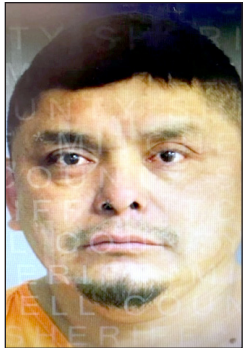
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Inmate escapes Mitchell County Jail Tuesday

Editor's note: The following press release was sent to the Herald by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

10/04/22, at around 5:20 a.m., a prisoner held in the Mitchell County Jail for possession of controlled substance and money laundering, escaped. The inmate is identified as Pedro Martinez, 44 years, of age of Chihuahua, Mexico. Martinez was arrested on 3-29-22 on drug charges and has been incarcerated for the last 6 months in the Mitchell County Jail awaiting trial.

Martinez had been given "trustee" status in the county jail inmate system in the past two months and was involved in unloading a food supply truck

with other "trustees," at 5:20 a.m., on 10/04/22. It was during this work detail that Martinez was able to escape. The jailer supervising this work detail discovered Martinez missing at 5:28 a.m. and immediately reported the escape.

The Mitchell County Sheriff's Office (MCS) would like to thank the agencies that came to assist in this search. They include Colorado City Police Department (CCP), Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)-Highway Patrol, DPS Aircraft Operations, Texas Rangers, DPS Criminal Investigation Division (CID), Texas Department of Corrections (TDC), U.S. Customs and Border Protection (USCBP) – Air and Marine, Howard County Sheriff's Office (HCSO), Scurry County Sheriff's Office (SCSO), Snyder Police Department (SPD), and Nolan County Sheriff's Office.

Martinez, at the time of this report, has not been located. Investigators with DPS Texas Rangers and CID are still processing information that would help in his apprehension. The public is asked to stay vigilant in the security of

their homes, buildings, and vehicles, to watch out for suspicious persons in the area, and report to law enforcement any person matching the description of Martinez. A further press release, issued Wednesday reported Martinez remains at large:

Sheriff Patrick Toombs is reporting no change in the status of the escaped inmate. Law enforcement continues to investigate information and leads to locate Martinez. There has not been a new sighting or report by citizens in the last 12 hrs. The public is still encouraged to contact law enforcement with information if anything new becomes available. Steinbeck's letter to son on love, 'the best thing,' on sale

BOSTON (AP) — A tender and touching letter that author John Steinbeck penned to his teenage son, offering fatherly advice after the young man confided that he was in love for the first time, is going up for auction.

Boston-based RR Auction says the handwritten draft of a letter to his eldest son, Thomas — then 14 — shows the "Of Mice and Men" author's empathy: He refused to dismiss it as puppy love. "While this letter offers an intimate, private glimpse into Steinbeck's family life, it also expresses his ideas about love with profundity and eloquence," said Bobby Livingston, executive vice president of the auction house.

In the two-page letter, dated Nov. 10, 1958, the Nobel Literature Prize laureate told his son: "If you are in love — that's a good thing — that's about the best thing that can happen to anyone. Don't let anyone make it small or light to you."

Steinbeck, who won a Pulitzer for "The Grapes of Wrath" in 1940 and the Nobel in 1962 for a body of acclaimed work, showed he was no stranger to matters of the heart. "The object of love is

the best, and most beautiful. Try to live up to it," he wrote. "If you love someone — there is no possible harm in saying so — only you must remember that some people are very shy and sometimes the saying must take that shyness into consideration." "Girls have a way of knowing or feeling what you feel, but they usually like to hear it also," he said. "It sometimes happens that what you feel is not returned for one reason or another — but that does not make your feeling less valuable and good." "If it is right, it happens — The main thing is not to hurry. Nothing good gets away," the California-born novelist wrote, signing his letter simply: "Love, Father."

John Steinbeck died in 1968, and Thomas Steinbeck died in 2016.

