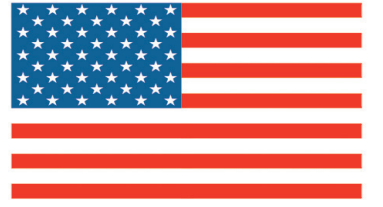

St. Patrick's Day, March 17, is the feast day of St. Patrick, patron saint of Ireland, and is recognized as the date of his death.

Patrick – known as “Patricius” in Latin, Pádraig in Irish or Padrig in Welsh – was born in the late fourth or early fifth century in Great Britain or possibly in Scotland. He is credited with leading the conversion of the pagan polytheistic Irish Celts to Roman Catholicism.

When Patrick was about 16 years old, he was kidnapped by Irish pirates from his home in Britain and taken to Ireland, where he worked as a field slave tending to flocks of animals. After six years as a slave, he escaped and returned to Britain.

Later in life, he became a priest, and returned to northern and western Ireland. Legends attribute such feats to Patrick as banishing all snakes from Ireland, chasing them into the sea after they attacked him during a 40-day fast.

Another story recounts that once he thrust his ash walking stick into the ground as he began evangelizing. His audience took so long to be convinced by his message that the staff had taken root by the time he was reading to leave. The town is



known today as “Aspatria” meaning “ash of Patrick.”

Patrick is credited with using the three-leafed shamrock as a symbol illustrating the Holy Trinity. Icons of the saint often depict him with a cross in one hand and a sprig of shamrocks in the other.

Patrick died around AD 461, and is said to be buried at Down Cathedral in Downpatrick, County Down, Ireland.

He was never officially canonized by the Catholic Church because he lived before the Church's rules regarding canonization and sainthood were fully developed. However, he is recognized and venerated as

a saint in the Catholic Church and in the Eastern Orthodox Church, as well as by the Anglican Communion and the Lutheran Churches.

March 17 is recognized as St. Patrick's Day in many places around the world, including both the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland, as well as the United Kingdom, Canada, the United States, Brazil, Argentina, Australia, and New Zealand, as well as many others. St. Patrick's Day is celebrated in more

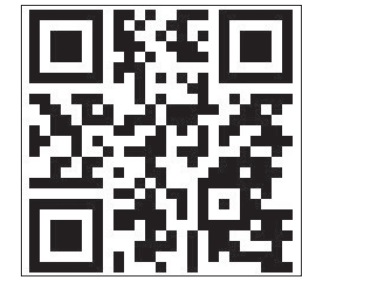
**Keep Big Spring Beautiful** started off the season of **Toasty Tuesday Trash-Offs** on March 15.

countries than any other national festival.

Celebrations of St. Patrick's Day often include public parades and festivals, traditional Irish music, and wearing of green clothes or shamrocks. St. Patrick's Day parades actually began in North American in the 1700s, spreading to Ireland in the 20th Century.

Christians may attend church services on St. Patrick's Day, and Lent restrictions on eating, or on drinking alcohol, may be lifted for the day. Indeed, drinking alcohol – especially Irish whiskey, beer or cider – has become a traditional part of the day's

festivities.

A traditional ceremony associated with the day involves the Irish Taoiseach (Prime Minister) presenting a Waterford crystal bowl filled with shamrocks to the President of the United States. The tradition began in 1952 when the Irish ambassador to the U.S. sent a bowl of shamrocks to President Harry S. Truman. It later became an annual tradition.

Green clothing, often adorned with shamrocks, is traditional St. Patrick's Day wear. The tradition originates with the traditional ancestor of the Gaelic people, Goidel the Green. According to legend, Goidel was bitten by a venomous snake, but saved by Moses, who placed his staff on the snakebite, curing the poison but leaving a green mark.

Ireland's nickname is the "Emerald Isle" due to

the Goidel legend and the country's subsequent green flag with a golden harp emblazoned on it. Although the country's flag has since changed to an orange, white and green tricolor, the harp remains famous as the insignia of the Guinness Brewing Company.

In the United States, traditions have arisen such as pinching those who don't wear green on St. Patrick's Day.

Seattle, as well as other cities, paint the traffic stripe along parade routes green. The Chicago River has traditionally been dyed green each St. Patrick's Day, as well as other rivers and fountains around the country, including the north White House fountain in Washington D.C.

Take a few days off and come back and be ready to play on Tuesday."

Rivera was solid on the mound, going the distance, allowing three hits while striking out nine and walking three. Big Spring ace Brinley Watkins lasted four innings, allowing three earned runs on six hits, striking out three and walking four. She left with her team trailing 4-0. She was relieved by Kaitlyn Whitehead.

