Marie Osmond promises '...a fun journey' at Big Spring concert

As you no doubt know by now, Big Spring will welcome a famous visitor – and have the opportunity to experience a great concert – on April 23.

The Big Spring Symphony Association and the Maria Hoag Estate will present An Evening With Marie Osmond that evening at 7 p.m. in Howard College's Dorothy Garrett Coliseum.

This week, the well-known singer spoke with a Big Spring Herald reporter by phone about the upcoming concert.

"I have kind of this very diverse crazy career that I have thoroughly enjoyed for six decades, and through the years, I've enjoyed pushing myself," said Ms. Osmond. "We had a show in Vegas for 11 years. It was voted Best Show in Vegas, and that's really fun to do musically, but what I love about this is, instead of people coming to you, with all this COVID and everything else, I made the decision to go to people."

Osmond will be performing in front of the Big Spring Symphony Orchestra during the show, and said she loves the

sound of an orchestra playing music, whatever the genre. "I wanted to go to colleges and symphonies because there's something about getting in and showing these kids what a symphonic orchestra can do to a song, whether it's country, pop, opera, legit soprano, Broadway, whatever the style is – and we're going to be doing all of that during the show – to show them what life is. It's just incredible," she said. "I'm not doing a lot of shows this year. I'm kind of playing this year. I have a Harley and I'm going to Sturgis, and I'm having fun. But I have decided to do just a few of these. I guess you can see some of the places we've been, and I think people are really having fun. It's something for every age group, and I kind of laugh because I say, 'I gave it the Marie Osmond Good Housekeeping Stamp of Approval.' You will leave having had a good time."

Osmond said she has great respect for the musicians of the orchestras she performs with, including the Big Spring Symphony Orchestra.

"I've done so many things in my life, and there's something

about roots, and getting out to places like this that's just so appealing to me. For example, my charts are really tough and difficult charts. I don't do 'footballs,'" she said. "When I go in with a big symphony, they usually take three hours to go through this. Now, I think your symphony is getting more. They're getting them ahead of time. But I talk about being in the business for six decades now. I have never not worked a year of my career. It's insanity, and I feel like God has been so good to me. But these musicians have worked just as hard, since the time they were children. And so to highlight these people; to bring this show like this to an area where people can hear them."

Ms. Osmond gave a few hints about the music she has in store for Big Spring.

"You know, I'm going to do some things where I was a Rodgers and Hammerstein girl, with The King and I and South Pacific and all those. I promise you, it's going to be a really fun show. I love doing this, because some of these people maybe never would see a show," she said. "I'm going to do 'Paper Roses.' I'm going to do 'Meet Me In Montana,' which was CMA Duet of the Year (with Dan Seals). We're going to be so diverse. I'm going to do some things...

videos and things like that that will go through decades of things really quickly. Funny stuff. I love going places and bringing shows, instead of saying, 'Hey, come to a gigantic city and see it.' It's just really fun for me right now. I'm loving it. And yes, I'm doing the big cities too, absolutely. I'm playing a lot of those as well. But when I get to do something like this, it's fun for me. I work now just because I enjoy it. These places, I'm sure they didn't get to Vegas to see the show. So they're going to see a different kind of show. It's going to be beautiful, but we're not going to just do lights and smoke and mirrors. It's going to be music and true entertainment.

You better believe it. Absolutely. You're going to hear six decades of music. I wish I could do all of it for you, but that's impossible. But I will highlight different eras. I've been so blessed to do so many different kinds of things. So we'll do that. We'll take you on a fun journey."

Of course, her newest album will be featured in the show, said Osmond.

"I will be doing something from my new album. It debuted at Christmas, and it's called Unexpected, and I'll be doing music from that, which I'm super-excited about," she said. "It's not just going to be symphonic. You are going to hear music live, whether it's a country hit back when I was 12 years old, or whether it's something new, you're going to

hear music in its purest form. When I did 'Paper Roses' when I was 12 1/2, I recorded that live in a room with 65 musicians. So that's what you're going to hear. Whether it's 'Paper Roses' or 'Nessun Dorma,' you're going to hear it live.

Marie said she probably will only have about a day in Big Spring before heading off to other engagements.

"This week I go in to do a big thing for Children's Miracle Network. I'm one of the founders of that organization. You know we help almost 11 million children every single year, and to date we've raised over \$7 billion. And 100 percent of the money goes to the kids. It all stays local. It's just really cool. Nobody gets paid, celebrity-wise. We all do it because we all just love to help. So I'm doing that," she said. "I'm doing some film things right now. I'm doing just a lot of different things. Also I just spent a week with my grandchildren, so I'm just enjoying my life, you know? It's just fun, and it keeps me very busy."

Advance tickets for the An Evening With Marie Osmond are highly recommended, and are available until noon on Friday, April 22 at H-E-B, the Heritage Museum of Big Spring, and Karat Patch. Tickets are also available through bigspringsymphony.org, and will be on sale at the Coliseum door the evening of the concert.

