can go to USPSOperationSanta.com, create an account and have their identities verified to help fulfill the holiday wishes of children and families who have written to Santa. USPS Operation Santa relies solely on

random acts of kindness and the generosity of strangers. For 110 years, the program has provided some extra magic to those in need during the holiday season. Registration is only for those wishing

to adopt letters. Letter writers do not need to register. Potential adopters must go to USPSOperationSanta.com, click on the registration link and follow the prompts. For security reasons, all prospective adopters must register to create an account and have their identities verified before they can participate. Even if

past, they must create a new account each year.

If a potential adopter is unable to have their identity verified online, they will be directed to get verified in person. The Postal Service will send the adopter a barcode and the location of the nearest Post Office location that can provide in-person ID verification. Once approved, the adopter will receive a welcome email with detailed information on how to participate in the program.

Beginning Nov. 28, verified adopters can visit USPSOp-

A Moment in History

T&P's Alpha and Omega

Train service in Big Spring was first established on May 28, 1881. The Texas and Pacific Railroad attached passenger cars to freight cars. The cars were wooden and crudely constructed. They were drafty, creaked, leaked, and almost defied heating with cast iron wood burning stoves. The seats were made from hard varnished and narrow shiplap. But to travelers, it was a miracle to "fly" through the country behind a 25-ton locomotive going 30-35 mph. It was now possible to visit friends and family other than a long trip by horse and buggy.

Gradually the quality of the coaches was upgraded. Steam heat replaced the old stoves, and after the turn of the century, they were replaced by the miracle of electricity that replaced the lanterns and lamps. Air brakes took over the old hand brakes which had to be set on each car.

Mohair upholstering softened the seats. Then came the Pullmans, sleepers of years ago. These were improved by adding upper and lower berths and lounge space with toilets and lavatories. In time, state rooms and roomettes were added for privacy and comfort.

Dining cars were added and offered cuisine at its finest. The climax of elegance came with the Club cars that were furnished with lounge chairs, game tables, and soda fountains. Later, the soda fountains were converted into bars. The large windows enabled passengers to take in the vast Texas scen-

Trains were not without their personalities. The somber conductor punched the passenger's ticket. Porters were statue-like figures, standing by to serve the passenger. They wore their stiff brimmed caps and dark serged suits, or with their starched gleaming white jackets worn in the dining car.

The "News Butch" hawked such wonderful wares, sparkling apples, oranges, bananas, and grapes along with the newspa-





pers, magazines, confections, and a clandestine copy of Capt. Billy's Whiz Bang.

Carriers were always throwing in an excursion to pep up business. Sometimes ads were placed in the paper, but frequently, circulars were distributed to apprise the public of the ridiculously low rail fares to El Paso and the mysteries of Juarez, Mexico, or to the bright lights of Fort Worth and Dallas. Occasionally cars were chartered for wedding parties or other special events. Towns with intense rivalry in sports chartered special trains. The T&P promoted special luxury trains to international conventions and to such annual events as the Kentucky Derby.

Gradually, steel cars replaced the wooden antiques. After World War II, streamlined cars with silvery aluminum replaced the steel cars. Mechanical air conditioning replaced the first system of blowing air over ice. Porters served coffee gratis and furnished patrons with a free clean pillow. Special attractive prices were offered on the diner, as well as on tourist fares. The railroad's future looked bright, and as such, designers planned sophisticated trains of the future. One of

High mortgage rates send homebuyers scrambling for relief

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mortgage rates are more than double what they were a year ago, so many homebuyers are looking for ways to put off some of the pain for a few years.

The trend has driven adjustablerate mortgages, or ARMs, to the highest usage in over a decade.

A recent snapshot by the Mortgage Bankers Association showed that ARMs accounted for 12.8% of all home loan applications in the week ended Oct. 14. The last time these loans made up a bigger share of all mortgage applications was in the first week of March 2008.

At the start of the year ARMs represented only 3.1% of all mortgage applications. The average rate on a 30-year fixed-rate mortgage then was 3.22%, while last month that rate topped 7% — the highest since 2002.

