#### Colorado City man dead following **Upton County wreck Special to the Herald**

A Colorado City man is dead after a two-vehicle wreck near Rankin Monday morning, according to a statement released Wednesday by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

According to the release, Eliseo Campos Galindo, 38, of Crane was driving his 2019 Mack truck with trailer north on State Highway 349 and came to a complete stop to turn west onto a lease road. Ray Dean Vanderslice, 60, of Colorado City was driving his 2017 Ford Super Duty truck behind Galindo on SH 349. When Galindo stopped his rig. Vanderslice struck the back of the truck's trailer.

Vanderslice was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Upton County Justice of the Peace Stephanie Brown. Galindo was taken to Rankin County Hospital, where he is in stable condition.

According to the report, weather at the time of the accident was clear, and road conditions were dry. The accident was investigated by Texas Highway Patrol Trooper Isha Yasin of Midland.

## 7 hurt in Arkansas tornado; storms cause damage in Texas, Missouri **By KEN MILLER and JILL BLEED**

Severe storms that included at least two tornadoes injured several people, damaged homes and businesses and downed power lines in Arkansas, Missouri and Texas overnight as twisters and hurricane-force winds were forecast in much of the Deep South on Wednesday.

No deaths were reported from the storms late Tuesday and early Wednesday, officials said.

A tornado that struck Springdale and the adjoining town of Johnson, about 145 miles (235 kilometers) northwest of Little Rock, about 4 a.m. injured seven people, two critically, said Washington County, Arkansas, Emergency Management Director John Luther. He had no additional information about them.

The National Weather Service said that tornado would be rated "at least EF-2," which would mean wind speeds reached 111-135 mph (178-217 kph).

"Search and rescue teams have been deployed, as there are significant damages and injuries," Arkansas Gov. Asa Hutchinson said.

In northwest Missouri, an EF-1 tornado with wind speeds around 90 mph (145 kph) struck St. Joseph on Tuesday night, according the weather service. That tornado damaged two homes, but no injuries were reported there.

Another EF-1 tornado with wind speeds around 100 mph (160 kph) touched down briefly before

dawn Wednesday in a rural subdivision 25 miles (40 kilometers) east of Dallas, damaging two roofs, the weather service reported.

The storms come a week after a tornado in a New Orleans-area neighborhood carved a path of destruction during the overnight hours and killed a man.

Damage was extensive in Springdale, including to an elementary school gymnasium and a warehouse, KFSM-TV reported. The Springdale School District, which is the largest in Arkansas, canceled all classes Wednesday.

"We have some commercial buildings and residences and everything in between ... with severe storm damage," Luther said.

About 80,000 power outages were reported in Texas and Louisiana, about 56,000 in Louisiana, where storms have passed.

Tornado warnings were in effect Wednesday afternoon in southeastern Arkansas, western Mississippi, northeastern Louisiana and a tornado watch remained in effect in parts of eastern Arkansas.

A tornado watch was issued for most of Arkansas, northern Louisiana, southern Missouri, southeastern Oklahoma, and northeast Texas through early Wednesday afternoon.

Strong winds in Louisiana overturned semitrailers, peeled the roof off a mobile home, sent a tree crashing into a home and knocked down power lines, according to weather service forecasters,

who didn't immediately confirm any tornadoes in the state.

Nearly 90,000 homes and businesses were without power from Texas to Mississippi, where downed trees blocked a street in the capital city of Jackson.

The Storm Prediction Center in Norman, Oklahoma, said all of Mississippi and parts of Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana and Tennessee were at the greatest risk for severe weather Wednesday. More than 8 million people live in that area, which includes the cities of Memphis, Tennessee; Baton Rouge, Louisiana; Jackson, Mississippi; and Montgomery, Alabama.

Schools in Memphis and dozens in Mississippi closed early or conducted classes online as a precaution against having children in crowded buildings or on buses.

"Today's weather may not impact some folks while others may experience one of the worst days of their life," Stephen McCraney, executive director of the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency, said in a briefing.

Officials in various Mississippi counties were opening safe locations for people worried about staying in their home during the storm. In Louisiana, officials with the Federal Emergency Management Agency advised people living in temporary housing such as trailers after Hurricane Ida to be on the alert and know where to go in case they need to evacuate.

## Judge OKs \$83M for property loss in Florida condo collapse

People who owned units in a Florida oceanfront condominium building that collapsed last year will divide \$83 million for property losses, with the compensation for families over the 98 deaths still to be determined, a judge ruled Wednesday.

