The statewide gas price average in Texas is \$3.32 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is 12 cents more than on this day last week and is 40 cents more per gallon compared to this day last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in El Paso are paying the most on average at \$3.63 per gallon while drivers in McAllen and Brownsville are paying the least at \$3.19 per gallon. The national average price for a gallon of regular unleaded is \$3.91, which is four cents more when compared to this day last week and 62 cents more than the price per gallon at this same time last year.

The Texas statewide weekly gas price average increased for the second week in a row as the energy markets weigh the OPEC+ announcement for plans to cut production by two million barrels per day. The trend of higher prices may

slow as the latest data on inflation could continue to instill fears of an economic slowdown.

In Big Spring, a few locations shared the best local price of \$3.26 per gallon of regular unleaded Thursday, including Shell at 2501 S. Gregg St., Murphy USA in the Wal-Mart parking lot, and DK/ Yesway at 1800 S. Gregg St.

"Market forces continue to oppose each other with each headline - whether it be focused on supply or demand," said AAA Texas spokesperson Joshua Zuber. "Market watchers will be waiting to see just how impactful the OPEC+ cuts are versus continued concerns for a market slowdown, which could lessen demand for fuel products."

Drivers in Texas are paying the second lowest gas price average in the country, according to gasprices.aaa.com. Meanwhile, drivers in California are paying the most at \$6.20 on average for a gallon of regular unleaded.

Prices up to date at press time using market prices posted at 3:41 a.m. Motorists can find current gas prices along their route with the free and revamped AAA App for iPhone, iPad and Android. Two Top 10 Most Wanted fugitives captured in Louisiana and Iowa

his arrest for failure to comply with sex offender registration requirements.

Two of Texas' 10 Most Wanted fugitives are back in custody following their recent arrests. Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offender Braeion Henderson was arrested September 30, in New Orleans, Lou., and Texas 10 Most Wanted Fugitive Paul Basaldua was arrested October 6, in Council Bluffs, Iowa. No Crime Stoppers rewards will be paid.

Braeion Joseph Henderson,

37, of Rowlett, was arrested in New Orleans by the U.S. Marshals New Orleans Task Force. The U.S. Marshals North Texas Fugitive Task Force, including Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) Special Agents, assisted with coordinating the arrest.

Henderson had been wanted since November 2020, when the Dallas County Sheriff's Office issued a warrant for

weapon.

In 2009, Henderson was convicted of aggravated promotion of prostitution and two counts of compelling prostitution under age 18 after incidents involving a 14-year-old girl. He was given multiple three-year sentences to be served concurrently. For more information, view his captured bulletin.

Paul Anthony Basaldua, 35, of McAl-

len, was arrested in Council Bluffs by the U.S. Marshals Southern Iowa Fugitive Task Force, along with the Council Bluffs Police Department. The U.S. Marshals Gulf Coast Violent Offenders Fugitive Task Force, including DPS Special Agents, assisted with coordinating the arrest.

Basaldua had been wanted since August 2021, when the McAllen Police Department issued a warrant for his arrest for aggravated sexual assault. In July 2022, the Hidalgo County Sheriff's Office issued warrants for his arrest for aggravated sexual assault of a child and indecency with a child by sexual contact.

In 2009, Basaldua was convicted of possession with intent to distribute marijuana and sentenced to 37 months in federal prison. In 2012, he was sentenced to 18 months of confinement after he was convicted of burglary of a building, and in 2017, he was convicted of aggravated

Farmer earns Guinness World Records title

Oct. 13 (UPI) -- A Michigan farmer earned a Guinness World Records title when his gargantuan butternut squash was officially weighed at 104.5 pounds.

Derek Ruthruff of Charlotte had his massive squash weighed at Dundee's Pumpkin Palooza in Dundee, Mich., and the gourd tipped the scales at 104.5 pounds, breaking a weekold Guinness World Record by just 1.5 pounds.

Ruthruff, who has been competitively growing Atlantic Giant Pumpkins for four years. said his squash was planted on April 15, hand-pollinated on July 21 and harvested just prior to its Oct. 1 weighing.

The plant was grown using a seed from Christopher Brown's

former world record 55.5-pound squash, which was grown in 2020. "Combining my love of butternut and my passion for growing giant vegetables, I wanted to grow the largest butternut squash possible," Ruthruff told Guinness World Records.

Rothruff said he is still working on a plan for the massive squash.