This week, the average rate for a 30year mortgage fell to 6.58 %, according to mortgage buyer Freddie Mac. A year ago, it was 3.1%.

Mortgage rates' swift rise follows a sharp increase in the vield on the 10-vear Treasury note, which has climbed amid expectations of higher interest rates overall as the Federal Reserve has hiked its short-term rate in a bid to crush the highest inflation in decades.

As mortgage rates rise, they can add hundreds of dollars to monthly mortgage payments. That's a significant hurdle for many would-be homebuyers, resulting in this year's housing downturn. Last month, sales of previously occupied U.S. homes fell for the ninth consecutive month. Annual sales are running at the slowest prepandemic pace in more than 10 years.

For house hunters still able to afford a home at current elevated mortgage rates, reducing their monthly pay ments with an adjustable-rate loan for the first few years can help give them financial flexibility.

A homebuyer who takes out a typi cal 5/1 ARM, for example, will have a low, fixed rate for the first five years of the loan. After that, the loan shifts to an adjustable interest rate, which could be higher or lower, until the debt is paid off, or the buyer refinances the loan.

Another approach that's become popular recently is buying down the interest rate on a fixed-rate 30-year loan for the first two or three years.

Buying down the rate on a 30-year mortgage can make monthly pay ments more manageable -- something both homebuilders and homeowners are offering to entice buvers as the housing market slows.

Let's say a borrower takes out a 30vear mortgage with a 6% fixed rate. With what's known as a 3-2-1 rate buy down, that homebuyer's interest rate would be 3% in the first year of the loan, 4% in the second and 5% in the third, saving them potentially thousands of dollars along the way.

The borrower must still qualify for the full monthly payment before the buydown adjustment, however.

Michele steps down as Gucci creative director Alessandro

MILAN (AP) — Alessandro Michele is leaving his role as creative director of the Gucci, the fashion house announced Wednesday, bringing an end to an eight-year tenure that sharply redefined Gucci's codes with romanticism and gender-fluidity, all the while powering revenues for the Kering parent. Womenswear Daily

ported Michele's expected departure on Tuesday, citing sources that said Michele had failed to meet a request to "initiate a strong design shift," and that the chairman of Gucci's parent Kering, Francois-Henri Pinault, was looking for a change of pace.

No mention of such backroom moves was made in the chele's departure, in which Gucci credited him with having played "a fundamental part in making the brand what it is today through his groundbreaking creativity."

Michele cited "different perspectives" as the reason for his departure, without elaborating.

"Today an extraordinary journey ends for me, lasting more than 20 years, within

a company to which I have dressed Billie Eilish, Flortirelessly dedicated all my love and creative passion," he

Michele was appointed creative director in January 2015, just days after he led a creative team that pulled together a menswear show in just five days, following the hasty exit of his predecessor. That collection announced Gucci's new direction, with silken blouses for men featuring elaborate bows and ruffled necks along with furtrimmed capes, as Michele redefined masculine dressing

For most of his tenure, Gucci has turned in stellar revenues, accounting for most of Kerings profits. But it has cently after underperforming rivals.

Michele's partnerships with Hollywood elite and VIPs were often rooted in friendships. Jared Leto has been a frequent front-row guest at Gucci shows during Michele's tenure, for a time adopting the same straight long hair and beard sported by the Gucci designer.

Michele also has famously

ence Welch and the Italian rock band Maneskin on its current tour. And he recently unveiled a collection designed with Harry Styles.

For his last runway collection, unveiled in September, Michele constructed a parallel universe of side-by-side shows separated by a wall that when lifted revealed twins in identical looks in synchronic stride. Michele joined Gucci in 2002, becoming an associate to the creative director in May 2011. In 2014, he was named creative director of the Richard Ginori porcelain brand, owned by Gucci. Gucci CEO and president, Marco Bizzarri, thanked Michele "for his 20 years of commitment to Gucci, and for his vision, devotion and unconditional love for this unique

There is only one USPS Operation Santa program, sanctioned by the Postal Service. Fulfilling wishes through the official program is voluntary and any organization asking you to give them money to adopt letters is in violation of the laws under which the Postal Service operates and is not condoned by, or affiliated with, the U.S. Postal Service.