The money for owners of the 136-unit Champlain Towers South building will come from sale of the now-vacant beachfront land as well as insurance policies, officials said. Unless they opt out, the owners who take the deal will relinquish their rights to sue individually but also could avoid an assessment because of the loss.

"It gives them certainty. These people need certainty and they need to carry on," Miami-Dade Circuit Judge Michael Hanzman said before approving the deal at a hearing. "Maybe it's not 100% of value, but it's pretty close. I think it's an outstanding result."

Champlain Towers South, a 12-story condo in Surfside, Florida collapsed without warning early on June 24. The settlement is part of a lawsuit arguing work on an adjacent luxury condo building, known as Eighty Seven Park, damaged and destabilized an aging building already in dire need of major structural repair. The defendants associated with Eighty Seven Park deny any negligence or wrongdoing.

The cause of the collapse remains unknown, although the building was in the midst of a 40-year inspection and engineers had pointed out some serious structural flaws previously. The National Institute of Standards and Technology is the main investigative agency in a probe that could take many months.

Under the agreement Wednesday, each unit owner will be paid a share based on their ownership portion of a condominium unit and for personal items that were lost. It does not does not include money for wrongful death claims arising from the 98 fatalities, which will be settled later after input from courtappointed experts.

"We have 98 people who lost their lives and we need to keep this case in perspective," Hanzman said.

Some family members of those died questioned why the property owners get the first chunk of guaranteed money.

"Loss of life is extremely more valuable than losing property," said Martin Langesfeld, whose sister and brother-in-law were killed. "We believe it is completely unfair."

Yet Alfredo Lopez, who survived the collapse with his family, said the settlement does not begin to compensate owners for the

true value of their former units.

"We are surviving victims. We will be getting a fraction of what our homes were worth," Lopez said.

The Surfside site where the building once stood will be put up for auction in the coming weeks, attorneys said. One offer for about \$120 million has been on the table for months, but there may be others as the auction approaches.

Hanzman said the deal approved Wednesday is contingent on the land sale going through. It is possible the sale could be for a higher amount.

The city of Surfside, meanwhile, is creating committees led by Champlain Towers South families to organize an anniversary event this June and to consider how to construct a permanent memorial to the victims who died.

CDC drops COVID-19 health warning for cruise ship travelers according to figures from Johns Hopkins Cruise-ship operators have complained By DAVID KOENIG

Federal health officials are dropping the warning they have attached to cruising since the beginning of the pandemic, leaving it up to vacationers to decide whether they feel safe getting on a ship.

Cruise-ship operators welcomed Wednesday's announcement, which came as many people thought about summer vacation plans.

An industry trade group said the move by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention validated measures that ship owners have taken, including requiring crew members and most passengers to be vac-

cinated against the virus.

The CDC removed the COVID-19 "cruise ship travel health notice" that was first imposed in March 2020, after virus outbreaks on several ships around the world.


However, the agency expressed reservations about cruising.

"While cruising will always pose some risk of COVID-19 transmission, travelers will make their own risk assessment when choosing to travel on a cruise ship, much like they do in all other travel settings," CDC spokesman Dave Daigle said in an email.

Daigle said the CDC's decision was based on "the current state of the pandemic and decreases in COVID-19 cases onboard cruise ships over the past several weeks."

COVID-19 cases in the United States have been falling since mid-January, although the decline has slowed in recent weeks, and the current seven-day rolling average for daily new cases in the U.S. is roughly unchanged from two weeks ago,

University. States have rolled back mask since the start of the pandemic that their



mandates, putting pressure on federal officials to ease virus-related restrictions.

Outbreaks continue to be reported on cruise ships, which conduct random testing before the end of voyages.

On Sunday, a Princess Cruises ship returning from the Panama Canal had "mul-

tiple" passengers who had tested positive for the virus. Princess Cruises said all the affected passengers showed mild symptoms or none at all, and that all crew members and passengers had been vaccinated. About a dozen passengers tested positive before the same boat docked in San Francisco in January.

Operators are required to tell the CDC about virus cases on board ships. The agency has a colored-coded system to classify ships based on the percentage of passengers who test positive. The CDC said that system remains in place.

The Cruise Lines International Association said in a statement that the CDC's decision to remove its health warning "recognizes the effective public health measures in place on cruise ships and begins to level the playing field between cruise and similarly situated venues on land."