With teachers in short supply, states ease job requirements

DALLAS (AP) — As schools across the South grapple with teacher shortages, many are turning to candidates without teaching certificates or formal training.

Alabama administrators increasingly have hired educators with emergency certifications, often in low-income and majority-Black neighborhoods. Texas, meanwhile, allowed about one in five new teachers to sidestep certification last school year.

In Oklahoma, an "adjunct" program allows schools to hire applicants without teacher training if they meet a local board's qualifications. And in Florida, military veterans without a bachelor's degree can teach for up to five years using temporary certificates.

Decisions to put a teacher without traditional training in charge of a classroom involve weighing tradeoffs: Is it better to hire uncertified candidates, even if they aren't fully prepared, or instruct children in classes that are crowded or led by substitutes?

"I've seen what happens when you don't have teachers in the classroom. I've seen the struggle," Dallas schools trustee Maxie Johnson said just before the school board approved expanding that district's reliance on uncertified teachers. He added, "I'd rather have someone that my principal has vetted, that my principal believes in, that can get the job done."

A Southern Regional Education Board analysis of 2019-20 data in 11 states found roughly 4% of teachers were uncertified or teaching with an emergency certification. In addition, 10% were teaching out of field, which means, for example, they may be certified to teach high school English but assigned to a

In Texas, reliance on uncertified new hires ballooned over the last decade. In the 2011-12 school year, fewer than 7% of the state's new teachers roughly 1,600 — didn't have a certification. By last year, about 8,400 of the state's nearly 43,000 new hires were uncertified.

The trustees in Dallas leaned into a state program that allows districts to bypass certification requirements, often to hire industry professionals for career-related classes. The school system has hired 335 teachers through the exemption as of mid-September.

In Alabama, nearly 2,000 of the state's 47,500 teachers didn't hold a full certificate in 2020-21, the most recent year for which data is available. That's double the amount from five years earlier.

And almost 7% of Alabama teachers were in classrooms outside of their certification fields, with the highest percentages in rural areas with high rates of poverty.

Many states have loosened requirements since the COVID-19 pandemic hit, but relying on uncertified teachers isn't new. Nearly all states have emergency or provisional licenses that allow a person who has not met requirements for certification to teach.

Such hires only delay the inevitable as the teachers don't tend to stay as long as others, said Shannon Holston, policy chief for the nonprofit National Council on Teacher Quality.

In a 2016 study, the U.S. Department of Education reported that 1.7% of all teachers did not have full certification. It went up to roughly 3% in schools that served many students of color or children learning English as well as schools in urban and high-poverty areas.

The use of such educators can be concentrated in certain fields and content areas. One example: Ala-

Poorer counties can't compete with higher salaries in neighboring districts.

Blair, who resigned from his post last spring, had launched a program to help certify the county's math and science teachers.

"But that's slowly changing as the teacher pool for all content areas diminishes," he said.

Birmingham and Montgomery each had three middle schools where more than 20% of teachers had emergency certification.

Birmingham schools spokesperson Sherrel Stewart said officials seek good candidates for emer-

gency certifications and then give them the support needed through robust mentoring.

"We have to think outside of the box," she said. "Because realistically, you know, that pool of candidates in education schools has drastically reduced but the demand for high-quality educators is still there."



E xoplanets are planets that orbit a star other than our sun. As of this month, scientists have identified 5,197 exoplanets in the universe. There are doubtless many, many more. Every star is expected to have at least one planet. With 200 billion stars in the Milky Way the number is, well, astronomical! But what BILL scientists are really excited about TINSLEY are earth-like planets, those that orbit in the "habitable" zone of sunlike stars, the so- called "Goldilocks zone." There could be 11 billion

habitable Earth-like planets in our galaxy alone! Just imagine, there could be other planets filled with beauty: oceans with waves breaking upon the shore, trees and forests, rivers and snow-capped mountains, clouds drifting across the sky, birds and beasts and living things.

C. S. Lewis posed this possibility in his novel, Out of the Silent Planet. But Lewis went a step further. He proposed that these "habitable" planets in the universe were different in one respect. They were planets without sin. Only on Earth, he suggested, did sin exist and, as a result, Earth had become the "silent planet" cut off from all the rest of creation. It is an interesting proposition.

Imagine again, a planet like the Earth filled with life, including human life, where sin does not exist. A planet like our own where there is no corruption, where no one lies, or steals, no deceit, no suspicion, no fear. A place where there is no violence. Everyone looks out for the welfare of others. Love rules.

