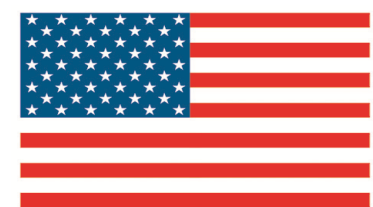
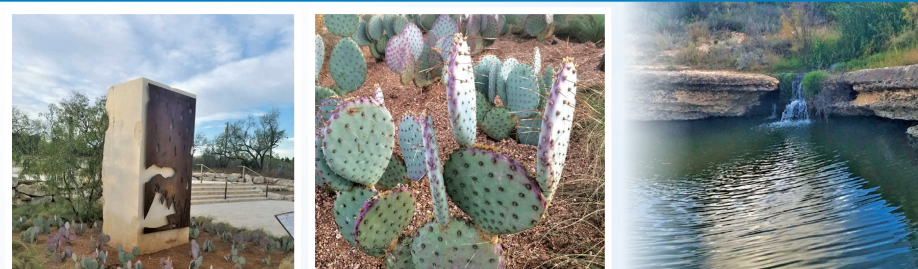

Mayor requests ideas from public for stray dog control

Mayor Robert Moore and the city of Big Spring are looking for some creative suggestions about how to deal with the city's stray dog problem. Moore spoke on the issues for about 15 minutes Monday evening, noting that, while the city has operated under a "no kill" policy, limitations on space and increasing numbers of strays may necessitate changing that policy, unless a new solution can be found.

"I need...the city needs...your advice, your expertise, and your thoughts and input about a matter of real concern to our community," the mayor said. "It's no secret that we're here because of the dog population and what, within reason, can and should be done about it."

The mayor started his address by stating the problem.

"The city operates a shelter for cats and dogs. Some are held only tempo-

rarily and returned to owners, or adopted or transferred to other organizations with a goal of adoption. Some are not. The capacity of the shelter to house dogs is generally limited to 39 dogs. So when the shelter's full, the city has no additional capacity and then is unable to pick up stray unwanted dogs roaming, and in some instances, threatening the community," the mayor said. "We now routinely have more dogs coming into the shelter than we have dogs leaving."

The mayor said at one time, the city's policy was to euthanize dogs who had been housed in the shelter for some time without being claimed.

"Some years ago, the city adopted a 'no kill' policy whereby dogs that are not adopted or transferred simply remain in the shelter. If full, no other dogs can be picked up, so something must be done," he said. "As things are presently, we cannot reasonably continue to operate as a no-kill facility."

County hires outside audit firm

Commissioner Eddilisa Ray motioned to table the item as she was not clear on the matter and would like more time to review. Pct 3 Commissioner Jimmie Long seconded the motion, leading the item to be tabled for future discussion.

The second item presented by County Judge Wiseman was the presentation and acceptance of the County Officials' monthly reports. The reports were approved by the commissioners court with the exception of Pct. 1 Place 2 Justice of the Peace Mike Averette. Per Howard County Auditor Jackie Olson, there were some issues regarding Judge Averette's report which could not be resolved before the meeting, due to him being out of the office this week. Judge Averette's report will be presented at the next commissioners court meeting.

Following Judge Wiseman's items, Howard County Treasurer Sharon Adams presented the court with personnel considerations which were approved by

the commissioners unanimously. Adams had no other items of business for consideration.

Howard County Auditor Jackie Olson presented the commissioners court next with several items for consideration including: the approval of invoices, purchase requests, and budget amendments; the appointment of a tax assessor-collector to calculate no-new revenue and voter approval tax rates; authorization to seek bids for an electronic door control system for jail security; GovDeals Auction for county surplus items; and appointment of outside audit firm Roberts and McGee of Abilene. Roberts and McGee has handled Howard County's outside audit duties for the past three years. All items presented by Olson were again approved unanimously by the court.

Following Olson, Pct. 4 Commissioner John Cline presented the next item to

BSISD to mull policy updates Thursday

Policy updates are on the Big Spring ISD School Board agenda for Thursday evening. The school board will meet at 5:15 p.m. Thursday in the Board Room located at Big Spring High School, 707 E. 11th Place.