USPS Operation Santa History

The Postal Service began receiving letters to Santa more than a century ago. In 1912, Postmaster General Frank Hitchcock authorized local postmasters to allow employees and customers to respond to them. This act of kindness became what is now known as USPS Operation Santa.

The complete program history can be found online at the USPS Holiday Newsroom, along with additional news and information, including all domestic, international, and military mailing and shipping deadlines.

The Postal Service generally receives no tax dollars for operating expenses and relies on the sale of postage, products and services to fund its opera-

Opponents sought vainly to place the blame for declining use on curtailed service. Pullman sleepers had been taken off the train. Lounge cars were long since gone, diner cars disappeared, and service was left with a void. The T&P argued successfully that it's illogical to subsidize a little wanted service. Logic seemed to prevail. Soon gone were the days of watching the passenger train come into the depot. The busy drummers, in their derby, lugging heavy cases were no longer disembarking the trains and new settlers dismounting to the offer of "fresh hay and new tie ropes" were all in the past. On a somber Wednesday morning, March 22, 1967, the last Passenger Train 26, rolled gracefully away, at 6:40 am, for its final destination to Fort Worth. On that day, T&P removed the passenger sign after 86 years of service. J.C. Craven ran his last route as passenger engineer with B.J. Hutchinson as Fireman. Joe Pickle wrote, "When the all-steel diesel-powered train snaked its way around the bend below the Benton Street overpass. It was far different from the wood burning 25-ton locomotive that puffed in from Fort Worth around that same bend 86 years previously. It was the Alpha and today was the Omega.' The romantic chapter in railroading was closed.

try so people could see what was in store for the future. There was a full capacity crowd waiting for it's stop when it arrived in Big Spring. As this modern train entered the city, no one could have predicted that the tide was at its peak. Airplanes transported people much faster as the trains once did over horse drawn carriages. Interstates and highways were being constructed for the newer luxury liner buses and automobiles. Not even the smooth powered Diesel engines could beat the newer forms of transportation.

was fatal so far as the Texas & Pacific was concerned for it simply compounded the history of loss in progressively declining passenger patronage. Two trains had been taken off service, the two remaining were operating at a \$300,000 per year loss, officials declared. That was too much luxury for sentiment.

Gambling has gone from the forbidden topic in the NFL to a key part of the league's present and future.

The days of lobbying against widespread legalized sports betting, preventing broadcast partners from even discussing point spreads and even prohibiting players from holding a fantasy football convention because it was at a casino are firmly in the

With a team playing in Las Vegas just a short walk from the casinos on The Strip, sponsorship deals with gambling companies who pay millions for in-game advertisements and teams having sports books next to their stadiums, the relationship between America's richest sports league and gambling is stronger than ever.

"The NFL has evolved quickly with the growing importance of sports betting on the overall ecosystem," said Robert Fishman, a senior analyst with MoffettNathanson, a division of SVB Securities.

"Sports betting continuing to grow in importance and will continue to be a driver of growth. We're still in the very early days and there will be a natural evolution of how this continues to grow." The growth has been

astronomical already since the U.S. Supreme Court overturned the Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act (PASPA) in 2018, setting the stage for legalized sports betting to spread outside Nevada to most of the rest of the country. More than 30 states

and Washington, D.C., allow sports betting either online or in person with several more set to join them in the next few years. The NFL is doing its

Highhill said league also is focused on "responsible gambling" and gave a grant to the National Council on Problem Gambling to focus on that area.

The NFL has signed deals with DraftKings, FanDuel and Caesars Entertainment that reportedly could be worth about \$1 billion for the league over five years.

Those companies have fueled an advertising spending spree that saw gambling companies spend \$129 million in advertising during NFL games during the 2021 season, according to research from the Kantar

Research from MoffettNathanson shows that legalized sports betting revenue in the United States grew from less than \$500 million in 2019 in the first year after PASPA was overturned to more than \$3 billion

"In a few short years, the very idea of sports betting has been transformed from a taboo and sub rosa vice into a major business opportunity," the company said in the report. "From sports leagues to rights owners to consumers, it is clear how important sports betting is today and how quickly sentiment has reversed the stigma that once was attached to this industry."

