# Howard College Meeting Presented Quick Facts About District

Howard County Junior College and the shadows fall behind District Board members heard several "Quick Facts" about the district – an event prepared annually for the final meeting each year by the college's

The report came during Monday's meeting.

After the meeting began at 12:30 with an invocation and recognition of guests, the board approved several routine matters, including minutes of the Nov. 14 regular meeting; November 2022 checklist; monthly reports of auxiliary services; personnel matters; and the internal audit report.

Next, Howard College President Dr. Cheryl Sparks reported on the college's response to COVID-19 - the 32nd such report since the onset of the pandemic.

"We are finding ourselves, really



moving hopefully past the pandemic, although we do have some more activity as far as COVID in our area," Sparks told the board.

"Mainly what we're working on right now is how to spend the remaining CARES money that we must have expended by June of '23. So we're working on that. We continue to just be responsive to things that are happening as far as confirmed cases or exposures. We work through all that following the Open Howard College document that

y'all approved earlier." The "Quick Facts" report came next. The purpose of the report is to provide a snapshot of the district and its schools in Big Spring, Lamesa and San Angelo, as well as the SouthWest College for the Deaf.

"It basically goes through and looks at each of our campuses, and specifically it looks at how we are faring as a district," Sparks said, noting that the report includes the district's vision, mission and values statements.

Sparks next announced that the college has been asked to participate in the Howard County Leadership Summit scheduled Feb. 28. The Leadership Summit, first held in December of 2021, was instituted to coordinate efforts among local governmental entities and leading businesses to move the county forward economically.

The board approved an interlocal agreement with the Texas Department Information Resources Communication Technology Services Division; and approved the auction of Howard County Trustee properties to

the highest bidder for cash.

The board approved Change Order No. 8 on the ongoing roofing project at Howard's Big Spring and SWCD campuses.

Howard's Special Project Officer Terry Hansen said the project is nearly complete.

"It never fails. We again had substantial completion inspection on the schedule for Thursday and Friday this week, and naturally we had about three or four days of rain," he said. "It wasn't heavy rain, but it was enough to keep things wet and slick and dangerous on the roofs. So that pushed us back a little bit. Right now it looks like we're going to do that on the 20th of December."

Howard's Workforce and Community

Development Officer Fabian Serrano said work on the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum is almost complete.

"The coliseum should be completed sometime this week," he said. "All of the cabinets in the main room have been rebuilt. All of the vanities in the locker rooms - except for the men's locker room, which was not damaged – are currently being installed. The coliseum should be done this week." Hansen said renovations on the Big Spring campus' Library and Music Building are proceeding well. "Those buildings, all the demolition

is complete. I was over there in the Library this morning, and there's some new walls going up where the new classroom will be, and the lab the little video lab where instructors or even students will be able to go in and do little video clips to share with class members or even with friends...it's going to be available for a lot of different uses. The Library will be completed before the Music Building, even though both projects were scheduled for 280 days. The contractor has told us - I don't want to jinx it, but he's looking at an April completion date on the Library. The Music Building, we're looking at June or July."

Addressing the board by telephone link, school officials announced that work on the district's upcoming audit, as well as work on implementation of the new Student Information System, are proceeding well.

Woman of the Year recipients have made can still be seen in our community. These individuals have demonstrated their love for the community and benefits of that love can still be seen," ValVerde said. "There are so many people who are doing great things, and while we will never be able to recognize each of them, but we do want to make an effort to let these people know all that they do are appreciated."

Nominations for Man and Woman of the Year will be selected by a committee and selection will be based on all around contributions to the community. The nominee should demonstrate a consistent track record of accomplishments rather than being honored for a single act of merit.

"Man and Woman of the Year is a special honor to receive. We do ask that a Chamber

member nominates them, but the nominee does not have to be a Chamber member," ValVerde said. "We do want to remind those looking to nominate someone that those who are currently holding a political office are not eligible for nomination."

# Mississippi State football coach Mike Leach dies at 61

Mike Leach, the gruff, pioneering and unfiltered college football coach who helped revolutionize the game with the Air Raid offense, has died following complications from a heart condition, Mississippi State said Tuesday. He was 61.

Leach, who was in his third season as head coach at Mississippi State, fell ill Sunday at his home in Starkville, Mississippi. He was treated at a local hospital before being airlifted to University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson, about 120 miles (200 kilometers) away. He died Monday night.

