Three of Texas' 10 Most Wanted offenders are back in custody following their recent arrests. Texas 10 Most Wanted Fugitive Raynaldo Tijerina, of San Antonio, was arrested September 6, in Fort Stockton. Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offenders Steven Powers, of Teague, was also arrested September 6, in Atlanta, Ga., and Columbus Johnson, of Wharton, was arrested September 8, in Rosenburg.

Raynaldo Farias Tijerina, 44, affiliated with the Tango Blast gang, was arrested in Fort Stockton by members of the U.S. Marshals Lone Star Fugitive Task Force, including DPS Special Agents from San Antonio and West Texas, along with members of the U.S. Marshals Gulf Coast Violent Offenders Fugitive Task Force in the Rio Grande

had been wanted since October 2021, when the Bexar County Sheriff's Office issued two warrants for his arrest for invasive visual recording and possession of child pornography. The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles issued a warrant for Tijerina's arrest the following month for a parole violation.

AAA Texas: Lone Star State gas price average decreases for third consecutive month

The statewide gas price average in Texas is \$3.15 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is three cents less than on this day last week and is 33 cents more per gallon compared to this day last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in Amarillo are paying the most on average at \$3.40 per gallon while drivers in McAllen are paying the least at \$2.95 per gallon. The national average price for a gallon of regular unleaded is \$3.68, which is two cents less when compared to this day last week and 49 cents more than the price per gallon at this same time last year. In Big Spring, several locations around town boasted per-

gallon prices of just \$2.89, including Shell at 2501 S. Gregg, Murphy USA in the Wal-Mart parking lot, DK/Yesway at 1800 S. Gregg, and H-E-B. Nearby, Abilene had an average Thursday of \$3.08/gallon,

while Midland's per-gallon average was \$3.18 and Odessa's \$3.16. San Angelo boasted \$2.97 per gallon gas and Lubbock's price for a gallon of regular unleaded was \$3.20. The Texas statewide weekly gas price average has been on

the decline for three consecutive months as the price of crude

contradicted by headlines of oil supply concerns. Inflation and economic slowdown worries have been keeping oil prices lower compared to where they were over the summer. Most of the country is now using less expensive winter blend gasoline, so modest pump price reductions have already occurred when it comes to the annual switch. Retail pump price fluctuations remain possible due to Russia's war in Ukraine and increasing hurricane activity.

"The statewide gas price average for Texas has been on the decline for three months," said AAA Texas spokesperson Daniel Armbruster. "Retail gas price fluctuations remain possible due to Russia's war in Ukraine as well as increasing hurricane activity."

Drivers in Texas are paying the fourth lowest gas price average in the country, according to gasprices.aaa.com. Meanwhile drivers in California are paying the most at \$5.52 on average for a gallon of regular unleaded.

Prices up to date at press time using market prices posted at 3:41 a.m. Motorists can find current gas prices along their route with the free and revamped AAA App for iPhone, iPad and Android. The app can also be used to map a route and learn traffic conditions along that route, find discounts, locate parking, book a hotel and request and track AAA roadside assistance. Marker in tiny hamlet denotes population center

HARTVILLE, Mo. (AP) — It's not every day that a small hamlet in the Missouri Ozarks is in the middle of everything, but that was the case for tiny Wright County on Wednesday as officials from the nation's capital unveiled a marker designating a spot there as the center of population in the United Dignitaries from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the U.S. Census Bu-

reau, including the agency's director, Robert Santos, celebrated the debut of the red granite marker in Hartville. With a population of 594 residents in 2020, the county seat is 14.6 miles (23.5 kilometers) from the actual spot calculated following the 2020 "You'll be famous for this wonderful designation

for the rest of our nation's history," Santos told local officials at a ceremony. "And you will have bragging rights for the rest of this decade! Not bad." Bypassed by interstate highways and railroads, Hartville doesn't have a big tax base or large in-

dustry. The local school, a nursing home, the gas station and the Dollar General store are the largest employers. The nation's population center is calculated every 10 years after the once-a-decade census shows where people are living. The heart of America has

been in Missouri since 1980. Previously located in Plato, in the neighboring county, it moved only 11.8 miles (19 kilometers) southwest from 2010 to 2020. It is the smallest distance shift in 100 years and the second-smallest in U.S. history. To calculate the center of the U.S., the Census Bureau figures out which spot would be "the balance

point" if the 50 states were located on an imaginary, flat surface with weights of identical size — each representing the location of one person — placed

Census-September is Hispanic Heritage month

Hispanic Heritage Month recognizes and celebrates the contributions Americans tracing their roots to Spain, Mexico, Central America, South America, and the Spanish-speaking nations of the Caribbean have made to U.S. society and culture. The designated period is also a nod to those from Mexico and Chile, which celebrate their independence September 16 and September 18, respectively.

