Texas State Parks invites Texans to join in celebrating Centennial celebration H-E-B supports Centennial Celebration with \$1 million donation

The Centennial Celebration of Texas State Parks is right around the corner, and park lovers are invited to get outside and join celebrations across the state. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) in partnership with Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundation (TPWF) will celebrate 100 years of Texas State Parks beginning January 2023.

"We invite all Texans to experience these precious public lands that truly belong to them," said Rodney Franklin, TP-WD's Texas State Parks Director. "We hope this is the year every Texan visits at least one state park. We are going to take advantage of the excitement about the Centennial to showcase everything our parks have to offer, and we're thrilled that H-E-B will be supporting our celebration."

H-E-B is the presenting sponsor of the Centennial Celebration and donated \$1 million to help Texas State Parks engage all Texans in discovering and exploring their parks.

"In a state rich with majestic landscapes, our support of this effort aims to provide access to our parks and the beauty of our great state for all Texans to enjoy," said Winell Herron, H-E-B Group Vice President of Public Affairs, Diversity and Environmental Affairs. "Only a very small fraction of land in Texas is public land, and it's our commitment to work along-

side organizations such as our longtime partner Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundation to protect these precious resources, so Texans can use them for generations to come."

When Governor Pat Neff called for a State Parks Board in 1923, he envisioned a Texas dotted by camping and recreational spaces held in sacred trust for the public good. Texas State Parks have lived up to that vision and so much more. Texas State Parks play a significant role in conserving habitat that benefits people and wildlife, encompassing some 630,000 acres, including 481,000 acres of Texas aquifers, rivers and reservoirs that protect our drinking water. Parks also provide critical habitat for wildlife, including more than 50 threatened and endangered species. They also attract close to 10 million visitors every year, generating \$891 million in economic value and \$18 million in sales tax revenue.

The Centennial Celebration will officially kick off statewide on Jan. 1, 2023, with "First Day Hikes." New Year's Day hikers will be welcomed across the state, and many parks will offer ranger-guided walks and hikes for this special event. Throughout the year, TPWD will encourage hikers, campers, picnickers and nature lovers to share their first-time park experiences on the Texas State Parks Facebook and Instagram

Next, the board will consider approval of the 2022-23 Campus Improvement Plan and consider approval of a resolution indentifying hazardous conditions

for student transportation eligibility.

The board will consider approval of district vehicles and discuss the National School Lunch Program, as well as the districtwide Intruder Detection Audit

Report findings. The board will hear informational items including district enrollment and the ADA/WADA report, financial reports, and board meeting dates.

Superintendent Brad Cox will present his regular report, including updates on the federal Elementary and Secondary Schools Emergency Relief (ESSER) 2 and 3 programs in response to the CO-VID-19 pandemic. The board will adjourn into executive

session to discuss personnel issues. Any items discussed in closed session will not be voted on until the board returns to open session. Following the executive session, the

meeting will be adjourned.

Comedians sue over drug search program ATLANTA (AP) — Comedians ed for 378 of those stops. Of those Officers blocked them as the

ATLANTA (AP) — Comedians Eric André and Clayton English are challenging a police program at the Atlanta airport they say violates the constitutional rights of airline passengers, particularly Black passengers, through racial profiling and coercive searches just as they are about to board their flights.

Lawyers for the two men filed a lawsuit Tuesday in federal court in Atlanta alleging that they were racially profiled and illegally stopped by Clayton County police at Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport.

The two men, well known co-

medians and actors, say officers singled them out during separate stops roughly six months apart because they are Black and grilled them about drugs as other passengers watched.

"People were gawking at me

and I looked suspicious when I had done nothing wrong," André said in an interview, calling the experience "dehumanizing and demoralizing."

While the stated purpose of the

program is to fight drug trafficking, the lawsuit says, drugs are rarely found, criminal charges seldom result, and seized cash provides a financial windfall for the police department.

Clayton County police officers and investigators from the county district attorney's office selectively stop passengers in the narrow jet bridges used to access planes, the lawsuit says. The officers take the passengers' boarding passes and identification and interrogate them, sometimes searching their bags, before they board their flights, the lawyers say in the lawsuit.

The police department calls the stops "consensual encounters" and says they are "random," but in reality the stops "rely on coercion, and targets are selected disproportionately based on their race," the lawyers argue.

Clayton County police spokesperson Julia Isaac said the department doesn't comment on pending litigation.

