## 118th District Court indicts 20 on felony charges

This past week, the 118th District Court Grand Jury returned indictments on 20 individuals for felonies including aggravated sexual assault of a child and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

The community is invited to help honor Big Spring Fire Department's Austin Childers; Big Spring Police Department's Samuel Mpagi; and Howard County Sheriff's Office's Mark Daily. "Choosing to serve your country takes sacrifice, but for those who come home and choose to continue to serve their community as a first responder is to

continue to live a life of service," Veteran and Quilt of Valor Presenter Mike Tarpley said. "This ceremony is meant to honor them for their acts of service and let them know that service is appreciated." The short ceremony is open to the community and will be opened up with the presentation of colors followed by the National Anthem sung by Nichole Negron. Before the veterans are presented with their quilt, Howard County Judge Kathryn Wiseman and City Manager Todd Darden will share a few words about the honorees. Each honoree will

"Anytime you research a subject, it takes time. The labels and research took the longest as I wanted to make sure the information was correct," she said.

According to Schrecengost, there are more than 50 various images depicting what things looked like years ago compared to present day.

"I chose images from the museums collection then I took photos of what it looks like today," she said. "These

pictures really do tell a story and provide a historical account."

Following the "Then and Now" exhibit will be the Caboose Watercolor Show. In addition to the temporary exhibit, which are rotated through on the lower level of the museum in the main lobby, there are permanent exhibits that help share the historical foundation of Howard County.

A new exhibit is in the works and will tell the history of saloons in the area.

"By 1884, Big Spring was home to thirteen saloons. They added a touch

of entertainment to a few weary railroad workers, cowboys, and travelers that would stop in Big Spring as they made their way further west. All headed to the nearest salon for whiskey, gambling, a little fighting, and some disagreeing that could sometimes end deadly," she said. "The new exhibit will highlight some of that history."

## Vin Scully, Dodgers broadcaster for 67 years, dies at 94

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Hall of Fame broadcaster Vin Scully, whose dulcet tones provided the soundtrack of summer while entertaining and informing Dodgers fans in Brooklyn and Los Angeles for 67 years, died Tuesday night. He was 94.

Scully died at his home in the Hidden Hills neighborhood of Los Angeles, the team announced after being informed by family members. No cause of death was provided.

"He was the best there ever was," pitcher Clayton Kershaw said after the Dodgers' game in San Francisco. "Just such a special man. I'm

grateful and thankful I got to know him as well as I did."

As the longest tenured broadcaster with a single team in pro sports history, Scully saw it all and called it all. He began in the 1950s era of Pee Wee Reese and Jackie Robinson, on to the 1960s with Don Drysdale and Sandy Koufax, into the 1970s with Steve Garvey and Don Sutton, and through the 1980s with Orel Hershiser and Fernando Valenzuela. In the 1990s, it was Mike Piazza and Hideo Nomo, followed by Kershaw, Manny Ramirez and Yasiel Puig in the 21st century.

"You gave me my Wild Horse name. You gave me love. You hugged me

like a father," tweeted Puig, the talented Cuban-born outfielder who burned brightly upon his Dodgers debut in 2013. "I will never forget you, my heart is broken."

The Dodgers changed players, managers, executives, owners - and even coasts - but Scully and his soothing, insightful style remained a constant for the fans.

He opened broadcasts with the familiar greeting, "Hi, everybody, and a very pleasant good evening to you wherever you may be."

Ever gracious both in person and on the air, Scully considered himself merely a conduit between the game and the fans.

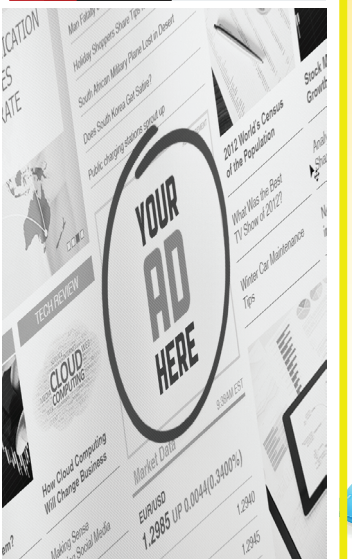

# Contract Bridge

## Deceptive defensive play

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

**NORTH**  
♠ J 10 9 3

The bidding:  
South West North East

Opening lead — three of diamonds.

One of the prerequisites of good defensive play is the ability to put yourself in declarer's seat and try to predict how he is likely to play the hand. East did that in today's deal and wound up defeating what seemed to be an ironclad contract.

East won the first two diamond tricks but was not optimistic about his side's prospects of taking two more tricks. Though he could count on eventually scoring a trick with the king of hearts, the king of spades appeared likely to fall prey to a finesse. East concluded that his only chance lay in trying to talk declarer out of the winning line of play. So at trick three, he shifted to the eight of hearts!

This extraordinary play had the desired effect on declarer. The heart return had all the earmarks of a singleton. This made the spade finesse a risky proposition, since West might win with the king and give East a heart ruff. By the same token, with the king of hearts "marked" in West's hand (and thus subject to a subsequent finesse), there was no reason to risk the spade finesse.

So, after winning the heart with the queen, declarer played the ace and another spade. East won and led a club to dummy's king. South then crossed to his hand with a trump to take the heart finesse and was flabbergasted when East produced the king to set the contract.