These facts are available thanks to the public's invaluable participation in U.S. Census Bureau surveys. We appreciate the information shared by each respondent as we continuously count and measure America's people, places and economy.

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Passengers and crew members restrained a passenger who was caught on video slugging a flight attendant on an American Airlines flight.

The FBI said Thursday that the man was arrested after the plane landed in Los Angeles and took the man off the plane.

The incident happened Wednesday on a flight from San Jose del Cabo in Mexico to Los Angeles International Airport. Video posted by another passenger showed the man running down the aisle and punching a male flight attendant in the back of the head or neck as the crew member walked in the other direction.

> Most of the incidents in 2021 and early 2022 involved passengers who refused to wear face masks, but the federal requirement for masks on planes and public transportation was struck down by a federal judge in April.

Government figures don't indicate how often the incidents turn violent, although it appears to be rare. The most notorious case involved a young woman who punched a Southwest flight attendant, breaking some of her teeth, on a plane in California. The woman was sentenced to 15 months in prison.





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Reflections

On Monday of this week I preached the funeral for Barbara, my wife's sister. She was 79.



They grew up on Slaughter Road, a small blue-collar community on the west side of the Brazos River off Highway 36 at Freeport, TX. The houses were

built by survivors of the Great Depression, with their own hands. While they were build-TINSLEY ing their houses, they built a church, Calvary Baptist Church, also with their own hands. It was there that Barbara came to faith in Christ. In that same church, a young man named Vernon Bundick came to faith in Christ along with his

brother, Bobby. Barbara and Vernon

fell in love in the 3rd grade when Ver-

non had his front tooth knocked out

and Barbara thought he was irresist-

The Edge of Eternity ible. They were married in that same Barbara in her final weeks. I have little church.

In 1995 Vernon died from a tragic accident on their property. Their children were grown, and they had purchased undeveloped land for their dream home. In the process of clearing the property, a tree limb split and knocked Vernon from the top of a dozer where he was standing. The fall left him unconscious. He recovered, but a few days later, a blood clot went to his heart. He died in Barbara's arms in a matter of minutes.

She found herself alone, shattered and broken. But through sheer determination, courage, and faith, she fought her way back, developed the property, built a beautiful house, and dedicated herself to blessing others. Over the last 27 years I watched her grow with a deep faith and a big heart, reaching out to family, friends, and strangers.

My wife and I stayed at my brother's house in Galveston to be near had the opportunity each morning to go for sunrise walks on the beach. It seemed to me that the waves washing on the shore were like the heartbeat of the earth, echoing the heartbeat of the universe.

On Wednesday last week she was no longer able to leave her bed. She struggled for consciousness, increasingly overcome by the cancer.

When we arrived at the house, she was awake. She was surrounded by her children and grandchildren. After she smiled and greeted her sister, I spoke with her. Her sparkling blue eyes had grown dull and gray. But her smile was still there. She whispered to me. "I am near the edge."

I said, "Yes, you are."
I said, "This morning I went for a sunrise walk on the beach. I stood there, on the edge of the eternal sea watching the sun rise in the distance, a great red ball rising among the broken purple clouds. I thought of you,'

I said. "It is a beautiful place to be, on the edge of eternity."

She nodded her head, "Yes, it is."

I asked if we could pray. Again, she nodded her head. 'I would like that." We held hands, Barbara, me, her

sister, her children, and her grandchildren. We prayed, letting her go, committing her to the Father who first loved her and gave her to us. Her body lingered for two more days. It is difficult for the human body to let go. On Friday I believe she heard an-

other voice whispering in her ear, perhaps those tender words He whispered into the ear of a 12-year-old girl, "Talitha, kum, (Little girl, I say to you, arise.)" (Mark 5:41).

Genuine compassion moves us to action. Who is the One on your path that is in need of love today? Who is the One that God is calling you to care for? Lord, help us not to be a people who pass by on the other side, but those who care enough to get involved. May we remember the example of the good Samaritan. Go and do likewise.

