For the second year in a row, youthful gourmet chefs from the Big Spring school district have met at Big Spring High School for a culinary competition organized by the district's food service provider, Aramark.

Contestants consisted of fourth and fifth graders, and seventh graders. Each kitchen magician whipped up their own

At the fifth-grade level, Violanda Mendoza's Strawberry Cheese Bites took first place, followed by a tie for second between Asher Werneburg's No-Bake Granola PB Cookies and Neviellah Hilario's Chia Seed Pudding.

Big Spring Junior High School's TMSCA Math/Science teams traveled to San Antonio this past weekend... and showed the state some of the best Howard County has to offer.

Competing against more than 2,000 4A students from across Texas, Big Spring's teams placed among the best in the state, including a first-place finish for the school's Science team.

"Our students are putting Big Spring back on the map as the place to be," said BSJHS TMSCA Coach Michael Steelman. "Students competed with 777 number sense, 758 calculator, 890 math, and 1,327 science participants. Several students earned several medals and trophies for their hard work all season long."

Lockout experience fuels Astros' Baker's unorthodox approach

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Houston Astros players trust that manager Dusty Baker's sometimes unorthodox approach to the lockout-shortened spring training has them better prepared for the rigors of the 2022 season.

"He's been through it a few times," pitcher Justin Verlander said. "That's wonderful insight, and maybe gives us a leg up because a lot of these other managers weren't around when Dusty was and went through these processes. And he was playing through them, so he knows what it takes to get ready. I think guys have a lot of faith in his opinion on this."

No manager has more experience dealing with labor stoppages than Baker. He's been around for all of them.

Baker played in 127 games for Atlanta in 1972 following a player strike. Players either went on strike or were locked out five more times during his playing career.

In 1990, Baker was San Francisco's hitting coach when a lockout delayed the start of the regular season by a week. He'd been elevated to manager by the time a players' strike ended the 1994 season prematurely, and was still at the helm when baseball returned in 1995.

"How many people have even been in this situation?" Baker said. "I've been in every situation of this type, but they've all been different. Even though I think I have really good experience, you don't know, man, until you get into it."

Baker applied lessons learned during those work stoppages to this year's condensed spring.

Notably, when some teams deployed potential opening day lineups in their first spring games, Baker held nearly all major league position players out of the Astros' first four Grapefruit League games.

While the Astros' core group of hitters exit camp healthy, it remains to be seen whether their bats are ready for the season. Only three regulars — Yuli Gurriel, Jose Altuve and Jeremy Pena — will head west from Florida with a batting average above .300. Most have fewer than 25 plate appearances.

"We always trust his experience," said third baseman Alex Bregman, who went 6 for 24 this spring.

Baker also slow-played his pitching staff.

Entering spring already on a throwing program as he worked his way back from Tommy John surgery in 2020, Verlander made four starts. The remaining four pitchers in Houston's rotation combined to make six starts.

"I think you have to have faith in Dusty on this one," Verlander said. "It's something that none of us have been through."

On Monday, in Houston's final spring training game, José Urquidy made only his second start on a main ballpark mound, tossing five shutout innings at the New York Mets.

Baker intends to continue his conservative approach when the Astros open the regular season on Thursday at the Los Angeles Angels.

"Early in the season I'm going to have to give guys a rest when I wouldn't normally give them a rest," Baker said. "They haven't played three or four games in a row or nine innings yet."

Baker now turns his attention to the first weeks of the regular season. He'll be looking for a better result than in that 1995 season, when his Giants finished in the NL West cellar.

He expects young fastball hitters and experienced pitchers with a feel for their off-speed pitches to start fast, taking advantage of pitchers who haven't locked in their breaking balls and hitters who need more plate appearances to time their swings. Baker also is concerned about the potential for early injuries, the likelihood of which could increase because of the shortened spring training.

"This is a very volatile situation that we're about to enter into because if you get hurt early in April, you'll never get into shape, or you'll be playing catch-up the whole time," Baker said.