Verlander, Pujols voted **Comeback Players of the Year**

NEW YORK (AP) — Houston Astros ace Justin Verlander and St. Louis Cardinals slugger Albert Pujols won baseball's Comeback Player of the Year awards Tuesday night.

Verlander, the American League recipient, returned from Tommy John surgery to lead Houston to its second World Series championship. He had the lowest ERA in the majors and was a unanimous winner of his third Cy Young Award — becoming the first player to earn the prize after not pitching in the previous season. Pujols, honored in the National

League, came back to St. Louis for his farewell season and posted his biggest numbers in years at age 42. The three-time MVP compiled an .895 OPS for the NL Central champions and became the fourth major leaguer to reach 700 career home runs. The winners were chosen in voting

by the 30 team beat reporters at MLB. Verlander went 18-4 with a 1.75 ERA

and 185 strikeouts in 28 starts and

made his ninth All-Star team. He won Game 5 in Philadelphia for the first World Series win of his illustrious career, then became a free agent this The 39-year-old right-hander made

only one start in 2020 because of his elbow injury and missed the entire 2021 season while recovering from Pujols batted .270 with 24 homers and 68 RBIs in 109 games for the Car-

dinals after getting released by the Los Angeles Angels in May 2021 and finishing last year with the Dodgers. His OPS was his highest since his last season with the Cardinals in 2011 (.906) before joining the Angels, and

his home runs were his most since

hitting 31 in 2016 for the Angels. The 11-time All-Star hit 18 home runs in the second half and retired after the Cardinals were eliminated from the playoffs by Philadelphia in the wild-card round.

He finished his career fourth in major league annals in home runs (703), second in RBIs (2,218) and total bases (6,211), and ninth in hits (3,384).

Seven Michigan St football players charged in tunnel melee

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Seven Michigan State football players are charged in the postgame melee in Michigan Stadium's tunnel last month, according to a statement Wednesday from the Washtenaw County Prosecutor's Office.

The most serious charge is against cornerback Khary Crump. who faces a felony count of felonious assault. The charges against the six others are misdemeanors. Linebacker Itayvion "Tank" Brown, safety Angelo Grose, cornerback Justin White, defensive end Brandon Wright and defensive end Zion Young are each charged with one count of aggravated assault, and linebacker Jacoby Windmon faces one count of assault and battery.

No. 3 Michigan plays rival No. 2 Ohio State on the road Saturday a few hours before the Spartans close out their regular-season at No. 11 Penn State, and needing a win to become bowl eligible.

Scuffles broke out in the Michigan Stadium tunnel on Oct. 29 after the then-No. 4 Wolverines beat the Spartans 29-7. Social media posts showed Michigan State players pushing, punching and kicking Michigan's Ja'Den Mc-Burrows in and near a hallway that doesn't lead to either locker room. Brown, Grose and Young are seen on video getting physical with McBurrows. McBurrows and defen-

sive back Gemon Green went up the tunnel, walking alongside the Spartans, after the game while much of Michigan's team was waving them off the field after beating their in-state rivals for the first time in three years.

Green, in another post, is surrounded by police while shouting across the tunnel at Michigan State players.

Michigan coach Jim Harbaugh has said one of the players, who he did not identify, might have had a broken nose. He also said Green was punched by a Spartans player and McBurrows was attacked when he tried to help.

Harbaugh has said he expected the suspended Spartans to be criminally charged.

The statement from the prosecutor's office provided no detail on the allegations, including who is accused of hitting whom. The statement also doesn't list potential prison sentences for each charge. It adds that the office will have no further comment as the case proceeds.

Michigan dent Santa J. Ono said Wednesday in a statement that the school appreciated "the thoughtful, deliberate approach from the Washtenaw County Prosecutor's Office to this unfortunate incident.'