The Texas Cross Country Coaches Association recently released its second regular season poll of this season and the Big Spring Steers cross country team have moved up one spot in the rankings.

The Steers are now ranked second in the state behind Class 4A Region I rival Canyon. The Steers were previously ranked third in the state but after a strong start early in the season the Steers have the coaches across the State of Texas taking notice.

The Steers cross country team won its first two meets of the season, followed by a second place finish in the LCU U-Chap Invitational and more recently a third place finish at the Lubbock ISD Invitational this past weekend which included a tough field from Region I.

At the Lubbock ISD Invitational the Steers finished third as a team behind second place Dumas and first place Canyon. It wasn't exactly the Steers best meet so far this season but it did give them a chance to run against regional

The Steers were led once again by seniors Adrian Solis and Isaac Gonzales. Solis finished sixth overall with a time of 16:50.30 followed by Gonzales in seventh place with a time of 17:00.70. Following after Gonzales were Diego Rios 22nd place (18:24), Kevin Quezada 25th place (18:31.30), Michael Perez 35th place (18:48.90), Jordan Mitchell 39th place (19:06.80), and Joseph Gonzales 54th place (19:31.30).

Big Spring will be making a long trip this Saturday as they travel all the way to Denton to compete in the Garmin MileSplit TX XC Invitational. The meet will feature state and nationally ranked powerhouses such as Southlake Carroll (#1 in the state and ranked 7th nationally) and The Woodlands (#3 in the state and ranked 22nd nationally).

The Steers will be competing in the Elite Boys 5000M race which will include a loaded field of the state's top runners. The meet will also provide another opportunity for the Steers to compete against Canyon as they will also be in attendance.

Race time for the boys is set for 7 a.m. Saturday morning. Good luck to the Steers cross country team this weekend!

Pittman, No. 10 Arkansas seek 4-0 again vs No. 23 Texas A&M

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Arkansas coach Sam Pittman fondly remembers that feeling in the locker room after the Razorbacks' first-in-a-decade victory, and finally beating longtime rival Texas A&M

in a Southeastern Conference game. "We were 4-0 at the time and it felt awful good ... we had lost nine in a row," said Pittman, the thirdyear Razorbacks coach. "I thought it was an impor-

tant game for us to have as a win." That was quite a boost for the 10th-ranked Razorbacks (3-0, 1-0 SEC), who get a chance to do it again

Saturday night when both teams play away from home for the first time this season.

But neither will be on an opposing campus either — Arkansas meets No. 23 Texas A&M (2-1, 0-0) again at AT&T Stadium, the home stadium of the

Dallas Cowboys. Arkansas hasn't had consecutive 4-0 starts since

1988-89, which was still a couple of seasons before joining the SEC.

The Hogs last won their first two conference games in 2006. After joining the Razorbacks in the the SEC in

2012, Texas A&M won nine straight against its for-

mer Southwest Conference rival in a 78-game series that dates back to 1903. The Aggies play their conference opener after a bounce-back win over then-No. 13 Miami that followed their home loss to Appalachian State.

"Most definitely, we're ready for SEC play," said Aggies running back Devon Achane, the only player in the nation this season with a rushing, receiving, and kickoff return touchdown.sdfsdf

medium-high heat until crisp. Transfer to a paper towel-lined plate to drain and cool. Reserve up to 1 tablespoon of the bacon fat from the pan, discarding the rest. Once the bacon has cooled, crumble it into small pieces. In a large pot, melt the butter over medium-low heat. Stir in the remaining cheeses, remaining bacon, and the sour cream. Remove the pot from the heat. Scoop potato chunks into the pan, breaking them into small pieces or leaving them chunky, depending on your preference. Serve hot, topped with your favorite garnishes, like cheese, bacon and chives.

"Still got work to do by far. Nowhere close to perfect in anywhere we are. But I love the competitiveness. Love the togetherness. Love the guys pulling together," coach Jimbo Fisher said. "I mean, coming off a tough week, come off a tough loss, guys bonded together, blocked out the noise, went and played." **BEST AND WORST**

The Razorbacks are the national leader with 5.7 quarterback sacks a game. But when they aren't getting to the quarterbacks, opposing teams are averaging 353 yards passing per game — which puts the Arkansas defense last among the 131 FBS teams in that category.