Of course, had East adopted a more normal line of defense, declarer undoubtedly would have tried both the spade and heart finesses and finished with 10 tricks.

Perhaps South should have smelled a rat anyway. The method of play he chose was designed to guard against West's holding both the king of hearts and king of spades, which was highly unlikely on the bidding. But if East had not planted the fear of a heart ruff in declarer's mind, South could not have gone astray.

## Today in History

Today in History: Aug. 4, Anne Frank and family arrested

Today is Thursday, Aug. 4, the 216th day of 2022. There are 149 days left in the year.

### Today's Highlight in History

On Aug. 4, 1944, 15-year-old diarist Anne Frank was arrested with her sister, parents and four others by the Gestapo after hiding for two years inside a building in Amsterdam. (Anne and her sister, Margot, died at the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp.)

On this date:

In 1790, the U.S. Coast Guard had its beginnings as President George Washington signed a measure authorizing a group of revenue cutters to enforce tariff and trade laws and prevent smuggling.

In 1830, plans for the city of Chicago were laid out.

In 1916, the United States reached agreement with Denmark to purchase the Danish Virgin Islands for \$25 million.

In 1936, Jesse Owens won the second of his four gold medals at the Berlin Olympics as he prevailed in the long jump over German Luz Long, who was the first to congratulate him.

In 1964, the bodies of missing civil rights workers Michael Schwerner, Andrew Goodman and James Chaney were found buried in an earthen dam in Mississippi.

In 1972, Arthur Bremer was convicted and sentenced in Upper Marlboro, Maryland, to 63 years in prison for his attempt on the life of Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace (the sentence was later reduced to 53 years; Bremer was released from prison in 2007).

In 1977, President Jimmy Carter signed a measure establishing the Department of Energy.

In 1987, the Federal Communications Commission voted 4-0 to abolish the Fairness Doctrine, which required radio and television stations to present balanced coverage of controversial issues.

In 1993, a federal judge sentenced Los Angeles police officers Stacey Koon and Laurence Powell to 2 1/2 years in prison for violating Rodney King's civil rights.

In 2009, North Korean leader Kim Jong Il pardoned American journalists Laura Ling and Euna Lee for entering the country illegally and ordered their release during a surprise visit by former U.S. President Bill Clinton.

In 2019, a masked gunman fired on revelers enjoying summer nightlife in a popular entertainment district of Dayton, Ohio, leaving nine people dead and 27 wounded; police said officers shot and killed the shooter within 30 seconds of the start of his rampage.

In 2020, nearly 3,000 tons of ammonium nitrate that had been improperly stored for years in the port of Beirut, Lebanon, exploded,

killing more than 200 people, injuring more than 6,000 and devastating nearby neighborhoods; it was one of the largest non-nuclear explosions ever recorded.

Ten years ago: Michael Phelps won the 18th Olympic gold medal of his career as the United States won the medley relay at the London Games. The United States set a world record to win the women's medley relay. Serena Williams beat Maria Sharapova 6-0, 6-1 to join Steffi Graf as the only women to complete the Golden Slam, winning the Olympics and the four majors. Three British athletes won gold medals in Olympic Stadium: Jessica Ennis in heptathlon; Greg Rutherford in men's long jump; and Mo Farah in the men's 10,000 meters.

Five years ago: Former pharmaceutical CEO Martin Shkreli, who became notorious for a price-gouging scandal, was convicted on federal charges that he deceived investors in a pair of failed hedge funds. (Shkreli was sentenced months later to seven years in prison.) The unemployment rate ticked down to 4.3 percent, matching the 16-year low that had been recorded in May, as employers added 209,000 jobs.

One year ago: Sydney McLaughlin smashed the world record and Dalilah Muhammad broke it as well in an American 1-2 finish in the women's 400 hurdles at the Tokyo Olympics. Andre De Grasse of Canada won the Olympic gold medal in the 200-meter race

five years after finishing second to Usain Bolt in Rio; De Grasse won in a national record time of 19.62 seconds. Belarusian Olympic sprinter Krystsina Tsimanouskaya, who feared for her safety at home after criticizing her coaches on social media, flew into Warsaw on a humanitarian visa after leaving the Tokyo Olympics.

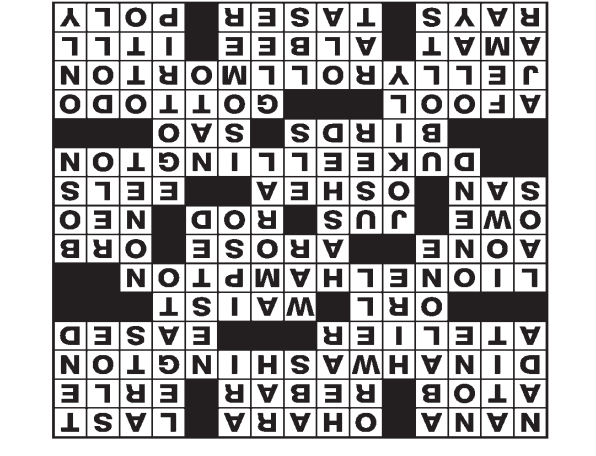


## SUDOKU