"We also want to express our concern for all the players involved, especially those who were injured," Ono said. "The University of Michigan will continue to cooperate fully with any additional reviews of this

matter." Michigan State's athletic director and football coach did not immediately return requests

for comment. Michigan State coach Mel Tucker suspended eight players — including Malcolm Jones, who is not being charged with a crime — for their

role in the melee. After the Oct. 29 incident, Michigan State President Samuel Stanley publicly apologized for the "violent" skir-

"I'm extremely saddened by this incident and the unacceptable behavior depicted by members of our football program," Stanley said then in a statement. "On behalf of Michigan State University, my heartfelt apology to the University of Michigan and the student athletes who were injured."

And there has been little evidence that they would be interested in sign-Ronaldo's interview with Piers Mor-

gan, in which he criticized United manager Erik ten Hag and the club's owners, made it clear he still believes he is one of the top soccer players on the planet. But where in the world will his career take him next?

Today In History...

Today is Monday, Nov. 28, the 332nd day of 2022. There are 33 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 28, 1942, fire engulfed the Cocoanut Grove nightclub in Boston, killing 492 people in the deadliest nightclub blaze ever. (The cause of the rapidly spreading fire, which began in the basement, is in dispute; one theory is that a busboy accidentally ignited an artificial palm tree while using a lighted match to fix a light bulb.)

On this date:

In 1520, Portuguese navigator Ferdinand Magellan reached the Pacific Ocean after passing through the South American strait that now bears his name.

In 1919, American-born Lady Astor was elected the first female member of the British Parliament.

In 1943, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Soviet leader Josef Stalin began conferring in Tehran during World War II.

In 1961, Ernie Davis of Syracuse University became the first African-American to be named winner of the Heisman Trophy.

In 1964, the United States launched the space probe Mariner 4 on a course toward Mars, which it flew past in July 1965, sending back pictures of the red planet.

In 1979, an Air New Zealand DC-10 en route to the South Pole crashed into a mountain in Antarctica, killing all 257 people aboard.

In 1990, Margaret Thatcher resigned as British prime minister during an audience with Queen Elizabeth II, who then conferred the premiership on John Major.

In 1994, serial killer Jeffrey Dahmer was slain in a Wisconsin prison by a fellow inmate. Sixties war protester Jerry Rubin died in Los Angeles, two weeks after being hit by a car; he was 56.

In 2001, Enron Corp., once the world's largest energy trader, collapsed after would-be rescuer Dynegy Inc. backed out of an \$8.4 billion takeover deal. (Enron filed for bankruptcy protection four days later.)

In 2016, the first commercial flight from the United States to Havana in more than 50 years arrived in Cuba as the island began week-long memorial services for Fidel Castro.

In 2018, Democrats overwhelmingly nominated Nancy Pelosi to become House speaker when Democrats took control of the House in January.

In 2020, Pennsylvania's highest court threw out a lower court's order preventing the state from certifying dozens of contests on its Nov. 3 election ballot; it was the latest lawsuit filed by Republicans attempting to undo President-elect Joe Biden's victory in the battleground state. Sarah Fuller became

the first woman to participate in a Power Five conference football game when she kicked off for Vanderbilt to start the second half at Missouri.

Ten years ago: New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie said his state would need nearly \$37 billion to recover and rebuild from Superstorm Sandy and that the state would seek federal aid to cover most of the expenses.

Five years ago: A Libyan militant was convicted in federal court in Washington of terrorism charges stemming from the 2012 Benghazi attacks that killed the U.S. ambassador and three other Americans, but the jury found Ahmed Abu Khattala not guilty of murder. (Khattala was sentenced the following June to 22 years in prison.) Jay-Z led the 2018 Grammy Award nominations as the top four categories were heavily dominated by rap and R&B artists.

One year ago: The Netherlands confirmed 13 cases of the new omicron variant of the coronavirus, while Australia and Canada each found two. Israel barred entry to all foreign nationals as countries around the world scrambled to slow the spread of the new variant. Lee Elder, who broke down racial barriers as the first Black golfer to play in the Masters, died in Escondido, California; he was 87. Carrie Meek, one of the first Black Floridians elected to Congress since Reconstruction, died at her Miami home at 95. Virgil Abloh, a leading designer whose groundbreaking fusions of streetwear and high couture made him one of the most celebrated tastemakers in fashion and beyond, died of cancer at 41.


