# Alvarez makes big throw, hits 25th homer, Astros top Royals

HOUSTON (AP) — Long established as a star at the plate, Yordan Alvarez has been showing flashes of brilliance on defense this season, too.

Alvarez threw out Hunter Dozier at the plate from just short of the warning track in left field to preserve a two-run, eighth-inning lead, then hit his 25th homer as the Houston Astros beat the Kansas City Royals 9-7 on Tuesday night.

The Astros also got homers from Jeremy Peña, Alex Bregman and Aledmys Díaz as they extended their winning streak to a major league-best eight

Houston trailed 4-3 entering the fifth inning before Peña homered off Zack Greinke (2-5) to tie it. Bregman's two-run shot later in the fifth put the Astros ahead 6-4.

The eighth belonged to Alvarez.

Bryan Abreu's bases-loaded walk of Michael A. Taylor got the Royals within two. Phil Maton took over and Nicky Lopez hit a deep flyball that Alvarez caught and fired on the fly to catcher Martin Maldonado, who tagged out Dozier for an inningending double play.

"When the ball was hit, I just focused and thought I'd have a chance at home if I made a pretty good throw," Alvarez said through a translator. "That was where my focus was, just to make a good, strong throw there."

After playing primarily at designated hitter in his first three major league seasons, Alvarez has been splitting time between DH and left field this

"It all goes back to work," manager Dusty Baker said. "And he's worked on it. He's worked on his defense a lot."

With two outs in the bottom of the eighth, Alvarez homered to left-center off Jackson Kowar to make it 9-6. Chants of "M-V-P" rained down on the slugger as he rounded the bases.

"It felt exciting that the fan base was calling for that," he said. "It definitely felt good."

His 25 homers are tied with Philadelphia's Kyle Schwarber for second in the majors, four behind the Yankees' Aaron Judge.

Alvarez was asked if he enjoyed his big defensive play or his homer more.

"I think the thing that is the most fun is today is it's my mom's birthday," he said. "At first, when I threw out the runner, I said: 'Oh wow.' Then I hit the home run and I said: 'Oh wow, (what) a good gift (for her).'" Luis Garcia (7-5) allowed eight hits and five runs

in 6 1/3 innings for his fourth straight win. Rafael Montero allowed a run on a groundout in the ninth before striking out the next two batters for his sixth save. Greinke tied a season high by allowing 10 hits

with six runs in five innings in his first start against Houston since signing with the Royals in the offseason. The veteran spent 2 1/2 seasons with the Astros, going to the World Series in 2019 and "Stuff felt pretty sharp but I made a lot of mistakes

and didn't really make a lot of quality strikes," Greinke said. "I think ... they had 10 hits or something and at least like eight of them were mistakes."

The Astros played a video honoring Greinke's

time in Houston while he warmed up and capped it by playing John Anderson's "Seminole Wind," which was his warmup music. He received a warm ovation and waved to the crowd from the bullpen.

"Yeah, that was good," Greinke said. "The Diamondbacks decided to show them hitting some home runs off me and then did a tribute, so it was nicer to do it before the game. Kind of a nice way of doing it."

MJ Melendez hit a solo homer off Garcia in the second and Bobby Witt Jr. connected off him for a two-run shot in the third. It was the third home run of the series for Melendez, who went deep twice in the series opener on Monday.

Díaz hit a two-run homer in the seventh off Kowar.

# Varsho's 3-run homer seals Diamondbacks' 6-2 win over Giants

PHOENIX (AP) — Josh Rojas planted the two-strike bunt seed in spring training after realizing, with his speed, he'd have better odds laying one down than swinging away.

Despite the analytics in his favor, the Arizona third baseman had yet to attempt it this season, worried about looking foolish if the ball rolled foul for a strikeout.

A pep talk from his dad convinced Rojas he should try. San Francisco's infield shift gave him the opportunity - and he pulled it off perfectly.

Rojas jump-started Arizona's fiverun eighth inning with a two-strike bunt single and Daulton Varsho capped it with a three-run homer, helping the Diamondbacks extend the Giants' losing streak to six games with a 6-2 win Tuesday night.

"The scariest part is when you bunt and it goes foul, you look like an idiot," Rojas said. "If you can get past that and you look at strictly the numbers and get half of them in play -Ithink I could probably get more than half — you're increasing your 0-2 batting average from .100-.200 to .500-

Rojas entered in the eighth inning as a pinch-hitter and missed two pitches from hard-throwing Dominic Leone (3-1). With a 1-2 count, the Giants shifted their infielders to the right side. Rojas squared to bunt on Leone's

next pitch, but pulled back when he saw the breaking ball wasn't a strike. Next pitch, Rojas got what he wanted — a fastball — and dropped it perfectly down the third-base line for the majors' second two-strike bunt single by a position player since 2016.

Rojas caused more problems with

his speed, drawing several pickoff throws to first base by Leone, and then went to third on Cooper Hummel's single. He scored the tying run on a wild pitch and Varsho all but sealed the Diamondbacks' first series win against their NL West rivals since May 2019 with his homer to the pool deck in right-center.

Mark Melancon worked a perfect ninth to close it out.

"There's no setup to doing it," Diamondbacks manager Torey Lovullo said. "It's just instinctual play when you see that the field has been shifted and there's a clear lane for you to get a base hit if you execute right. Josh

Joc Pederson gave San Francisco a 1-0 lead with a sacrifice fly in the fourth. Geraldo Perdomo tied it with an RBI single in the fifth.