The text of the letter has been published for

worldwide audiences, including in 1989's "Steinbeck: A Life in Letters," by Penguin Books. Legal wrangling over his estate has dragged on for decades. In 2020, the U.S. Supreme Court let stand a decision awarding Steinbeck's stepdaughter \$5 million in a family dispute over abandoned plans for movies of some of Steinbeck's best-known works. Thomas Steinbeck, a writer in his own right, fiercely defended his father's work, adapting several of his father's books for movies

Mexican man killed in shooting at US Border Patrol station

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — A Mexican citizen was fatally shot at a U.S. Border Patrol station in Texas in the second deadly shooting along the U.S.-Mexico border in less than a week.

The man was in custody at the Ysleta Border Patrol Station in El Paso on Tuesday when he was shot, U.S. Customs and Border Protection said in a statement. He was taken to a hos-

pital where he was pronounced dead, the FBI said.

The Border Patrol said its agents were involved in the shooting but no details were released about what preceded it.

The Mexican Consulate in El Paso said the man who died was a Mexican citizen who was being processed at the station when criminal charges

against him were discovered. The FBI is leading the investigation into the shooting.

The shooting happened days after two migrants were shot, one fatally, while getting water along the U.S.-Mexico border in rural Hudspeth County, about 90 miles (145 kilometers) east of El Paso. In that case, two Texas brothers — including one who

had been a warden at a detention center that has housed immigrants — were arrested and charged with manslaughter.

The man who was killed and the woman who was wounded in Hudspeth County were both from Mexico, the consulate said Tuesday.

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Yankees star Judge hits 62nd homer to break Maris' AL record

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Aaron Judge took a smooth, mighty swing, then broke into a big smile, as he trotted around the bases. Heading home, his teammates backed away, letting him touch the plate alone.

At last, the New York Yankees slugger had the American League home run record all to himself.

Judge hit his 62nd home run of the season Tuesday night, breaking Roger Maris' AL record and setting what some fans consider baseball's "clean" standard.

"It's a big relief," Judge said. "Everybody can finally sit down in their seats and watch the ballgame. It's been a fun ride so far, getting a chance to do this. ... Getting a chance to have your name next to someone as great as Roger Maris and Babe Ruth and those guys is incredible."

Judge said he felt "a few emotions" after connecting, thinking about his family and fans and supporters. He said it would probably be after the season until he'd truly soak in and appreciate the significance of his achievement.

"In my book, it's just another day," the stoic Judge said.

After slamming his helmet in a rare show of frustration when he went without a homer in the first game of the doubleheader against the Rangers in Texas, Judge hit the third pitch of the nightcap into the first row of seats in left field.

That trip around the bases after a long chase was certainly a mixture of pure joy and relief for No. 99, whose only homer in the previous 13 games had been when he tied Maris' 61 last Wednesday in Toronto.

Judge did it just in time, too, homering on the next-to-last day of the regular season.

Barry Bonds holds the major league record of 73 home runs, set with the San Francisco Giants in 2001.

Judge's milestone ball was caught by Cory Youmans of Dallas, who was sitting in Section 31. When asked what he was going to do with the ball while being taken away with security to have the ball authenticated, Youmans responded, "Good question. I haven't thought about it."

Asked after the 3-2 loss if he'd gotten the ball, Judge said, "not yet."

"I don't know where it's at. It'd be great to get it back," he said.

Judge also praised the fan for making a "great catch" and said the man had every right to keep the prized souvenir.

Another fan was escorted away after leaping over the rail into a gap between the seats and the left-field wall. The crowd of 38,832 was Texas' third sellout of the season.

Almost as soon as Judge connected on a 1-1 slider from right-hander Jesús Tinoco, his Yankees teammates streamed out of the dugout to celebrate with him. But they stayed away from home plate — leaving him to step on it before sharing hugs and high-fives.

"You never know how you're going to react in the moment. And it was just so, so very cool," manager Aaron Boone said.

Gerrit Cole, who set a Yankees single-season strikeout record in the same game, said he didn't know if Judge was pressing as of late, but chuckled when saying everybody else on the team was.

