**A Moment in History**  
**Coahoma, It's All in The Name**

Howard County's second town, Coahoma, came into being in the early 1890s. The little settlement was situated two miles west of the present location, then for some reason shifted a mile east of today's present townsite.

In 1980, Marj Carpenter interviewed Leroy Echols, pioneer of Coahoma. Carpenter asked Leroy, "How did Coahoma get its name?"

Echols answered, "Grandma named Coahoma." Echols said his family arrived in Coahoma in 1891. "Grandpa

staked claim exactly two miles east of the railroad stop. He set up a General Mercantile store and a Post Office in the same small building." The town grew around this central location.

Leroy said, "When the post office needed a name, grandma named it after a place she was from, Coahoma, Mississippi." Echols continued "A lot of people say it is an Indian name, and it may have been back in Mississippi." Earlier names for the present Coahoma community included Signal Mountain and Signal Mountain Station.

Wikipedia states: "Coahoma is a baby girl name pronounced KOWAH-

OWMAH. The language origin is Native American Choctaw, and it is predominantly used in Choctaw language. The name is of the meaning 'red colored panther'.

Leroy raised his family on his grandpa's original homestead. He kept the trees clear of the view to Signal Mountain.

"I think it is one of the most beautiful views in the world," said Leroy.

The Texas and Pacific Railway enabled Coahoma to grow into a retail trade area and shipping point. Coahoma residents

**NASA: Moon rocket endured hurricane, set for 1st test flight**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA's moon rocket needs only minor repairs after enduring a hurricane at the pad and is on track for its first test flight next week, a top official said Friday.

"Right now, there's nothing preventing us" from attempting a launch on Wednesday, said NASA's Jim Free, an associate administrator.

The wind never exceeded the rocket's design limits as Hurricane Nicole swept through Kennedy Space Center on Thursday, according to Free. But he acknowledged if the launch team had known in advance that a hurricane was going to hit, they likely would have

kept the rocket indoors. The rocket was moved out to the pad late last week for its \$4.1 billion demo mission.

Gusts reached 100 mph (160 kph) atop the launch tower, but were not nearly as strong farther down at the rocket. Computer models indicate there should be no strength or fatigue issues from the storm, even deep inside the rocket, Free noted.

NASA had been aiming for an early Monday launch, but put it on hold for two days because of the storm.

The 322-foot (98-meter) rocket, known as SLS for Space Launch System, is the most powerful ever built by NASA. A crew capsule atop the rocket, with

## Bob Dylan's love letters for sale

A deeply personal collection of love letters in which a teenage Bob Dylan tells his high-school sweetheart that he envisions changing his name and selling a million records is going up for sale in Boston.

The Hibbing, Minnesota, boy — still known then as Bob Zimmerman — wrote the 42 letters totaling 150 pages to Barbara Ann Hewitt between 1957 and 1959. The missives, to be auctioned by RR Auction, have never before been made public and shed light on a period in the folk-rock icon's life for which not much firsthand information is known.

"This archive is one of the most culturally important of the 20th century we have ever offered," said RR Auction Executive Vice President Bobby Livingston, a big Dylan fan.

The collection, including a lavish Valentine's card, is a "first-person account of Dylan's formative years," he said.

Hewitt's daughter found the letters after her mother died in 2020. They, along with the original envelopes addressed in Dylan's handwriting, are being offered as a single lot with a starting bid of \$250,000. Bidding closes on Nov. 17. RR Auction is not releasing the exact content of the letters ahead of time, but they deal with timeless and universal teenage concerns: clothes, cars, and musical tastes, the auction house said.

Dylan, now 81, also included snippets of poetry and professed his love for Hewitt.

Perhaps most impressively, he also imagined his future success.

In one letter, he asks Hewitt for feedback about changing his name (Little Willie and Elston are mentioned in the letters), and writes about selling a million records (he's actually sold about 125 million) and appearing on "American Bandstand" in front of throngs of screaming girls. "They really give an insight into how he's going to present himself,"

Livingston said. "It shows that Dylan dreamed all this up, and it all came true — he foresaw it."

Alas, like most teenage romances, it came to an end.

In one of the last letters, the future Nobel laureate asks Hewitt to return the photographs he sent her. But it seems likely Dylan did not forget her.

Hewitt's daughter told RR Auction that Dylan called her mother sometime in the late 1960s after he'd hit the big time and asked her to come to California.