We may never know if there are other planets like our earth. The closest star with a possible habitable planet is about 14 light years away. Most are more than 40 light years. Even if we could achieve the speed of light, this is not exactly commuting distance.

But the Bible assures us there is such a place as we have imagined, not in our galaxy or in our sphere of time and space. It exists in another dimension, eis aionos, or "into the age," as Jesus said. "I go to prepare a place for you, that where I am, there you may be also." (John 14:2-3).

Revelation describes this place "He will wipe away every tear from their eyes; and there will no longer be any death; there will no longer be any mourning, or crying, or pain; the first things have passed away." And He who sits on the throne said, "Behold, I am making all things new." ... I will give to the one who thirsts from the spring of the water of life without cost. He who overcomes will inherit these things, and I will be his God and he will be My son." (Revelation 21:4-8). We will likely never be able to visit an exoplanet. But we can go to heaven. The only thing preventing us from entering heaven is our sin. We have all sinned. But "God demonstrated His love for us in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us, (Romans 5:8). For this reason, God sent his Son, that "whosoever believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life." (John 3:16). Peter stated, "According to His promise we are looking for new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells," (2 Peter 3:13). Sadly, this seems to make people run away even more.


When the scriptures talk about recognizing words and deeds, the association between good and bad trees, and the evidence of fruit, most people are offended at the idea of being judged.

Bidding quiz

Partner bids One Spade, and the next player passes, both sides vulnerable. What would you bid with each of the following hands?

1. Two notrump. Unless you and your partner have agreed to some other meaning for two notrump in this situation, this bid shows 13 to 15 points, a balanced distribution and stoppers in the unbid suits.

Of course, the bid does not irreocably commit your side to notrump. If partner does anything but raise to three notrump, you will next show your three-card spade support. 2. Two spades. This shows six to 10 points and trump support, which is precisely what you have. It is better to avoid a two-diamond response, because partner might expect you to have a somewhat better hand and would not, for the moment at least, be aware that you had adequate support for spades. By raising spades directly, you place the decision on whether to continue bidding exactly where it belongs — in partner's lap. 3. Two hearts. This is in keeping

g quiz with the principle of first mentioning the higher-ranking of two fivecard suits, regardless of the highcard content of the two suits. Bidding diamonds first and hearts next

would indicate fewer hearts than diamonds and could result in your winding up in the wrong contract. **4. Two clubs.** Here you're too good to raise to two spades, since with your trump fit and two doubletons, your hand is worth about 11 points.

In-between hands such as this are best described by bidding a side suit first and then raising partner's suit at your next turn. If you happen to play "limit" raises, as most now do, an immediate jump to three spades, indicating 11-12 points with spade support, is also acceptable.

Today in History: October 14, Martin Luther King wins Nobel

Today is Friday, Oct. 14, the 287th day of 2022. There are 78 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 14, 1964, civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. was named winner of the Nobel Peace Prize.

On this date:

In 1066, Normans under William the Conqueror defeated the rocket plane over Muroc Dry Lake in California.

In 1964, Soviet leader Nikita S. Khrushchev was toppled from power; he was succeeded by Leonid Brezhnev as First Secretary and by Alexei Kosygin as Premier.

In 1981, the new president of Egypt, Hosni Mubarak (HOHS'-nee moo-BAH'-rahk), was sworn in to succeed the assassinated Anwar Sadat. Mubarak pledged loyalty to Sadat's policies. in the eastern New Mexico desert after a 24-mile jump from a balloon in the stratosphere in a daring, dramatic feat that officials said made him the first skydiver to fall faster than the speed of sound. Retired Air Force Brig. Gen. Chuck Yeager, at the age of 89, marked the 65th anniversary of his supersonic flight by smashing through the sound barrier again, this time in the backseat of an F-15 which took off from Nellis Air Force Base in Nevada. Former Sen. Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania, 82,

Murdaugh had been arrested and charged with stealing insurance settlements that were meant for the sons of his late housekeeper. A work by British street artist Banksy that sensationally self-shredded just after it sold at auction three years earlier fetched more than \$25 million ,Äî a record for the artist, and close to 20 times its pre-shredded price.

