

BSISD sets date for Voter-Approval election on tax rate

The Big Spring Independent School District Board of Trustees held a brief special meeting Monday night. The trustees voted to call a voter-approval tax rate election to ratify an adopted tax rate that exceeds the District's voter-approval tax rate.

The rate exceeded the voter-approval tax rate limit by three cents per \$100 valuation.

The school board discussed the option of limiting the district's property tax to the voter-approval tax rate by lowering it by three cents, but because since the three cents will generate approximately \$1.3 million for the district, the board voted to approve the higher tax.

"It may seem like the tax rate is going up, but it isn't," said Superintendent Jay McWilliams, and added that it isn't a tax rate hike and will actually provide added revenue that, "The state can't touch."

McWilliams reminded the group that taxes have steadily decreased over the past five years.

BSISD Chief Financial Officer Susan Bryan explained that the Texas Education Agency determined that the base starting rate the district uses to calculate its tax rate is \$0.8046 cents per \$100. Above that amount, the district is allowed by state funding rules to spend "Golden Pennies," each of which increases the tax rate by one cent per \$100. Revenue earned through the Golden Pennies is not subject to recapture by the state, and is available for use by the district.

"I get to add in five Golden Pennies, recapture free," Bryan said. "That gets us to \$0.8546. Then, we have to add in our I&S tax rate, which is being proposed at \$0.0763, so the Voter Approval Rate that was in the notice, was \$0.9309. But if you look at the top, I'm proposing \$0.9609, which is three pennies more."

Although the district's tax rate will bring in extra revenue for the district, it is lower than the 2021-22 tax rate.

"Basically, that rate of \$0.729, that is, what would it take to generate what we had last year?" McWilliams said. "That's not a fair comparison, because this year, our values went up a billion

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Howard County Commissioners' Court approve proposed tax and budget for 2022-23

On Monday, the Howard County Commissioners Court held a regular meeting in the third floor county courtroom at the Howard County Courthouse. The main topic of the meeting was consideration of approval of the county's proposed tax rate and budget for 2022-23. The meeting began with Howard County Judge Kathryn Wiseman leading the court by reciting both the U.S. and Texas pledges.

After the pledges, the meeting began by allowing members of the public to address the court. Local resident Scott Emerson was the only member of the community present to speak; however Mr. Emerson did not speak on the proposed 2023 budget and tax rates. Instead, Mr. Emerson gave the commissioner's court an update in regard to the Howard County Appraisal District regarding personnel changes and the consideration of possibly changing the name of the Howard County Appraisal District. They were no other members of the community who wished to speak following Mr. Emerson.

After the public comment, the com-

missioners' court then went into its first tion to approve, followed by Precinct 4 public hearing regarding the proposed budget for 2023. There was no address from the public as no one chose to speak.

Following the public hearing, Precinct 3 Commissioner Jimmie Long made the first motion to approve the proposed budget for 2023, with Precinct 2 Commissioner Craig Bailey seconding the motion. The commissioner's court voted unanimously to accept and adopt the proposed budget for 2023.

Following the approval of the proposed budget for 2023, Howard County Judge Kathryn Wiseman stated that this year's budget was a very lengthy process because they (court) had to consider factors such as inflation, the possibility of a recession, and employees being able to pay their bills. This year's budget will raise more revenue from property taxes than last year's budget by an amount of \$1,528,826 - a 7.93% increase from last year's budget. Property tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll this year is \$36,013.

The commissioner's court then discussed and considered the approval of setting salaries and benefits for county officials as reflected in the 2023 budget. Commissioner Bailey made the first moCommissioner John Cline seconding the motion. The commissioners voted unanimously to approve the measure.

The commissioners court then held its second public hearing regarding the proposed tax increase for 2022-2023. There was no public comment again as no one chose to speak to the court. The court then moved to vote to ratify the property tax rate reflected in the 2023 budget and consider setting the tax rate for 2022. Both items were approved unanimously by the commissioners. Following the approval of the tax increase, Howard County Judge Kathryn Wiseman made another comment to the public regarding the tax increase. Judge Wiseman stated that this is effectively an 8.38 percent increase. This will raise more money for maintenance and operations than last year's tax rate. The official rate increase is 9.21 percent. This will raise taxes on a home valued at \$100,000 by approx \$19.48. The court then voted on the approval of an order levying a tax rate. The measure again was approved unanimously by the court.