The Giants took a 2-1 lead in the seventh on Austin Wynns' run-scoring single off Caleb Smith (1-1) that was initially ruled a foul ball when Hummel missed a sliding catch. After a long replay review, the ball was deemed fair, allowing Yermin Mer-

cedes to score. An end to their losing streak in sight, the Giants watched the win blow away in the desert air after Rojas' bunt with two strikes and Varsho's homer on a 102 mph fastball. San Francisco has lost 12 of 15.

"If you're going to point the finger, point it at me," Leone said.



# The philosophy of good defense

**NORTH ♦** Q 10 **♦**953 WEST **EAST** ♦ Q 10 7 4 ♦ A K J 8 2 **♣**K 9 7 6 **SOUTH ♣**QJ42 The bidding:

East dealer.

Both sides vulnerable.

South Dble Opening lead — king of diamonds. Good defense is not difficult if

you keep the ultimate objective — defeat of the contract — firmly in mind. Most defensive errors are usually due to a failure to view the play of the hand as a whole. Assume you're East, defending against four hearts, and partner leads the king of diamonds. When

dummy appears, you should feel there's a reasonable chance to defeat the contract. This is because the dummy, aside from its trumps, does not pose much of a threat. You signal with the seven of diamonds, asking West to continue the

suit in hopes of snatching three quick diamond tricks. But declarer ruffs the next diamond lead, and you must now reconsider how you side is going to collect the four tricks needed to set the contract.

At trick three, South leads trump to the ten and returns a club from dummy. If you follow the general rule of second-hand low, you will later regret it. South plays the queen of clubs and West the ace but the battle is just about over Declarer soon leads another club from dummy. You win the king and return a spade, but South rises with the ace and discards dummy queen of spades on the jack of clubs to make the contract.

Note, however, that if you go up with the king on the first club lead from dummy and return a spade South goes down one. Moreover that's the play you'd make if you had been thinking along the proper lines when the first club was led.

After declarer trumps the dia mond at trick two, it is clear tha your side must score three tricks in the black suits to stop the contract If South has the A-Q of clubs, your king is dead no matter what you do so rising with the king can do you no harm. But if West has specifically the club ace and spade king going up with the king and return ing a spade is the only way to defea the contract.

Today's Highlight in **History:** 

**On July 7, 1976**, the United States Military Academy at West Point included female cadets for the first time as 119 women joined the Class of 1980.

On this date:

In 1846, U.S. annexation of California was proclaimed at Monterey (mahn-tuh-RAY') after the surrender of a Mexican garrison.

**In 1865,** four peo-

ple were hanged in Washington, D.C. for conspiring with John Wilkes Booth to assassinate President Abraham Lincoln: Lewis Powell (aka Lewis Payne), David Herold, George Atzerodt and Mary Surratt, the first woman to be executed by the federal government.

In 1898, the United States annexed Hawaii.

In 1930, construction began on Boulder Dam (later Hoover Dam).

In 1946, Jimmy Carter, 21, married Rosalynn (ROH'-zuh-lihn) Smith, 18, in Plains, Georgia.

**In 1948,** six female U.S. Navy reservists became the first women to be sworn in to the regular Navy.

In 1981, President Ronald Reagan announced he was nom-

inating Arizona Judge

Sandra Day O'Connor

to become the first female justice on the U.S. Supreme Court.

In 1990, the first "Three Tenors" concert took place as opera stars Luciano Pavarotti, Placido Domingo and Jose Carreras performed amid the brick ruins of Rome's Baths of Caracalla on the eve of the World Cup championship.

In 2005, terrorist bombings in three Underground stations and a double-decker bus killed 52 victims and four bombers in the worst attack on London since World War II.

In 2010, Los Angeles police charged Lonnie Franklin Jr. in the city's "Grim Sleeper" serial killings. (Franklin, who was sentenced to death for the killings of nine women and a teenage girl, died in prison in March 2020 at the age of 67.)

In 2013, Andy Murray became the first British man in 77 years to win the Wimbledon title, beating Novak Djokovic 6-4, 7-5, 6-4 in the final.

In 2016, Micah Johnson, a Black Army veteran who served in Afghanistan, opened fire on Dallas police, killing five officers in an act of vengeance for the fatal police shootings of Black men; the attack ended with Johnson being killed by a bomb delivered by a police robot.

Ten years ago: Jubilant Libyans chose a new parliament in their first nationwide vote in decades. The Obama administration declared

Afghanistan the United

States' newest "ma-

jor non-NATO ally." Serena Williams beat Agnieszka Radwanska (ahg-nee-ESH'-kuh rahd-VAHN'-skuh) of Poland 6-1, 5-7, 6-2 to win a fifth Wimbledon singles championship; about five hours later, she and sister Venus were back on Centre Court to win the doubles final.

Five years ago: Islamic militants attacked a remote Egyptian army outpost in the Sinai Peninsula with a suicide car bomb and heavy machine gun fire, killing at least 23 soldiers in the deadliest attack in the turbulent region in two years. A federal appeals court dismissed Hawaii's attempt to challenge Trump administration rules for a travel ban on citizens from six majority-Muslim countries, saying it didn't have jurisdiction to address the issue.

One year ago: A squad of gunmen assassinated Haitian President Jovenel Moïse and wounded his wife in an overnight raid on their home. (More than 40 suspects have been arrested, including at least 18 Colombian soldiers and 20 Haitian police officers.) Former President Donald Trump sued Facebook, Twitter and Google's YouTube, claiming that he and other conservatives had been wrongfully censored. A federal judge ruled that the Air Force was mostly responsible for a former serviceman killing more than two dozen people at a Texas church in 2017 because it failed to submit his criminal history into a database, which should have prevented

him from purchasing

firearms. The Tampa Bay Lightning won the Stanley Cup for the second consecutive season, beating the Montreal Canadiens 1-0 to wrap up the series four games to one.




