**THE BASIC PRINCIPLES**

J. C. Penney, the founder of the great chain store system which bears his name, once wrote: "A business is an organization of men by and through which they seek to express their ideals. When I enter a store I invariably size-up the men behind the institutions by the treatment I receive at the hands of the sales people. I have been in stores where the atmosphere in July was as cold as the weather in January. On the other hand, I have been in stores in which the atmosphere was as wholesome as the scent of a rose. It is needless to say in which of these places I carried the longer, and naturally made the larger purchases. The big, lasting, dependable, rapidly growing business is the one whose basic principles are Honor, Confidence, Service and Cooperation."

Mr. Penney wrote that in 1920. In the ensuing years, it seems safe to say, the standards of service, using that word in the broadest sense, in American retailing have become steadily better. There is little room in a modern store for discourteous or indifferent employees, and those who display such qualities are soon replaced. And there is little room, as well, for the owner and operator whose one and only interest is profit. It doesn't take a customer long to recognize arrogance and greediness on the part of either management or the employees...and to take his business elsewhere.

This is one of the results of competition...among the chains, the independents, the specialty stores and all the rest. Competition is the regulator that provides the consumer with the best in service, as well as top value for his retail dollar.

**CREATING POVERTY**

A leaflet published by a union states: "This session of Congress must also increase the amount and broaden the coverage of the FEDERAL MINIMUM WAGE...the most effective means of combating poverty."

This union is entitled to its views and to press for legislation which it wants. But a great many people who have studied the matter, hold grave doubts that increase after increase in the minimum wage, coupled with broadened coverage, is the way to help the poor. In fact, they think it is more likely to have the opposite result.

To begin with, arbitrarily increased wage rates, which are not geared in any way to a worker's value and productivity, cannot help but force commodity prices up and give another boost to inflation. The burden of that must fall on those least able to bear the added burden...pensioners, recipients of welfare, and the great numbers of people who live on modest fixed incomes from one source or another. It is certainly evident that every time prices rise, more poverty is automatically created.

Secondly, these arbitrary wage rates which are not reflected in productivity can severely limit opportunity for employment. The employer is forced to cut marginal employment to the greatest extent he can. This is especially apparent in such service businesses as retailing. And thus the unskilled have less chance to get jobs and gain the experience that will qualify them for higher pay.

Many a plan, well intended for improving the lot of lower-income groups, has boomeranged. That is inevitable when wage rates are pegged by flat and unreasonable levels.

**REPORT FROM CITY HALL**

Every meeting of your City Council will be reported in the newspaper. The Council will be called upon to have special meetings because of the amount of business that comes before it, especially at this time. But, there will be no secret meetings of any kind. We have no secrets, and we have no feelings of animosity toward anyone.

There are some matters, however, that cannot be reported in the newspaper. For instance, the hydrologist's report ordered by the previous City Council, cannot be printed in the newspaper because of its length. It is public information, however, and anyone interested in reading it is encouraged to

do so. It can be seen anytime at the office of the secretary-treasurer at City Hall.

Mr. Reed, the hydrologist, is reported to have said to one member of council that the report "was not good." We do have some serious problems with our underground water supply for which we have no remedial measures as yet...the main one being the sharp and continuing increase in soluble nitrates in our water supply. County health officers have repeatedly warned us about this condition. We are well above the requirements of the State Board of Health in this regard. The concern of the health officer is "nitrate poisoning," to which condition infants and younger persons are easily susceptible. The symptom of this condition is "turning blue," according to health authorities, hence the term "blue babies." This does not mean that babies are born "blue." This is another condition altogether, stemming from a circulatory disorder. The concern is that, with the sharp increase in nitrates, the condition of "nitrate poisoning" will become more prevalent. It has already been evidenced in animals in this area. If we do not heed these warnings about our water, and proceed sensibly and rationally to remedy this condition, we are simply being irresponsible.

Another thing brought out in the report is that our water supply depends solely upon rainfall for source. Our underground water supply is recharged only by rainfall. A hydrologist's report must be supplemented by a long range meteorological report indicating what must be anticipated by way of possible droughts in this area. A sustained drought could put us in critical condition.

A specialist in water problems who has worked closely with Haskell's previous City Council in matters pertaining to the water supply, recently said

### The Good Earth

by MRS. B. F. COBB

The Haskell Garden Club voted to postpone the Spring flower show. Nearly every member lost all their spring blooms to the hail.

Keep a look out for soft rot in iris due to hail damage and prolonged damp weather. The first sign of soft rot is when the fans begin to droop and fall over. Dig into the suspected clump. If the rhizome is soft and smells foul, soft rot is present.

If your iris are plentiful, destroy the infected rhizome; if not, scoop out the soft rot and dust with sulphur. Let the plant stay out of the ground two or three days to dry, then plant in a new location.

Examine trees for scars; be sure to paint damaged spots with tree paint. This also applies to rose bushes. Borers enter through scars and often destroy the whole plant.

If pinto beans are planted by the 28th or 29th of April, they will still produce a good crop. Beans planted in May have a tendency to grow large, bushy vines, bloom constantly and never produce beans.

Some gardens were fortunate enough to be at least partially spared by the hail. There are still many pretty flowers in some parts of town. The Bill Blakley's have a row of amar-

yllis in full bloom with very little hail damage. Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Hamner's rose garden is alive with color after such a beating by the hail. Now is a good time to practice arranging with foliage. Very few blossoms being left, try using only one or two for color and use foliage for filler and live material.

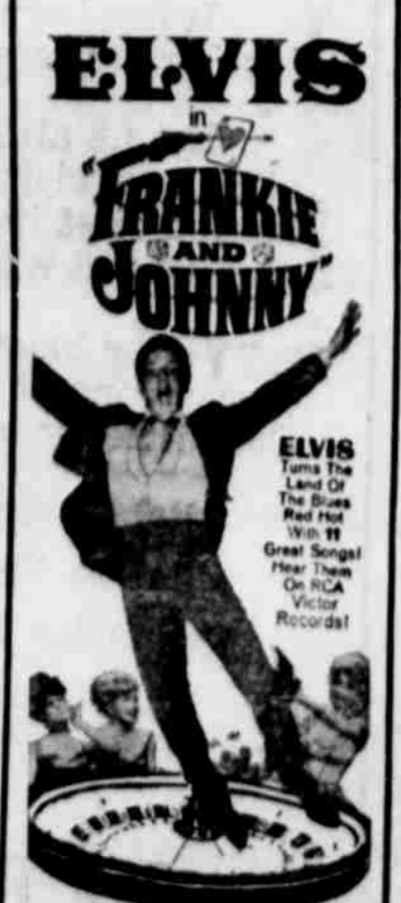

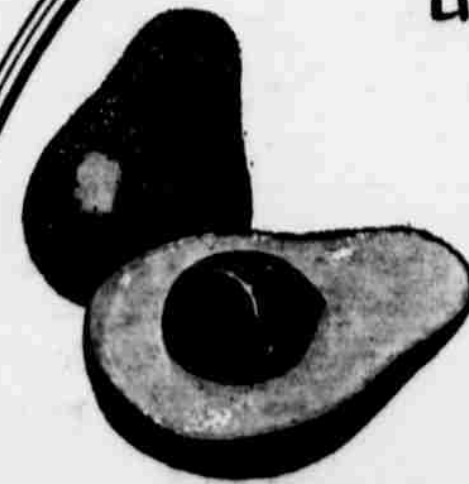
