Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday in First Baptist Church here with Dr. Ray Nobles, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Willow Cemetery under direction of Holden Funeral Home.

Born April 21, 1931, in Haskell County, Mr. Foster was married to the former Dolores Burnett June 2, 1956, at Sayre, Okla. He was tax assessor-collector for the Balmorhea Public Schools system for two years. He moved from Balmorhea to Vernon and was a teacher in the Vernon Public School system two years prior to returning to Haskell in 1963.

Upon returning to Haskell he became administrator of Haskell County Hospital. He retired May 1, 1965, due to ill health. He was a member of Haskell Masonic Lodge No. 682; the Haskell Jaycees and the Haskell American Legion.

He served in the U. S. Army during the Korean Conflict. Mr. Foster was a member of First Baptist Church of Haskell.

Other stories he gathers in talking with listeners at the banquet is over. "The funniest things are those that really happen," he has discovered.

Herring is vice-president of Grand Prairie State Bank...he completed high school in Mineral Wells and after going to Allen Academy in Bryan, Texas he went to Texas Tech in Lubbock. There he played football under Pete Cawthon, making a Cotton Bowl appearance in 1939. He is a graduate of the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking, SMU, and served as president of Class III.

He is past president of the Grand Prairie Rotary Club; a 32nd Degree Mason; a six-year member of the Grand Prairie Independent School Board. He has been chairman of the United Fund Drive, worked with Boy Scout Circle 10 Council, the Grand Prairie Chamber of Commerce, and served on the equalization board.

"I'm not an extemporaneous speaker," he admits. "And although I enjoy just talking, when I get up to address a group I have put a lot of thought into what I say. I plan my talk to fit the audience. But it isn't a 'set' speech. Even after I arrive on the scene, I keep trying to size up the audience and get closer to it. The only constant formula I use is the recipe calling for two-thirds humor and one-third serious talk. A banquet audience doesn't need a lot to worry about. They might get indigestion. Finding the right story for the right audience is his hardest problem. "You can always scare 'em to death with taxes or something like that. But making them laugh is a different matter," he says.

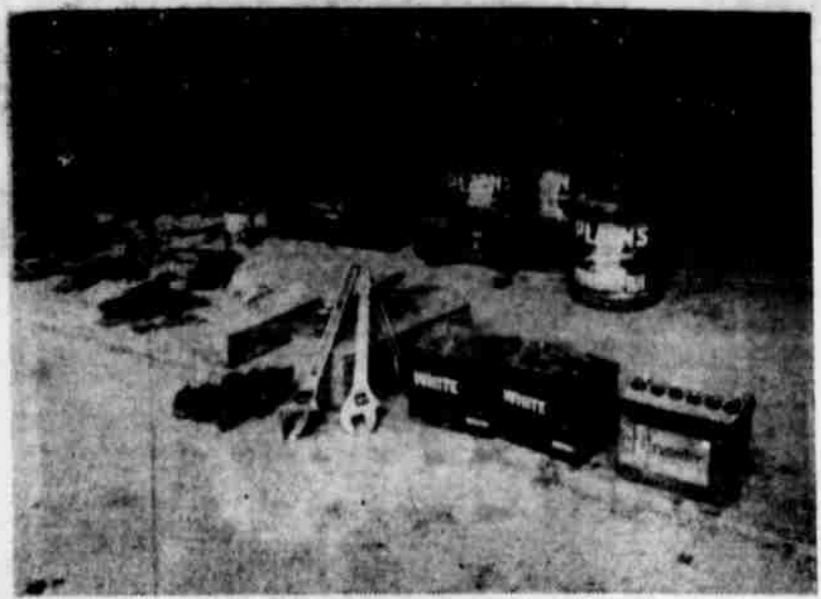
### Rotarians View Film, "Song of The Clouds"

### Large Scale Theft Ring Is Broken-Up

"The biggest battery theft ring since I have been sheriff was broken up here last week," Haskell County Sheriff Garth Garrett said.

