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

Big Spring legend Cotton Mize passes away at 95

In 2019 I made the acquaintance of a legend of Big Spring history. I had seen his name on the ball field in Comanche Trail Park, but being a fairly recent Big Springer - I came here in 2001 - I wasn't

familiar with the legend of Cotton Mize. In 2019 I interviewed Cotton for a Living magazine article, and learned a lot about

a big part of our city's sports legacy. A.C. "Cotton" Mize passed away Friday, but the tradition of sportsmanship he instilled in many young men is still thriving in Big Spring.

Cotton was a businessman, distributing potato chips throughout the area, and in 1986 he became mayor of Big Spring, serving until 1989. But down deep, Cotton loved softball. Today, softball may be seen as a "girl's sport" or a leisure activity, but in Mize's day, they played it fast-pitch.

""I had Morton Foods potato chips, and I had a softball team called the Chippers," Mize said in that interview. "Most of the boys graduated from Big Spring High School, played baseball there, and just started playing softball with me. We traveled all over the country - Fargo, North Dakota; Minot, North Dakota; Kingman, Arizona; Hastings, Nebraska - we've been over the whole United States. California, two or three times, Colorado, three or four or five times."

Mize said he played with the Chippers and coached them for about 40 years.

"About 10 years ago, me and my son and my left fielder joined up with Odessa and we won two national championships. My son made first team All-Amer-

ican pitcher," Mize said proudly in 2019. Today, Johnny Mize – Cotton's son – makes his home in Amarillo, but spoke

with the Herald about his father's legacy. "He was my dad, and so I'm pretty biased," Johnny said. "Probably like every son would say, I felt like I had the greatest dad in the world. Obviously he was

Search continues for Texas inmate who escaped prison bus

CENTERVILLE, Texas (AP) — Authorities were agencies were involved in the search, including searching Friday for a Texas inmate serving a life aircraft from the Texas Department of Public Safe-

sentence for murder who escaped from a transport bus after stabbing the driver.

But when he experiences numerous attempts on his life, he seeks out the services of the eccentric Bleecker Street Inquiry Agency to uncover the culprit. "His reputation preceded him, and I knew he was a stellar player before I started playing. To be so honored to be selected to play for his team with his son Johnny, I was just thrilled to get that opportunity. Cotton Mize's name was just synonymous with fast pitch softball and I had the privilege of getting to play with him."

In addition to Johnny Mize of Amarillo, Cotton leaves two daughters, Carol Pate of Big Spring and Brenda Toner of Round Rock. His wife Billie passed away in 2016.

Cotton Mize's funeral arrangements are under the direction of Big Spring's Nalley-Pickle and Welch Funeral Home, although funeral details have not yet

canvassing of statewide propositions. Unofficially, both propositions passed handily in Howard County, although statewide results are not yet available. Proposition 1 would create a Constitutional Amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the reduction of the amount of a limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for general elementary and public school purposes on the residence homestead of a person who is elderly or disabled to reflect any statutory reduction from the preceding tax year.

Proposiition 2 would create a constitutional amendment increasing the amount of residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes.

The Big Spring City Council will meet at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday to examine the results of the election. Following the meeting's call to order and public comment, the council will canvass the returns and declare the results of the May 7 election.

The council also plans to recognize outgoing Mayor Shannon Thomason for his service, and administer the oath of office to Mayor-elect Bob Moore and to the re-elected Councilman Troy Tompkins (District 5). Council members will then be able to offer input prior to the meeting's adjournment.

Palmer shoots 62, joins lead at lowscoring Byron Nelson

McKINNEY, Texas (AP) — Jordan Spieth thought the course for his hometown Byron Nelson would play more difficult after yielding more birdies in its debut than any other tournament on the PGA Tour last season.

The three-time major winner says he couldn't have been more wrong, and is frankly surprised over how little he thinks was done the first two days to make TPC Craig Ranch a stiffer test.

Ryan Palmer, one of the Dallas-area players in the shadow of Spieth and Masters champion Scottie Scheffler, shot a 10-under 62 on Friday and was tied at 15 under with Sebastián Muñoz and 40-yearold tour rookie David Skinns.

Muñoz, a Colombian who lives in the Dallas area and went to college at North Texas, was even through 13 holes coming off his second 60 of the season — a first on the PGA Tour — before birdies on three of four holes for a 69. Skinns shot 63.