Judge Wiseman then moved to her



Buxton early exit, Twins fall; Garcia HR, Texas takes 3 of 4

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Twins All-Star center fielder Byron Buxton exited early with hip trouble and the Texas Rangers beat Minnesota 2-1 Monday night as Adolis García homered and Corey Seager singled home the go-ahead run in the sixth inning.

Buxton came out in the seventh with right hip tightness. Although he's listed day-to-day, "it could be more than a day-to-day issue," manager Rocco Baldelli said.

The off-injured Buxton singled and stole a base in his 92nd game of the season. Since making his major league debut in June 2015, only once has he played 100 games in a year.

"Any time something happens to him or he has to come out of the game, it's a tough blow for us, obviously," Twins shortstop Carlos Correa said. "Hopefully he's fine."

After leading the AL Central for much of the season, the Twins have gone 9-10 in August and now trail Cleveland by two games. They scored just six runs in the four-game series against Texas in the midst of a team-wide hitting slump.

"I feel like it just takes one game where everybody just clicks and we go, and it's time for us to do it now," Correa said. "It's very important that we do it now. The preparation is never in question. The work everybody puts in here, I see it, and it's great work. Now, we've just got to go out there and do our job."

García extended his hitting streak to a career-best 19 games as Texas took three of four in the weekend wraparound series. The Rangers are 5-3 since replacing Chris Woodward with interim manager Tony Beasley last week.

The Twins turned their second triple play of the season after first baseman Jose Miranda caught Nathaniel Lowe's line drive in the fourth.

A.J. Alexy (1-0) pitched 2 1/3 scoreless innings in relief of starter Cole Ragans to earn the win. Brett Martin, José Leclerc and Matt Moore blanked the Twins the rest of the way, with Moore earning his third save of the season.

"You feed off guys' energies, especially the bullpen," Alexy said. "You get to watch these guys come out day in and day out and just throw the ball over the plate and do their jobs, so it's exciting to see the other guys performing really well."

Sonny Gray (7-4) gave up two runs on five hits while fanning six. He gave up three singles in the sixth inning, with Seager's hit driving home Brad Miller to give Texas the lead.

RISP REGRETS

Over the first three games of the series, the Twins were 1 for 19 with runners in scoring position, and those struggles continued again on Monday.

In the first inning, Correa hit a one-out triple on a ball that center fielder Leody Tavares lost in the sun. Buxton walked and stole second. But Miranda struck out and Max Kepler grounded out to end the threat.

In the third, Miranda and Kepler again had a chance to put the Twins ahead with two on and one out, but Miranda grounded out and Kepler flied out to keep the game scoreless.

The Twins finally broke through in the fourth inning when Nick Gordon's double drove home Gio Urshela from third for the game's first run. It was their only hit in seven at-bats with runners in scor-

ing position on the night.

"(Hitting is) a really easy thing to do when it's coming in bunches. It feels so easy," Baldelli said. "And when it's not coming in bunches, it feels really hard. In reality, it's probably somewhere there in the middle.

"We gave ourselves opportunities. The runs are there for the taking. It's time to take them."

AMAZING ADOLIS

Texas tied it when García hit the first pitch of the fifth inning deep into the second deck in left-center. The 453-foot drive provided another glimpse of the type of skills the Rangers' second-year right fielder can display.

"Adolis is a dynamic player. That's number one," Beasley said. "When he puts his mind to something and he's focused, he can do some special things on the baseball field, in all aspects. It doesn't surprise me, anything he does."

García said he started that at-bat looking for a sinker down and in, and that's what Gray delivered. But mostly he lets his talent take over.

"I just try to keep it simple mentally, look for pitches in the zone and stay simple," García said through a translator.

Gary Gaines, coach of 'Friday Night Lights' fame, dead at 73

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Gary Gaines, coach of the Texas high school football team made famous in the book and movie "Friday Night Lights," has died. He was 73.

Gaines' family said in a statement the former coach died Monday in Lubbock after a long battle with Alzheimer's disease.

Gaines made many stops in West Texas during a 30-year coaching career, but was best known for a four-year stint leading the highly successful program at Odessa Permian. Gaines returned to Permian later in his career.

His 1988 team was chronicled in Buzz Bissinger's bestselling book, which portrayed a program and school that favored football over academics and attributed racist comments to assistant coaches.

Gaines, who was played by Billy Bob Thornton in the 2004 movie, said he never read the book and felt betrayed by Bissinger after the author spent the entire 1988 season with the team.

The book, which portrayed Gaines as a compassionate coach caught in the win-at-all-costs culture of a high school program in football-crazed Texas, also

was turned into a TV series.