She turned him down.

Hewitt was a redhead, and Livingston speculates that Dylan's references to redheaded or auburn-haired women in some songs were inspired by Hewitt, including "Tangled Up in Blue" where in one line he wonders "if her hair was still red." Hewitt moved on, apparently. She married another Hibbing man, but divorced in the late 1970s after seven years and never remarried, her daughter told the auction house.

built the first school in 1891, and Gertrude McIntyre became the first teacher.

James Harvey died in 1905. One of his sons, Albert Luphenia Echols and wife Cora, filed on a section of land adjoining his father on the south. They had three sons that included Leroy, Harvey, and Elbert.

O.B Hoover promoted a large celebration to launch the new townsite, and the sale of lots which became so competitive that he put names of buyers in a hat and drew in the order of sale. There were 25 blocks on the southside of the T&P tracks,

five others on the north-south streets on the south were numbered. However, Third Street later became Main. East-west, streets were named Pacific, Pace, Broadway, Rancier and Hoover. Paralleling the tracks on the north was Texas, with Culp one block to the north.

By 1916, Coahoma was proud to claim 500 citizens. A found back issue of a Coahoma newspaper stated that the town included three mercantile stores, one hardware/furniture store, a garage, a blacksmith shop, a drugstore, two gins, two barbers, a lumberyard, meat market, millinery shop, bank, a hotel, and a new brick schoolhouse. There were three different attempts to establish a newspaper in Coahoma, 1916, 1920s and a quickly failed attempt during the depression.

Coahoma continued growing and flourishing, and was incorporated on June 14, 1927. The first mayor to serve was Ben Logan with Aldermen being Leroy Echols, J.A. Roberts, J.L. Collins, J.E Adams, H.T. Hale, and E.T. O'Daniel. Citizens passed a \$25,000 bond issue in 1928 for a water system, including wells, standpipe, and mains. Coahoma connected in 1955 with the Howard County Water Control and improvement District No. 1 to get treated water from Big Spring. This spurred even more growth in the Coahoma area.

With this information, arises another question: "How did Coahoma schools choose a bulldog as their mascot?" Perhaps, if the modern information highway had been available back then, Coahoma Bulldogs could have been Coahoma Red Panthers!

In Amsterdam, four bodies, violently butchered, are discovered in a canal house, the remains of friends and confidantes of the assassin known only as Louis in *The Nameless Ones*-Charlie Parker series Bk 19 (M CON J) by John Connolly. The men responsible for the murders are Serbian war criminals. They believe they can escape retribution by retreating to their homeland. They are wrong. Louis has come to Europe to hunt them down: five killers to be found and punished before they can vanish into thin air.

# Fans praise slain rapper Takeoff at Atlanta memorial

ATLANTA (AP) — Fans celebrated the musical legacy of slain rapper Takeoff on Friday at a memorial service in Atlanta, near where the artist grew up, that drew Justin Bieber, Drake and other big names in the music industry.

Takeoff, part of the Grammy Award-nominated trio Migos with uncle Quavo and cousin Offset, was shot and killed earlier this month outside a Houston bowling alley. A woman and another man were also wounded in the shooting. No arrests have been made.

Jenifer Loving, 22, stood in line with her infant son, Mateo, for more than an hour before the doors at State Farm Arena opened to fans who were able to get a free ticket. She said Takeoff's death was heartbreaking in part because he was only 28 years old.

Migos' music represented the creativity and culture of the Black community, she said, and she worried the group would be too saddened to make new music — at least for a while.

"It's just something that you can play anywhere, and everybody will just come out and come around and dance," she said. "It's how it brings people together. It's how it makes the whole room just fill up with positivity."

Eric Hood, an Atlanta firefighter, said he was shocked when he heard about Takeoff's death because of the three members of Migos, he was considered the most laid back.

Migos' music was an "escape" for many people, he said, and he was hopeful the event would leave the rapper's family and the rest of the group with lasting memories of him.

"I pray for them," he said. "I hope they continue to be uplifting, positive, influential members in the society and keep pushing forward."

Dozens of fans lined up early at the arena, home to the Atlanta Hawks, despite rainy weather. A massive sign outside was lit up with the rapper's image.

Free tickets to the memorial service were available to Georgia residents, but State Farm Arena said well before Friday that the event had reached capacity and fans without tickets should not come downtown.

