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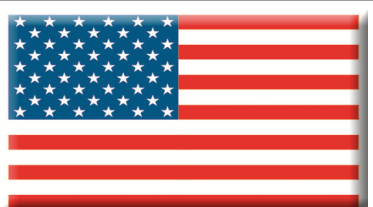

At the school board meeting scheduled Thursday evening, Big Spring ISD trustees will hold a public hearing to discuss the district's Financial Accountability Rating System of Texas (FIRST) rating and the annual financial accountability management report for the 2020-21 fiscal year.

The school board will meet at 5:15 p.m. Thursday in the board room at Big Spring High School, 707 E. 11th Place.

The meeting will open with a prayer and pledges to the U.S. and

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Texas flags, followed by an opportunity for public comments. If you would like to address the school board, arrive early to the meeting and fill out a brief form alerting board members to your intent to speak.

Next, the board will consider an action item concerning the annual audit. The board will consider approval of the audit report for the year ending Aug. 31, 2022.

The board will next consider special recognitions. No information regarding who will be recognized is provided along with the meeting's

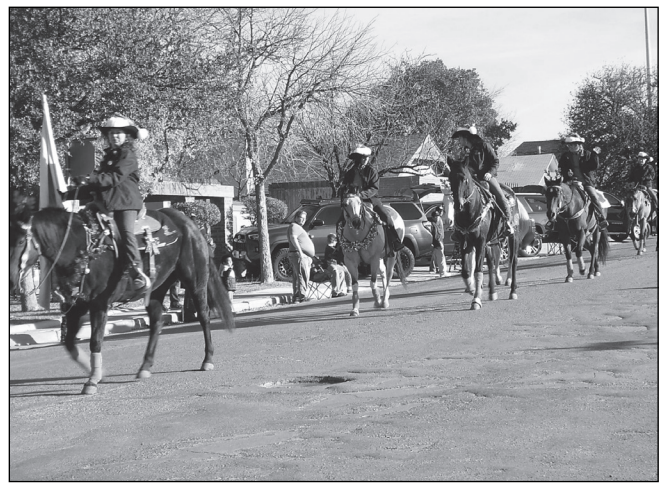

agenda.
The public hearing is next on the meeting's agenda.
The board will then consider a discussion item on GoGuardian Beacon. According to its website, GoGuardian's Beacon tool is a machine-learning solution that notifies pre-determined school staff of instances where students may be at risk of suicide, self-harm or potential harm to others. The Beacon tool works by analyzing students' online behaviors, including their browsing across all content, including search engines, social media, email, web apps and more.
According to the GoGuardian website, "Based on search content, Beacon can also alert staff to poten-

tial student safety threats or violence."
Following the GoGuardian Beacon discussion, the board will consider the meeting's Consent Agenda. On the Consent Agenda are two items: Approval of board minutes (including minutes from the Nov. 8 Special Meeting, Nov. 15 Regular Meeting and Nov. 17 Special Meeting); and financial reports.
The agenda includes eight Action Items for the board to consider:
• Approval of the Tax Roll.
• Possible action to approve the sale of tax properties by the Texas Communities Group, including four parcels, three to Rosa Elia Avila and one to Cinthia and Fortino Quezada.
• Approval of the local District of Innovation plan.
• Approval of various donations.
• Possible action to approve an agreement to retain Varitec Solutions LLC to be the contractor for

the repair, renovation and/or installation of upgraded heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems at BSISD facilities.
• Approval of expenditure over \$150,000 for the HVAC work from the previous item.
• Approval of employment recommendations.
• Discussion and approval of personnel issues, including employment, resignations, reassignment, duties, performance problems, and evaluations. This item may involve adjourning into closed executive session.
Following the Action Items, Superintendent Jay McWilliams will give his regular report, including resignations and retirements, an enrollment report, and district updates.
After McWilliams' report, the meeting will be adjourned.