"Just wanted it to happen so bad," Cole said. "So I don't know if that's pressing, or it's just hoping hard. We were all just hoping really hard I think ... He's not trying to get the record for himself. He's trying to get the record for his teammates, and for the Yankee fans."

New York wound up losing the second game after winning the opener 5-4. With one game left in the regular season, the split left the Yankees with a fitting 99-62 record — Judge's number and his home run total.

Judge's mother and father were in the stands to see the 30-year-old outfielder end a five-game homerless streak, including the earlier game Tuesday when he was 1 for 5 with a single.

The Maris family wasn't in Texas after following Judge around for a while,

but Roger Maris Jr. tweeted, "Congratulations to Aaron Judge and his family on Aaron's historic home run number 62! It has definitely been a baseball season to remember. You are all class and someone who should be revered. For the MAJORITY of the fans, we can now celebrate a new CLEAN HOME RUN KING!!"

When the top of the first ended, and Judge went to take his place in right field, he carried the glove and cap of first baseman DJ LeMahieu, who patted him on the back.

The fans in right field cheered Judge loudly while he warmed up by tossing a ball back and forth with center fielder Harrison Bader. Judge then provided another souvenir ball when he tossing the one he had warmed up with several rows deep.

Judge, eligible to become a free agent after this season, struck out on a full-count pitch when batting again in the second.

He took his spot right field in the bottom of the inning before Boone pulled him from the game. Oswaldo Cabrera, who had been at second base, moved to right field and the slugger got another loud ovation as he jogged back to the Yankees dugout on the third base side.

Reaction quickly came from far beyond the ballpark.

"History made, more history to make," President Joe Biden posted on Twitter.

Tweeted former Yankees star Derek Jeter: "Congrats @TheJudge44 on 62! Postseason next!!!"

Former President Bill Clinton also tweeted congratulations, as did former MLB players like Paul O'Neill, Dwight Gooden, Dave Winfield and Ryan Howard.

Maris' 61 for the Yankees had been exceeded six times previously, but all were tainted by the stench of steroids. Along with Bonds' record, Mark McGwire hit 70 for the St. Louis Cardinals in 1998 and 65 the following year. Sammy Sosa had 66, 65 and 63 for the Chicago Cubs during a four-season span starting in 1998.

McGwire admitted using banned steroids, while Bonds and Sosa denied knowingly using performance-enhancing drugs. Major League Baseball started testing with penalties for PEDs in 2004, and some fans — perhaps many — until now have considered Maris as holder of the legitimate record.

A Ruthian figure with a smile as outsized as his body, the 6-foot-7 Judge has rocked the major leagues with a series of deep drives that hearken to the sepia tone movie reels of his legendary pinstriped predecessors.

The doubleheader nightcap in Texas was his 55th game in row Judge had played since Aug. 5.

Boone initially said Judge earned himself a day off Wednesday, but then said he would speak with the slugger who had already said he hoped to play in the regular season finale, before the AL East champion Yankees have five days until the AL Division Series.

"We'll have a conversation and see what makes the most sense," Boone said. "And I'll try and lead him in a certain direction, maybe he'll lead me back in the other direction."

Judge had gone 3 for 17 with five walks and a hit by pitch since moving past the 60 home runs Babe Ruth hit in 1927, which had stood as the major league record for 34 years. Maris hit his 61st off Boston's Tracy Stallard at old Yankee Stadium on Oct. 1, 1961.

Judge likely will come up short of becoming the first AL Triple Crown winner since Detroit's Miguel Cabrera in 2012. He leads the AL with 131 RBIs and goes into the final day of the regular season trailing Minnesota's Luis Arraez, who was hitting .315. Judge was at .311, right where he had started the day.

Judge's accomplishment will cause endless debate.

"To me, the holder of the record for home runs in a season is Roger Maris," author George Will said earlier this month. "There's no hint of suspicion that we're seeing better baseball than better chemistry in the case of Judge. He's clean. He's not doing something that forces other players to jeopardize their health."