The Lady Steers also got out of a pickle in the seventh inning by turning a shortstop-to-second-to-first double play.

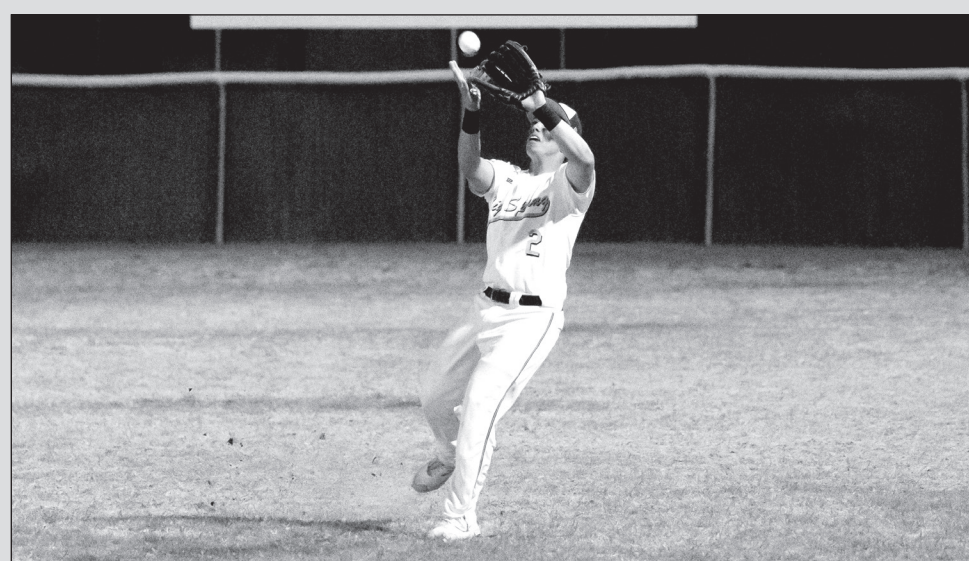
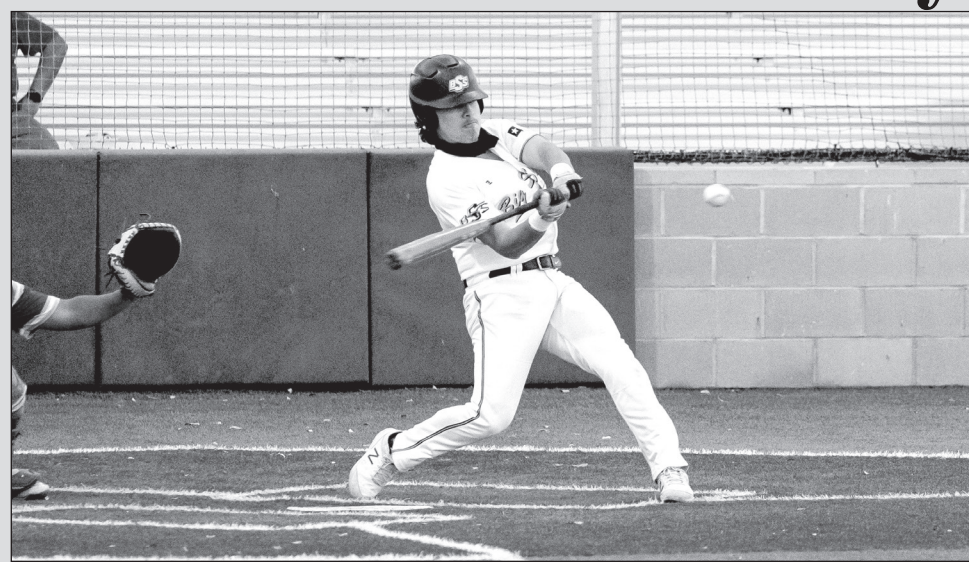
Big Spring's first score came in the fifth. Alex Enriquez started the inning with a bunt single. She eventually scored from third on a ground ball out by Madrid.

Rangers arrive in Canada with full roster

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The Texas Rangers arrived in Toronto with their entire expected opening-day roster on the trip to the country that requires all visitors to be fully vaccinated for COVID-19 at least 14 days prior to entry.

"We have to follow the rules of law, and we have to do exactly what everybody else does coming into Canada," manager Chris Woodward said Wednesday during a Zoom call with Rangers media. "There were no issues. ... So far, so good."

After playing its final spring training game in Arizona on Tuesday, the team flew directly to Toronto, where each person in the travel party had to submit proof of vaccination as part of the arrival process. Texas plays its season opener Friday night against the Toronto Blue Jays.

Woodward said players were allowed to make their own decisions regarding vaccinations.

The players had a mandatory day off Wednesday, and will work out at Rogers Centre on Thursday.