J. W. Roberts, 35, and Lavina Reid, 52 (female), were taken into custody at a wrecking yard in Stamford, following a tip from the Stamford Police Department. Possibly two or three other counties will be involved in the thefts, Garrett said.

The loot which consisted of batteries, wrenches, chains, gas cans, four tool boxes complete with tools and many other items were taken from more than fifty farm homes in Haskell County and this area. A large amount of the stolen articles were taken from one of the suspects' home in Knox City and there is a good possibility we will recover more, Garrett said.

Sheriff Garrett, who had spent several sleepless nights in tracking down clues which led to the arrest of Roberts and Reid, lost no time in bringing the accused before Haskell County Judge Jim Ables County Court. Both pled guilty to the theft charges.

Lavina Reid received a 10-day jail sentence and fined \$250.00. Roberts was given a 90-day jail sentence and a \$500 fine.

Investigating officers were Sheriff Garrett; deputy, Pete Mercer; Texas Ranger Homer T. Melton; Constable Raymond Denson, Rule; and Bud LeFevre, constable at Rochester, along with other neighboring officers.

### BATTERY ATTEMPTED BATTERY THEFT FOILED

Marvin J. Luster, 44, of Wichita Falls, and Otis Mise, 41, of Olney, were picked up here on Friday night as they were attempting to take batteries from Smitty's Auto Parts, 204 N. 1st.

The balance of payments problem, which has resulted in heavy drains on our gold reserves, continues to plague us. Varied causes, some major, some minor, contribute to it. It consists of aggressive efforts to encourage foreigners to come and visit us. The plan is now in full operation and Pan-Am expects it to add a hefty \$500-million to the United States' balance of payments over a three-year period.

This program carries the name "See America... Sell America." It involves investments in planes and facilities, expanded overseas advertising and promotional budgets and improved procedures. Attractive fares are offered.

The benefits from the ambitious program are many. They include increases in U. S. tax revenues at all governmental levels; new sources of revenue for domestic transportation services, hotels, retail stores, and so on; and the creation of thousands of new jobs in tourist-serving industries and in companies engaged in export trade. All in all, this is a fine example of how imaginative private enterprise can help with national problems of top importance.

**GREAT WHITE FATHER**

President Robert P. Gerholz of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States has something worthwhile to say about federal intervention in the affairs of our communities.

As he sees it, community development is basically a competition for a greater share of national growth and prosperity, and federal help for local problems tends to make the contest unfair. So, in his words, "If the laggards in a golf tournament were allotted a few extra strokes to help them catch the leaders, what kind of a competition would that be? And how long would anybody keep trying to win?"

"Federal aid is out of place in this contest. Cities need plenty of inducements if they are to put forth their best efforts, and free competition is the best spur."

One of the worst aspects of federal aid of this type, aside from the money costs, is that it encourages local people and local organizations and institutions to sit on their hands and wait for the Great White Father in Washington to do the needed jobs. Initiative, imagination and responsibility are undermined and in many instances destroyed. And so the trend towards a monolithic government, which decides everything and does everything, is accelerated at a tragic cost in human freedom.

