Recognizing, honoring those who sacrificed

City of Big Spring officially accepts Purple Heart City designation

The vote has been cast; the City of Big Spring became a Purple Heart City with a unanimous vote from the City Council. With this approval, Big Spring joins the more than 200 cities across the nation in recognizing the sacrifices made by these brave men and women. This designation puts Big Spring in alignment with the State of Texas, which is designated a Purple Heart State. The state designation was approved on May 29, 2017 through the acceptance of HCR56.

“The pride it instills in a Purple Heart recipient anytime

they are driving through and see that sign is what it is all about,” veteran and Purple Heart recipient Mike Tarpley, said. “Plus, any time anybody sees that sign, it should make them think of the sacrifices that have been made for this country.”

Howard County officially became a Purple Heart County in February 2021, after hearing from Chapter Commander for the Military Order of Purple Heart, Chapter 1919, Jim Bracken. As Bracken mentioned during the County Commissioners meeting, the purpose of the designations is to encourage people to reflect upon those who have given their lives to serve their country. The County designation allowed for the petition to go to TxDOT

to allow for “Purple Heart County” signs to go along the sides of the roads, in Howard County. The County acceptance came around Purple Heart Day, which is Feb. 22.

“Out of the awards that I received in my three years, three

A Moment in History

Home Sweet Home

Between the years of 1900-1910, Big Spring was experiencing its first building boom. The town was building homes, churches, schools, and stores.

In 1907, there were five lumber stores that were trying to meet the town’s demand. Building materials and lumber arrived in Big Spring on the T&P Railway.

The sounds of hammers banging could be heard all through the night. Some-

thing you would not hear was the buzz of a skill saw or hammer drill. Everything was cut with a handsaw and a lot of elbow grease.

Bascom Reagan was a local house builder and J.M. Morgan was one of the brick and rock masons. Some of their work is still standing in Big Spring today.

Most of the homes that were being built at that time were less than 1,000 square feet, pier and beam with pine or oak planked flooring. There was no insulation and very few had a bathroom. If they did have a bathroom, a bath is what it was used for.

“Who would want to do that nasty stuff in the house?” — a phrase often heard. It made so much more sense to go to the outhouse for your private business. If the family had a bathtub, it was usually a large galvanized tub without running water.

Eventually the city established a sew-

Cotton always loved his hometown of Big Spring

and served as Mayor from 1986-1989. He also enjoyed traveling and was thankful for the opportunity to experience Australia, New Zealand, Hong Kong, China, Mexico, Peru, Germany, France, Canada in addition to playing softball throughout the US.

Cotton was an active member of the Nazarene Church for over 90 years and served on the Church Board as well as the Sunday School Superintendent. He participated in mission trips to several foreign countries. He was a member of the Lions Club and Gideons.

months and seven days of combat in Vietnam, the one I am most proud of is the Purple Heart. It's the one award that I didn't do anything for; I was in the wrong place at the wrong time and because I was injured they gave me a medal for it," Steve Purdy, a Vietnam Veteran and Purple Heart Recipient, said. "There is a special connection, more so for me than others I would say, with the Purple Heart medal. George Washington started the Purple Heart, and in the mountains in New York where I'm from, there is a museum named the Jacob Purdy Museum, which served as a headquarters for George Washington. The name is also a distant relation of mine who served as Captain under George Washington in the Revolutionary War."

The Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration

in present use. It was initially created as a badge of military merit by George Washington in 1782. It is the first American service award or decoration made available to the common soldier; specifically awarded to members of the U.S. armed forces who have been wounded or paid the ultimate sacrifice in combat. According to the Wounded Warriors Family Support website, there are an estimated 1.8 million Purple Heart recipients who have transitioned back to civilian life.

"The real purpose behind getting Big Spring designated as a Purple Heart City is to honor those who didn't come home, to keep them alive. Yes, it is to honor those who sacrificed and are here, but it's really about not forgetting those who didn't get to come back home," Purdy said.

As Purdy continued speaking about the honor behind the Purple Heart, he mentioned that there is an inner strength that is discovered while in combat. Purdy described it as an inner strength that no

one will ever fully know unless they are in combat. "Vietnam is not a time that I like to talk about ... it makes me emotional ... It also helped form me into the man I am today. It provided an inner strength for me that I wouldn't have otherwise. I want to be known for the man I am today, which is why I often don't talk about Vietnam," Purdy said.

Now that the City of Big Spring and Howard County both have the Purple Heart designation, those who are wanting to order signs are able to do so through the Wounded Warriors Family Support website. According to Tarpley, in the near future, signs will be placed at the entrances of the city to display the designation of Purple Heart City. Local businesses who are wanting to show their support for Purple Heart recipients and their families are encouraged to order designated parking signs for their place of business. galvanized tub without running water.

Eventually the city established a sewer and water system. All outhouses were ordered to be torn down. Home owners had to carve out a small space for a toilet, tub and sink if there was never a designated bathroom built. Often a small room was added onto the house for this purpose. It was nothing more than a lean-to with a short ceiling.