"Mike was a giving and attentive husband, father and grandfather. He was able to participate in organ donation at UMMC as a final act of charity," the family said in a statement issued by Mississippi State. "We are supported and uplifted by the outpouring of love and prayers from family, friends, Mississippi State University, the hospital staff, and football fans around the world. Thank you for sharing in the joy of our beloved husband and fa-

In 21 seasons as a head coach at Texas Tech, Washington State and Mississippi State, Leach went 158-107.

Leach fought through a bout with pneumonia late in this sea-

son, coughing uncontrollably at times during news conferences, but seemed to be improving, according to those who worked with

News of him falling gravely ill swept through college football the past few days and left many who knew him stunned, hoping and praying for Leach's recovery under grim circumstances.

His impact on all levels of football — from high school to the NFL — over the last two decades runs deep and will continue for

"Mike's keen intellect and unvarnished candor made him one of the nation's true coaching legends," Mississippi State President Mark Keenum said. "His passing brings great sadness to our university, to the Southeastern Conference, and to all who loved college football. I will miss Mike's profound curiosity, his honesty, and his wide-open approach to pursuing excellence in

Leach was known for his pass-happy offense, wide-ranging interests — he wrote a book about Native American leader Geronimo, had a passion for pirates and taught a class about insurgent warfare — and rambling, off-the-cuff news conferences. An interview with Leach was as likely to veer off into politics,

wedding planning or hypothetical mascot fights as it was to stick to football. He considered Donald Trump a friend before the billionaire businessman ran for president and then campaigned for him in 2016.

He traveled all over the world and his curiosity knew no bounds. He most appreciated those who stepped outside of their

"One of the biggest things I admire about Michael Jordan, he got condemned a lot for playing baseball. I completely admired that," Leach told The Associated Press last spring. "I mean, you're gonna be dead in 100 years anyway. You've mastered basketball and you're gonna go try to master something else, and stick your neck out and you're not afraid to do it, and know that a lot of people are gonna be watching you while you do it. I thought it was awesome."

Leach's teams were consistent winners at programs where success did not come easy. And his quarterbacks put up massive passing statistics, running a relatively simple offense called the Air Raid that he did not invent but certainly mastered.

As much as Leach enjoyed digging into topics other than football, he was excellent at the X's and O's.

Six of the 20 best passing seasons in major college football history were by quarterbacks who played for Leach, including four

Calling plays from a folded piece of paper smaller than an index card, Leach turned passers such as B.J. Symons (448.7 yards per game), Graham Harrell (438.8), Connor Halliday (430.3) and Anthony Gordon (429.2) into record-setters and Heisman Trophy

"You have to make choices and limit what you're going to teach and what you're going to do. That's the hard part," Leach told the AP about the Air Raid's economical playbook.

Leach also had a penchant for butting heads with authority, and he wasn't shy about criticizing players he felt were not playing with enough toughness. A convergence of those traits cost Leach his first head coaching

job. He went 84-43 with the Red Raiders, never having a losing season at the Big 12 school and reaching No. 2 in the country in 2008 with a team that went 11-2 and matched a school record for victories. But he was fired by Texas Tech in December 2009 after being

accused of mistreating a player, Adam James — the son of former ESPN announcer and NFL player Craig James — who had suffered a concussion. He clashed with his bosses instead of apologizing for the conflict, and eventually sued Texas Tech for wrongful termination.

The school was protected by state law, but Leach never stopped trying to fight that case. He also filed a lawsuit against ESPN and Craig James that was later dismissed. Leach was out of coaching for two seasons. He and his wife,

Sharon, bought a home in Key West, Florida, where he spent time riding his bike around town and knocking back drinks at the local bars. He returned to coaching but never gave up that beloved home

in the Keys. Leach landed in the Pac-12 at Washington State in 2012. After

three losing seasons, the Cougars soon looked very much like his Texas Tech teams. In 2018, Washington State went 11-2, setting a school record for victories, and was ranked as high as No. 7 in the country.

Leach moved to the Southeastern Conference in 2020, taking over at Mississippi State.

After years of questions about whether Leach's spread offense could be successful in the nation's most talented football conference, the Bulldogs set an SEC record for yards passing in his very first game against defending national champion LSU.

Born March 9, 1961, in tiny Susanville, California, Leach grew up in even smaller Cody, Wyoming. Raised as a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, he attended BYU and later got a law degree from Pepperdine.

"It was hard for me when I was in college, narrowing down what to study," Leach told the AP.

Leach didn't play college football, but watching the innovative passing attack used by then-Cougars coach LaVell Edwards at a time when most teams were still run-heavy piqued his interest in drawing up plays.