In the Action Items portion of the agenda, several policy updates are listed for review, including: CPC (LOCAL) regarding Office Management - Records Management; DMA (LOCAL) regarding Professional Development - Required Staff Development; EHAA (LOCAL) regarding Basic Instructional Program - Required Instruction (All Levels); EHBB (LOCAL) regarding Special Programs - Gifted and Talented Students; EIF (LOCAL) regarding Academic Achievement - Graduation; FFBA (LOCAL) regarding Crisis Intervention - Trauma-Informed Care; and FFH (LOCAL) regarding Student Welfare - Freedom From Discrimination, Harrassment and Retaliation.

The board will also consider changes to local policies including DNA (LOCAL) on Performance Appraisal - Evaluation of Teachers; and EIC (LOCAL) on Academic Achievement - Class Rank-

ing.

At the start of the meeting following the opening prayer and Pledge of Allegiance, the board will hear public comments and offer special recognitions.

The board will next consider approval of the meeting's Consent Agenda, including minutes of the June 9 school board meeting, and financial reports.

The policy review and change items are next on the agenda, followed by consideration of the Hiring Schedule for 2022-23.

Next, the board will consider an item regarding "Chapter 49." Chapter 49 is a chap-

ter in the Education Code regarding school districts whose local revenue exceeds entitlement and must therefore reduce local revenue to acceptable levels by choosing one of five options: consolidating with another district; detaching territory from the district; purchasing average daily attendance credits; arranging to educate nonresident students; or consolidating tax bases with another district. At the Big Spring ISD board meeting last month, staff indicated that the purchase of attendance credits is probably the best option for

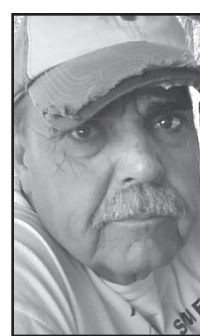

The mayor said that no actual plans have been made to change the shelter's policy or to begin terminating dogs.

"But something must be done," he said. "Changes must be made if we are to continue that policy. We cannot continue taking in more dogs than we are releasing. At the same time, we must have space available to take in dogs that are unwarranted, roaming, and a potential danger to the community."

The mayor said the city needs to look at the root causes of the problem.

"Aside from breeding, the dogs themselves haven't created the problem," he said. "They have had the help of irresponsible, selfish people who abandoned them without providing for their needs or were unable to further care for them and relinquished them to others for care. That's the first area we need to focus on. How did we get here, and what can we do to avoid having a population of unwanted dogs in the first place?"

The mayor said that, while the city can pass ordinances regulating dog ownership and punishing irresponsible dog owners, such measures won't ultimately solve the problem.

The city needs to take action on the problem soon, he said.

"This evening is not going to be just the first of a long series of meetings, committees, studies, etc. We are going to develop a plan," he said. "I am assuming each of you individually, and as a representative of your organization have some ideas, some suggestions, and some recommendations. You may have ideas about what you think the city should be doing, or something we should be doing better, or what others should or could do."

Mayor Moore warned that he's not asking for bashing of those whom local citizens feel are responsible for the problem.

"This is not an invitation to see how many ways you might want to lay out all the blame on the city or its policies or its personnel," he said. "We are certainly open to listening and considering constructive observations and recommendations."

The mayor asked local citizens and organizations to brainstorm ideas on how to solve the problem.

"So here's what I'm asking of you: Prepare for us a list of where you think the problems lay, a list of barriers you think need to be removed or relaxed, and what measures you believe would ease the demands on the city's shelter, and what policies might be implemented that would promote a system where we are able to release, by whatever means other than euthanasia, more dogs than we

are taking in thus allowing the shelter room for the city to take in dogs as deemed necessary."

Moore said City Manager Todd Darden's Administrative Assistant Lesa Gamble, who works at City Hall, will be responsible for collecting lists submitted by members of the public or local organizations, adding that the city will collect such lists through July 22.