Organizers did not release a program for the event or allow media inside. Several fans leaving the event confirmed Bieber and Drake's presence and said Offset and Quavo also talked.

Atlanta resident Jeffrey Wilson said the event was moving. "His mother was up there, and I could see the tears in her," Wilson said. "I felt the kinship myself, like I knew him personally."

Tyler Williams drove hours from Montgomery, Alabama, on Friday morning with his 2-year-old son, Ashton.

"He probably won't remember it," he said of his son. "But it's something to have when he gets older, to know he was there."

Migos broke out nearly a decade ago with the 2013 hit "Versace," which hit even greater heights in popularity through a Drake remix. The trio were largely raised by Takeoff's mother in an Atlanta suburb.

Houston Police Chief Troy Finner said the day after the shooting that Takeoff, born Kirsnick Khari Ball, was "well respected," and there was "no reason to believe he was involved in anything criminal at the time."

Migos' record label, Quality Control, mourned Takeoff's death in a statement posted on Instagram that attributed it to "senseless violence and a stray bullet." Police have said nothing about the gunshot being stray.

Instead of flowers or gifts, his family has asked that people make donations to The Rocket Foundation, which was established in Takeoff's honor and aims to prevent gun violence, according to its website.

# Click out as Astros GM 6 days after winning World Series

HOUSTON (AP) — Astros general manager James Click will not be given a new contract, a highly unusual move that the team announced Friday — just six days after Houston won the World Series.

Click was hired from the Tampa Bay Rays before the 2020 season and appeared increasingly distant from owner Jim Crane. The 44-year-old Click did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

It's believed to be the first change in general manager following a World Series title since 1947, when the Yankees' Larry MacPhail was replaced by George Weiss.

Click said Tuesday at the general managers meetings in Las Vegas that his contract expired Oct. 31 and the situation had not been addressed. He also said that he was given little advance notice of Wednesday's news conference, where the Astros announced that manager Dusty Baker was coming back on a one-year contract.

Click wouldn't respond Tuesday when asked by reporters whether he had been offered a one-year contract. And he answered indirectly when asked whether autonomy over baseball operations was an issue.

"All of us always want to have areas of responsibility in areas

that we can call our own, in areas that we can take pride in," he said. "Inevitably in any of these jobs, these decisions are multi-million-dollar decisions, and ownership is going to be involved. It's just a question of degree."

Crane was asked about Click's status multiple times Wednesday and said the two were in discussions. Crane also was asked how he would evaluate the job Click had done since taking over after Jeff Luhnow was fired in the wake of the team's sign-stealing scandal.

"We're going over that," Crane said. "But I think James has done a good job. He stepped in and made some good moves. We'll sit down and see where we're going to end up with James."

After that, Crane was asked whether he thought the organization was better off now with Click at the helm: "I've run a lot of businesses. This one is no different. I'm never satisfied. If I was satisfied maybe we wouldn't be where we are. But I press everybody to get better from top to bottom ... so I'm always looking to improve and I can improve, the people on my team can improve and the players can improve. So the standard is there for everyone."

Click spent 14 years with the Rays, starting as a coordinator of baseball operations before becoming the team's director of baseball research and development and director of baseball operations. He spent three seasons as vice president of baseball operations before Houston hired him.

## Deshaun Watson set to practice with Browns next week

BEREA, Ohio (AP) — Deshaun Watson has one last weekend off the field.

The Cleveland Browns' suspended quarterback can begin practicing on Monday as part of his settlement with the NFL after he was accused of sexual misconduct by two dozen women when he played for Houston.

Watson, who was acquired by the Browns in a controversial trade in March, was banned for 11 games in August for violating the league's personal conduct policy. He agreed to the suspension, a \$5 million fine and to undergo counseling and treatment.

He returned to the team last month, but the three-time Pro Bowler has been limited to attending meetings, weight-room workouts and conditioning sessions with members of Cleveland's training staff.

That changes on Monday, when he'll be allowed to practice.

The Browns (3-5) play at Miami on Sunday and won't have their next on-field workout until Wednesday when Watson, who will be eligible to play on Dec. 4 — against Houston — can rejoin his teammates.

"I've been waiting. We're still waiting. I'm ready to play with him," said Browns defensive end Jadeveon Clowney, who was also Watson's teammate with the Texans. "I've played with him before. He's a big energy booster for a team. He can go out there make some crazy throws, make some plays, and I think when he gets back we can open up our playbook with him a little different."