Verlander, bullpen keep Phils hitless until 9th in 10-0 win

HOUSTON (AP) — After capping his magnificent comeback season with another stellar start Tuesday night, Justin Verlander was too busy looking ahead to reflect too much on what he's accomplished already.

"I wouldn't be who I am or in this position now if I just was happy with where I finish the regular season. ... I'm already trying to prepare myself for the postseason and get ready for that," he said. "But at the same time, I see the numbers, I know how good they are, and I do appreciate it."

Verlander struck out 10 without allowing a hit in five innings, and Houston's bullpen kept the Philadelphia Phillies hitless until the ninth inning in a 10-0 win.

Verlander, who has pitched three no-hitters in his career, walked one before being pulled after 77 pitches. The AL West champion Astros led the NL wild-card Phillies 8-0 at that point.

"It's great to have him on the mound," manager Dusty Baker said. "The team's excited, the fans are excited, I think baseball is excited when he's on the mound on a national stage like that. He's some pitcher."

Rookie Hunter Brown pitched 2 1/3 hitless innings and Hector Neris got the last two outs of the eighth inning. Will Smith came on for the ninth and Garrett Stubbs singled to center field to break up the no-hit bid, causing a smattering of boos from the crowd.

"About the fifth inning you start thinking about it," Baker said of the possibility of a no-hitter. "You start counting the amount of outs ... everybody in

our bullpen, the guys that came in, they wanted to be a part of it."

Added Verlander: "It didn't work out. It wasn't our night."

Jeremy Peña, Kyle Tucker and Martín Maldonado homered as the Astros jumped on Ranger Suárez (10-7) for six runs in two innings to build a huge lead early in their 1,000th win at Minute Maid Park, which opened in 2000.

Verlander (18-4) collected his American League-leading 18th win, and his MLB-leading 1.75 ERA is the lowest for a qualified pitcher in the AL, excluding the pandemic-shortened season, since Pedro Martínez posted a 1.74 ERA in 2000.

The two-time Cy Young Award winner's ERA is also the lowest of his career, besting his 2.40 ERA in 2011, when he won his first Cy Young and was also named AL MVP while with Detroit.

Verlander, who also won the Cy Young in 2019, is a top candidate to win the award for a third time this season after returning to form following an almost two-year absence following Tommy John surgery.

"To me, this is maybe not what was supposed to happen, but what I expected to happen," he said. "I didn't know exactly how good the season would be, but I thought I would be me when I'm healthy — which is usually pretty good."

The 39-year-old Verlander was dominant from the start Tuesday, fanning eight consecutive batters at one point to set a career-high and tie a franchise record.

That eight-strikeout streak started when he got Darick Hall to end the first. He then struck out the side in the second and third innings before striking out Bryce Harper to start the fourth.

The streak ended when Alec Bohm grounded out after that. Verlander didn't allow a baserunner until Brandon Marsh walked to start the fifth.

But he got right back on track, retiring Bryson Stott and Nick Maton before Matt Vierling grounded into a force-out to end the inning.

Verlander received a nice ovation as he walked to the dugout and he tipped his cap to the crowd just before stepping off the field.

He would have pitched a little longer Tuesday, but caused the top of one of his fingers to bleed by "clicking it" on his glove. Verlander said it's something he's dealt with before and it wasn't serious, but he didn't see a reason to push it at this point in the season.

Harper and Marsh played Tuesday, but the Phillies fielded a lineup missing many of their regular starters after clinching their first playoff berth since 2011 a night earlier. Philadelphia will travel to St. Louis to take on the Cardinals in a wild-card series starting Friday.

Jose Altuve hit a leadoff double before Peña homered to center field to make it 2-0. Yordan Alvarez then doubled off the wall in left field and Alex Bregman walked.

Tucker then smacked a ball to the seats in right field to extend the lead to 5-0.

Maldonado pushed it to 6-0 when he opened Houston's second with his shot to left-center.