"I would request that between now and Friday, July 22, you submit in writing your thoughts and recommendations on both the general causes of the overpopulation of dogs, and how the city and various agencies can and should respond," he said. "We will take these responses, recommendations and suggestions, review them, and determine a course and plan of action."

No questions were taken during the brief meeting, except one asking the mayor to repeat Gamble's name and how to contact her.

the court for consideration: a proposal to return property to the Howard County Rodeo Board. Per Commissioner Cline, the rodeo board had given the county two acres of land during in the 1950s. The house that had been built there has been gone for some years now. The two acres are located near the rodeo bowl. The Commissioners court voted unanimously to approve the returning of that land to the Howard County Rodeo Board.

Howard County Road and Bridge Engineer Brian Klinksiek presented the next item for consideration to the commissioners. Klinksiek presented the court for approval to abandon the county's right of way (ROW) interest in Refinery Road and return it to Delek. Klinksiek stated that the county originally built the main road into the refinery, and since then it has become Delek's

main entrance and is behind a gate now controlled by Homeland Security. Klinksiek advised that they have been working with Delek regarding the return of this easement for several years, and added that if approved, this would be the first time that the county has abandoned something that they truly have a ROW easement file in the County Clerk's office. The Commissioners Court again voted unanimously to approve to abandon its interest of the right of way easement on Refinery Road.

Klinksiek also provided the court with his roadway maintenance update. during which he stated that the widening of Longshore Road will begin this week. Klinksiek added that one side of the roadway will be widened based on material they have on hand and that the portion of Longshore Rd that will be widened will be from Ranch Road 33 to Wildfire Rd.

Following Klinksiek's update, the commissioners court adjourned with Pct. 3 Commissioner Long making the motion and followed by Pct. 4 Commissioner Cline's second motion.

Seager HR, Smith inside-park shot send Rangers past A's 10-8

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Corey Seager's first four-game homer streak comes with the realization that the slugging Texas shortstop might never match what diminutive teammate Josh Smith did an inning later.

Seager connected on his 20th homer leading off the fifth before the rookie Smith got his first home run in the big leagues on an inside-the-park shot as the Rangers held on to beat the Oakland Athletics 10-8 Monday night.

Smith's one-out liner in the sixth skipped past sliding center fielder Ramón Laureano and rolled to the warning track. The speedy leadoff hitter slid head-first across the plate easily ahead of the throw, pausing on his belly briefly before getting up and smiling.

"I honestly never expected that to happen. I think that's like my first one ever, inside the park," said Smith, the 5-foot-10 third baseman who is closing in on his 25th birthday. "It almost doesn't even feel like a homer. Try to get one out of here soon."

Seager, the \$325 million offseason addition, has been getting plenty of the over-the-fence variety. As for circling the bases without that, well, "Probably never," Seager said.

The A's cut an eight-run deficit to two in the eighth and had the potential go-ahead run at the plate in the ninth.

Laureano hit a two-run homer and Chad Pinder connected on a three-run shot off Kolby Allard, who was called up from Triple-A earlier in the day.

Tony Kemp stopped an 0-for-21 skid with a double off Garrett Richards. Sheldon Neuse, who homered against his hometown team for the first time with a solo shot in the fifth, had an RBI groundout before Dennis Santana got Vimal Manchín on a groundout.

"To have an opportunity to win that game from where we were, I've said it for most of the season, that this team shows that fight to get into games," manager Mark Kotsay said. "Probably one of the best offensive innings of the season."

Brett Martin struck out two in the ninth and has his first three career saves in his past three outings. The left-hander's streak of consecutive batters retired ended at 12 with Nick Allen's two-out single before Elvis Andrus walked and Pinder struck out.

The first of Smith's three RBIs came on a sacrifice fly popup caught by Andrus, the former Texas shortstop who stumbled over third baseman Manchín in foul territory as Kole Calhoun raced home for a 5-1 Texas lead in the fourth.

Leody Taveras had three hits and three RBIs for the Rangers, both career highs.