Kraken deal blow to Stars' playoff push with 4-1 victory

SEATTLE (AP) — The final month of their first NHL season will see the Seattle Kraken get plenty of chances against teams fighting for positioning or playoff spots.

The Kraken are hoping to see more performances like what they got on Sunday night.

Jared McCann scored a short-handed goal in the first period, Ryan Donato converted on a breakaway early in the third period, and the Kraken beat the Dallas Stars 4-1.

Seattle denied the Stars a chance to leap into the top wild-card spot in the Western Conference.

"I've been impressed by the work ethic of our team, how together that we've been able to play with a lot of the changes and some of the individuals that have stepped forward and are proving themselves and doing good things night after night," Seattle coach Dave Hakstol said. "So we want to continue that. It's a busy month. We got a long month in front of us. But let's try to have some fun."

McCann's early goal was his 25th of the season and Donato added a beautiful finish five minutes into the third period to give the Kraken a cushion. It was Donato's 14th of the season, tying his career-high.

Yanni Gourde added a breakaway goal with 2:13 left and Karson Kuhlman scored an empty-netter in the final minute as Seattle snapped a two-game losing streak. Chris Driedger was terrific in net and nearly posted his first shutout of the season, finishing with 29 saves — including several sprawling stops early in the third period.

"I think were a more competent hockey team. Things have been going our way a little bit more lately," Driedger said. "We've been playing just better hockey and competing, no matter what the score is. I really liked our effort tonight."

John Klingberg scored with 5:35 remaining on a

shot through traffic to pull the Stars within 2-1. It was Klingberg's fifth goal of the season. Jake Oettinger had 25 saves while losing for the second time in his last five games as Dallas missed a chance to jump past Vegas and Nashville.

While Seattle is nowhere near the playoffs, the expansion squad will have an influence on how the playoff picture plays out over the final few weeks of the regular season. Seattle has nine games remaining against teams currently top three in their division or fighting for a wild-card spot.

Vegas picked up four crucial points by sweeping two games from the Kraken earlier this week. The Stars could not capitalize in the same way.

Dallas had won five straight on the road and was looking to sweep a four-game road trip after winning a pair in Anaheim and beating San Jose on Saturday night.

But the Stars looked like a team playing a challenging back-to-back and struggled to create good scoring chances against the fresher Kraken.

One killed in Texas as damaging storms tear across South

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — Violent storms killed one person in Texas on Tuesday as hail pelted communities and high winds knocked trees into power poles elsewhere in the South. Authorities issued a flurry of tornado warnings at the start of what could be two days of violent weather in the region.

In eastern Texas, W. M. Soloman, 71, died when storm winds toppled a tree onto Solomon's home in Whitehouse, about 100 miles (160 kilometers) southeast of Dallas, Whitehouse Mayor James Wansley said. Officials said at least four homes in the area had trees fall on them.

More than 50,000 homes and businesses were without power Tuesday afternoon from eastern Texas to South Carolina. No injuries were reported, but the National Weather Service issued a nonstop stream of tornado warnings for hours as the storm system tore across Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina.

In South Carolina, Allendale County Manager William Goodson said a tornado, captured in a video on social media, caused damage in his rural county, but exactly how much and whether there

were any injuries were unknown.

"I know we have buildings damaged and power lines down," Goodson said. "My deputies and emergency officials are out there assessing it."

The weather service said it was sending survey teams to examine potential tornado damage in Wetumpka, Alabama. Lightning struck a flea market in the north Alabama community of Lacey's Spring, causing a fire that gutted the building, news outlets reported, and rising water in Mobile Bay covered part of a ramp on Interstate 10.

Fallen trees and limbs closed a stretch of highway for several hours in Newton County, Mississippi. As the line of storms pushed into Georgia, a large tree fell and crashed through the roof of Marie Jordan's home in metro Atlanta, coming down in the living room, kitchen and garage.

"It just took everything," Jordan told WSB-TV. "For years and years, I have watched that tree."