Tucker has 30 homers, 107 RBIs and 25 stolen bases this season to join Hall of Famer Jeff Bagwell as the only players in franchise history with at least 30 homers, 25 steals and 100 RBIs in a season. Bagwell twice, in 1997 and 1999.

Suárez allowed seven hits and six runs, with a career-high three homers in three innings.

Contract Bridge

A perfect bull's-eye

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable

NORTH
♠ 7 6
♥ 6 5
♦ A Q J 8 4 2
♣ A J 5

WEST

The bidding:
South 1♣ Pass
West Pass
North 1♦ Pass
East 3 NT
Opening lead — queen of hearts.

Assume you're East, defending against three notrump. Your partner leads the queen of hearts, and before you do anything, you stop to assess the situation. You know declarer has the king of hearts, and the question is whether you should duck your ace, take the ace and return a heart, or take the ace and discontinue the suit.

It should not take you very long to conclude that if you allow declarer to gain the lead with the king of hearts at either trick one or trick two, he will almost surely

make the contract. Dummy's abundance of tricks — at least seven are in plain view — should convince you that your only hope of defeating the contract lies in spades, and that if South is not vulnerable in that suit, you can't stop him. Having reached this conclusion, you take partner's queen of hearts with the ace, and the only remaining question is which spade to lead at trick two.

Ordinarily, with the Q-8-5-2 of spades, you would lead your fourth-best card, the two. But in the present case, where your only chance to beat the contract is to garner four spade tricks at once, you should lead the queen!

As it happens, the queen play is spectacularly successful. You find your partner with the A-J-10-3, and South goes down one before he can even say "good play." Observe that if you return the two of spades instead of the queen, declarer makes the contract by playing the four or the nine from his hand.

Of course, you must be lucky for the queen play to work out so perfectly, but that is a commodity one must learn to rely on to at least some extent. It certainly offers more hope than allowing declarer to win the first heart, or taking the ace and mechanically returning a heart at trick two, which is tantamount to conceding the contract.

Today in History: October 6, the launch of Instagram

Today is Thursday, Oct. 6, the 279th day of 2022. There are 86 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 6, 1973, war erupted in the Middle East as Egypt and Syria launched a surprise attack on Israel during the Yom Kippur holiday. (Israel, initially caught off guard, managed to push back the Arab forces before a cease-fire finally took hold in the nearly three-week conflict.)

On this date:

In 1536, English theologian and scholar William Tyndale, who was the first to translate the Bible into Early Modern English, was executed for heresy.

In 1927, the era of talking pictures arrived with the opening of "The Jazz Singer" starring Al Jolson, a feature containing both silent and sound-synchronized sequences.

In 1928, Chiang Kai-shek became president of China.

In 1939, in a speech to the Reichstag, German Chancellor Adolf Hitler spoke of his plans to reorder the ethnic layout of Europe, a plan that would entail settling the "Jewish

problem."

In 1976, President Gerald R. Ford, in his second presidential debate with Democrat Jimmy Carter, asserted that there was "no Soviet domination of eastern Europe." (Ford later conceded such was not the case.)

In 1979, Pope John Paul II, on a week-long U.S. tour, became the first pontiff to visit the White House, where he was received by President Jimmy Carter.

In 1981, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat was shot to death by extremists while reviewing a military parade.

In 2003, American Paul Lauterbur and Briton Peter Mansfield won the Nobel Prize for medicine for discoveries that led to magnetic resonance imaging.

In 2010, social networking app Instagram was launched by Kevin Systrom and Mike Krieger.

In 2014, the Supreme Court unexpectedly cleared the way for a dramatic expansion of gay marriage in the United States as it rejected appeals from five states seeking to preserve their bans, effectively making such marriages legal in 30 states.

In 2018, in the narrowest Senate confirmation of a Supreme Court justice in nearly a century

and a half, Brett Kavanaugh was confirmed by a 50-48 vote; he was sworn in hours later.