"What we want to do is make sure

opening day is a little bit lighter load for them, not cram a bunch of meetings in," Woodward said. "Getting here two days early is actually really good for our players."

Before returning to the United States after the three-game series, they all will have to provide a negative COVID-19 viral test taken no earlier than Saturday, or provide documentation from a licensed health care provider of having recovered from the virus in the 90 days before the trip.

The Rangers play their home opener Monday against Colorado. The season-opening series against Toronto is their only scheduled trip to Canada this season, and first visit there since August 2019.

The Blue Jays played home games in three different cities last season, when they went 91-71 and finished one game behind New York and Boston in the AL wild-card race.

Second baseman Marcus Semien was an All-Star and a Gold Glove winner last year in his only season with the Blue Jays before signing a \$175 million, seven-year contract with the Rangers.

Today in History

Today is Thursday, April 7, the 97th day of 2022. There are 268 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:
 On April 7, 1984, the Census Bureau reported Los Angeles had overtaken Chicago as the nation's "second city" in terms of population.

On this date:
 In 1862, Union forces led by Gen. Ulysses S. Grant and Maj. Gen. Don Carlos Buell defeated the Confederates at the Battle of Shiloh in Tennessee.

In 1915, jazz singer-songwriter Billie Holiday, also known as "Lady Day," was born in Philadelphia.

In 1922, the Teapot Dome scandal had its beginnings as Interior Secretary Albert B. Fall signed a secret deal to lease U.S. Navy petroleum reserves in Wyoming and California to his friends, oilmen Harry F. Sinclair and Edward L. Doheny, in exchange for cash gifts.

In 1945, during World War II, American planes intercepted and effectively destroyed a Japanese fleet, which included the battleship Yamato, that was headed to Okinawa on a suicide mission.

In 1949, the Rodgers and Hammerstein

musical "South Pacific" opened on Broadway.
 In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower held a news conference in which he spoke of the importance of containing the spread of communism in Indochina, saying, "You have a row of dominoes set up, you knock over the first one, and what will happen to the last one is the certainty that it will go over very quickly." (This became known as the "domino theory," although Eisenhower did not use that term.)

In 1957, shortly after midnight, the last of New York's electric trolleys completed its final run from Queens to Manhattan.

In 1959, a referendum in Oklahoma repealed the state's ban on alcoholic beverages.
 In 1962, nearly 1,200 Cuban exiles tried by Cuba for their roles in the failed Bay of Pigs invasion were convicted of treason.

In 1966, the U.S. Navy recovered a hydrogen bomb that the U.S. Air Force had lost in the Mediterranean Sea off Spain following a B-52 crash.

In 1994, civil war erupted in Rwanda, a day after a mysterious plane crash claimed the lives of the presidents of Rwanda and Burundi; in the months that followed, hundreds of

thousands of minority Tutsi and Hutu moderates were slaughtered by Hutu extremists.
 In 2020, acting Navy Secretary Thomas Modly resigned after lambasting the officer he'd fired as the captain of the USS Theodore Roosevelt, which had been stricken by a coronavirus outbreak; James McPherson was appointed as acting Navy secretary.

Ten years ago: A massive avalanche engulfed a Pakistani military complex in a mountain battleground close to the Indian border; all 140 people on the base died. CBS newsman Mike Wallace, 93, died in New Canaan, Connecticut.

Five years ago: President Donald Trump concluded his two-day summit with Chinese President Xi Jinping (shee jihn-peeng) at Mar-a-Lago in Florida, saying he had developed an "outstanding" relationship with the Chinese leader. Gov. Jerry Brown declared an end to California's historic drought emergency imposed in 2014.

One year ago: Former NFL player Phillip Adams fatally shot six people in Rock Hill, South Carolina, including a prominent doctor, his wife and their two grandchildren, before killing himself. The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department said investigators found that been driving at more than 80 miles an hour

Äi nearly twice the posted speed limit, Äi when he lost control of an SUV in February; the wreck left Woods seriously injured. Anne Beatts, a groundbreaking comedy writer who was on the original staff of "Saturday Night Live," died at her California home at 74.

heart. But the king-of-hearts return put an end to this threat, holding declarer to one diamond trick instead of four.
Declarer took the heart king with dummy's ace, then led a low diamond to the king and a second diamond to dummy's ten, West following with the three and four. Had East made the mistake of ducking the ten, South would have had his eighth trick. But East took the ace of diamonds and returned the ten of hearts, and South could score only seven tricks.
West's play of the three followed by the four indicated that he had started with exactly three diamonds. East therefore had no problem winning the second diamond because he knew South had only two cards in the suit.
Had West been dealt the doubleton 4-3 of diamonds, he would have played the four first and the three next. In that case, East would then have ducked the second round of diamonds, knowing that South had the remaining diamond.
Whether one plays first the three and then the four, or the four and then the three, might seem like splitting hairs, but the fact is that hair-splitting often makes the critical difference in the delicate art of defense.