Elsewhere in Texas, one person was injured when the storms swept through Johnson County, about 40 miles (65 kilometers) southwest of Dallas. Brittaney Deaton said she became trapped in an RV trailer behind her family's home after the trailer

flipped over. She said her stepfather got injured trying to free her.

"I was screaming on the phone. I couldn't get out. I was terrified," Deaton told KDFW-TV. "And I felt like I was just trapped, like it was going to roll with me in it. And I just thank God that I got out."

Her mother, Amber Zeleny, said her husband suffered injuries to his nose, leg and ribs but that he was expected to recover.

The threat of damaging weather will move to the north on Wednesday, forecasters said, with severe storms possible across an area stretching from western Alabama to the western tip of the Carolinas. More than 10 million people in metro areas including Atlanta; Birmingham; and Chattanooga, Tennessee, will be at risk, the Storm Prediction Center said.

Springtime often brings strong storms to the Southeast, and the region has faced a barrage of weather recently that included a tornado last month in metro New Orleans, where one person died, and storms that killed at least two people in the Florida Panhandle last week.

Two killed in crash of small plane near Central Texas airport

MARLIN, Texas (AP) — Two people were killed Tuesday when the small plane they were flying in crashed near a Central Texas airport, officials said.

Those aboard the single-engine Cessna TU206H were a man and a woman, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety. No identities were immediately available, DPS Sgt. Ryan Howard said.

The six-seat aircraft was en route from Houston Executive Airport to Waco Regional Airport when it went down just before 1 p.m. near Marlin Airport,

about 30 miles (50 kilometers) short of its destination, the Federal Aviation Administration said in a statement.

The aircraft crashed about 70 yards (65 meters) from the end of the airport's lone runway, said Marlin City Manager Cedric Davis.

No cause was immediately determined. The FAA and the National Transportation Safety Board will investigate.

Marlin is about 110 miles (180 kilometers) south of Dallas.

Police: Man shot after running over worker, stabbing another

HOUSTON (AP) — Officers shot and wounded a man early Tuesday when he charged at them with a knife after he killed a construction worker with the worker's own stolen truck, crashed into the lobby of a Houston high-rise and then stabbed someone else, police said.

The suspect carjacked the 59-year-old construction worker's truck shortly before 3:30 a.m., police said. As the victim was walking to the office of the luxury apartment building west of downtown where he had been working, the suspect ran him

over and then crashed into the lobby of the building, which is still under construction but is 30% occupied, police Chief Troy Finner said.

The construction worker, whose name police didn't release, died at the scene.

The building's concierge, who was at a desk in the lobby, wasn't hurt during the crash and barricaded himself inside an office. The suspect got back into the truck and crashed it into the office, but the concierge wasn't hurt, Finner said.

The suspect then stabbed in the back a 51-year-old man who came to the lobby area after the crashes, Finner said. That victim was in stable condition.

Officers found the suspect walking down the

street and told him multiple times to drop the knife but he refused and charged, leading them to shoot him, the chief said.

The suspect, whose name has not been released, was shot at least twice but managed to get up, leading the officers to use their stun guns to subdue him, Finner said.

The suspect was taken to a hospital, where he was in surgery, police said.

"This is a senseless incident. I don't know what the motivation is, if you can even describe it. What would motivate somebody to do this?" Finner wondered.

Police: Dallas concert where 1 killed, 15 shot had no permit

DALLAS (AP) — An outdoor concert in Dallas where one person was killed and 15 others were wounded by gunfire over the weekend did not have a permit, police said Monday.

In addition to the people killed or wounded, a woman suffered a non-gun-related injury, police said. The victims ranged in age from 13 to 29 and were in stable condition, police Chief Eddie Garcia said during a Monday news conference.

Garcia said that with "a permit and proper promoter oversight, we can better be prepared for events and crowds."

Seven Dallas police officers were approved to work the event off-duty, but that shouldn't have happened since the event didn't have a permit, Garcia said. They had all left by the time the shooting happened, he said.