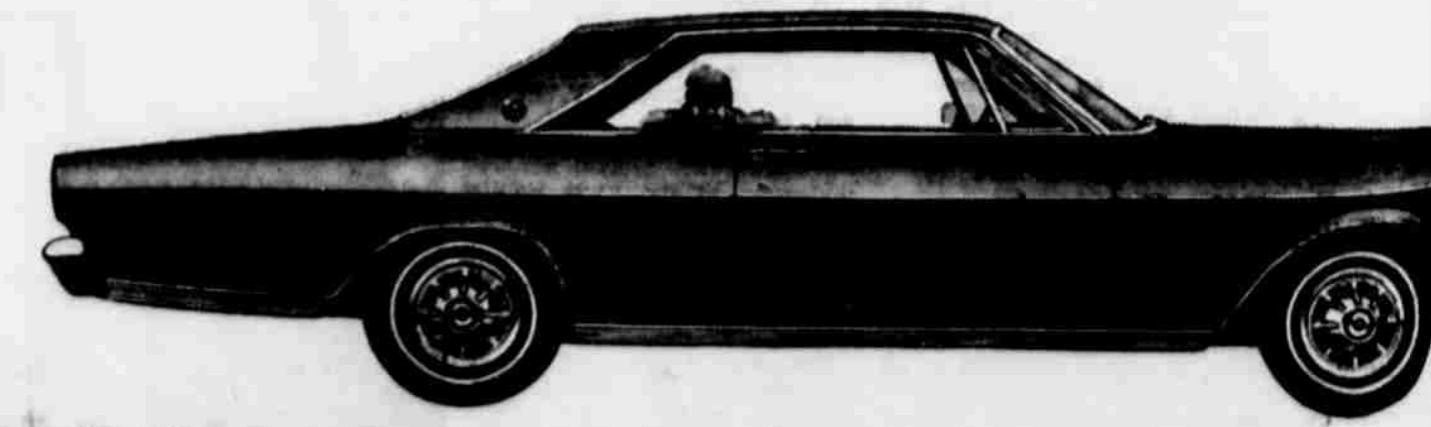

These prices are below the price for comparable service in the area and Mr. Turnbow says it is hoped the hospital can continue to maintain this position. 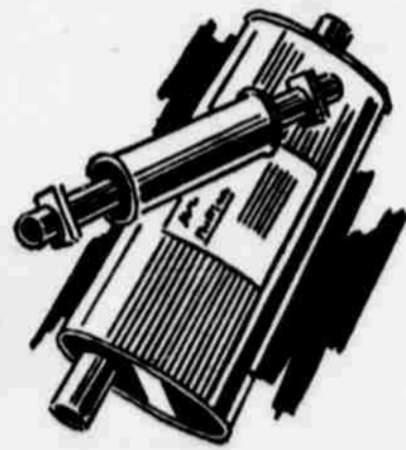

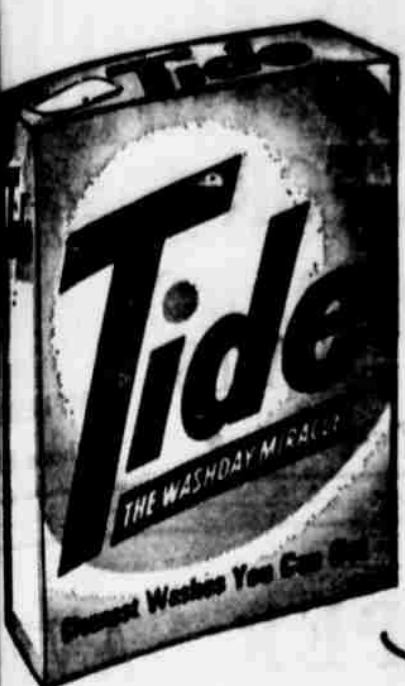

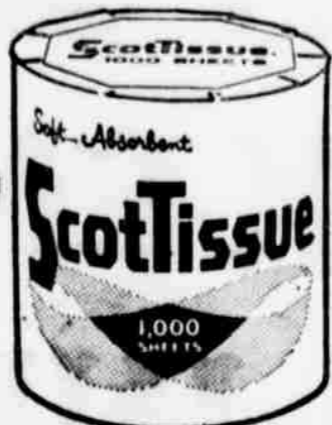

### The Good Earth

by MRS. B. F. COBB

Right now I am out of any space to garden for the first time in 31 years. We sold our home, and our garden plot. Never before had we been so blessed with good soil and all the water we wanted to use. Needless to say we will miss having vegetables any time we wanted to gather them. Right now we are renting and there isn't a space of any kind to plant anything. We hope to buy another home by planting time.

The amaryllis have really been pretty; so far we have had 20 blossoms. There are six more buds showing color. Some of the blooms were 7 1/2 inches across, some seven inches and some six inches across. There was one red blossom with a white six pointed star in its throat. Several were white with delicate pink stripes. A few were deep red. Do try amaryllis

next year they afford many days of pleasure.