Rivera pitched her way out of a couple of tough situations in the third and fourth innings. Both times she finished the job, leaving Colorado City with four runners left on base in those two innings.

Colorado City scored its first run in the second inning. Avery English's fielder's choice scored a run. In the third they padded the lead thanks primarily to a two-run scoring double by Jazmine Hernandez. Rivera led 4-0.

Rivera then capped off the Colorado City win in the sixth by line driving a two run homer, against the wind, over the left field fence.

Marr credited Rivera's pitching with being the difference in the contest. "She was locating a lot better. In fact this is one of the best games she's pitched all year. The defense made some good plays today. I'm never gonna get upset at them for charging in on a ball.. As long as they're hustling, they're all right."

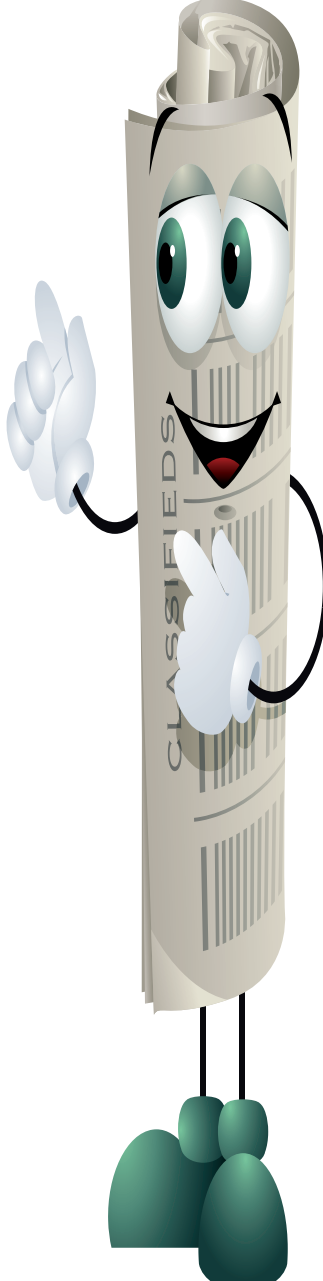

Without an explanation, the bidding by North on this deal suggests that he may have taken leave of his senses, but nobody would criticize the final contract, which is lay-down. It just goes to show that crazy-looking bids can be very successful, even though they don't mean what they seem to say.

A number of years ago, some genius (according to the Official Encyclopedia of Bridge, it was Dorothy Hayden Truscott) came up with the idea that a jump-shift

response one level higher than necessary indicates a void or a singleton in the suit bid, adequate support for partner's last-bid suit and sufficient values for at least a game, with a potential for slam opposite a fitting hand. That accounts for North's three-spade bid, commonly called a "splinter bid."

Certainly the North hand is ideally suited for such a convention. The moment partner opens one heart, North should start thinking in terms of a slam. From North's viewpoint, the key to the slam is South's holding in spades and clubs. South could have spade strength and three club losers, or, ideally, club strength and three spade losers.

The three-spade bid thus encourages South, who has no wasted values in spades, to cooperate by cuebidding the ace of clubs.

North is delighted to hear this bid, leaving South's trump holding the only question remaining to be resolved. Accordingly, North next invokes the "grand slam force" convention by leaping to five no trump. This commands South to bid seven hearts if he holds two of the top three trump honors.

So South dutifully bids the grand slam, with full confidence that North has not gone completely berserk.

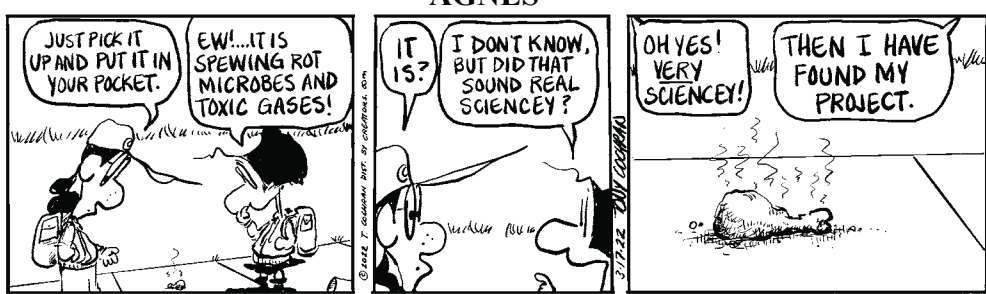