"We're looking at our internal policies to take a closer look at approvals for these types of jobs," Garcia said.

Police said officers responded at about 12:13 a.m. on Sunday to the field in southwest Dallas

where the concert was held. Garcia said that one person fired a gun into the air, then an argument broke out and another person fired in the crowd's direction.

Near the concert stage, police found 26-year-old Kealon Dejuane Gilmore lying on the ground with a gunshot wound to the head. Gilmore died at the scene.

"People coming to an event should worry about enjoying themselves, not to have fear if won't make it home," Garcia said.

The investigation is ongoing. A police spokeswoman said the organiz-

ers' identities were not immediately available, so they could not be reached for comment.

Saturday night's shooting happened two weeks after 10 people were shot on March 19 during a spring break party at a Dallas event venue.

Today is Wednesday, April 6, the 96th day of 2022. There are 269 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On April 6, 1896, the first modern Olympic games formally opened in Athens, Greece.

On this date: In 1862, the Civil War Battle of Shiloh began in Tennessee as Confederate forces launched a surprise attack against Union troops, who beat back the Confederates the next day.

In 1864, Louisiana opened a convention in New Orleans to draft a new state constitution, one that called for the abolition of slavery.

In 1909, American explorers Robert E. Peary and Matthew A. Henson and four Inuits became the first men to reach the North Pole.

In 1917, the United States entered World War I as the House joined the Senate in approving a declaration of war against Germany that was then signed by President Woodrow Wilson.

In 1943, 'Le Petit Prince' (The Little Prince) by Antoine de Saint-Exupery was first published by Reynal & Hitchcock of New York.

In 2014, legendary

Hollywood actor Mickey Rooney, 93, died in North Hollywood.

In 1954, Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R-Wis., responding to CBS newsman Edward R. Murrow's broadside against him on 'See It Now,' said in remarks filmed for the program that Murrow had, in the past, 'engaged in propaganda for Communist causes.'

In 1968, 41 people were killed by two consecutive natural gas explosions at a sporting goods store in downtown Richmond, Indiana.

In 1974, Swedish pop group ABBA won the Eurovision Song Contest held in Brighton, England, with a performance of the song 'Waterloo.'

In 2008, Democratic presidential candidate Barack Obama, speaking at a private fundraiser in San Francisco, spoke of voters in Pennsylvania's Rust Belt communities who 'cling to guns or religion' because of bitterness about their economic lot; Democratic rival Hillary Rodham Clinton seized on the comment, calling it 'elitist.'

In 2020, British Prime Minister Boris Johnson was transferred to the intensive care unit of a London hospital where he was being treated for COVID-19, after his condition deteriorated.

Ten years ago: Five Black people were shot, three fatally, in Tulsa, Oklahoma; Jake England and Alvin Watts, who admitted targeting the victims because of race, pleaded guilty to murder, and were sentenced to life in prison without parole. A Navy F18 Hornet jet whose pilots were forced to eject crashed in a spectacular fireball into a big apartment complex in Virginia Beach, Virginia; miraculously, no one died. Fang Lizhi (fahng lee-juhr), 76, who was one of China's best-known dissidents, died in Tucson, Arizona. Painter Thomas Kinkade, 54, died in Monte Sereno, California.

Five years ago: President Donald Trump and Chinese President Xi Jinping (shee jihn-peeng) opened a two-day summit at Trump's Florida beach resort. Don Rickles, the big-mouthed, bald-headed 'Mr. Warmth' whose verbal assaults endeared him to audiences and peers and made him the acknowledged grandmaster of insult comedy, died at his Beverly Hills home at age 90.

One year ago: Mov-

ing up his deadline by about two weeks, President Joe Biden said every adult in the U.S. would be eligible for a coronavirus vaccination by April 19. Major League Baseball announced that the All-Star Game would be played at Coors Field in Denver; the game had been pulled from Atlanta because of objections to changes in Georgia's voting laws.