Justin Lower, another older tour rookie at 33, was alone in fourth, a shot behind the leaders after a 66.

"I mean, a 60 yesterday and a lot of 8s (under) and 7s all over the board," said Spieth, who shot 65 and was three shots off the lead in a group that includes defending champion K.H. Lee.

"It's just, a lot of tees are up, it was very surprising," Spieth said. "I think they were looking at the weekend as a lot less wind and so they used more of the easier pins the first two days because I can only name one or two pins on this golf course that were not the easiest two locations that are on the greens. I'm a little surprised at how, on a not-so-difficult golf course they have also set it up a little easier for us, too."

The Nelson was the only 2020-21 tournament with more than 2,000 birdies (2,007). There were 38 eagles in the first round Thursday, the most for a single round this season.

Charl Schwartzel had one of the Friday eagles in a round of 65 that put him at 13 under. The 2011 Masters winner drove into a greenside bunker on the 316-yard, par-4 14th and holed out from there.

The top-ranked Scheffler, who came in with four wins in six individual events capped by the Masters victory, shot a 68 and was 9 under after two rounds alongside his fellow former Texas Longhorns in Spieth and Lee.

Palmer, who finished his opening round with an eagle on the par-5 18th, started on the back nine and birdied six of the last seven holes on that side, then added four more on the front in a bogey-free round. The 45-year-old hasn't won an individual event

since 2010 in Hawaii. Palmer lives in nearby Colleyville and is a member at Colonial Country Club in Fort Worth, where the tour returns in two weeks after the PGA Championship at Southern Hills. Palmer had a two-shot lead halfway through his

last Texas stop in San Antonio in early April before shooting 7 over on the weekend. He is a four-time winner, including the 2019 Zurich team event in New Orleans with Jon Rahm. "I spent 19 years doing this, unbelievable that

I've been here that long, and these young guys ... you got to play such great golf to beat 'em," Palmer said. "We're in position again and we'll learn from what we learned in San Antonio and try and do it Lee won the rain-plagued Craig Ranch debut at 25

under while Spieth tied for ninth, his personal best in a tournament he badly wants to win because of his remarkable pro debut at the Nelson as a 16-yearold Sunday contender in 2010.

There's no hint of rain this time in McKinney, about 30 miles north of downtown Dallas, and the wind was brisk the first two days. Combine that

with the expectation of the rough being more of a factor a year after a February deep freeze wiped it out, and Spieth figured scores would be higher.

Instead, he found himself calling out the movedup tee box on the par-5 ninth, which played just 474 yards and an average nearly three-quarters of a stroke below par Friday. It was the easiest hole on the course.

The Tom Weiskopf-designed course also has wide fairways and large greens.

"Some familiarity to me with some of the courses I played back in South Africa," said Schwartzel, who tied for third at 21 under last year. "I don't feel claustrophobic off the tee. It gives me a bit of space, and once I can get it in play, iron play is not much of a problem. So just really comfortable."

Skinns, an Englishman with no top-25 finishes in 20 PGA Tour appearances spread out over nearly a decade, had five consecutive birdies starting on the par-3 seventh in his career-best round.

Lower hasn't finished higher than tied for 15th in an individual event. He paired with Dylan Wu to tie for 10th in the team event in New Orleans.

The ninth-ranked Spieth and No. 17 Joaquin Niemann, also at 12 under, lead the list of 10 among the world's top 30 in the field.

No. 13 Hideki Matsuyama was 11 under, a shot better than eighth-ranked Justin Thomas, who spent the first two days in the group ahead of Spieth, his good friend and house guest for this week. No. 11 Dustin Johnson was 7 under, and 12th-

ranked Xander Schauffele rallied from 3 over for the tournament early in the second round with eight birdies over 10 holes to make the cut on the number at 5 under.

The rest of the top 30 players missed the cut: 10thranked Sam Burns, the runner-up to Lee at the Nelson last year; Will Zalatoris (28th), another player in his hometown event; and Kevin Kisner (30th).

Fun and tension during Austin FC's second season

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The view from near the top certainly looks much better to Austin FC.

After finishing their 2021 debut near the bottom of Major League Soccer's Western Conference, the second go-round has been quite a turnaround.

Austin is in second place in the standings, is second in the league in scoring behind hot-footed Argentine forward Sebastian Driussi, and has proven it can do what the best teams can: win on the road. The club also announced Friday a three-year contract extension for head coach Josh Wolff through 2025.