Spencer Howard's defensive gem qualified the right-hander for his second big league win. Facing the potential tying run with two outs in the fifth, the 25-year-old dashed off the mound toward third, grabbed Sean Murphy's slow bouncer with his bare hand and threw him out.

Howard (1-1) allowed one earned run in five innings.

The Rangers scored their first two runs on a balk and a wild pitch by rookie Adrián Martínez (2-2). The 25-year-old right-hander allowed six runs — four earned — in 4 1/3 innings with four walks and two wild pitches in his fourth career start.

"Tough outing for Adrian, command issues," Kotsay said. "Game sped up on him there in the second inning. Kind of showed his youthfulness."

ABOUT THOSE TEXAS HOMERS

Seager's four-game homer streak ties Boston's Rafael Devers and Patrick Wisdom of the Chicago Cubs for the longest in the majors this season. ... Smith was the second player since the start of 2017 with an inside-the-park homer for the first of his career. Zach McKinstry did it with the Los Angeles Dodgers against Colorado last season. Smith is the fourth Texas player with an inside-the-park homer as his first.

ROOM TEMPERATURE IS 75

The temperature was 75 degrees instead of the normal 72 inside Globe Life Field after officials in charge of the electric grid in Texas asked residents to conserve energy during the hottest part of the day. Alonso, Pujols, Acuña, Soto in for Home Run Derby

ATLANTA (AP) — Mets slugger Pete Alonso will try to become the first player to win the All-Star Home Run Derby three consecutive times against a field that will include the Cardinals' Albert Pujols, Phillies slugger Kyle Schwarber, the Braves' Ronald Acuña Jr. and Washington's Juan Soto.

The New York first baseman said Monday he is one of nine participants in the July 18 competition at Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles.

"It's a really fun event, and it's going to be super exciting," Alonso said before the Mets played at Atlanta on Monday night. "I have a really good plan to go into it and, again, I have just so much fun. I don't think anyone has more fun than I do, especially when it comes to this event."

Alonso is now a Washington Nationals special assistant, will pitch to Alonso for the second straight Derby.

"Just need to give him about two pots of coffee for before and a case of Bud Lite for after, and he said he's good to go," Alonso said.

Alonso hit 74 total home runs in last year's Derby at Denver's Coors Field and beat Baltimore's Trey Mancini 23-22 in the final round. Alonso joined Ken Griffey Jr. (1998-99) and Yoenis Céspedes (2013-14) in winning consecutive titles. Griffey also won in 1994 and is the only three-time champion.

Pujols will participate in his fifth Derby after

coming up short in 2003, 2007, 2009 and 2015. He and Detroit's Miguel Cabrera were added to the All-Star rosters as special selections by Commissioner Rob Manfred.

Pujols will make his 11th All-Star appearance and participate in the Derby at one of his former homes. He played 85 games with the Dodgers last season after being cut by the Los Angeles Angels, then signed with St. Louis before this season, which he has said will be his last.

The 42-year-old Pujols has five homers this season and 684 in his career, fifth on the career list.

"It's an honor to be back in the All-Star Game and to have a chance to be part of the Home Run Derby, that's something I enjoy a lot and my kids will have a blast," Pujols said Monday night. "Hopefully, I can put on a good show for them, because at the end of the day, it's not about us, it's about putting a good show for the fans."

Schwarber posted a home run highlight reel on his Instagram page on Tuesday and the Phillies later confirmed their lone All-Star representative would participate in the Derby. Schwarber has 28 home runs in his first season with the Phillies.

Acuña, the Atlanta star who will be a starting outfielder for the National League, will compete in his second Home Run Derby. Acuña was eliminated by Alonso in 2019, when he set a career high with 41

homers.

Acuña will compete in the Derby even though he is not one of seven Atlanta players with 10 or more homers.

Acuña is hitting .274 with eight homers. He missed 19 games at the start of the season as he continued his recovery from reconstructive surgery on his right knee.

Acuña was the NL's leader in All-Star voting.

Soto will be in the Derby for the second straight year. He hit the longest home run in last year's competition at 520 feet — the longest Derby drive in the Statcast era.