My husband and I visited Joe Roberts "Green house of Tomatoes" in Munday last week. It was our first time to see tomatoes grow under plastic.

The plants are of Florida origin. Manapal and Floralou are the varieties planted. All side shoots are pinched off, and only the main trunk is left. The leaves are huge and only slightly resemble our common garden tomatoes. The vines are about an inch and a half in diameter. Some tower 7 1/2 to 8 feet tall.

Blossoms as large as small daisies grow in clusters of 6 to 8. Each cluster of blossoms has to be vibrated by hand. A long rod attached to a portable battery vibrates the pollen so they will set fruit. There are no bees or insects to carry pollen in a green house.

The tomatoes begin to ripen from the bottom of the vine. Some weigh as much as 1 1/4 lbs. One vine will have from 8 to 10 clusters of tomatoes. Each cluster has from 6 to 8 fruits in it. There are only slightly over 25 acres of tomatoes under plastic in the state of Texas. It

is a rather new undertaking. The flavor of the hot house tomatoes is out of this world.

Mr. and Mrs. Roberts got a scare last week as a light hail storm hit. Only minor damage occurred. Haskell Garden Club members

are looking forward to a spring flower show. Mrs. Ed Hester is chairman of the event and has prepared an interesting flower show schedule. If only mother nature co-operates with bountiful rains we should have a beautiful display.

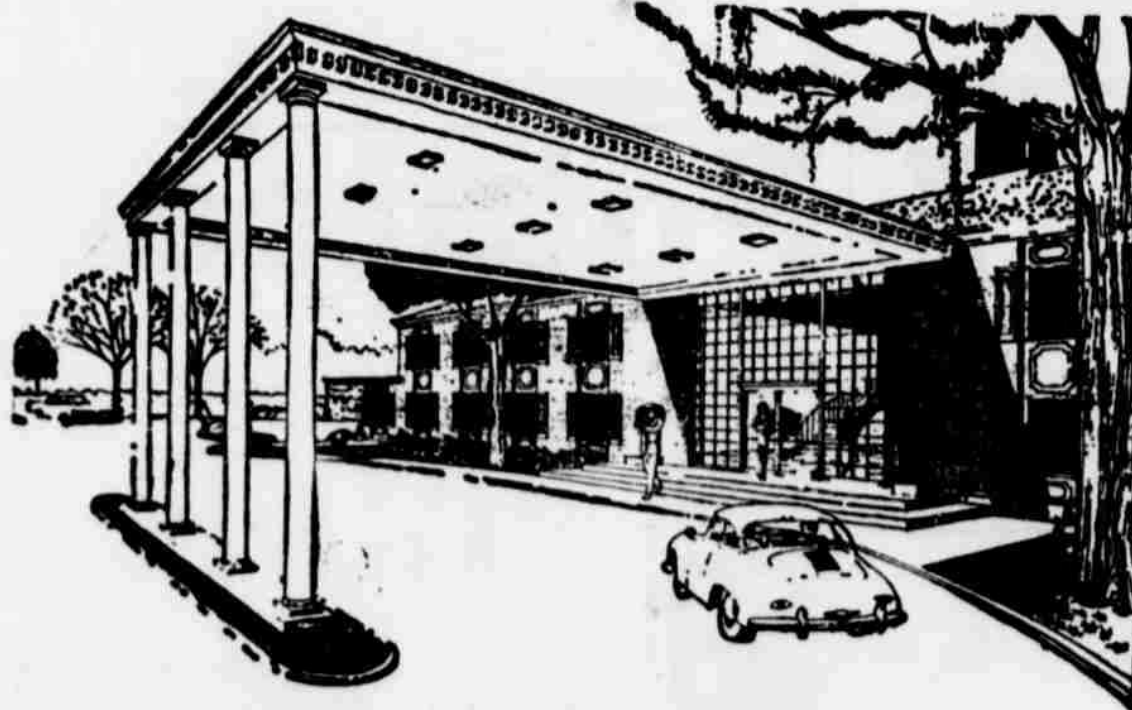