The houses had tall, steep roofs and high ceilings. It was important to have the air circulate in the hot summers. Raising a window and opening the transom over the interior doorways, was the only air conditioning available. During the cold winters, rags or newspapers were chinked into the cracks of the walls. Heat was from the fireplace or stove or it was generated by sleeping in the same bed with

all the siblings.

There was usually a large front porch. A place that was used often during the spring, summer, fall seasons, and sometimes put into use as a sleeping porch where the night air was cooler.

Big Spring did have some luxurious homes. The Brennands on Jack Street (renamed Lancaster) had a beautiful brick and sandstone trimmed house that was a showplace. Another lovely home was built for the John Birdwell family at 900 Goliad and made of sandstone blocks. There were two and three story homes built along East Second, Third, and Fourth Streets.

The Potton house was built in 1901 and had concrete porches and sidewalks and was made of solid sandstone blocks.

The newly built homes had a fresh coat of paint applied however, they were rarely repainted. Paint was expensive and a luxury.

The first homes were built along Main, Scurry,

Lancaster, and Runnels. Soon a "suburban" neighborhood was built on Bell, Aylesford, and Abrams Streets.

Once the children were grown and moved out, rooms would be available to rent. Lodging was not easy to find in Big Spring and if a lady's husband passed away, she could earn a living by renting out rooms and providing meal services for the boarder.

When Della Agnell was left a widow and forced to raise her three young children alone. she made a living by opening a school in her home at 6th and Lancaster streets.

Many of the homes built in 1900 are still standing today. Some of the old homes were purchased and moved to the country making the journey without a crack developing or window breaking. Image.jpeg Sadly, through the years, hundreds of these homes were either torn down, vandalized to irreparable destruction, or burned. The craftsmanship and memories gone forever.

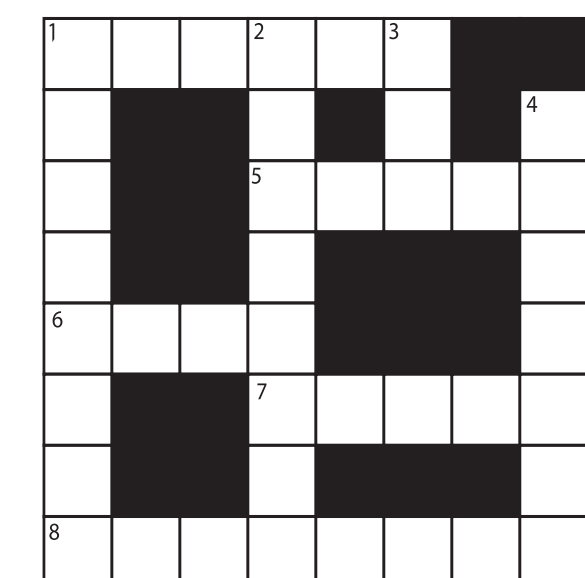

Contract Bridge

The bidding:
West North East South

Opening lead — eight of spades.
Most deals require no more than simple, orderly thinking for declarer to achieve the best result possible. A tendency to focus on how to play a specific suit rather than on how to play the hand as a whole is a fairly common failing that causes many contracts to be lost.

Take this case where many declarers would go wrong. West leads a spade, and South wins East's nine with the queen. How should declarer play the hand? He is gazing at six

ready-made tricks — two spades, two hearts and two clubs — and needs three more for the contract.

Declarer can lead a diamond to the queen and lose to the ace — which East, on the bidding, is likely to have — but this will give South only two additional tricks and leave him one trick shy of his goal. Or declarer can play the A-K and another club, hoping the opposing clubs are divided 3-2, but this will also bring him to only eight tricks.

Since both methods of play lead to a dead end, South should start looking elsewhere for a way to develop his three additional tricks. And if he studies the situation carefully enough, he should spot an approach that will give him an excellent shot at the contract.

At trick two, he leads a club to the king and returns a low diamond from dummy. East can't afford to rise with the ace, which would hand declarer three immediate diamond tricks, so let's say East ducks and allows South to win with the king.

Having "stolen" this trick, declarer now abandons diamonds and plays the ace and another club. When the suit breaks normally, he has nine solid tricks.

A little in-depth analysis at the start pays off in the end.

Today in History

Today in History: May 17, Brown v. Board of Education ruling

Today in History
Today is Tuesday, May 17, the 137th day of 2022. There are 228 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 17, 1954, a unanimous U.S. Supreme Court handed down its Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka decision which held that racially segregated public schools were inherently unequal, and therefore unconstitutional.

On this date:

In 1536, Archbishop of Canterbury Thomas Cranmer declared the marriage of England's King Henry VIII to Anne Boleyn invalid after she failed to produce a male heir; Boleyn, already condemned for high treason, was executed two days later.

In 1940, the Nazis occupied Brussels, Belgium, during World War II.

In 1946, President Harry S. Truman seized control of the nation's railroads, delaying but not preventing a threatened strike by engineers and trainmen.

In 1973, a special committee convened by the U.S. Senate began its televised hearings into the Watergate scandal.