He beat Shohei Ohtani 31-28 after two tiebreakers in the first round, then lost to Alonso 16-15 in the second round.

Soto is hitting .243 with 17 home runs this season.

Joey Gallo, Matt Olson, Salvador Pérez and Trevor Story also competed last year.

There was no Derby in 2020, when the All-Star Game scheduled for Dodger Stadium was canceled due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Alonso won the 2019 Derby at Cleveland as a rookie when he defeated Vladimir Guerrero Jr. in the final round, also by 23-22. Guerrero, whose father won the event in 2007, hit 91 total homers but tired in the final round.

Today in History

Today in History: July 13, George Zimmerman acquitted

Today is Wednesday, July 13, the 194th day of 2022. There are 171 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 13, 2013, a jury in Sanford, Florida, cleared neighborhood watch volunteer George Zimmerman of all charges in the shooting of Trayvon Martin, the Black teenager whose killing unleashed furious debate over racial profiling, self-defense and equal justice.

On this date:
In 1863, deadly rioting against the Civil War military draft erupted in New York City. (The insurrection was put down three days later.)

In 1923, a sign consisting of 50-foot-tall letters spelling out "HOLLYWOODLAND" was dedicated in the Hollywood Hills to promote a subdivision (the last four letters were removed in 1949).

In 1960, John F. Kennedy won the Democratic presidential nomination on the first ballot at his party's convention in Los Angeles.

In 1965, President Lyndon B. Johnson nominated Thurgood Marshall to be U.S. Solicitor General; Marshall became the first Black jurist appointed to the post. (Two years later, Johnson nominated Marshall to the U.S. Supreme Court.)

In 1973, former presidential aide Alexander P. Butterfield revealed to Senate Watergate Committee staff members the existence of President Richard Nixon's secret White House taping system. (Butterfield's public revelation came three days later.)

In 1974, the Senate Watergate Committee proposed sweeping reforms in an effort to prevent another Watergate scandal.

In 1985, "Live Aid," an international rock concert in London, Philadelphia, Moscow and Sydney, took place to raise money for Africa's starving people.

In 1999, Angel Maturino Resendiz (ahn-HEHL' mah-tyoo-REE'-noh reh-SEHN'-deez), suspected of being the "Railroad Killer," surrendered in El Paso, Texas. (Resendiz was executed in 2006.)

In 2006, Israel imposed a naval blockade against Lebanon and blasted the Beirut airport and army air bases; Hezbollah fired dozens of rockets into Israel.

In 2011, California became the first state in the nation to add lessons about gays and lesbians to social studies classes in public schools under a measure signed by Gov. Jerry Brown.

In 2016, Theresa May entered No. 10 Downing Street as Britain's new prime minister following a bittersweet exit by David Cameron, who resigned after voters rejected his appeal to stay in the European Union.

In 2020, Washington's NFL franchise dropped the "Redskins" name and Indian head logo amid pressure from sponsors; the move followed decades of criticism that the name and logo were offensive to Native Americans. (As new names were considered, the team

would be known as the Washington Football Team; the team was eventually renamed the Commanders.)

Ten years ago: His credibility under attack, Republican presidential hopeful Mitt Romney insisted he had "no role whatsoever in the management" of Bain Capital, a private equity firm, after early 1999, and demanded that President Barack Obama apologize for campaign aides who persisted in alleging otherwise. Movie producer Richard Zanuck, 77, died in Beverly Hills, California.

Five years ago: A federal judge in Hawaii weakened President Donald Trump's travel ban by vastly expanding the list of U.S. family relationships that visitors from six Muslim-majority countries could use to get into the country. Trump defended his son's meeting with a Russian lawyer during the presidential campaign, characterizing it as standard campaign practice. China's most prominent political prisoner, Nobel Peace Prize winner and human rights campaigner Liu Xiaobo (lee-OO' show-BOH') died in prison of liver cancer at the age of 61.