5. Four spades. The immediate raise to four serves two purposes. First, you should have a good chance for game, even though you don't have many high-card points. Second, and equally important, is the bid's pre-emptive value. Given your dearth of high card points and your six-card trump support, there is a substantial danger that the opponents can make a game or find a good sacrifice in hearts or clubs. If all goes well, your fourspade bid might be just enough to block them out.

English at the Battle of Hastings.

In 1586, Mary, Queen of Scots, went on trial in England, accused of committing treason against Queen Elizabeth I. (Mary was beheaded in February 1587.)

In 1933, Nazi Germany announced it was withdrawing from the League of Nations.

In 1939, a German U-boat torpedoed and sank the HMS Royal Oak, a British battleship anchored at Scapa Flow in Scotland's Orkney Islands; 833 of the more than 1,200 men aboard were killed.

In 1944, German Field Marshal Erwin Rommel took his own life rather than face trial and certain execution for allegedly conspiring against Adolf Hitler.

In 1947, U.S. Air Force Capt. Charles E. ("Chuck") Yeager (YAY'-gur) became the first test pilot to break the sound barrier as he flew the experimental Bell XS-1 (later X-1) In 1986, Holocaust survivor and human rights advocate Elie Wiesel (EL'-ee vee-ZEHL') was named winner of the Nobel Peace Prize.

In 1990, composer-conductor Leonard Bernstein (BURN'styn) died in New York at age 72.

In 2008, a grand jury in Orlando, Fla. returned charges of first-degree murder, aggravated child abuse and aggravated manslaughter against Casey Anthony in the death of her 2-year-old daughter, Caylee. (She was acquitted in July 2011.)

In 2016, a judge in Connecticut dismissed a wrongful-death lawsuit by Newtown families against the maker of the rifle used in the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting massacre, citing a federal law that shielded gun manufacturers from most lawsuits over criminal use of their products.

Ten years ago: Extreme athlete Felix Baumgartner landed gracefully died in Philadelphia.

Five years ago: A truck bombing in Somalia's capital killed more than 500 people in one of the world's deadliest attacks in years; officials blamed the attack on the extremist group al-Shabab and said it was meant to target Mogadishu's international airport, but the bomb detonated in a crowded street after soldiers opened fire. The board of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences revoked the membership of movie mogul Harvey Weinstein, after published reports about sexual harassment and rape allegations against Weinstein.

One year ago: New York real estate heir Robert Durst was sentenced in Los Angeles to life in prison without a chance of parole for the murder of a friend, Susan Berman, more than two decades earlier. (Durst died in prison in January 2022 at 78.) South Carolina state police said prominent attorney Alex is 85. Former White House counsel John W. Dean III is 84. Fashion designer Ralph Lauren is 83. Singer Sir Cliff Richard is 82. Singer-musician Justin Hayward (The Moody Blues) is 76. Actor Greg Evigan is 69. TV personality Arleen Sorkin is 67. World Golf Hall of Famer Beth Daniel is 66. Singer-musician Thomas Dolby is 64. Actor Lori Petty is 59. Former MLB player and manager Joe Girardi is 58. Actor Steve Coogan is 57. Singer Karyn White is 57. Actor Edward Kerr is 56. Actor Jon Seda is 52. Country singer Natalie Maines (The Chicks) is 48. Actor-singer Shaznay Lewis (All Saints) is 47. Actor Stephen Hill is 46. Singer Usher is 44. 

Ex-Texas cop charged for shooting teen eating hamburger

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - A now-former San Antonio police officer was charged Tuesday with two counts of aggravated assault by a peace officer for shooting and gravely wounding a teen eating a hamburger in his car in a McDonald's parking lot. The teen had begun driving away when the officer opened fire.

James Brennand, 27, was charged in the Oct. 2 shooting of Erik Cantu, 17, according to a police statement. He turned himself in to police Tuesday night and remained in custody, said Police Chief William McManus.

Cantu is still unconscious and on life support, his family said Tuesday.

"There is no improvement in his condition," the family said in a statement delivered by their lawyer, Brian Powers. "The last two days have been difficult, and we expect more difficulty ahead, but we remain hopeful.'

Brennand, a rookie officer, reported the vehicle Cantu was sitting in had evaded him the night before during an attempted traffic stop. Brennand said he suspected the vehicle was stolen.

In body camera footage released by police, Brennand opens the car door and tells Cantu to get out. The car drives backward with the door open, and the officer fires multiple times into the vehicle. He continues to shoot as the car drives awav.