"It's going to be exciting to see when he gets back. I'm just ready for it."

Watson has always denied being inappropriate with the women, who claim he exposed himself and touched them inappropriately during massage therapy sessions. The 27-year-old settled 23 of 24 civil lawsuits brought against him. (In October, another civil lawsuit accusing Watson of sexual misconduct was filed in Texas.)

Two grand juries in Texas declined to indict him on criminal charges.

Watson was courted by other teams and initially turned down a trade to the Browns before changing his mind after the team offered him a five-year, \$230 million contract that's fully guaranteed. The Browns sent three first-round draft picks to the Texans for Watson, and are counting on him to become a franchise QB.

Jacoby Brissett has played well while filling in at quarterback, but he'll soon step aside for Cleveland's final six games.

Browns coach Kevin Stefanski declined to specify the team's immediate plans for Watson when he comes back next week.

"We kind of have a plan for that moving forward," Stefanski said. "Deshaun is a great, great teammate. He has been awesome having him back in the building and in the meetings rooms."

The Browns can't afford many more losses or their playoff hopes will vanish before Watson comes back. There's obvious incentive to play well to set up Watson's return to games, but All-Pro defensive end Myles Garrett said that can't be the focus.

"We've got to win regardless if he comes back or not," Garrett said. "Anything can happen, praying to God that he's healthy and everything goes right when he comes back, but I don't plan on handing it to anyone."

"He's coming back to us, so we're all going to do our part and he's going to come in and do an exceptional job, and we fully believe that. But we've got to win for the sake of winning, wanting to be great and do great for the sake of this city. Not just for him coming back."

## NFL to honor John Madden on Thanksgiving broadcasts

From awarding victory turkey legs to the star players to being the voice on the NFL's biggest Thanksgiving Day games for years, John Madden was synonymous with the holiday he so adored.

The NFL is making that a lasting tribute by honoring the late broadcaster by launching the "John Madden Thanksgiving Celebration" to begin on the first Thanksgiving following his death last December.

"No one cared more or contributed more to our game than John Madden," Commissioner Roger Goodell said in a statement. "Honoring his memory

and impact on the NFL is important and Thanksgiving Day brings all of the elements significant to John to life — family, football, food and fun."

The league plans for the Thanksgiving tribute to Madden to be an annual event starting Nov. 24, when there will be special segments on all three broadcasts by CBS, Fox and NBC dedicated to Madden.

A recording of Madden discussing Thanksgiving and the holiday's relationship to football will serve as the lead-in to the three games that day: Buffalo at Detroit on CBS, the Giants at Dallas on Fox and New England at Minnesota on NBC.

Madden worked for all three of those networks during a ca-

reer that included 20 games on Thanksgiving when he worked at CBS and Fox.

"There's no place that I would rather be today on Thanksgiving than right here, right now, at a football game," Madden said at the Bears-Lions Thanksgiving game in 1997. "There are just certain things that go together: the turkey, the family, the tradition, football. ... And we have it all today."

Madden began the tradition of handing out a turkey leg to the star of the game beginning in 1989 when Philadelphia's Reggie White got it following a win over Dallas.

The following year Madden gave out victory legs to Dallas'

Emmitt Smith and Troy Aikman and joked that he wished he had more for the offensive linemen.

A barbecue owner in Texas took up the challenge and created an artificial six-legged turkey.

For this year's games, the "Madden Player of the Game" will have a \$10,000 donation made in their name by the NFL Foundation to the youth or high school football program of their choice.

There will also be "John Madden Thanksgiving" logos on the 25-yard lines and a sticker on the back of each helmet featuring an image of Madden with his fist up in the air.

## NHL, NHLPA call off plans to hold World Cup of Hockey in '24

The NHL and NHL Players' Association have abandoned plans to hold a World Cup of Hockey in 2024.

They made the announcement in a joint statement Friday, saying it was not feasible to hold the tournament in February as they had hoped. The league and union said they hope to stage it in February 2025 and will continue to plan for that.

There has not been a World Cup for the sport since 2016 for various reasons. This time, the war in Ukraine was the reason because some countries did not want Russians to participate and players want the best in the world to take part.

Pushing plans to 2025 buys the league and players another year to figure out what to do with the Russia issue. Deputy Commissioner Bill Daly said some countries refused to play if Russians were allowed to participate, even if not in nation-

al team uniforms.