In 2020, President Donald Trump, recovering from COVID-19, tweeted his eagerness to return to the campaign trail and said he still planned to attend an upcoming debate with Democrat Joe Biden in Miami; Biden said there should be no debate as long as Trump remained COVID positive. (The debate would be canceled.)

Ten years ago: Five terror suspects, including Egyptian-born preacher Mustafa Kamel Mustafa, widely known as Abu Hamza al-Masri, arrived in the United States from England and appeared in court in New York and Connecticut. (Mustafa was convicted in 2014 of supporting terrorist organizations.)

Five years ago: The board of directors of The Weinstein Co. said movie mogul Harvey Weinstein was on indefinite leave from the company he founded amid an internal investigation into sexual harassment allegations against him. The International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons, a grassroots effort aimed at pressuring the world's nuclear powers to give up those weapons, won the Nobel Peace Prize.

One year ago: A federal

judge ordered Texas to suspend a new law that had banned most abortions in the state since September. (An appeals court would reinstate the law two days later.) The Los Angeles City Council voted to enact one of the nation's strictest vaccine mandates; it required the shots for everyone entering bars, restaurants, nail salons, gyms and even a Lakers game. The World Health Organization endorsed the world's first malaria vaccine and said it should be given to children across Africa in the hope that it would spur stalled efforts to curb the spread of the parasitic disease; the vaccine was developed by GlaxoSmith-Kline in 1987.

up against the Seminole Indians. However, it would not be enough as the Indians cruised to a 63-28 win over the Steers.

The loss snapped Big Spring's four game winning streak as the Steers fell to 4-2 on the season in their last non-district game. Big Spring will now get ready to open up District 2-4A play against Brownwood this Friday night.

Heading into the game, most predicted it to be a shootout as both the Steers and Indians possessed similar high powered offenses. Both teams were also coming in with tough defenses as well to compliment the offense. The difference in the game was that Seminole scored on most its offensive possessions while the Steers struggled for most of the game to complete scoring drives.

"Overall tonight we just started the game out flat and we weren't able to keep up a tempo for most of the game you know. And hats off to them (Seminole) they're a really good team they have a really good quarterback," Steer head coach Cannon McWilliams said after the game.

"It was kind of the same old song and dance for us tonight. We had a good scoring drive to end the first half and another two good scoring drives to start the second half and we just couldn't really get anything consistently going after that. At the end of the day its a great learning experience for us and again we just have to be more consistent throughout the whole game. When you make these kind of mistakes against really good teams they're going to expose you and that's what happened here tonight," head coach McWilliams added.

The Indians got off to a fast start scoring two touchdowns in the first quarter. Right before the end of the first quarter the Steers finally responded back with a scoring drive of its own with Steer quarterback Gavin Padron rushing in for the touchdown to make the score 14-7 headed into the second quarter. The Indians offense continued to dominant in the second quarter scoring two more touchdowns early in the second to make the score 28-7.

With just under a minute left in the first half, the Steers were able to put together a successful scor-

ing drive thanks Steer quarterback Gavin Padron connecting with senior wide receiver Ricky Escovedo on a 10-yard touchdown pass to make the score 28-14. The Indians responded back scoring another touchdown to make the score 35-14 heading into halftime.

Big Spring received the ball to start the second half and the offense came out on fire as the Steers scored back to back on its two offensive possessions in the third quarter. To start the half Gavin Padron connected with Escovedo again for a 20-yard touchdown pass to make the score 35-21. The Steers defense stepped up as they held the Indians offense to give the ball right back to Big Spring.

On the Steers next possession, they drove down the field to Seminole's own 24 yard line where Padron connected with Escovedo again for a 20 yard pass. Escovedo was quickly wrapped up by Seminole's defenders but at the last second Escovedo lateraled to Steer running back Kavien Ford to rush in for the score making it 35-28 midway through the third quarter.