One year ago: The government reported that prices paid by U.S. consumers in June had posted the sharpest 12-month spike in 13 years, as a swift rebound in spending ran up against widespread supply shortages. Los Angeles Angels pitching and hitting star Shohei Ohtani unleashed his 100 mph heat while pitching a perfect inning for the win as the American League beat the National League 5-2 for its eighth straight

victory in the All-Star Game; Ohtani went 0-for-2 at the plate.

"The Crown" tied with "The Mandalorian" for the most Emmy nominations, 24 each, but the Marvel universe also got bragging rights with runner-up "WandaVision"; the nominations reinforced the rapid rise of streaming, as the top-nominated scripted shows were on services that had largely emerged in the preceding two years.

Opening lead — jack of spades.
It has been said that bridge has all the excitement of war, with only 10 percent of the danger. But in some hands, even the 10 percent can be reduced to zero, as witness this deal played in four hearts.

East won the spade lead with the ace and returned a spade to South's king. Declarer drew two rounds of trump ending in his hand and then led a low diamond to the jack. East took the queen and returned a spade, ruffed by South.

Declarer now cashed the A-K of diamonds, hoping the suit would divide 3-3, in which case he would discard a club from dummy on his fourth diamond. But when the diamonds failed to break evenly and East later turned up with the ace of clubs, South had to go down one.

Certainly South was unlucky. He would have made the contract if West had held the queen of diamonds, if the diamonds had divided 3-3, or if West had held the ace of clubs. Nevertheless, declarer should have made the contract despite his bad luck.

He should have started by drawing trump ending in dummy, ruffed dummy's last spade and then led a low diamond to dummy's eight. East would win with the ten but would be endplayed. Whatever he returned — whether a diamond, a club or a spade (if he had one) — would cost his side a trick, as well as the contract.

Nor could West alter the outcome by putting up the nine on the first diamond lead toward dummy. Declarer would simply cover the nine with the jack, and East would again find himself endplayed.

Indeed, regardless of the actual lie of the opposing cards, the deep diamond finesse reduces declarer's chance of losing the contract to zero.

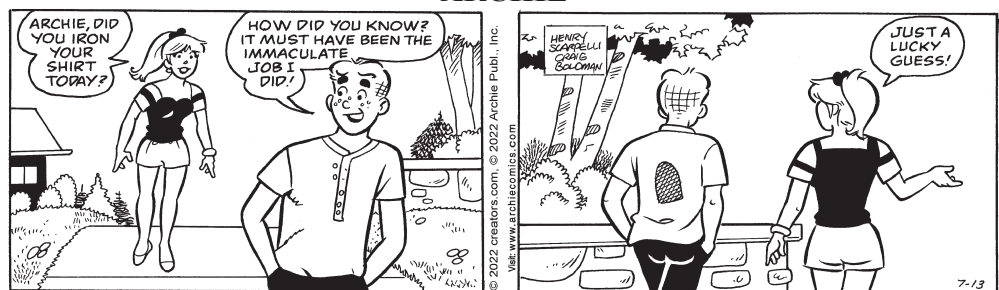

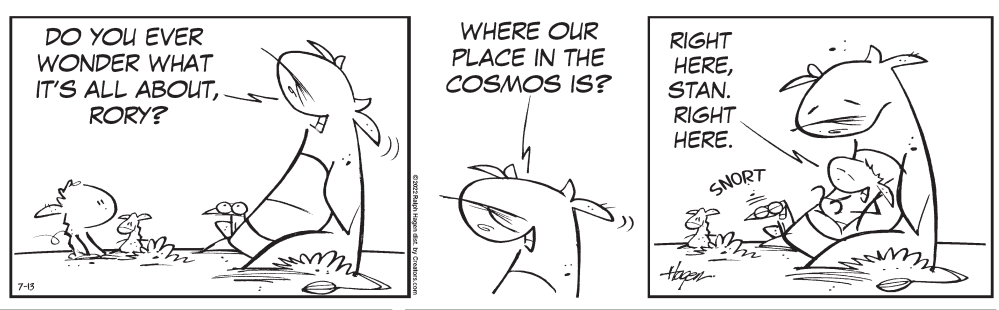