Investigators quickly determined that the use of deadly force was unwarranted, and Brennand was fired. Charges against Cantu of aggravated assault and evading arrest were dropped.

A police spokesperson did not immediately respond to an inquiry about whether the vehicle was actually stolen.

Brennand is charged with two counts of assault because there was a passer ger in the car. The passenger was unharmed.

In a press conference Tuesday evening, the police chief defended the depart ment's training and said the failures were those of the individual officer.

In an appearance on CNN earlier Tuesday, McManus said he expected ag gravated assault charges would be filed, and murder charges in the event Cantu dies.

McManus said Brennand's body camera video was "horrific."

"There is no question in anybody's mind looking at that video that the shooting is not justified," McManus said.

Police officials and the Bexar County District Attorney's Office did not im mediately return messages from The Associated Press. Brennand has no published telephone number and could not be reached for comment.

Cantu's condition, as related in his family's statement, is in stark contrast to what police officials said in the wake of the shooting: that Cantu was hospital ized in stable condition.

'We'd like to correct any misrepresentations that Erik is in 'stable condi tion' or he is 'going to be fine.' That is not true. Every breath is a struggle for Erik. We ask for everyone's continued prayers for our son," the family said.

Ex-Angels employee gets 22 years in Skaggs overdose death

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A former Los Angeles Angels employee was sentenced to 22 years in federal prison Tuesday for providing Angels pitcher Tyler Skaggs the drugs that led to his overdose death in Texas.

Eric Kay, dressed in an orange jumpsuit with handcuffs and leg shackles, didn't react when U.S. District Judge Terry R. Means read his sentence. Kay faced at least 20 years in prison on one of the two counts.

There was no reaction from Skaggs' widow and mother or members of Kay's family, including one of his sons who read a statement on his behalf before sentencing.

A bailiff had warned observers they would be removed from the court over any outbursts.

Prosecutors presented evidence of Kay, 48, making derogatory comments about Skaggs, his family, prosecutors and jurors in phone calls and emails after he was convicted in February.

There was emotional testimony from both sides in federal court in Fort Worth, about 15 miles from where the Angels were supposed to open a fourgame series against the Texas Rangers on July 1, 2019, the day Skaggs was found dead in a suburban Dallas hotel room.

Kay was convicted on one count each of drug distribution resulting in death and drug conspiracy. Means recommended Kay serve his time in his home state of California. He has been in prison in Fort Worth since the conviction.

A coroner's report said Skaggs, 27, had choked to death on his vomit and that a toxic mix of alcohol,

cording to testimony and court documents.

After revealing the sentence, Means said he dreaded this day from the beginning of the case because the 20-year minimum could be considered too harsh for the crime.

Means said he added two years because of Kay's comments to his family in jailhouse conversations after the conviction.

The judge interrupted Kay to quote the former public relations employee as saying in one of those exchanges, "I'm here because of Tyler Skaggs. Well, he's dead. So (expletive) him."

"That's disgusting," Kay responded. "I don't know why I said that. I was mad at the world."

Means appeared skeptical, even saying at one point after delivering the sentence that he would probably become a target of Kay's anger.

The judge said Kay displayed "a callousness and refusal to accept responsibility and even be remorseful for something that you caused."

"Tyler Skaggs wasn't a perfect person," the judge said. "But he paid the ultimate price for it."

Kay sobbed while one

of his three sons spoke to the judge from the lectern in a plea for leniency. Carli Skaggs, the widow, fought back tears much the same way she did when she testified during the trial.

"Not only am I grieving the loss of my husband," she said. "I'm grieving the loss of mvself. Defense attorney Cody Cofer, who took over after Kay's two trial lawyers were removed,

sought a motion that would have allowed Means to consider a sentence below the 20-year minimum. It was denied.

"We are very grateful to everyone who worked so hard to investigate and prosecute Eric Kay," the Skaggs family said in a statement. "Today's sentencing isn't about the number of years the defendant received. The real issue in this case is holding accountable the people who are distributing the deadly drug fentanyl."

Kay served as the team's public relations contact on many road trips, and the trip to Texas was his first since returning from rehab. Kay was placed on leave shortly after Skaggs' death and never returned to the team. He didn't testify during his trial.

The government argued at trial that Kay was the only one who could have given Skaggs the drugs that led to his death, that the delivery was in Texas and that fentanyl was the cause of death. Prosecutors say Kay gave Skaggs counterfeit oxycodone pills that contained fentanyl.