The Steers momentum would end there as the offense was unable to complete any scoring drives for the remainder of the game. The Indians offense would prove to be too much for the Steers defense as Seminole would go on to score four more touchdowns to get the 63-28 win over Big Spring.

Steer quarterback Gavin Padron finished the night completing 37 passes out of the 54 attempts for 392 yards, 3-passing touchdowns, no interceptions, and 1-rushing touchdown. The Steers receiver corp had another amazing night with three of Big Spring's receivers catching for over 100-yards. Ricky Escovedo led the way catching 16 passes for 123 yards and two touchdowns. Derrick Walleck ended the night with 7 catches for 115 yards and Eli Cobos had 6 catches for 106 yards.

The Steers rushing attack was led by Leroy Johnson who had 8 carries for 56 yards. Kavien Ford finished the game with 7 carries for 21 yards and 4 catches for 29 yards and 1-touchdown.

The Seminole Indians ended the game with 553 yards of total offense and 9-touchdowns on the night.

Big Spring will make the long trip this Friday to Brownwood to take on the Lions in district play. The Lions are also coming off a loss to the No. 1 ranked Stephenville Yellowjackets last Friday night. The Lions played a tough first half but the Yellowjackets proved to be too much for Brownwood in the second half coming away with a 42-21 victory over the Lions.

"They're a really good team (Brownwood), I think they're ranked top ten right now, but we just have to go to work and get ready for them, but more importantly we have to fix ourselves, stay healthy, and just get ready to play," head coach McWilliams said about this weeks matchup with Brownwood.

The game will be played at Gordon Wood Stadium with kickoff set for 7 p.m.

Texas A&M looks to rev up offense in trip to No. 1 Alabama

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M's offense has sputtered all season, remaining stagnant despite a quarterback change.

As the Aggies prepare to visit top-ranked Alabama on Saturday, coach Jimbo Fisher is adamant that they can turn things around if every player simply makes a commitment to doing things right on every play.

"Football's the ultimate team game," he said. "It's all 11 at all times to play and do well."

Texas A&M was expected to compete for the SEC title entering the season, but a loss to Appalachian State in Week 2 and a mistake-filled blowout loss at Mississippi State last week has dropped the team out of The AP Top 25 poll and has it searching for answers on how to get on track.

Fisher constantly preaches about the importance of creating good practice habits that will translate into games. He said the lack of execution hasn't come from a poor effort and he believes the team's hard work will pay off soon.

"We haven't been perfect yet," Fisher said. "It hasn't all clicked yet. We have to keep working at it and we have to give them the confidence and we have to give them the knowledge and educate them and coach them well to make sure they're in the right space and doing the right thing consistently in practice to allow it to go into the game."

The Aggies rank last in the SEC and 105th in the nation in total offense with just 335 yards a game. They are also scoring the fewest points in the conference at just 21.8, a total that is 108th in the country.

Things could get even tougher this week when they face an Alabama team that ranks fourth in nation by allowing just 236.4 yards a game.

Texas A&M started the season with Haynes King at quarterback, but he was benched after the loss to the Mountaineers and replaced with LSU transfer Max Johnson. But so far, the switch hasn't done anything to get the offense going.

Johnson lost a fumble — one of four turnovers against the Bulldogs — before injuring his hand late in the fourth quarter last week and his status for Saturday's game is in question.

King had a tough time filling in for him after the injury. He had a touchdown run soon after he came in, but threw two interceptions after that, including one that was returned for a touchdown.

Despite his performance, Fisher raved about King's attitude and how well he's dealt with the benching.

"He has been a tremendous, tremendous human being, handling the situation as well as any human can ever be expected to," Fisher said. "And he actually was a benefit and a help to Max on the information and things that are going on."

While much of the criticism for Texas A&M's offensive woes has been directed at the quarterback, a bigger problem might be the subpar play of the offensive line. It's an inexperienced group that includes three sophomores and a freshman.

The unit has improved since the beginning of the season, but still has plenty of work to do if the Aggies expect to compete with the Crimson Tide this weekend.