But there are critical days ahead. Seven of the next nine games are on the road, starting with a key two-game swing that begins Saturday night at Real Salt Lake before a match with conference leader LAFC four days later. Points

And back home there are some fractures underneath the veneer of fun: forward Cecilio Dominguez has returned from a five-game suspension amid team and league investigations of an alleged domestic dispute, and some vocal parts of the fan base have yet to welcome him back.

Dominguez, a former Paraguayan national team player and the club's first designated player signing, was suspended from all team activities by MLS on April 8 after the team reported a situation involving his ex-partner at a residence. Police were called to the scene, but Dominguez was not arrested and no charges were filed.

Dominguez sat while the league and team investigated. He was reinstated last week with league orders to undergo counseling. The club had to take him back under terms of the league's collective bargaining agreement. His status as one of the team's most popular players is now clearly in jeop-

ardy. Dominguez didn't play in last week's 0-1 home loss to the LA Galaxy, and the issue has polarized some in the fan base. Although some support the club's handling of the matter, two of the main fan groups protested his return by observing 10 minutes of silence during the match, and with banners decrying domestic violence and publicizing a victim hotline. Dominguez wears No. 10.

Dominguez has not spoken publicly on the matter.

The tension is a new pressure point for a club that has enjoyed rowdy support from a passionate fan base since its launch. The team is on a run of 23 consecutive home sellouts — the longest streak in MLS — at 20,000-seat Q2 Stadium. And despite the Dominguez controversy, the place was still packed in near 100-degree heat last Sunday.

"Everyone is entitled to their opinion," Wolff said. "The league reinstated Cecelio and we move forward. ... In time we'll see what happens with Cecilio.'

Wolff said Dominguez likely won't play during the road swing. He also said Austin has strong chemistry in the locker room and on the field that likely won't fracture.

"I think we have a very strong (team) culture," Wolff said. "As soon as he's mentally and physically ready to play, he'll be back on the field. ... We've got great fans in this city. It's not just the supporter groups. Our community is tremendous. We're proud of that."

Austin defender Julio Cascante said Dominguez's return to training this week has been smooth.

"We are professional, training, how it should be," Cascante said. "We just keep working and thinking of the team."

Driussi has been the club's top offensive weapon in the meantime. He is tied for the league lead with seven goals and has three assists. He was the MLS player of the month for April.

Austin (6-2-2) went 4-1-1 in April, including four league victories. The only blemish came in a U.S. Open Cup loss at San Antonio.

Driussi scored four goals in that stretch, including a match-leveling strike in the 85th minute in a rally at DC United, and the winner on the road at Houston.

Those two road wins showed a maturity and fight Austin didn't have in its first season. Austin trailed DC United 2-0 before rallying for three goals in 10 minutes. At Houston, they were down 1-0 after five minutes before rallying again.

The win at DC United cleared a big hurdle for the club. After the whistle blew, Wolff punched the air and let out an emphatic "Yeah!" as he left the field. "We're a good team," Casacante said. "A better team than last year."

When an American pair held the North-South cards, they got to four spades as shown and went down one after West led a heart. Declarer won the heart in dummy and played a low trump, covering East's nine with the ten and losing to the king.

West led another heart, and declarer eventually lost the ace of clubs and two more trump tricks to West's A-8 to go down one.

However, South should have made the contract. He should have reasoned that his only real hope was to lose just two trump tricks, not three, and he should have proceeded accordingly, even though his chances were relatively slim. The low trump lead from dummy at trick two offered no possibility of success. Declarer should instead have led a

low club from dummy at trick two to create a subsequent entry to his hand. East presumably would have won the club and returned a heart. South would win in dummy, ruff a club and lead a spade toward the Q-6. Once he did this, the defense could not win more than two trump tricks and a club, and the contract would come rolling home. This approach succeeds whenever

West's spade holding is A-J, K-J, A-K-9, or A-K-8. Declarer must assume that one of these four combinations was dealt to West, as they are the only ones that offer a chance to make the contract. To ignore these possibilities is equivalent to conceding defeat. When the Italians held the North-

South hands, they stopped at two spades, making three for 140 points. At this table also the trumps were mishandled, but since the Italians were only in a partscore, the proper play of the suit was not critical.