Texas governor picks veteran GOP lawmaker for elections job

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Greg Abbott on Tuesday tapped a longtime Republican lawmaker to be Texas' new elections chief, a pick who could enjoy a smoother confirmation process following the blowback and scrutiny his two previous picks faced.
Jane Nelson, a state senator who didn't seek reelection last month, hasn't been a divisive figure in the Legislature and gives Abbott a candidate with a strong path to confirmation in the state Senate chamber

where she served for 30 years.
The announcement followed the resignation of Texas Secretary of State John Scott, whose appointment in 2021 came under immediate criticism over his brief stint as a lawyer on former President Donald Trump's legal team. Scott was preceded by David Whitley, a former Abbott aide who resigned before he could be forced out of office after calling into the question the U.S. citizenship of thousands of voters based on flawed data.

"Voters expect fair elections with accurate, timely results, and I am committed to making that happen," Nelson said in a statement.
Nelson is a former teacher from suburban Dallas and held a long stint as the senate's chief budget writer. The Texas secretary of state's office is still in the process of completing a limited audit of the 2020 election despite no evidence of widespread fraud.

Bennett, Duggan, Stroud, Williams are Heisman finalists

Quarterbacks Stetson Bennett of Georgia, Max Duggan of TCU, C.J. Stroud of Ohio State and Caleb Williams of Southern California were announced as finalists for the Heisman Trophy on Monday night.

The award given to the outstanding player in college football, determined by a vote of more than 900 sports journalists and past winners, will be presented Saturday at the Lincoln Center in New York.

Conspicuously absent from the list of finalists is Tennessee quarterback Hendon Hooker, who was the leader of the nation's No. 1 offense before his season ended Nov. 19 because of a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee.

Bennett had been a bit under the radar as a Heisman candidate and perhaps a mild surprise to be one of the top four vote-getters for no reason other than that his statistics don't jump off the page.

"I don't even know what to think right now," Bennett said. "We have a lot of good players who make me look good. It's special. This honor is all about my teammates and this team. I wouldn't be here if we didn't have the team that we have. This honor is for them."

Bennett, a sixth-year player from Blackshear, Georgia, does know how to win, though. He has quarterbacked the defending national champion Bulldogs to a second straight spot in the College Football Playoff and is 24-1 as a starter since last season.

Bennett was most valuable player of the Southeastern Conference championship game after throwing for 274 yards and four touchdowns in a 50-30 win over LSU that ran the Bulldogs' record to 13-0.

Of Georgia's three all-time wins over a No. 1-ranked team, Bennett was quarterback for two of them. He was at the controls for the Bulldogs' win over Alabama in the national championship game last January, and he passed for two TDs and ran for another in a 27-13 win over Tennessee last month.

"I understand what Coach (Kirby) Smart means when he says that success comes to those who don't look for it or are too busy working to look for it," Bennett said.

"I have never thought about the Heisman. I just wanted to play quarterback at Georgia. I just wanted to play football. I'm thinking of the players and people who have been in this with me. Regardless of who wins, it's a huge honor to be in this group."

Duggan willed TCU to its first CFP appearance with an inspiring performance in the Big 12 championship game against Kansas State.

Duggan, who had heart surgery two years ago, was at the center of one of the signature sequences of the season.

It happened late in the fourth quarter when he broke loose for

40 yards and then, visibly out of breath, ran for an 8-yard TD and completed his 2-point pass to bring the Frogs back from an 11-point, fourth-quarter deficit.

Duggan came up just short of the goal line on a run in overtime, and the Frogs lost for the first time this season, 31-28.

"I think if you watch this game today, I think it's pretty clear that he's certainly deserving to, if not win the Heisman Trophy, to certainly be in the conversation," first-year TCU coach Sonny Dykes said.

"His performance has been gritty week after week. The guy is one of the best players in college football. I think it's pretty obvious."

Duggan, a fourth-year player from Council Bluffs, Iowa, was Gary Patterson's starter for two seasons before Dykes picked Chandler Morris over Duggan in the preseason.

Duggan regained the job for the second game because of an injury to Morris and ended up leading the Big 12 in every major passing category.

Stroud, in his third season out of Inland Empire, California, is a Heisman finalist for the second year in a row. He was fourth in voting last year.

He came into this season regarded as the front-runner and remained the favorite as Ohio State piled up impressive numbers through the first eight games.

But he struggled against Northwestern, the worst team in the Big Ten, and he couldn't rally the Buckeyes in the second half of their most recent game, a 45-23 home loss to Michigan.

Still, Stroud has the nation's highest passer rating and is tied for the lead with 37 touchdown passes.