Police records show that from Aug. 30, 2020, to April 30, 2021, there were 402 jet bridge stops, and the passenger's race was listed for 378 of those stops. Of those 378 passengers, 211, or 56%, were Black, and people of color accounted for 258 total stops, or 68%, the lawsuit says.

Those 402 stops resulted in three reported drug seizures: about 10 grams of drugs from one passenger, 26 grams of "suspected THC gummies" from another, and six prescription pills without a prescription from a third, the lawsuit says. Only the first

and third person were charged.

Those 402 stops also yielded more than \$1 million in cash and money orders from a total of 25 passengers. All but one were allowed to continue their travels, and only two — the ones who also had drugs — were charged, the lawsuit says. Eight of the 25 challenged the seizures, and Clayton County police settled each case, returning much of the seized money, the lawsuit says.

Carrying large quantities of cash doesn't mean someone is involved in illegal drug activity, the lawyers argue in the lawsuit, noting that people of color are less likely to have bank accounts and are more likely to carry large sums when they travel.

English was stopped while flying from Atlanta, where he lives, to Los Angeles for work on Oct. 30, 2020, the lawsuit says. André had finished a shoot for HBO's "The Righteous Gemstones" and was traveling from Charleston, South Carolina, to his home in Los Angeles on April 21, 2020, when he was stopped after a layover in Atlanta.

Officers blocked them as they entered the jet bridge and asked if they were carrying illegal drugs, the lawsuit says. Both were asked to hand over their boarding passes and identification. An officer said he wanted to search English's bag, and English agreed, not believing he had a choice.

"I felt completely powerless. I felt violated. I felt cornered," English said at a news conference outside the federal courthouse in Atlanta. "I felt like I had to comply if I wanted everything to go smoothly."

André complained about his stop right after it happened. Clayton County police said at the time that it was "consensual."

"Mr. Andre chose to speak with investigators during the initial encounter," the department said in a statement posted on Facebook. "During the encounter, Mr. Andre voluntarily provided the investigators information as to his travel plans. Mr. Andre also voluntarily consented to a search of his luggage but the investigators chose not to do so."

André said he felt a "moral calling" to bring the lawsuit "so these practices can stop and these cops can be held accountable for this because it's unethical."

"I have the resources to bring national attention and international attention to this incident. It's not an isolated incident," he said. "If Black people don't speak up for each other, who will?"

One of the lawyers who filed the lawsuit, NYU School of Law Policing Project co-founder Barry Friedman, encouraged anyone else who has had similar experiences to get in touch.

The lawsuit names Clayton County and the police chief, as well as four police officers and a district attorney's office investigator. It alleges violations of the constitutional rights that protect against unreasonable searches and seizures and against racial discrimination. The comedians seek a jury trial and ask that the Clayton County police jet bridge interdiction program be declared unconstitutional. They also seek compensatory and punitive damages, as well as legal costs.

program has been providing free training to veterans for the last two years and is beginning to take off. Lexmark Field Service Specialist Jeff Feldmann recently stepped into holding the reins and is looking to expand the reach of the program. With the hardware field experience that Feldmann has, the combination was one that screamed success.

"The program has been around for a little while, but we are ready to re-launch it. I built the curriculum for the veterans who are interested and brought on the concept of hardware training," he said. "The good thing about this program is that it's free to the veteran to apply and has no obligation. Once a veteran is trained in the program, they can apply to work for any company they choose to apply to, search for Lexmark positions that are available, start their own business or whatever they choose.'

The program is self-paced and set online so interested veterans can take part from anywhere in the nation. Once the information modules have been completed there is an opportunity to expand on that information. An additional hands-on experience opportunity - hardware training - can also be taken advantage of as long as the veteran can get to the Lexmark Headquarters in Kentucky. Local veterans in Howard County will also have a hand of support through the local D.A.V. (Disabled American Veterans) Chapter 47.

"The hardware course is a week-long training that takes place at the Lexmark location in Kentucky. The training is free, the veteran just needs to pay the transportation, room and board, but once again the training has no obligation or promise of employment," Feldmann said.

The partnership with the D.A.V. expands the reach of the training program by allowing those veterans who may want to pursue this path, but are unable to financially get there. To add another layer on, Feldmann is using his connections through field service visits to find open positions and needs of dealers.

FRISCO, Texas (AP) — The Dallas defense has done a little more each week during Cooper Rush's four-game winning streak filling in for injured quarterback Dak Prescott.

