**Threatening The Voice of The Press**

In many states at various times, legislation has been introduced, and in every case rejected, which would have required editorial expression in newspapers and other publications to be signed. Such a proposal is being considered in Kentucky, where the House of Representatives has passed a bill requiring editorial identification. The Senate probably will not pass the measure. No better way could be thought of to destroy the stature of a paper's voice.... its editorial page.

Commenting on this, Editor and Publisher observes: "Such a requirement would destroy the editorial page as the voice of the newspaper and turn it into a collection of individual opinions. We don't think there is any more justification for this legislation than there is for a law requiring a politician to reveal who writes his speech. A newspaper editor or publisher stands behind the comments expressed on the editorial page regardless of who put them into words just as a politician will stand behind the thoughts he utters regardless of who puts them on paper for him to read."

**HARD TO UNDERSTAND**

Poverty and depressed areas have been so well publicized as conditions prevailing in the U. S. that the rest of the world must think we are in bad shape.

It is difficult to square the poverty and depressed areas concern with the actions of government agencies and officials that block private investments and employment for years at a time.

Two good illustrations are a \$700 million Duke Power project in the Carolinas' depressed area and the \$257 million Pacific Northwest Power Company project on the Snake River.

Both projects would create many jobs and be great taxpaying assets. But government agencies and officials continue to promote tax-subsidized and tax-exempt public properties and block private development.

Which is best for a poverty or depressed area: A billion dollars worth of taxpaying properties or a billion dollars worth of tax-consuming, tax-exempt projects that increase the load already carried by over-burdened taxpayers?

Tax-paying projects are being held up by the tax-spenders. Apparently, one hand of the government is not aware of what the other hand is doing.

**The Good Earth**  
 by MRS. R. F. COBB

If this dry weather keeps up, every measure that can be taken to preserve water must be used.

Mulching saves moisture more than any other thing I know. There are many types of mulches. If one is going on a vacation, newspapers spread over the well saturated soil will keep the ground wet for at least two weeks. Spread the papers at the base of the plants and lower slightly with dry soil...enough to keep the papers from looking unsightly, and to anchor them so they don't blow. When you return, simply water as usual; the papers will soon turn into soil.

Newspapers also make a good mulch when decayed. A man at Abilene kept a pit full of old newspapers constantly decaying for compost. His soil was dark and friable. He had as pretty a yard as there was in Abilene. He would put a layer of shredded paper and a layer of soil, then thoroughly saturate the mixture. Ever so often the compost was turned. As it broke down into humus it was added to the soil.

Black plastic is another good mulcher, especially when one is away on vacation. Not only does the plastic act as a mulch to preserve moisture, it also acts as a de-weeder. Lay the plastic as near to the well watered plants as possible and completely cover the middles. Black plastic is economical because of its long lasting quality.


I visited Mrs. C. B. Rhea's garden this week and felt as though I'd stepped into a cool, green forest. Huge blackberry trees form a dense shade over most of the yard. As one steps in the driveway, four o'clocks with both red and yellow flowers on the same stalk catches one's eye. They nestle in a bed of the largest, healthiest iris fans I have ever seen. Bronze foliage cannas make a pleasing picture against the white garage.

A very healthy bougainvillea vine twines in and out of a white picket fence in a three-cornered flower bed where coleus geranium, hibiscus and other flowers make a pleasing picture. On the opposite side of the gate, yellow and red cannas tower over rich, green chrysanthemums. As one enters the gate

The right amount of fertilizer depends on the kind you buy, climate, type of grass, and soil. For best lawn response, follow directions on fertilizer package. Proper mowing promotes thick turf. Begin when grass is three to four inches high. Never clip shorter than 1 1/2 inches. Exceptions are bent grass, Bermuda grass, zoysia, and Merion bluegrass lawns. Use a sharp mower; dull mower blades bruise and shred grass, make lawn unattractive. Water only when needed, says the Institute, then soak soil five or six inches deep to encourage deep rooting. Light watering makes grass easy prey for pests and drought.

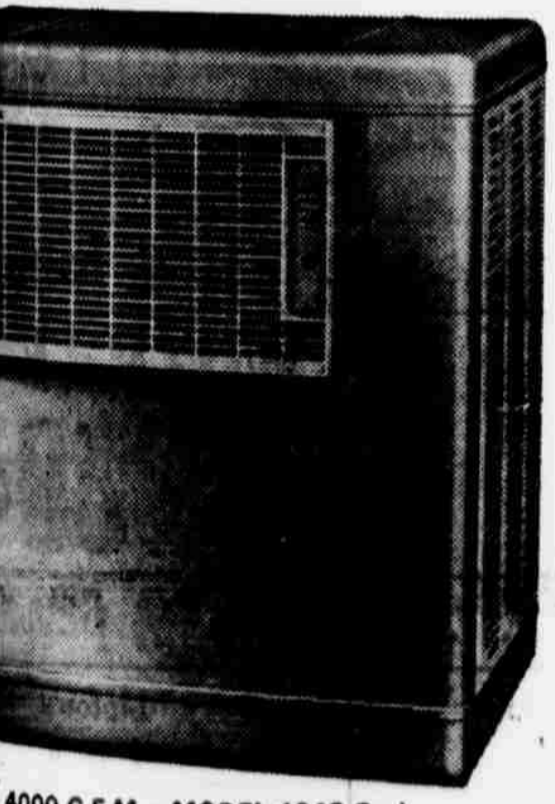

## HOW'S YOUR I. Q. WHEN IT COMES TO BORROWING MONEY?

How's your I. Q. when it comes to borrowing money? Here are ten money tips which may help you become more adept. They're suggested by Mrs. Doris Myers, Extension home management specialist at Texas A&M University. The tips are from the National Association of Credit Unions.

- 1) First, no matter how good the interest rate sounds, find out what the credit or loan will actually cost you in money.
- 2) Before you sign any papers, make sure all the figures are entered correctly. Never leave any blank spaces to be filled in later.
- 3) Question all insurance charges. Find out what kind of insurance you are buying and exactly what it covers. Many different insurances "lead on" practices have been reported.
- 4) On installment purchases you may owe the payments to some other firm, not the dealer. Find out who it is, and if it is a reputable firm. If you have any doubts, check.
- 5) Read the note or contract to see what penalties are imposed for late payments. Some penalties are exorbitant.
- 6) See if there are any other extra charges specified in the note or contract. Don't skip the fine print or you may be sorry.
- 7) Read what is said about repossession in a time-payment contract. Do you get a fair notice before the item is repossessed? What repossession charges can be levied against you? This is important.
- 8) Understand clearly what security you are giving. On a purchase, find out if it includes other merchandise you have bought previously. Above all, look to see if the note or contract gives your creditor the right to collect your salary.
- 9) Make sure you do not sign away any of your legal rights or guarantees, such as the right to refuse merchandise that is not as promised.
- 10) See if there is a provision for a refund of interest or carrying charges if you complete the payments ahead of schedule.