That would have meant the likes of Alex Ovechkin, Evgeni Malkin, Andrei Vasilevskiy and Nikita Kucherov being left out, which would have taken a huge chunk of talent out of the tournament. Unlike soccer, which banned Russia from its World Cup because of the country's invasion of Ukraine, many of hockey's best players are from there and the impact would be much greater.

Commissioner Gary Bettman foreshadowed the decision last month, saying the deadline was approaching to nail down plans. There were other hurdles, such as cooperation with the International Ice Hockey Federation and national federations over hosting games in Europe, but the league and players were confident they could do the tournament themselves, if needed.

Two months ago, when it looked likely the World Cup would indeed happen, U.S. star Jack Eichel said, "Don't hold your

breath" in a skeptical tone that turned out to be warranted.

"We're trying to grow hockey globally," Eichel said. "Whether it's representing your country or having the opportunity to play against the world's best, everyone wants to do it. I think it's something that fans want to see. I think it's great for our game."

There is optimism about 2025 and extra time could allow for a qualifying tournament to decide who joins the obvious teams: the U.S., Canada, Sweden, Finland and the Czech Republic — and perhaps Russia, depending on the global climate.

The 2016 World Cup closely followed the 2014 Olympics in Sochi. The NHL chose to skip the 2018 Olympics and planned to participate in 2022 in China before the pandemic caused enough schedule disruption to derail those hopes.

The NHL has committed to sending players to the 2026 Winter Olympics in Milan and Cortina.

Celebrate a classic sandwich that goes by many names

Even though making sandwiches usually does not involve any cooking, that doesn't mean layering flavors and selecting quality meats and cheeses involves any less intuition and skill. One of the most popular styles of sandwiches goes by many names, and what you call the sandwich may let others know which part of the country you call home.

Each May, people pay homage to the "hoagie," which is the name that people from Philadelphia and southern New Jersey bestow on a long, cold-cut sandwich. But these sandwiches can be enjoyed any time of year. There are many theories surrounding the origin of this sandwich's name,

which is known as a submarine, grinder, hero, or torpedo in other regions. According to the food resource TheKitchn, this sandwich got its name from Italian immigrants who worked at the Philadelphia Navy Yard, which was once known as Hog Island. Workers were known as "hog-gies," which eventually became "hoagies." The name soon was extended to the sandwiches these workers frequently ate.

Anyone can craft a delicious sandwich at home. Enjoy this "Classic Italian Sub (Hoagie)" recipe, courtesy of Boar's Head®.