Now the Cowboys have to slow Jalen Hurts and the undefeated Philadelphia Eagles in an early NFC East showdown, with Prescott's return creeping ever so closer.

It's too early to tell if the star QB's recovery from a fractured right thumb will be far enough along by Sunday night at the Eagles (5-0).

Meantime, the defense is harkening to the franchise's "Doomsday" teams of the 1970s — and posting numbers not since seen since the birth of that

era 50 years ago. "We're for real," reigning NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year Micah Parsons said. "We're going to keep proving this every week. One thing I've learned about us is that we're tougher and we're

Major League Baseball's first foray into a best-ofthree wild-card round provided its share of memo-

A 15-inning, 432-pitch game. A seven-run comeback win. Joe Musgrove's ears.

Now it's on to the division series, which is business as usual with a best-of-five format. The four matchups are Braves-Phillies, Padres-Dodgers, Mariners-Astros and Guardians-Yankees and all of them begin Tuesday.

The Astros, Yankees, Braves and Dodgers got to rest and watch the wild-card drama round from home, thanks to superior regular season records. Now they'll bring their own storylines to the post-

Rested Yankees slugger Aaron Judge — who set the AL record with 62 homers this season — gets his chance to swat postseason dingers. Jose Altuve, Justin Verlander and the Astros bring their ample postseason experience to the mix.

The Dodgers and their loaded lineup of Mookie Betts, Trea Turner and Freddie Freeman take the field. Then there's the defending World Series champion Braves, who rallied to win the NL East in the final days of the regular season and look formidable once again.

Some of the game's biggest stars are already headed home after the wild-card round: Max Scherzer, Pete Alonso and the Mets are gone after a 101-win season. The feel-good story of Cardinals veteran stars Albert Pujols and Yadier Molina is over partly because of a leaky bullpen. The Blue Jays and Vladimir Guerrero Jr. were bounced by a stunning Mariners comeback.

MLB Playoffs: Judge, Verlander join fray as 8 teams remain

After the division series wrap up, the league championship series and World Series will be in a best-of-seven format. The LCS is scheduled to begin on Oct. 18 while the World Series starts Oct. 28.

HOW WAS THE NEW WILD CARD FORMAT? MLB's switch to a bulked-up, 12-team bracket and

a best-of-three wild-card round — instead of the one-game, sudden death format that had been in place since 2012 — seemed to provide the balance the sport was seeking.

"It's definitely interesting," Phillies slugger Kyle Schwarber said. "You know, I think it's good for teams that we can get extra teams in there, and guys are going to be battling throughout the whole year. It's not just that do-or-die. But still, it's also a round of urgency, too, because it's two wins and you're on to the next round.

"So there's a sense of urgency in every single game, which I think is really good."

The Guardians were one of the teams that didn't need three games in the wild-card round to advance, sweeping the Rays with two wins. But even after winning the first game, Guardians manager Terry Francona seemed pleased with the new for-

"I think it's good. I think it's better," Francona said. "I think it's a more true outcome. But then again, it might hurt us. I hope it doesn't. Just think: you play 162 and then you play one and go home. That's rough. I think this is good for the fans. I think it's a better measure in competitive balance

than a one-game play-in."

WHY DID THE PLAYOFFS START LATE?

October's postseason festivities will bleed into November before a champion is crowned.

That's mostly because of the sport's labor strife that resulted in a work stoppage over the winter. It delayed the beginning of spring training and pushed the regular season back about a week. Baseball players and owners salvaged the usual 162-game season, but to do that, they had to move opening day from March 31 to April 7.

Some of the games originally scheduled for the first week of the season were moved to the end. meaning a season that was originally scheduled to end on Oct. 2 instead ended on Oct. 5.

WHO ARE THE FAVORITES?

Great question.

The Dodgers have been dominant all season with a lineup that includes Betts, Turner and Freeman. They won 111 games for one of the best seasons in franchise history. Over in the American League, the Houston As-

tros topped 100 wins as well. They've got a loaded lineup that includes Altuve, Alex Bregman and Yordan Alvarez, along with Verlander, the potential AL Cy Young winner. The Yankees were cruising for much of the sea-

son — led by Judge's huge year — but haven't played as well since the All-Star break.

Then there's the defending World Series champion Braves, who still have a loaded lineup that includes Austin Riley, Dansby Swanson, Michael Harris, Matt Olson and Ronald Acuña Jr.