"Well, we have to get better, both of them, really. But obviously there's a little bit more urgency of covering people," Pittman said. "Now we can live with guys getting good throws. We can't live with guys wide open. ... Somebody is going to beat us. They need to beat us with us attempting to cover the guy.'

Alabama transfer linebacker Drew Sanders has 28 tackles for Arkansas and is tied for the national lead with 5 1/2 sacks. The Razorbacks' eight sacks last week against Missouri State were their most in a game since 2012.

KJ IMPRESSIVE, MJ MANAGES

While Texas A&M has already changed starting quarterbacks, fourth-year Arkansas junior KJ Jefferson is averaging 313 total yards a game. The dualthreat QB has completed 55 of 78 passes (70.5%) for 770 yards with six touchdowns and one interception while running for 169 yards and three more scores.

Former LSU transfer Max Johnson got his first start for Texas A&M last week when inconsistent Haynes King was benched. While the Aggies won, and Fisher said Johnson "managed the game," he was only 10-of-20 passing for 140 yards and a touchdown for the SEC's worst offense (313.7 yards and 20.7 points per game).

NEUTRAL SITE

This is the 12th time Arkansas and Texas A&M will play at the home of the NFL's Cowboys, who are owned by Jerry Jones, a co-captain of the 1964 Razorbacks team that went undefeated. The Aggies are 7-4 in the previous meetings

"Being in Mr. Jones' stadium is really neat," Pittman said.

Fisher said he is still "torn at times" about neutral-site games — especially one that could have been been played in College Station. The Aggies did get to play their last 2020 "home" game in this series on campus during the CO-VID-19 pandemic.

"There's not a better place to play than Kyle Field, and I'm sure Sam would say there's no better place to play than Arkansas," Fisher said.

The win over Texas A&M last September, after they had already won at home against future SEC foe Texas, pushed the Razorbacks into the top 10 for the first time since 2012. But they promptly dropped after a 37-0 loss to eventual national champion Georgia the following week, and didn't get back into the top 10 until winning their first two games this season. The Aggies began this season ranked sixth, in the top 10 for the third consecutive season, but plummeted 18 spots after being upset by Appalachian State.

No. 22 Texas opens Big 12 at Texas Tech, stays vague on QBs

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Texas coach Steve Sarkisian isn't offering any clarity on the injuryclouded situation at quarterback for the 22ndranked Longhorns for his first, and possibly only, trip to Texas Tech.

The top two options for the Big 12 opener Saturday are quite familiar to Texas Tech's Joey Mc-Guire, the former Baylor assistant and lifelong Texan who's now facing the Longhorns for the first time as a head coach.

McGuire tried to get Quinn Ewers to come to Lubbock when the former Dallas-area high school standout was transferring from Ohio State. Hudson Card was another top recruit, playing just a few miles from the Texas campus.

Ewers, who won the starting job, was out last week against UTSA with a sprained clavicle, while Card been playing through the high ankle sprain he sustained after replacing Ewers two weeks ago against then-No. 1 Alabama.

"I guess Quinn had more stars or a higher rating, but you're talking about four- and five-star guys," said McGuire, who won three state championships as a Texas high school coach. "They're going to run the same offense."

Sarkisian offered more this week than he did before last week's 41-20 victory over UTSA, saying Monday that all of the quarterbacks went through the week's first practice. McGuire assumed that meant at least one of them didn't last week.

In his final meeting with reporters Thursday,

Sarkisian said Ewers would suit up and Maalik Murphy and Charles Wright also would make the trip — and that his choice for a starter wouldn't be a game-time decision.

Card beat out Casey Thompson for the job last season but was replaced in his first road game a rough trip that ended with Thompson taking the snaps in a 40-21 loss to Arkansas.

"I think Hudson has really matured mentally," Sarkisian said. "He's more than capable of operating our offense at a high level. He'll be ready to go when his number is called. I'm proud of him, This journey here has not been an easy one for him." Sarkisian's future trips to Lubbock have nothing

to do with how hot his coaching seat gets in his second year: The Longhorns might not return to the home of one of their longtime rivals in 2024 if the switch to the Southeastern Conference is bumped up a year from 2025. It all hinges on the Big 12's pursuit of a new media

rights deal. Even with an agreement and an earlier departure for Texas and Oklahoma, there is still talk of Texas and Texas Tech continuing a series set for a 63rd consecutive meeting.