Great job by former Howard College basketball coach Mark Adams on getting the Texas Tech Red Raiders to the "Sweet Sixteen" of the NCAA tournament.

Adams, a Brownfield native, took over the coaching duties at Tech when Chris Beard bolted to Texas last year. Adams is known for his defensive coaching prowess and it showed at Tech. The Red Raiders defended well all year. It took a very good Duke team to beat them 78-73.

Adams won 223 games as head coach at Howard from 2004-2013. His 2010 Howard team won the national championship behind the play of Jae Crowder. Crowder is still one of the best all around players in the NBA. His Phoenix Suns may be the best team in the NBA Western Conference.

As the old saying goes, "The apple doesn't fall far from the tree." Adams' son Luke is the head basketball coach at New Mexico Junior College. ## **Baylor starters Brown, Akinjo entering** names into NBA draft

WACO, Texas (AP) — Baylor standout freshman Kendall Brown and point guard James Akinjo both announced Wednesday they are entering their names into the NBA draft.

The players revealed their decisions individually on their social media accounts.

Akinjo still had another season of eligibility at Baylor, where he transferred last year after leading Arizona in scoring in his only season with the Wildcats. He began his college career at Georgetown.

Brown, a five-star recruit whose dad is a former Harlem Globetrotters player, averaged 9.7 points and 4.9 rebounds a game while starting all 34 games for the Bears.

"I feel so fortunate for all that I've experienced this season at Baylor University! We accomplished so much as a team and grew together," Brown said in part in a statement posted on his Twitter account.

Akinjo ranked ninth in the Big 12 averaging 13.5 points a game, and led the conference with 5.8 assists per game.

In an Instagram post, Akinjo said he had decided to pursue his dream and enter the NBA draft after talking it over with his family. He said he planned to hire an agent.

"Thank you to the Baylor coaching staff for welcoming me into the program, to my teammates for helping me get better every day," part of Akinjo's post read.

Brown and Akinjo became starters after joining a Baylor team that was coming off a national championship last season.

The Bears were the No. 1 seed in the East Region this season, and lost in overtime in the second round of the NCAA Tournament to Final Four team North Carolina. Baylor overcame a 25-point deficit in the second half, and tied the game on Akinjo's second three-point play in the final 1:48 of regulation.



Today is Thursday, March 31, the 90th day of 2022. There are 275 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 31, 1991, the Warsaw Pact military alliance came to an end.

On this date:

In 1492, King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella of Spain issued an edict expelling Jews from Spanish soil, except those willing to convert to Christianity.

In 1814, Paris was occupied by a coalition of Russian, Prussian and Austrian forces; the surrender of the French dentally shot to death during the filming of a movie in Wilmington, North Carolina, when he was hit by a bullet fragment that had become lodged inside a prop gun.

In 1995, baseball players agreed to end their 232-day strike after a judge granted a preliminary injunction against club owners.

In 2004, four American civilian contractors were killed in Fallujah, Iraq; frenzied crowds dragged the burned, mutilated bodies and strung two of them from a bridge.

In 2005, Terri Schiavo (SHY'-voh), 41, died at a hospice in Pinellas Park, Florida, 13 days after her feeding tube was removed in a wrenching right-to-die court fight. Brandenburg Gate to the Great Wall of China went dark as part of Earth Hour, a global effort to highlight climate change. Brittney Griner was named The Associated Press' women's college basketball Player of the Year, the first Baylor player to win the award.

Five years ago: President Donald Trump signed a pair of executive orders focused on reducing the U.S. trade deficit; the first order gave the Commerce Department 90 days to assemble a report on the factors behind the trade deficit, while the second sought to increase collection of duties on imports.

One year ago: President Joe Biden outlined a huge \$2.3 trillion shooting rampage at a Southern California office building, leaving four people dead, including a 9-year-old boy whose mother was critically wounded. (The suspect, Aminadab Gaxiola Gonzalez, was found incompetent to stand trial because of injuries he suffered in a shootout with police.)

Accordingly, he played the ace of hearts at trick two, planning to continue with a heart. Undoubtedly, South would have made three notrump had he been playing against anyone else, but when he cashed the ace, Sylvia accidently dropped the king on it! After this, South found — to his great dismay — that there was now no way to make the contract, and Sylvia, in her own inimitable way, had triumphed again.

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
