 3A playoffs last season.

"We got what we wanted," said Orosco, whose team is ranked No. 14

Wells allowed six hits while striking out 10 and not issuing a walk. Her counterpart only allowed four hits en route to striking out six and walking three.

Trailing 1-0 in the fourth, Lamesa had a chance to take command of the game. Amaya Vasquez led off the inning with a double and tied the game on a RBI single by Zoey Sifuentes.

The Lady Tors then loaded the bases with no outs thanks to two more hits. Wells calmly got out of the inning by striking out the next three batters.

Coahoma took a 1-0 lead in the third inning when catcher Karleigh Burt doubled, She scored on a base hit to right field by Wells. Wells had two of Coahoma's four hits.

It was Wells' bat that busted open the Colorado City game in the third inning. Clinging to a 1-0 lead with one out; Coahoma leadoff hitter Madison Rodgers worked Colorado City starter Kaci Rivera for a nine pitch walk. Next batter Christian Everett worked Rivera for a seven pitch walk. Burt the next batter bunted moving the runners to second and third, bringing up Wells. Wells promptly blasted her sixth homer of the year, a moon shot over the left field fence that must have travelled 275 feet. Coahoma had the game in hand at 4-1.

Meanwhile Coahoma pitcher Makayla Calvio pitched a masterful

game, limiting the Lady Wolves to two hits, striking out seven and walking four along the way.

Everett, who scored two runs herself, had a two-run scoring base hit in the fourth inning.

Today in History

Today is Monday, March 14, the 73rd day of 2022. There are 292 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 14, 1794, Eli Whitney received a patent for his cotton gin, an invention that revolutionized America's cotton industry.

On this date:

In 1879, physicist Albert Einstein was born in Ulm, Germany.

In 1939, the republic of Czechoslovakia was dissolved, opening the way for Nazi occupation of Czech areas and the separation of Slovakia.

In 1951, during the Korean War, United Nations forces recaptured Seoul.

In 1962, Democrat Edward M. Kennedy officially launched in Boston his successful candidacy for the U.S. Senate seat from Massachusetts once held by his brother, President John F. Kennedy. (Edward Kennedy served in the Senate for nearly 47 years.)

In 1964, a jury in Dallas found Jack Ruby guilty of murdering Lee Harvey Oswald, the accused assassin of President John F. Kennedy, and sentenced him to death. (Both the conviction and death sentence were overturned, but Ruby died before he could be retried.)

In 1967, the body of President John F. Kennedy was moved from a temporary grave to a permanent memorial site at Arlington National

Cemetery in Virginia.

In 1980, a LOT (laht) Polish Airlines jet crashed while attempting to land in Warsaw, killing all 87 people aboard, including 22 members of a U.S. amateur boxing team.

In 1990, the Soviet Congress of People's Deputies held a secret ballot that elected Mikhail S. Gorbachev to a new, powerful presidency.

In 1995, American astronaut Norman Thagard became the first American to enter space aboard a Russian rocket as he and two cosmonauts blasted off aboard a Soyuz spacecraft, headed for the Mir space station.

In 2011, Neil Diamond, Alice Cooper, Tom Waits, Darlene Love, Dr. John and Leon Russell were inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

In 2015, Robert Durst, a wealthy eccentric linked to two killings and his wife's disappearance, was arrested by the FBI in New Orleans on a murder warrant a day before HBO aired the final episode of a serial documentary about his life. (Durst would be convicted in the shooting death of his friend, Susan Berman; he died in January 2022 while serving a life sentence in California.)

In 2018, Stephen Hawking, the best-known theoretical physicist of his time, died at his home in Cambridge, England, at the age of 76; he had stunned doctors by living with the normally fatal illness ALS for more than 50 years.

Ten years ago: President

Barack Obama and his wife, Michelle, hosted a White House state dinner for British Prime Minister David Cameron and his wife, Samantha. Earlier, the two leaders announced that NATO forces would hand over the lead combat role in Afghanistan to Afghan forces in 2013 as the U.S. and its allies aimed to get out by the end of 2014.

Five years ago: A blustery late-season storm plastered the Northeast with sleet and snow, paralyzing much of the Washington-to-Boston corridor but falling well short of predicted snow totals in New York, Boston and Philadelphia. Declaring "enough is enough," Gen. Robert Neller, the Marine Corps commandant, told senators that he intended to fix the problem that led to current and former Corps members sharing nude photos of female Marines online and making lewd or threatening comments about them. Mitch Seavey won his third Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race, becoming the fastest and oldest champion at age 57.

One year ago: U.S. authorities arrested and charged two men with assaulting U.S. Capitol Police officer Brian Sicknick with bear spray during the Jan. 6 riot. (Sicknick collapsed and died at a hospital the next day; a medical examiner determined that he suffered a stroke and died from natural causes.) Myanmar's ruling junta declared martial law in parts of the country's largest city as security forces killed dozens of protesters in an increasingly lethal crackdown on resistance to the previous month's military coup. Female performers including Beyoncé and Taylor Swift swept the top honors at the Grammy Awards; Beyoncé's

28th win made her the most decorated woman in Grammy history. Record-setting New Orleans Saints quarterback Drew Brees announced his retirement after 20 NFL seasons.

Board No. 54 of the 1959 Italy-U.S. match was the most amazing deal of the tournament. The contract at both tables was three notrump, and the opening lead was also the same. With best defense, it seemed that the contract would go down one. However, the Italian declarer finished down six, while the U.S. declarer wound up with two overtricks!

These strange doings require some explanation. When Giorgio Belladonna became declarer for Italy after the auction shown, he won the heart lead with the king and played the A-Q of clubs, which held. He then led another club, taken by Ivar Stakgold (East) with the king. When Stakgold next returned the five of hearts, Belladonna played a diamond! Leonard Harmon (West) naturally assumed East had the only missing heart, so he allowed dummy to win with the queen. At this point, North asked Belladonna whether he had any hearts. Belladonna said yes, and the director was called. He ruled, in accordance with the Laws, that South must substitute the heart six for the diamond three. Harmon was allowed to change his play — as stipulated by the Laws — from the heart nine to the heart ace. But dummy's queen play could not be changed, since it was a legal play. So Harmon cashed five heart tricks, and Belladonna eventually finished down six.

At the other table, Harry Fishbein was South for the U.S. He won the heart lead with the king and also played the A-Q-J of clubs. East took the king and could have defeated the contract by returning a spade, but he led a heart instead. West won with the ace and returned a heart, and Fishbein had nine tricks. Both defenders then kept their spades as the clubs were run, so Fishbein won the last two tricks with the 7-5 of diamonds!
