## Texas officer testifies he saw gun before fatal shooting By JAKE BLEIBERG

A former Texas police officer on trial for murder testified Monday that he made mistakes, but said he had no choice when he fatally shot a Black woman through a rear window of her home in 2019 while staring down the barrel of a handgun she was pointing at Aaron Dean said Atatiana Jefferson had the gun

"pointed directly at me" but repeatedly acknowledged his actions were "bad police work" on the fourth day of his trial in the killing of the 28-year-old woman. It was Dean's first public statement in the more than three years since the white Fort Worth officer shot Jefferson while responding to a call about an open front door. "I was looking right down the barrel of the gun and

when I saw the barrel of that gun pointed at me, I fired a single shot from my duty weapon," Dean said on the witness stand. Prosecutors contend Dean didn't see On cross examination, Dean, now 38, acknowledged

that he didn't say he was police nor mention the gun

before shooting, and also didn't tell another officer about the weapon before they moved into the house. Running through events, prosecutors repeatedly

asked if his actions were "more bad police work." Again and again, Dean said "yes." The Fort Worth Police Department released body-

camera video and arrested Dean on a murder charge within days of the Oct. 12, 2019, shooting. He'd completed the police academy the year before and quit the force without speaking to investigators. Since then, Dean's case was repeatedly postponed

amid lawyerly wrangling, the terminal illness of Dean's lead attorney and the COVID-19 pandemic. Tarrant County prosecutors rested their case Wednesday after about two and a half days of testimony.

Dean shot Jefferson after a neighbor called a nonemergency police line to report that the front door to Jefferson's home was open. She had been playing video games that night with her nephew and it emerged at trial that they left the doors open to vent smoke from hamburgers the boy burnt.

Bodycam footage showed that Dean and a second officer who responded to the call didn't identify themselves as police at the house. Officer Carol Darch testified last week that she and Dean thought the house might have been burglarized and quietly moved into the fenced-off backyard, guns drawn, looking for signs of forced

There, Dean fired a single shot through the window a split-second after shouting at Jefferson, who was inside, to show her hands.

Dean testified Monday that his view of the darkened backyard was clearer than what's shown in his body-camera footage but said that he could not make out the race or sex of the person in the window. He said he opened fire after seeing a gun "very close" and that he was briefly blinded by his muzzle flash.

# Texas coach Chris Beard arrested on family violence charge

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Chris Beard, who coached Texas Tech to the 2019 NCAA championship game and was hired away by Texas with expectations he'd elevate his alma mater to the same elite level, was arrested early Monday on a felony family violence charge.

Beard was arrested by Austin police and booked in the Travis County jail at 4:18 a.m. on a charge of assault on a family or household member in which their breath was impeded, or choking in common terms.

The charge is a third-degree felony in Texas, with a possible punishment of two to 10 years in prison. Jail records showed Beard had not posted bond as of Monday morning and did not indicate when he would be making an initial court appearance.

Beard attorney Perry Minton did not return a message from the AP seeking comment but he told the Austin American-Statesman the coach is innocent of the charge.

"He should never have been arrested," Minton told the newspaper. "The complainant wants him released immediately and all charges dismissed. It is truly

inconceivable." The seventh-ranked Longhorns (7-1) host Rice on Monday night. They were ranked No. 2 a week ago, the program's highest ranking in more than a decade.

"The university is aware of the situation regarding Chris Beard. We are continuing to gather information and monitoring the legal process," the school said in a statement.

Beard is in his second season of a seven-year guaranteed contract that pays him more than \$5 million per year. Before that, he was 112-55 in five seasons with the Red Raiders. He was named The Associated Press coach of the year in 2019 as he guided Texas Tech to a 31-7 finish and lost in an overtime thriller to Virginia in the national championship game.

His departure for Texas — a deal reached after a meeting with Texas athletic director Chris Del Conte that included a McDonald's breakfast an hour's drive north of Lubbock — left Texas Tech officials frustrated.

Beard said it was a difficult move, but he could not turn down a chance to coach at his alma mater, where he was a student assistant three decades ago. Earlier this year, he led Texas to a first-round victory over Virginia Tech that was the Longhorns' first NCAA Tournament win since 2014.

Beard's contract includes a provision under which he can be fired for cause for conduct the administration reasonably determines reflects poorly on the coach, program, school or university system. That includes being charged with a felony. University of Texas System Board of Regents Chairman Kevin Eltife did not immediately return a message seeking comment.

If Beard is suspended, Longhorns associate head coach Rodney Terry would be a likely candidate to lead the team. Terry has been a head coach at UTEP

(2018-21) and Fresno State (2011-18). Texas freshman guard Arterio Morris faces a misdemeanor family violence charge stemming from a June arrest after an incident with a former girlfriend.

He faces a Wednesday court hearing in Denton County near Dallas. Morris, a top national recruit, has been allowed to play this season despite the charge, and averages 17 minutes and 6.5 points per game. Morris' attorney,

Justin Moore, has said Moore is innocent of the assault charge.





But many Souths, knowing East had started with five hearts and West with only three, thought it very unlikely that East could have all three spades and West none. These declarers thought West had to have at least one spade, and if it was the singleton king, they could make an overtrick. So they laid down the ace of spades and were flabbergasted when West showed out. All of these Souths — about two-thirds of the field — thus went down in an ice-cold contract.

Without any revealing bidding East-West, the expectancy that two days later. East would have all three spades is 11%. Since East was known to have find themselves doing something started with five hearts, this percentage is slightly lower.

As opposed to this, the chance that West would be dealt the singleton king — normally 13% — was also lessened slightly by the fact that he had only three hearts.



The New York Times published claims by three women that they had been raped by music mogul Russell Simmons in the 1980s and 1990s; Simmons denied the allegations.

One year ago: The

House panel investigating the Jan. 6 Capitol insurrection voted to pursue contempt charges against former White House chief of staff Mark Meadows; lawmakers also revealed a series of frantic texts he received as the attack was under way, in which members of Congress, Fox News anchors and even President Donald Trump's son urged Meadows to push Trump to act quickly to stop the siege by his supporters. (The House voted to hold Meadows in contempt, but the Justice Department declined to prosecute.) The Air Force said it had discharged 27 people for refusing to get the COVID-19 vaccine; they were believed to be the first service members removed for disobeying the mandate to get the shots. The

to halt a COVID-19

vaccine requirement for health care workers

in New York that did

not offer an exemption for religious reasons. The Biden administration released a federal strategy to build 500,000 charging stations for electric vehicles across the country and ultimately transform the U.S. auto industry.