Verlander returns to playoffs as Astros host Seattle in ALDS

HOUSTON (AP) — When Justin Verlander takes the mound for the Houston Astros in Game 1 of the AL Division Series on Tuesday against the Seattle Mariners, it will have been almost three years since his last playoff appear-

Verlander, who missed almost two seasons after Tommy John surgery, will look to build on his remarkable comeback season when he leads Houston into the postseason in the opener of the best-of-five series.

"This crowd here's always great, especially in the playoffs," Verlander said. 'So hopefully we can feed off that, and just try to continue to pitch like I have

lowed five hits and three runs in five innings of a loss to Washington in Game 6 of the World Series. Tuesday will be his 31st playoff start and 32nd appearance in his 20th playoff series. "Unbelievable Hall of Fame-type career, on top of his game, maybe better

Verlander's last postseason appearance came on Oct. 29, 2019, when he al-

than he's ever been most recently," Seattle manager Scott Servais said. "We certainly have seen him a lot through the years, and he's not slowing down, unfortunately for us." The 39-year-old Verlander led the AL with 18 wins, and his MLB-leading 1.75

ERA is the lowest for an AL qualified pitcher in a full season since Pedro Mar-

tinez's 1.74 ERA in 2000. The two-time Cy Young Award winner's ERA also was the lowest of his career, besting his 2.40 ERA in 2011, when he won his first Cy Young and was

Verlander, who also won a Cy Young in 2019, is a top candidate to win the award for a third time this season after returning to form following his injury. Veteran second baseman Jose Altuve said Verlander's return gives the Astros a boost as they try to return to the World Series for the fourth time in six seasons and reach their sixth consecutive ALCS.

"He's just amazing the way he pitched, the way he came back from injury,"

"He's the right guy to have out there in Game 1... (and) we all know he's going to go out there and be him."

Verlander was great against the Mariners in the regular season, going 5-1 with a 2.34 ERA in six starts.

He believes this series will be interesting because the AL West foes know each other so "intimately."

Houston had the advantage in the regular season, winning 12 of 19 games. The Mariners advanced to the ALDS after rallying from a seven-run deficit

in Game 2 of the wild-card round to sweep the Blue Jays.

That victory was the biggest road comeback win in playoff history and baseball's largest comeback victory to clinch a postseason series.

"Their lineup is really good," Verlander said. "They never give in, as you saw in the series against Toronto. They grind out at-bats. They don't make it

The Mariners will counter with Logan Gilbert, who will make his first postseason start, as they continue their first playoff run since 2001 with ace Luis Castillo unavailable after starting the first game of the wild-card series on Fri-

Gilbert was solid against the Astros in four starts this season, going 2-1 with

"I've watched these games since I was little," Gilbert said. "I grew up dreaming about playing in these games and now we are here."

ROOKIE RODRIGUEZ

Seattle center fielder Julio Rodríguez is off to a slow start in the postseason after a dazzling regular season that made him the frontrunner for AL Rookie of the Year.

Rodríguez hit .284 with 28 homers and 25 stolen bases in the regular season, but has just one hit in the playoffs.

He was hit twice, singled and scored two runs in Game 1 against Toronto before going 0 for 4 in the second game.

The 21-year-old hasn't had much success against the Astros, hitting .218 with two homers, two doubles, six RBIs and 19 strikeouts in 15 games.

Servais is confident that Rodríguez will make an impact this October because of the strides he's made throughout this season.



"His ability to make adjustments in game is outstanding," Servais said.

"He understands what they're doing to him in the batter's box and how he needs to maybe make an adjustment to get the result he's looking for. But above and beyond that is his preparation and his routine when he gets to the ballpark every day."

FILLING CORREA'S SHOES With Houston playoff staple shortstop Carlos Correa gone to Minnesota in free agency, the Astros will look to rookie Jeremy Peña to continue his strong season in the postseason.

Peña hit .289 with 22 homers and 63 RBIs this season after taking over for Correa, who starred at shortstop in Houston for the previous seven years.

Correa embraced the spotlight perhaps more than any Astro in recent history, piling up 18 homers and 59 RBIs in 79 career playoff games. Though Peña understands that comparisons will be made, he's focused on

being himself and not concerned about trying to fill Correa's shoes. "It's never been about that," he said. "It's just been about me making a dream

come true. This is something I've been working for my whole life." Altuve has been impressed with Peña's development this season and believes he's ready for the bright lights of the playoffs.

"He wants more," Altuve said.

"He wants to learn. He wants to get better. For me, that's all that matters. I know he's going to go out there and give everything he has and he's going to help us to win some games."