Permian lost in the state semifinals in 1988, a season that included the loss of star running back James "Boobie" Miles to a knee injury during a preseason scrimmage. Miles' character played a prominent role in the movie.

The book described scenes of "for sale" signs being placed in the front yard of Gaines' home. His record from 1986-89 was 47-6-1.

Gaines led Permian to the fifth of the program's six state championships with a perfect season in 1989, then left to become an assistant coach at Texas Tech.

He later coached two of Permian's rivals, Abilene High and San Angelo Central, before returning to college as the coach at Abilene Christian. Another four-year run as Permian's coach started in 2009, and Gaines also was a school district athletic director in Odessa and Lubbock.

"I just can't find the words to pay respects," retired coach Ron King, a former Permian assistant, told the Odessa American. "It's a big loss for the coaching profession. There are a lot of coaches he took under his wing and mentored.'

Pick Six: Critical games dot the schedule as 2022 commences

The college football schedule offers a weekly selection of marquee games between top teams, and some will hit the ground running fast this year.

Two Sept. 3 showdowns could shuffle the preseason AP Top 25 quickly as No. 5 Notre Dame, with new coach Marcus Freeman, visits No. 2 Ohio State, and No. 3 Georgia — the defending national champion — plays No. 11 Oregon in Atlanta.

Reaching across Power Five lines for these matchups seems to have escalated in recent years, but then long-held bitter rivalries take over later in the season as teams grapple for championships and bowl positioning. Here are just six of the tantalizing games on tap this season:

No. 5 NOTRE DAME at No. 2 OHIO STATE, Sept. 3

Freeman's debut against his alma mater will set the tone for both teams, of course, and it will see Heisman Trophy candidate C.J. Stroud under center for the Buckeyes. There will be nine preseason AP All-Americans on the field between the two teams. A bit of added intrigue: High school star edge rusher Keon Keeley could be among the 103,000 or so fans in attendance. Keeley previously committed to the Irish, then decommitted after the coaching change. The Buckeyes and No. 1 Alabama are among the teams vying to bring him into their five-star fold.

No. 11 OREGON vs. No. 3 GEORGIA (Atlanta), Sept. 3

The Bulldogs lost five first-round NFL draft choices from last year's team on defense, but they get QB Stetson Bennett back, potentially adding to his remarkable story as a former walk-on who was the MVP in a national championship game victory. The Bulldogs' tendencies, though, are well known by former defensive coordinator Dan Lanning, who will be making his debut as the Ducks' coach after Mario Cristobal left to take the job at Miami.

No. 13 NORTH CAROLINA STATE at No. 4 **CLEMSON, Oct. 1**

Last year, the Wolfpack ended an eight-game slide against the Tigers by prevailing 27-21 in double overtime. N.C. State held Clemson to just 214 yards, its lowest total of the season, and the loss eventually helped allow Wake Forest to end the Tigers' six-year stranglehold on the ACC's Atlantic Division title. The Wolfpack has 10 defensive starters back, so Clemson has its work cut out. The programs are picked to finish 1-2 in the division, with Clemson first.

No. 6 TEXAS A&M at No. 1 ALABAMA, Oct. 8

This SEC West showdown might as well be called the "Beef Bowl" after the spicy offseason comments over recruiting between Aggies coach Jimbo Fisher and Crimson Tide coach Nick Saban. More important, this could be the deciding game in the division race. The coaches say they've buried the hatchet, but the winner may give it a twist. Texas A&M last won the national championship in 1939; the Crimson Tide has six with Saban alone.

No. 14 USC at No. 7 UTAH, Oct. 15

The Trojans' ranking is likely more a tip of the cap to new coach Lincoln Riley after a 4-8 finish last season. Riley used the transfer portal hoping to rebuild the program quickly, bringing in 24 new players. The Utes are intent on seeing returning QB Cam Rising continue to push their ascent after their first Pac-12 title and Rose Bowl appearance. How quickly Riley's new systems take hold will be huge for USC.

No. 12 OKLAHOMA STATE at No. 9 OKLAHO-**MA**, Nov. 19

The Cowboys return 10 offensive starters, including QB Spencer Sanders, to a team that came within an eyelash of the playoff last season. Defense has always seemed a strength and should remain so with Derek Mason taking over as coordinator for Jim Knowles, who took the same spot at Ohio State. The Sooners had their six-year grip on Big 12 titles end last season thanks to a loss to the Cowboys. They hope former Clemson defensive coordinator Brent Venables can get them back on top behind QB Dillon Gabriel, who passed for more than 8,000 yards and 70 touchdowns at Central Florida.





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