"They did progress," Fisher said. "And I think we're running the ball very well. We're getting better on pass pro. I think those guys did a good job on the edges."

While A&M has been inconsistent in its passing game, the running game has steadily improved this season. Running back Devon Achane has been the star of the team and ranks third in the SEC by averaging 93.2 yards rushing a game.

But he lost a fumble last week, too, as the Aggies made mistake after mistake in the 42-24 loss.

Tight end Max Wright believes the Aggies are close to putting everything together and that the offense can be much better if the players pay attention to detail and limit their mistakes.

"We just need to trust ourselves a little bit more and just go back to your training," Wright said. "Coach always talks about whenever you get into tough situations and in situations where stress comes, you fall back on your training. I think that comes from us preparing better in the week in terms of our mental preparation."

Oklahoma-Texas matchup likely to be high-scoring again

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — Recent meetings between Texas and Oklahoma have been shootouts.

Both teams have scored at least 40 points in four of the past six meetings, with Oklahoma breaking 50 in victories the past two years.

There are plenty of reasons to believe the high-scoring trend will continue. Both teams have had issues at times on defense heading into Saturday's matchup in Dallas.

Oklahoma's defense started the season strong under new coach Brent Venables, allowing just 10 points per game in three wins, but the past two weeks have been rough. The Sooners gave up 509 yards in a 41-34 home loss to Kansas State, then surrendered 668 yards in a 55-24 loss at TCU.

"We've got to play with better discipline," Venables said. "That's where it all starts. If we don't do that, we'll have the same kind of inconsistent results. The first three weeks, I thought we played with really good discipline. The last two weeks, not as much."

Venables was renowned for his defenses as the coordinator at Clemson, though the coordinator duties at Oklahoma are being handled by Ted Roof and Todd Bates, both in their first year with the Sooners.

Oklahoma (3-2, 0-2 Big 12) gave up 361 yards rushing to TCU. And now the Sooners face Bijan Robinson, one of the nation's top running backs. Robinson averages 103 yards rushing per game and ran for 137 yards and a touchdown last year against Oklahoma.

Robinson is looking forward to Saturday's matchup. Texas (3-2, 1-1) is averaging 154 yards rushing per game.

"TCU did a really good job," Robinson said. "All the running backs and coach Sark (Texas coach Steve Sarkisian), we're trying to find a way to really be effective on the run game and be hard to stop. I'm excited to see what the game plan will be about that."

The Sooners also must deal with receiver Xavier Worthy, who torched the Sooners with nine catches for 261 yards and two touchdowns last year as a freshman.

Texas quarterback Quinn Ewers could return from injury for the big rivalry game. The strong-armed freshman was off to a good start against Alabama before suffering an injured clavicle, and he has not played since. Sarkisian has not said whether Ewers or Hudson Card will start on Saturday.

Venables said keeping his players thinking positive and blocking outside opinions will be points of emphasis this week.

"It's continuing to show belief in people," he said. "It's getting the best out of them. It's still correcting and holding them accountable. Being tough and demanding, but continuing to give them hope."

The Texas defense has improved over last year's porous bunch and has played well in spurts but struggled in others.

Against Alabama, the Longhorns controlled the line of scrimmage for most of the game, and all but shut down Heisman Trophy winner Bryce Young, only to surrender the lead twice in the fourth quarter as the Crimson Tide rallied late to win.

Against Texas Tech, the Longhorns held a two-touchdown lead in the second half before losing 34-31 in overtime.

Texas allowed the Red Raiders to convert six fourth downs and wore down as the Longhorns allowed 479 yards and struggled to get off the field.

But the Sooners have problems on offense. Quarterback Dillon Gabriel is in concussion protocol, and the Sooners are looking at their options. Davis Beville stepped in last week against TCU and struggled, connecting on just 7 of 16 passes for 50 yards. General Booty and Nick Evers are next on the list.

The Longhorns have forced just two turnovers in five games — numbers they could increase against a backup quarterback.