Williams transferred to USC from Oklahoma in February, two months after Lincoln Riley was hired away from the Sooners.

The second-year player from Washington is responsible for a nation-leading 21.7 points per game.

He turned in a gutsy performance in the Pac-12 championship game Friday, injuring his left hamstring on a 59-yard run in the first quarter but staying in the game and finishing with 363 yards passing and three touchdowns despite a noticeable limp in the 47-24 loss to Utah.

Williams has thrown for 37 touchdowns against just four interceptions and has amassed a school-record 4,447 total yards.

Including his 10 rushing touchdowns, he has accounted for a school-record 47.

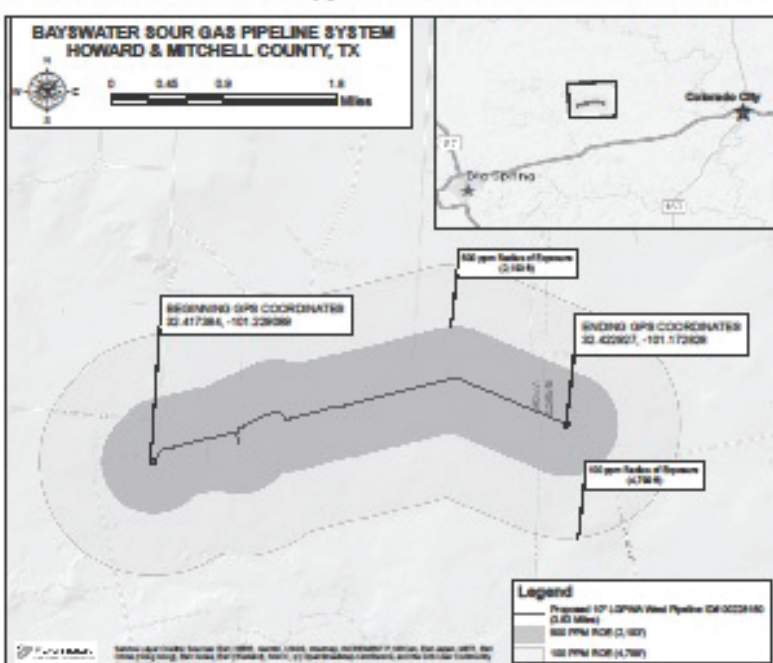

Today's Highlight in History:

On Dec. 7, 1941, the Empire of Japan launched an air raid on the U.S. Navy base at Pearl Harbor in Hawaii as well as targets in Malaya, Hong Kong, Guam, the Philippines and Wake Island; the United States declared war against Japan the next day.

On this date:
In 1787, Delaware became the first state to ratify the U.S. Constitution.

In 1796, electors chose John Adams to be the second president of the United States.

In 1917, during World War I, the United States declared war on Austria-Hungary.

In 1963, during the Army-Navy game, videotaped instant replay was used for the first time in a live sports telecast.

In 1972, America's last moon mission to date was launched as Apollo 17 blasted off from Cape Canaveral.

In 1982, convicted murderer Charlie Brooks Jr. became the first U.S. prisoner to be executed by injection, at a prison in Huntsville, Texas.

In 1988, a major earthquake in the Soviet Union devastated northern Armenia; official estimates put the death toll at 25-thousand.

In 2001, Taliban forces abandoned their last bastion in Afghanistan, fleeing the southern city of Kandahar.

In 2004, Hamid Karzai (HAH'-mihd KAHR'-zeye) was sworn in as Afghanistan's first popularly elected president.

In 2017, Democratic Sen. Al Franken said he would resign after a series of sexual harassment allegations; he took a parting shot at President Donald Trump, describing him as "a man who has bragged on tape about his history of sexual assault." Republican Rep. Trent Franks of Arizona said he would resign, after revealing that he discussed surrogacy with two female staffers.

In 2018, the man who drove his car into counterprotesters at a 2017 white nationalist rally in Virginia was convicted of first-degree murder; a state jury rejected defense arguments that James Alex Fields Jr. acted in self-defense.

In 2020, retired Air Force Brig. Gen. Charles "Chuck" Yeager, the World

War II fighter pilot ace and quintessential test pilot who in 1947 became the first person to fly faster than sound, died at 97.