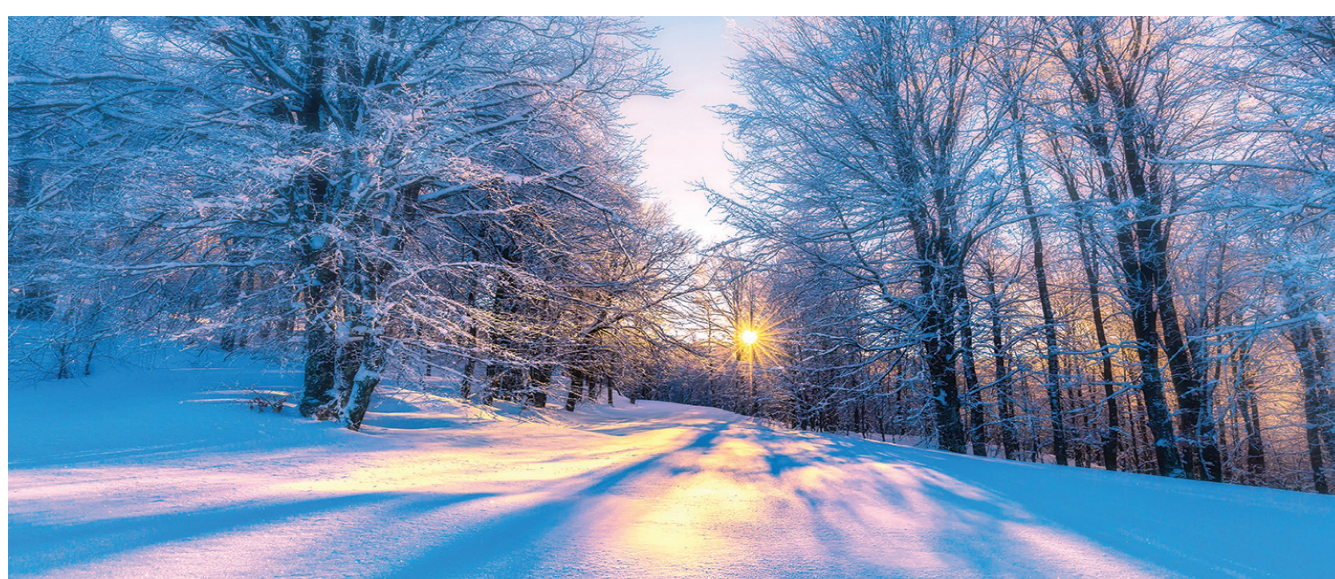

Famous Hand

West dealer. North-South vulnerable. This deal was played many years ago in a match between two Stockholm teams. South was the Swedish star Einar Werner, who wound up in seven spades doubled. East's four-diamond bid asked for controls in diamonds and hearts. The five-heart response showed second-round control of diamonds as well as the ace of the agreed trump suit, hearts. Five notrump was the grand slam force, asking West to bid seven if he had two of the three top heart honors. Believing the opponents' bidding, Werner elected to sacrifice against

seven hearts (which would have been down one). He ruffed the opening heart lead and cashed the rest of his trumps. When the last trump was led, dummy had been reduced to the queen of hearts and A-J-6 of clubs. At this point, West, who was down to the ace of hearts and K-10-9 of clubs, was squeezed. When he discarded the nine of clubs, Werner pitched the heart queen, took the club finesse and scored the last three tricks with dummy's A-J-6 of clubs. Making seven, 2,420 points. There were fireworks at the other table, too. Werner's teammates, holding the East-West cards, reached seven diamonds doubled, played by East. South led the queen of clubs (North had doubled five clubs at one point). Dummy's king brought forth the ace, ruffed by declarer. East drew two rounds of trump and cashed the king of hearts. When South showed out, declarer had to fall back on the club suit. He led dummy's ten, trapping North's jack, and East's J-10-9 of hearts were eventually discarded on dummy's good clubs. So the Werner team, after scoring a grand slam with the North-South cards, also scored one with the East-West cards (another 1,580 points) at the other table! Amazingly, a diamond lead would have beaten both contracts.



14 facts about the winter solstice The winter solstice occurs each year during the month of December in the northern hemisphere. In 2022, the winter solstice will take place on December 21 at 4:48 p.m. EST. Solstices are significant events that occur twice per year. One occurs in the winter and one in the summer. The winter solstice also is known as the first day of winter and occurs when the Earth's pole reaches its maximum tilt away from the sun. During the winter solstice, people will experience the shortest period of daylight and the longest period of nighttime of the year. Here are 14 fascinating facts about the winter solstice.

- 1. Depending on the hemisphere, the north or south pole will experience continuous darkness or twilight around its winter solstice.
2. The winter solstice sometimes is referred to by the term midwinter.
3. Even though the solstice is marked by a whole day on the calendar, it actually is just the brief moment of time when the sun is exactly over the Tropic of Capricorn.
4. The word "solstice" can be translated from Latin and means "sun stand still."
5. The Tropic of Capricorn is located at 23.5 degrees south of the equator.
6. Tourists flock to Stonehenge to track the movement of the sun. The stones will frame the sunset on the winter solstice

- and the sunrise on the summer solstice.
7. Ancient cultures viewed the winter solstice as a time of death and rebirth.
8. Important events in history have taken place on winter solstices. The Apollo 8 spacecraft launched on the solstice in 1968. Pilgrims also arrived at Plymouth on the winter solstice in 1620.
9. Each planet in the Earth's solar system has its own solstices and equinoxes.
10. The southern hemisphere experiences the winter solstice in June each year.
11. A full moon on a solstice is even more rare than a blue moon. The last full moon to occur on the winter solstice was in 2010 and the next one won't happen until 2094.

- 12. Earth is closer to the sun around the winter solstice in December. However, the northern hemisphere receives less sunlight and has cooler temperatures because it is tilted away from the sun during winter.
13. Even though the winter solstice features the shortest amount of daylight of any day during the year, it does not have the earliest sunset. That takes place roughly two weeks prior. In 2021 in New York, the winter solstice took place on December 21, but the earliest sunset occurred on December 7 at 4:28 p.m.
14. Meteorological winter begins on December 1 rather than December 21.