In 1987, he broke into college coaching at Cal Poly, but it was

at Iowa Wesleyan where he found his muse. Head coach Hal Mumme had invented the Air Raid while coaching high school in Texas. At Iowa Wesleyan, with Leach as offensive coordinator, it began to take hold and fundamentally change the way football was played.

Leach followed Mumme to Valdosta State and then to the SEC at Kentucky, smashing passing records along the way. He spent one season as Oklahoma's offensive coordinator in 1999 before getting his own program at Texas Tech.

From there, the Air Raid spread like wild and became the predominant way offense was run in the Big 12.

Leach's extensive coaching tree includes USC's Lincoln Riley, TCU's Sonny Dykes, Houston's Dana Holgorsen and Kliff Kingsbury of the Arizona Cardinals.

"Coach — You will certainly be missed, but your impact on so many will live on — Thankful for every moment. You changed my life and so many others," Riley posted on Twitter.

This past season, Leach's Mississippi State team finished 8-4, including a 24-22 victory Thanksgiving night over Mississippi in the intense rivalry known as the Egg Bowl. It was his final game.

Leach is survived by his wife and four children, Janeen, Kimberly, Cody and Kiersten.

# Carr lifts Texas over Rice after coach Chris Beard suspended

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — No. 7 Texas had already been through a long, bewildering day, and there was still a game to play.

Coach Chris Beard was arrested on a felony domestic violence charge early Monday. Assistant Rodney Terry called the players together to talk, urging them to rally to each other and stay focused on their matchup with Rice.

By tipoff, Beard was out of jail but suspended indefinitely without pay. That left Terry to direct the Longhorns to a tough 87-81 overtime win over Rice.

Terry summed up Monday as a "difficult

"I took our older guys ... and really just had a really good talk in terms of there's going to be things like this the rest of your life. It's how you deal with them, adapt and adjust. At the end of the day, we have a job to do," Terry said. "I thought they responded to that well."

Texas has not yet publicly committed to Terry as the acting coach beyond Monday night's game. Texas doesn't play again until Sunday in Dallas against Stanford. Terry said the school had not yet talked to him about any future games.

Terry has two previous head coaching stints at UTEP (2018-21) and Fresno State (2011-18). He got a round of applause Monday night when he was announced as the "acting head coach" before tipoff.

Quincy Olivari scored 28 points for Rice, which missed the potential game winner in the final seconds of regulation.

Terry was animated in Beard's absence, often standing courtside and waving his arms to pump up the crowd in a tense matchup that featured the teams trading baskets for most of the second half.

Beard is in his second season of a sevenyear contract that pays him more than \$5 million per year. His contract includes a provision that he could fired for cause if arrested on a felony charge. The formal charge is assault by strangulation/suffo-

Beard had Texas (8-1) humming in his second season. After starting 6-0, the Longhorns were No. 2, the program's highest ranking in more than a decade.





The Rule of Eleven is a handy gadget that can be used by either side. Here is an unusual case that demonstrates the value of the rule.

West leads the six of spades, dummy following low, and the question is what East should play on this trick. If he plays the ten, which is probably what most players would do, declarer can make the contract by establishing clubs and guessing to play the nine of spades on West's spade return (or later leading a spade to the nine himself) to produce his ninth trick.

Let's suppose that East is a devout

disciple of the Rule of Eleven and understands its workings perfectly. In that event, after West leads the six of spades and dummy follows with the three, East plays the five!

The effect of this startling play is that South goes down one. Declarer wins and attacks clubs, whereupon West takes the ace and leads another low spade. If the queen is played from dummy, East quickly defeats the contract by taking the king and continuing with the ten to West's jack; if the nine is played from dummy, East wins with the ten, cashes the king and returns the queen of diamonds, leaving South with only eight tricks. In applying the Rule of Eleven

(which assumes that the lead is fourth-best), East subtracts the number of the card led from 11 which in this case tells him that there are five cards higher than the six in the North, East and South

East sees two of them in dummy and two of them in his own hand, so he knows South has only one spade higher than the six. Given South's two no-trump bid, this card is most likely to be the ace, which means East can safely play the five. Even if South's spade honor is the jack, the play of the five can do no worse than break even, since South is assured of a spade trick no matter what East plays.

One year ago: The House voted to hold former White House chief of staff Mark Meadows in contempt of Congress after he ceased to cooperate with the Jan. 6 committee investigating the Capitol insurrection. (The Justice Department would decline to prosecute.) A federal judge dis-

missed a lawsuit that was brought by former President Donald Trump in his attempt to block congressional lawmakers from obtaining his tax returns. The U.S. death toll from COVID-19 topped 800,000, ac-






