'Federal aid is out of place in this contest. Cities need plenty of inducements if they are to put forth their best efforts, and free competition is the best spur-

One of the worst aspects of federal aid of this type, aside from the money costs, is that it encourages local people and local FOR COUNTY COMMISSIONorganizations and institutions to sit on their hands and wait for the Great White Father in Washington to do the needed jobs. Initiative, imagination and responsibility are undermined and in many instances destroyed. And so the trend towards a monolithic government, which decides everything and does everything, is accelerated at a tragic cost in human freedom.