In 1980, rioting that claimed 18 lives erupted in Miami's Liberty City after an all-white jury in Tampa acquitted four former Miami police officers of fatally

beating Black insurance executive Arthur McDuffie.

In 1987, 37 American sailors were killed when an Iraqi warplane attacked the U.S. Navy frigate Stark in the Persian Gulf. (Iraq apologized for the attack, calling it a mistake, and paid more than \$27 million in compensation.)

In 1996, President Bill Clinton signed a measure requiring neighborhood notification when sex offenders move in. ("Megan's Law," as it's known, was named for Megan Kanka, a 7-year-old New Jersey girl who was raped and murdered in 1994.)

In 2004, Massachusetts became the first state to allow same-sex marriages.

In 2010, the Supreme Court ruled 5-4 that young people serving life prison terms should have "a meaningful opportunity to obtain release" provided they didn't kill their victims.

In 2015, a shootout erupted between bikers and police outside a restaurant in Waco, Texas, leaving nine of the bikers dead and 20 people injured.

In 2017, the Justice Department appointed former FBI Director Robert Mueller as a special counsel to oversee a federal investigation into potential coordination between Russia and the 2016 Donald Trump campaign.

In 2020, New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo was tested for the coronavirus on live TV as he announced that all people in the state who were experiencing flu-like symptoms were eligible

for tests.

Ten years ago: Washington's envoy to Israel, Dan Shapiro, told the Israel Bar Association the U.S. had plans in place to attack Iran if necessary to prevent it from developing nuclear weapons.

Donna Summer, 63, the "Queen of Disco," died in Naples, Florida. Frank Edward "Ed" Ray, the California school bus driver hailed as a hero for helping 26 students escape after three kidnappers buried them underground in 1976, died at age 91.

Five years ago: The Justice Department appointed former FBI Director Robert Mueller as a special counsel to oversee a federal investigation into potential coordination between Russia and Donald Trump's campaign during the 2016 presidential election. Pvt. Chelsea Manning, the soldier who was sentenced to 35 years in a military prison for giving classified materials to WikiLeaks, walked free after serving seven years behind bars, her sentence having been commuted by President Barack Obama. Chris Cornell, who was lead singer with rock bands Soundgarden and Audioslave, took his own life in a Detroit hotel room; he was 52.

One year ago: The Supreme Court, with a 6-3 conservative majority, agreed to consider a major rollback of abortion rights by hearing a challenge to a Mississippi abortion law that would ban abortions after 15 weeks of pregnancy. (A decision in the case is expected next month.) The White House said President Joe Biden expressed support for a cease-fire in a call to Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu after eight days of Israeli-Palestinian

airstrikes and rocket attacks. AT&T announced a deal to combine its massive media operations, including HBO and CNN, with Discovery, the owner of lifestyle networks including the Food Network and HGTV.

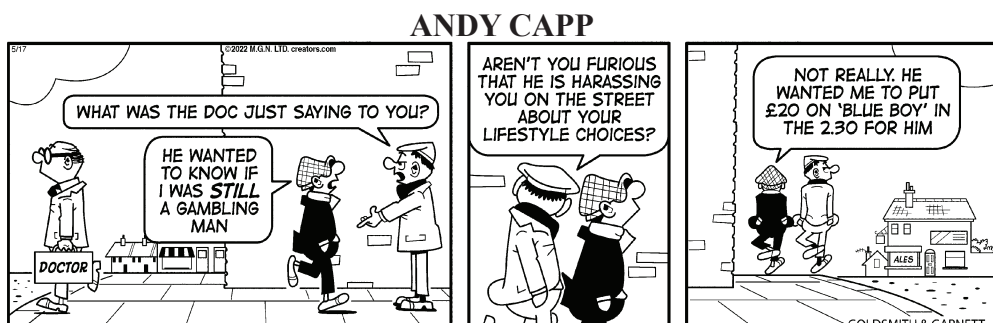
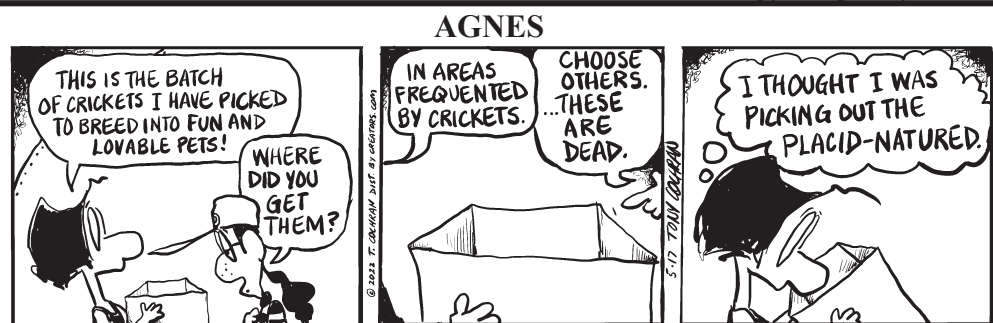