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama asked Congress for \$60.4 billion in federal aid for New York, New Jersey and other states hit by Superstorm Sandy (lawmakers ended up passing a \$50.5 billion emergency relief measure in addition to a \$9.7 billion bill to replenish the National Flood Insurance Program).

Five years ago: A white former South Carolina police officer, Michael Slager, was sentenced to 20 years in prison for the fatal shooting of an unarmed black motorist, Walter Scott, in North Charleston in 2015. Demonstrators in the Gaza Strip burned U.S. flags and pictures of President Trump, and Palestinian protesters clashed with Israeli forces in east Jerusalem and the West Bank, after Trump's decision to recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital.

One year ago: During a video call lasting more than two hours, President Joe Biden warned Russia's Vladimir Putin that a Russian invasion of Ukraine would bring sanctions and enormous harm to the Russian economy. A major outage in Amazon's cloud computing network severely disrupted services at a wide range of U.S. companies for more than five hours, impacting everything from airline reservations and auto dealerships to payment apps and video streaming services.

Contract Bridge

There are often two sides to a story, and the same can be said of many bridge hands. Consider this case where West led the diamond six against three notrump, taken by East with the ace. East returned the five of diamonds, South's jack losing to the queen, and at this point West — a very fine defensive player — realized that it would be futile to continue the suit.

Accordingly, he switched to a low club at trick three, having decided that the best chance of stopping three notrump was to find partner with the ace or king of clubs and queen of hearts. That holding was entirely possible on the bidding.

No truer arrow was ever shot! East's king forced declarer's ace, and South could do no better than attempt a heart finesse. When he did, East took his queen and returned a club, and declarer went down one, losing two diamonds, a heart and two clubs.

After giving West full credit for his club shift at trick three, the unalterable fact remains that failing to make the contract was South's own fault — and that's the other side of the story.

South blundered badly when he finessed the jack of diamonds at trick two. He was playing with fire, and he ultimately got burned. South could have assured making three notrump by winning the second diamond with the king and finessing the nine of hearts.

If the finesse lost and East did not have a diamond to return, South would make five notrump. If the finesse lost and East did have a diamond to return, that would mean West had started with only a four-card suit, so South would wind up making three notrump.

The normal-looking play of the diamond jack at trick two thus turned out to be both a snare and a delusion.

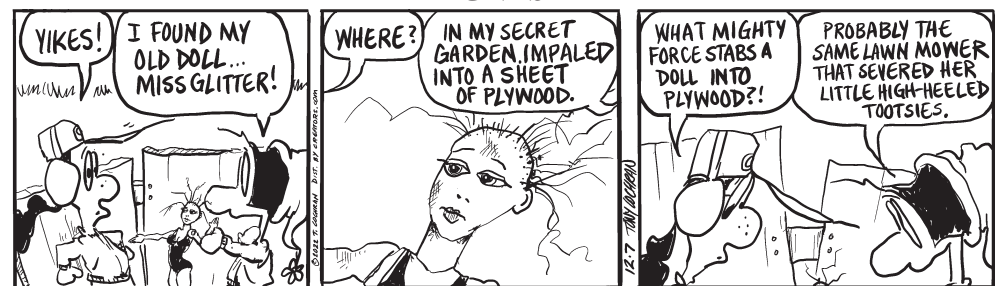

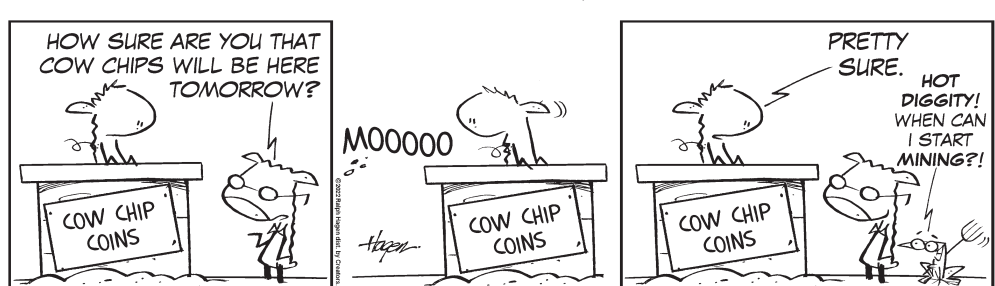