"Passionate fans, college town, that's what it's about," Sarkisian said. "You've got to like these environments. That's the beauty of why we get to do what we do."

GET THE HOOK

Big 12 games always bring out a smattering of "Horns Down" hand signs from Texas opponents and it will be sure to make an appearance with just about everyone in Jones Stadium.

But it can also be a 15-yard penalty if an official

thinks Texas Tech players are doing it in an unsportsmanlike or taunting manner. McGuire said he'll remind his players of the rule.

"It makes me laugh, I don't get it. It truly makes me laugh that it's a rule," McGuire said. "I'll make sure it doesn't happen. I don't want to hurt anybody's feelings."

TECH'S QB PICTURE

With Tyler Shough still several weeks from returning from a shoulder injury, sophomore Donovan Smith has thrown five interceptions the past two games since dominating lower-division Murray State in the opener. Redshirt freshman Behren Morton threw the last of Texas Tech's three interceptions in last week's 27-14 loss at No. 12 North Carolina State.

"I hope you see both of them. That's been the plan from the get-go," McGuire said. "I've said we're going to play all three of them. One of them's hurt right now. Game 1, we played all three. Game 2, we played the two. Game 3, we played the two. I expect them to play this week."

RUNNING STRONG

The Longhorns still can lean on a strong run game no matter what's happening at quarterback. Bijan Robinson ran for 183 yards and three touchdowns and Roschon Johnson had 81 more with a score in last week's 41-20 victory over UTSA.

The Longhorns rolled up 298 yards behind a young but improving offensive line that starts two freshmen. Robinson is averaging a robust 6.1 yards per carry and was clocked at 19 miles an hour at the end of his 78-yard touchdown run against the Roadrunners.

No. 17 Baylor expects bruising Big 12 opener at Iowa State

Baylor heads into its Big 12 opener at Iowa State on Saturday planning to draw on the experience from its double-overtime loss at BYU two weeks

The 17th-ranked Bears (2-1) will play in front of another big and loud crowd at Jack Trice Stadium in Ames, just as they did in Provo, Utah, and they'll face another motivated and hard-hitting opponent.

"People always talk about BYU being such a physical team. Well, since I've been here, they say the same thing about Iowa State," linebacker Brooks Miller said. "So we just have to be more physical."

No. 19 BYU is by far the toughest team Baylor has played.

The defending Big 12 champion Bears outscored their other opponents, Albany and Texas State, by a combined 111-17.

Iowa State (3-0) will be going for its best start since 2000. Its closest game so far was a 10-7 road win at rival

The last three Baylor-Iowa State meetings have been decided by a total of 11 points. Baylor hasn't won in Ames since 2016 and this game sets up as a defensive battle.

Iowa State leads the Big 12 in total, rushing and scoring defense. Baylor is third in total and rushing defense.

Iowa State coach Matt Campbell said one of his biggest concerns is Baylor's speed.

Both teams are in the top four against the pass.

"When you talk about their secondary, they can run and strike and they're physical," Campbell said.

"You talk about their D-line, they're big, they're strong, but they can really run. Linebackers play sideline to sideline."

Miller said he's impressed with the transition the Cyclones have made from Brock Purdy to Hunter Dekkers at quarterback.

Dekkers is throwing for just under 250 yards per game, he's second in the Big 12 with eight touchdown passes, and his completion rate of 74.3% is fifth nationally.

"He's good at getting the ball out," Miller said. "It's always different seeing a lefty. He looks real good, he looks smooth."

Baylor has not seen any drop-off in its ground game since Taye McWilliams went out with a head injury against BYU.

Freshman Richard Reese stepped in and ran for 156 yards and three touchdowns against Texas State last week. Bears coach Dave Aranda said it's a

Anthony Johnson was one of the best cornerbacks in the Big 12 for four years before Campbell asked him to move inside for the Cyclones for his final season. So far, so good.

Johnson is the team's active leader in career pass breakups (25), but he didn't have his first interception until last week against Ohio.

"I think I'm around the ball more," said Johnson, who will be making his 45th consecutive start. "I'm thankful and I love the transition and I'm glad that I made it."

DOYLE HOMECOMING

Baylor's Dillon Doyle will be back in his home state after transferring from Iowa after the 2019 season.

The Iowa City native has started 25 of his 26 games at linebacker for the Bears and made 155 tackles. He also plays some fullback and has a receiving and rushing touchdown.
